Surplus Fruit Crop Offers Many Home Opportunities

College Station, July 31—With peach growers, consumers, grocers, and governmental agencies intent on distribution and consumption of Texas' bumper peach crop, homemakers will likely turn their attention to drying as a safe, economical means of preservation.

Grace I. Neely, specialist in food preservation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, says in one of her publications that most foods, if stored in a cool, dry place, will remain in a good edible condition for a year or more.

There are two methods which may be followed in drying peaches—drying in the sun or in a ventilated glassed-in box. The latter provides a higher temperature and can be made a protection from the rain, while there is little control of temperature in the sun drying method.

As a rule, the specialist says, sliced peaches dry in three to eight hours; halved fruits in eight to 24 hours; and whole fruit in 18 to 36 hours. After some pieces will dry before the rest, and in this case the thoroughly dried products should be removed and the remainder left in the dryer to complete the process. Fruit thoroughly dried has a "rubbery" texture.

When fruit is taken from the drying trays it should be "conditioned"—that is, it should be placed in deep containers and stirred each day for 8 to 10 days. Then before it is stored, the product should be heated for 30 minutes at a temperature from 150 to 180 degrees. All containers for storing dried foods should be sealed or closed tight, the specialist says. Further information about home drying of foods can be obtained from county home demonstration agents.

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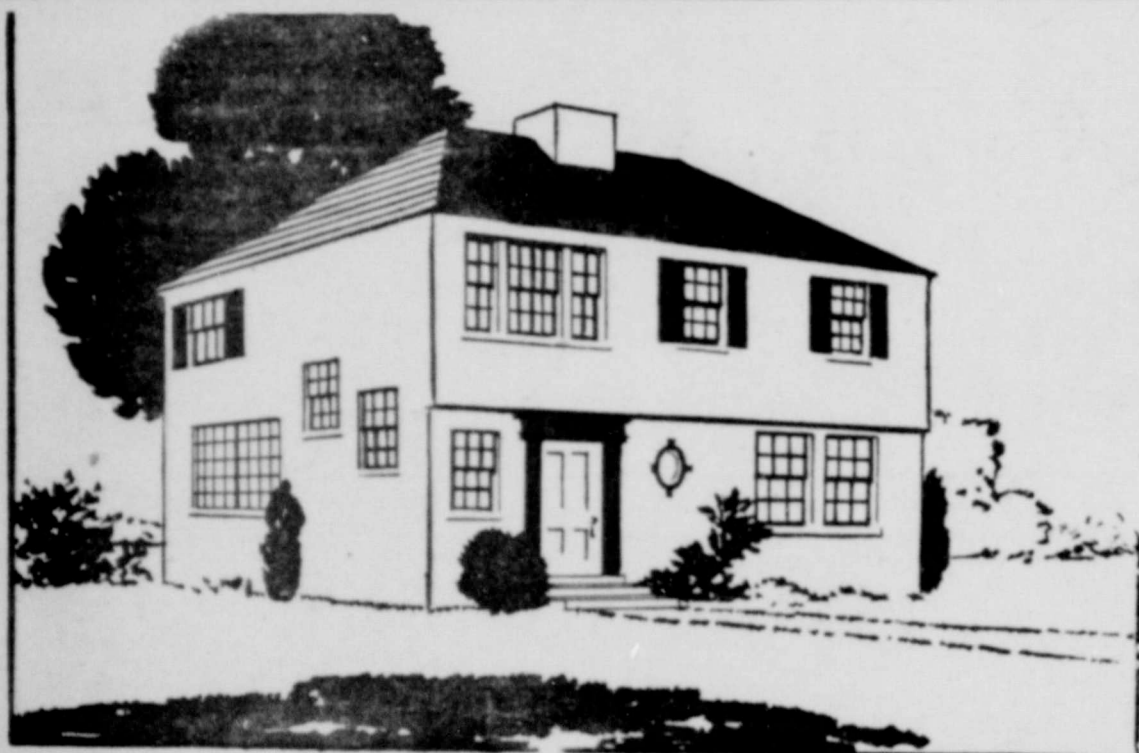

These two illustrations are a study in good and bad window composition. Window composition is a builder's or architect's term for window massing or window location.

