



# SCOUT AREA IS DIVIDED IN NEW PLAN

## FIVE DISTRICTS TO BE MADE OF COUNTIES OF SOUTH PLAINS

The executive committee of the South Plains Area council, Boy Scouts of America, voted yesterday to accept the plan of D. T. Jennings, executive, in which the area, composed of 13 counties, will be divided into five districts.

Acceptance was given the plan at a business meeting at the Hilton Hotel, following a luncheon.

District No. 1 will be composed of the City of Lubbock; districts two will comprise the counties of Lamb, Cochran and Hockley, excepting Roperville in Hockley county and including Shallowater in Lubbock county; district 3, counties of Gaines, Yoakum and Terry and including Roperville in Hockley county; districts 4, the counties of DeSoto, Borden, Lynn and Garza and including Slaton in Lubbock county; district 5, the counties of Dickens and Crosby and including Idalou in Lubbock county.

Committees To Govern

Each district shall be governed by a district committee with an executive board, a council and outstanding committees. Amendments to the constitution and by-laws of the council were also outlined yesterday to cover the re-organization plan.

Several reports were made at the gathering each of them revealing that the South Plains Area council is one of the fastest growing organizations of its kind in this section of the state. One hundred and seventy-four new Boy Scouts have been registered in the council since January 1, making the grand total of members at this time 540.

# BOWIE COUNTY JUDGE DECLARES HE HAS NO MERCY WHEN WOMEN START SELLING WHISKEY; SEVEN ON TRIAL

(By Associated Press)

TEXARKANA, June 18.—District Judge George W. Johnston of Bowie county denounces leniency for women defendants, declaring, "when women start selling whiskey they cease to be just women and become criminals."

He said he was "hearing criticism of this court's attitude on women law violators from all parts of the district."

"I have no apology to make for any action of this court," he added, "and, as long as I occupy the bench, law violators are going to be punished regardless of sex. Men have a tendency to be lenient with women, but when they violate the law, they become criminals and must be prosecuted."

Followed Acquittal

His statement followed the acquittal of Mrs. Pauline Oatis, 33 year old Texarkana grandmother, on a charge of liquor law violation.

She was the seventh woman ordered before the court on liquor law violation charges within two days. Officers testified they found a jug of whiskey and glasses in her home, but she denied ownership of the liquor. The jury acquitted her after deliberating 15 minutes.

Mrs. H. E. Mayhew failed to appear to answer a similar charge, and bond forfeiture and re-arrest were ordered. Her daughter, Stella Mayhew, due to face trial on charges of assault to murder in an attack upon Sheriff Henry Brooks during a raid upon her home, also failed to appear and her re-arrest was ordered.

### MORE ACTION IS AIMED AT GANGS' RULE

#### JUDGE TELLS GRAND JURORS TO PROBE TO THE BOTTOM

(By Associated Press)  
CHICAGO, June 18.—The arm of public indignation which yesterday forced the resignation of William Russell as commissioner of police, reached out today for the slayer of Alfred (Jake) Lingle, Tribune reporter; and the fist was clenched to smash gangdom.

Half a dozen public agencies were directing new energies toward crushing gang rule; but chief dependence rested with the grand jury, which was given a special charge by Chief Justice Normoyle of the criminal court to search out the truth concerning politico-gang connections and crime profits.

"Do Your Duty," Judge Normoyle told the jurors. "You have nothing to fear. Gangsters are inherent cowards, dangerous only when they run in packs."

The action of Judge Normoyle was entirely unexpected. Asked later what had prompted his action, Judge Normoyle said:

"Why? A man has been murdered and as a consequence the police commissioner and a deputy chief of detectives (John Stagg) have resigned at the demand of public and press. I know nothing about this, but I am a law enforcement officer in charge of the grand jury, and the grand jury functions for just such situations. These men have nothing in common with crooks or police and I am sure they will make a complete job of this."

State Attorney John A. Swanson will direct the grand jury inquiry, and the evidence will be gathered by his special investigator, Pat Roche.

### THOUSANDS EXPECTED TO ATTEND OLD COWBOY REUNION AT STAMFORD; REAL INDIANS FROM RESERVATION COMING

STAMFORD, June 18.—With arrangements completed for a group of 50 Comanche Indians from the government reservation in Oklahoma to put on a two hour show each evening during the Texas Cowboy Reunion in this city, June 26, 27 and 28, a well-balanced program has been provided for the thousands who will attend the affair.