The top illustration, according to the Federal Housing Administration, shows poor window composition, while the lower drawing represents a house with well-placed windows.

The oval, double-hung, casement, double, and triple windows in the top illustration lend restlessness and confusion to the architectural treatment of the house. In the one structure every common type of window

is used with the result that harmony is sacrificed.

Introduction of shutters only on the single double-hung windows is not consistent with good design, according to the FHA advisers. The same house has an atmosphere of dignity and simplicity when the windows are well-chosen, well-placed, and given the proper type shutters, as illustrated in the lower drawing.

Shutters could be added to the first-floor front windows of the lower house although the designer apparently thought that the overhang provided ample protection to

these windows.

The location of the door in the upper design indicates a side hall plain with light provided by windows stepping up to conform with rise in stairs. Although windows located in this manner may be justified from a practical point of view, they nevertheless tend to make the exterior design restless. The center hallway of the lower house receiving its light from side and transom windows of the old colonial type doorway offers a simple and restful exterior facade.

Cotton Louse or Aphid Should be Controlled

Cotton louse or cotton aphid is do-
ing damage in some of the cotton
fields over the county and the County
Agricultural Agent wishes to call
this fact to the attention of the
farmers, that this pest can be con-
trolled satisfactorily.

These lice vary greatly in colora-
tion but are commonly green or
greenish black or yellow with char-
acteristic black markings. They
multiply at an extraordinary rate
except at extremely high tempera-
ture. They may cause the leaves to
curl and may retard the growth of
the plant.

The aphid or lice are constantly
sucking sap from the plant and the
excess fluid passes through their
bodies, dropping on the leaves or on
the ground as a clear, sticky sub-
stance, known as honey dew, which
often becomes infected with a sooty
fungus and turns black. Honey dew
falling into the open soil may stain
lint and make it gummy, thus low-
ering its grade.

Aphis infestation on cotton can
easily be suppressed by applying,
under proper conditions, a nicotine
dust containing about 2½ per cent of
nicotine. Usually one application is
sufficient. The dusting should be
done only when the air is calm, and
becomes more effective as the tem-
perature rises. A single dusting may
be made to serve for both boll weevil
and aphid by mixing that percentage
of nicotine with the calcium arse-
nate. In other cases hydrated lime
is used as a carrier for the nicotine.

To make this nicotine dust, thor-
oughly mix 100 pounds of the carrier
with 6½ pounds or 5 pints of com-
mercial nicotine sulphate solution
which contains 40 per cent of nico-
tine. Apply the dust at the rate of
from 6 to 9 pounds per acre.

As nicotine dusts deteriorate
rapidly upon exposure to the air, it is
well to make them at home, just
before they are to be applied.

Cotton in Excess of '41 Quotas Subject To Penalty

Cotton marketed in excess of 1941
farm marketing quotas will be sub-
ject to a penalty of approximately
7 cents per pound, Floyd County
AAA Secretary has announced.

In 1939 and 1940, Hoots continued,
the penalty for excess cotton was 3
cents per pound and in 1938 the rate
was 2 cents per pound. There will
not be an increase however, in the
total amount of penalties due on car-
ry-over penalty cotton marketed in
excess of the 1941 quota.

The higher penalty rate will be
applied on only that portion of the
carry-over penalty cotton which
would yield the same amount of
penalties as all of the carry-over cot-
ton would have yielded under the
former rates. The remainder of the
carry-over cotton would then become
penalty free.

"To make my point clear," Hoots
said, "suppose a farmer has 700
pounds of carry-over penalty cotton
from 1940. Had he marketed the
cotton last year, he would have paid
a penalty of \$21 which is the equi-
valent of 3 cents per pound. If he
elects to sell the cotton this year,
however, the 7 cents per pound pen-
alty would be in effect and he would
pay 7 cents per pound penalty on
only 300 pounds for the \$21 total
penalty since this is the amount of
the total penalty for 1940. The re-
maining 400 pounds of cotton would
then become penalty free."

Recently enacted legislation which
makes 85 percent of parity loans
available on major commodities also
provides that penalties on excess
marketings will be 50 percent of the
basic loan rate. The basic loan rate
for cotton for 1941 will be set at 85
percent of the parity price as of the
beginning of the marketing year
which will be about August 1.

If, for example, Hoots continued,
the parity price of cotton on August
1 is the same as it is at the present
time, or 16.12 cents per pound, the
basic loan rate will be 13.70 cents
per pound, which is 85 percent of
parity. The penalty on excess cotton,
in this case, would be 6.8 cents per
pound. The loan rate for cotton
marketed in excess of the farm mar-
keting quota is 60 percent of that
offered to producers who plant
within their cotton acreage allot-
ments.

Non-cooperators would be entitled
to a 60 percent loan on only that por-
tion of the crop which is in excess
of the farm quota and when this
cotton is placed under loan it re-
mains subject to the penalty when
marketed in excess of the farm
quota.

Farmers Should Have Planting Seed Tested

Information has been received by
the county agricultural agent, D. F.
Bredthauer, that through a system
in use by the Texas Wheat Improve-
ment Association wheat farmers will
be able to get their wheat planting
seed analyzed for purity beginning
immediately.

This is rather important due to the
fact that for the past few years mix-
tures in wheat of barley and rye
have become of such an appreciable
amount that it has seriously affected
the price of wheat and farmers will
be able to receive this analysis free
by bringing a representative sample
of their planting wheat to the Coun-
ty Agricultural Agent. One-fourth
pound of wheat will be sufficient.
This test will be made for varietal
purity, and will be free of charge.

Shelterbelts Like Good Seasons 1941 Growth Indicates

Unusual increase in growth is pre-
dicted for the shelterbelts on more
than 2,500 farms in northwest Texas
as a result of favorable weather in
recent weeks.

W. E. Webb, state director of the
Prairie States Forestry Project, says,
"A number of tree species which
struggled through several years of
drought have come back with a
bang." Cottonwood particularly is
showing a remarkable recovery. Other
trees such as Chinese elm, black
and honey locust, mulberry, green
ash, walnut, and many others have
already put out from 12 to 15 inches
of growth this year.

Shelterbelts were first planted in
six different counties six years ago.
The planting program has now
spread to 32 counties.

Storage Rates For 1941 Loan Cotton Are Announced

College Station, July 31.—The maxi-
mum warehousing rate for 1941 loan
cotton are 17½ cents a bale per
month for warehouses that do not
operate compress facilities and 15
cents a bale per month for ware-
houses operating compress facilities.
B. F. Vance, administrative officer
of the state AAA, has announced.

In addition to these charges, Vance
said, warehouses may not collect
more than 25 cents per bale service
charge for receiving, sampling and
delivering, and 10 cents a bale for
each service of reweighing and re-
sampling. As customary in past loan
programs, the cotton producer will
also pay a fee of 15 cents a bale
for classing which is done by the
Agricultural Marketing Service.

At the time service is authorized
by the person having title to the
warehouse receipts, compression
charges will be made at rates spec-
ified in the warehouseman's estab-
lished tariff in effect at that time
but will not be in excess of the tariff
rate of July 1, 1941. Delivery charges
for cotton on which compression
charges are not collected, may also
be made by warehouses that operate
compress facilities, the AAA official
said, but no delivery charge will be
made if the cotton is delivered direct
to a consuming mill within 50 miles
of the warehouse plant.

Fire insurance for the full market

value of the cotton will be carried
by the warehouseman and if his es-
tablished tariff provides for rates
lower than the maximum rates, the
lower rates will apply. In the event
county AAA committees authorize it,
warehouses may make out loan pa-
pers for an agreed fee.

Storage and fire insurance rates
for 1938 loan cotton will be con-
tinued under the existing warehou-
sing contracts with a maximum rate
of 12½ cents per bale. The maxi-
mum rate for 1940 loan cotton is 15
cents per bale until July 31, 1941,
when a 12½ cents per bale storage
will be in effect.

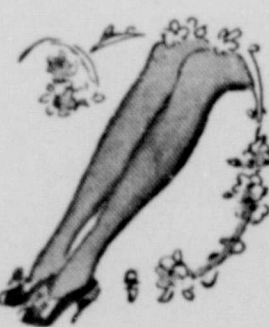