During each afternoon, a western cowboy rodeo in which approximately 100 actual working ranch hands will compete for liberal cash prizes, will be staged, and after the Indian show in the evening, an old-fashioned ranch dance with real pioneer music will be held in the open air pavilion on the reunion grounds.

Everybody Invited  
Special efforts are being made to have all men who were engaged in working cattle on the ranges prior to 1890 attend the reunion. However, everybody whether an old-timer or a newcomer to this area, is invited, and will find many things of interest and much to entertain and amuse during the three days.

The opening feature of the celebration will be a monster street parade at 10 a. m. on the morning of June 26. In the aggregation will be the 50 Indians, the cowboy rodeo contestants, the pioneer cattlemen and many other interesting divisions, along with about a dozen ranch, chuck wagons. These wagons will be on display on the reunion grounds all during the affair and the ranch cooks will be with them. The Indian show each evening will be highly interesting. Tribal war dances with the redskins in full native regalia and the gub booming drums that require four men to handle them, will be among the thrilling items offered on the program each night.

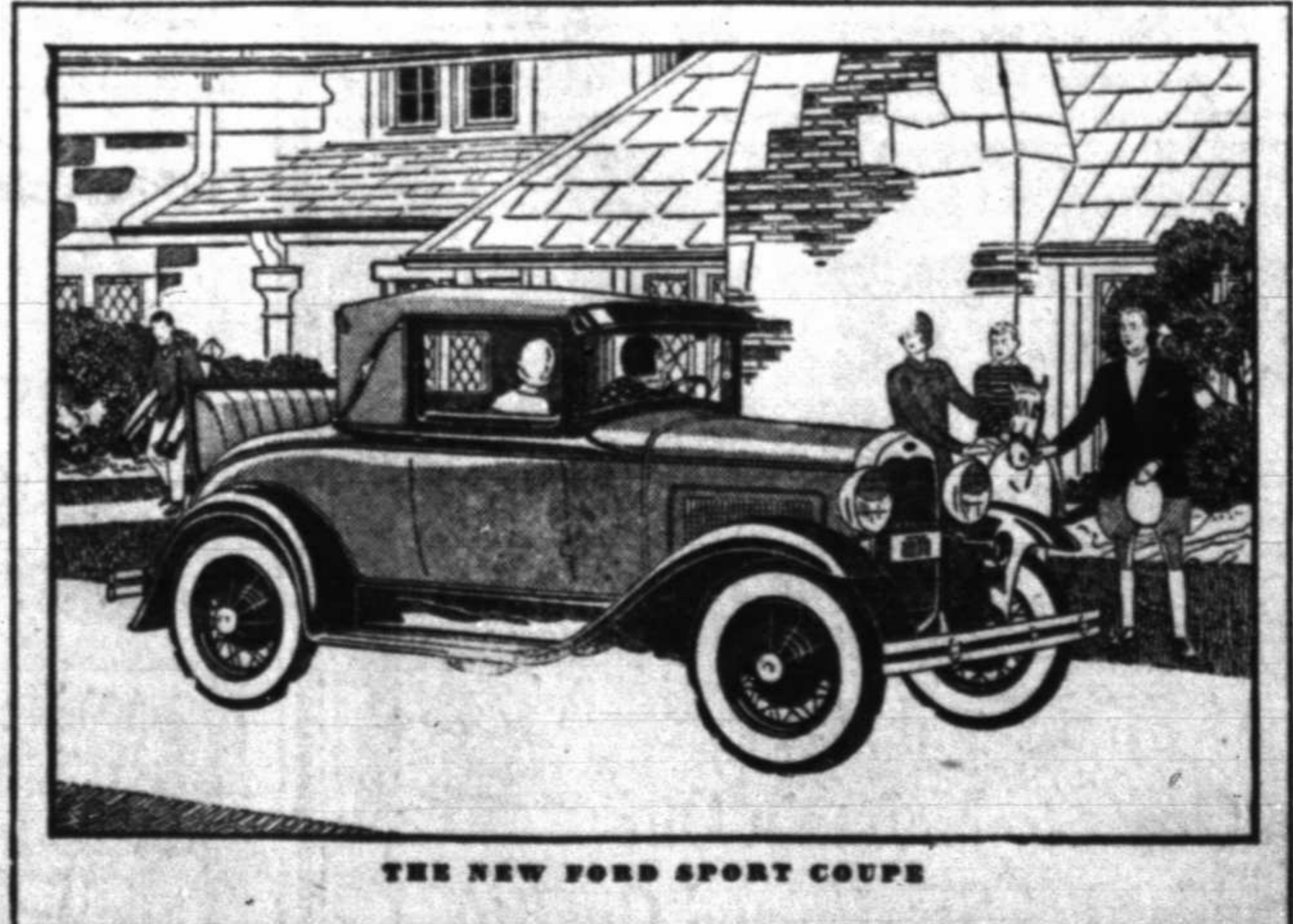

# OLTON IS ONE OF LEADING INLAND TOWNS OF SECTION; AGRICULTURE MAIN REVENUE

(By Staff Correspondent)

OLTON, June 18.—County seats in Texas as a rule are on a railroad but Olton, county seat of Lamb county, is one of the few towns in West Texas that is the center of the governmental activities of a county and not on a railroad.

Also Lamb county, of which Olton is the center, is one of the largest counties on the South Plains, with an estimated population of nearly 20,000. Half of the justice precincts give a total of 20,000 population. The others are expected to boost the total 6,000.

**Up in One Corner**

Olton is up in one corner of Lamb county, somewhat removed from Littlefield, Amherst and Sultan, the other towns.

It has been the seat of government since its organization some 22 years ago, despite attempts to move the court house.

Population of Olton is given by Uncle Sam as 678. It is located on the old C. S. Slaughter land and the South Land company, of which W. P. South was head, developed the town.

With the continued development of that section of Lamb county, the town is growing both in population and as a trading center. There is always a crowd of people from the country in town and the close relation between the town and the farm residents is seen in the resultant harmonious working together for the general betterment of the entire community.

**How to Operate**

One naturally thinks of an inland town as the place where everything is going and nothing going out, in a merchandise way. That idea is up set in Olton.

Last year, says L. S. Kennedy, who handles mail for the chamber of commerce as well as for the Kennedy Land company, of which he is head, over 80,000 bushels of agricultural products were shipped from Olton.

Following figures on tonnage are given out: Corn (130,000 bu.) 27,000; cotton (8,000 bales) 2,000; wheat 2,500; grain sorghums, 30,000; sodas, 4,000; wheat, 4,000; miscellaneous, 1,000; total, \$1,000.

**L. C. L. Shipments**

Corn, produce, 40; hay, 40; oats, 30; cattle, 2,500; sheep and wool, 110; poultry, 20; total, 2,580.

**Has 45 Businesses**

Olton has a total of 45 business houses. There are five churches.

The business houses include two gas, two lumber yards, a feed mill, a light and power plant and numerous mercantile stores, drug stores, filling stations and the like.

"Our trade territory is about 20,000 acres in extent," Mr. Kennedy said. "Over 80 per cent of this is tillable land and 80 per cent is now in cultivation.

"Ninety per cent of our farmers own the farms on which they live. Besides shipping out nearly 80,000 tons of agricultural products we shipped into Olton 27,528 tons of materials."

The Olton schools are rated among the best in that section of the Plains. H. P. Webb, superintendent, has been at the head of the system for several years. There were enrolled last year 492 pupils in the grade schools and 162 in the high school. Enrollment represented a 25 per cent increase over the previous year.

Chief agricultural products raised in Olton's trade territory include corn, wheat, cotton, sodas, maize, hay and hogs.

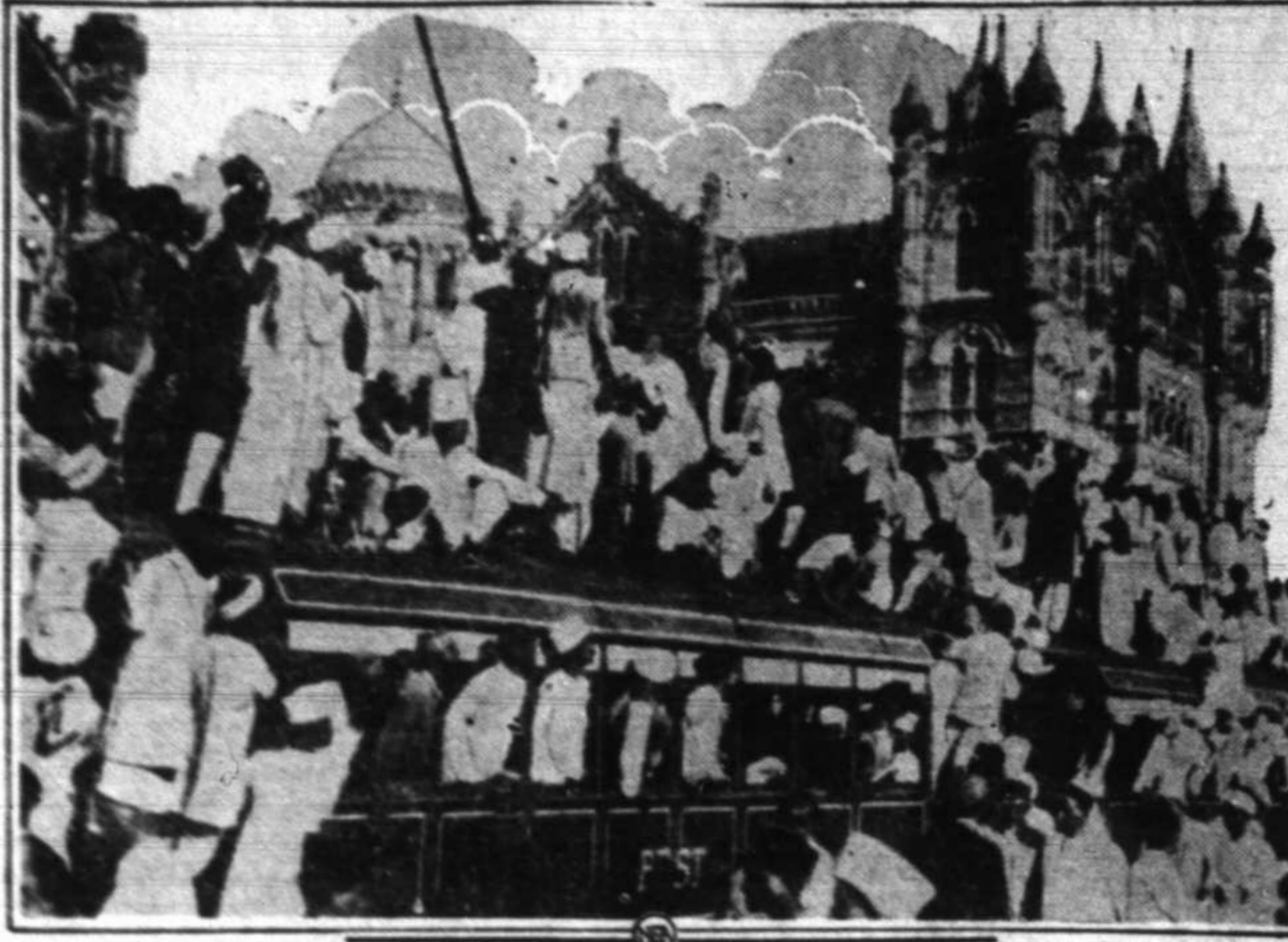
Whose territory is in excess of 12,000 acres and the average for the year is expected to be around 8 to 10 bushels.

Postoffice receipts are an indication of the growth of Olton. In 1924 the receipts were \$10,100. Five years later there had been an increase of 200 per cent. The 1928 receipts were \$28,800 and for 1929 nearly a 20 per cent increase. The first eleven months were \$30,000 and for the year \$33,000.

J. F. Wiles is postmaster. There is one rural route, established April 1 and effective June 18 will be a daily service.

Mail for Olton is brought by a star route from Littlefield. Some mail also is handled into Muleshoe on Sundays for train connections.

# LUBBOCK AND FIVE OTHER CITIES ASK PRESS CONVENTION NEXT YEAR; PLANS LAID FOR MEETING IN ABILENE SOON

With Lubbock and five other cities already clamoring for the 1931 session, members of the West Texas Press Association are laying plans for this year's annual meeting, to be held on July 11 and 12 at Abilene.

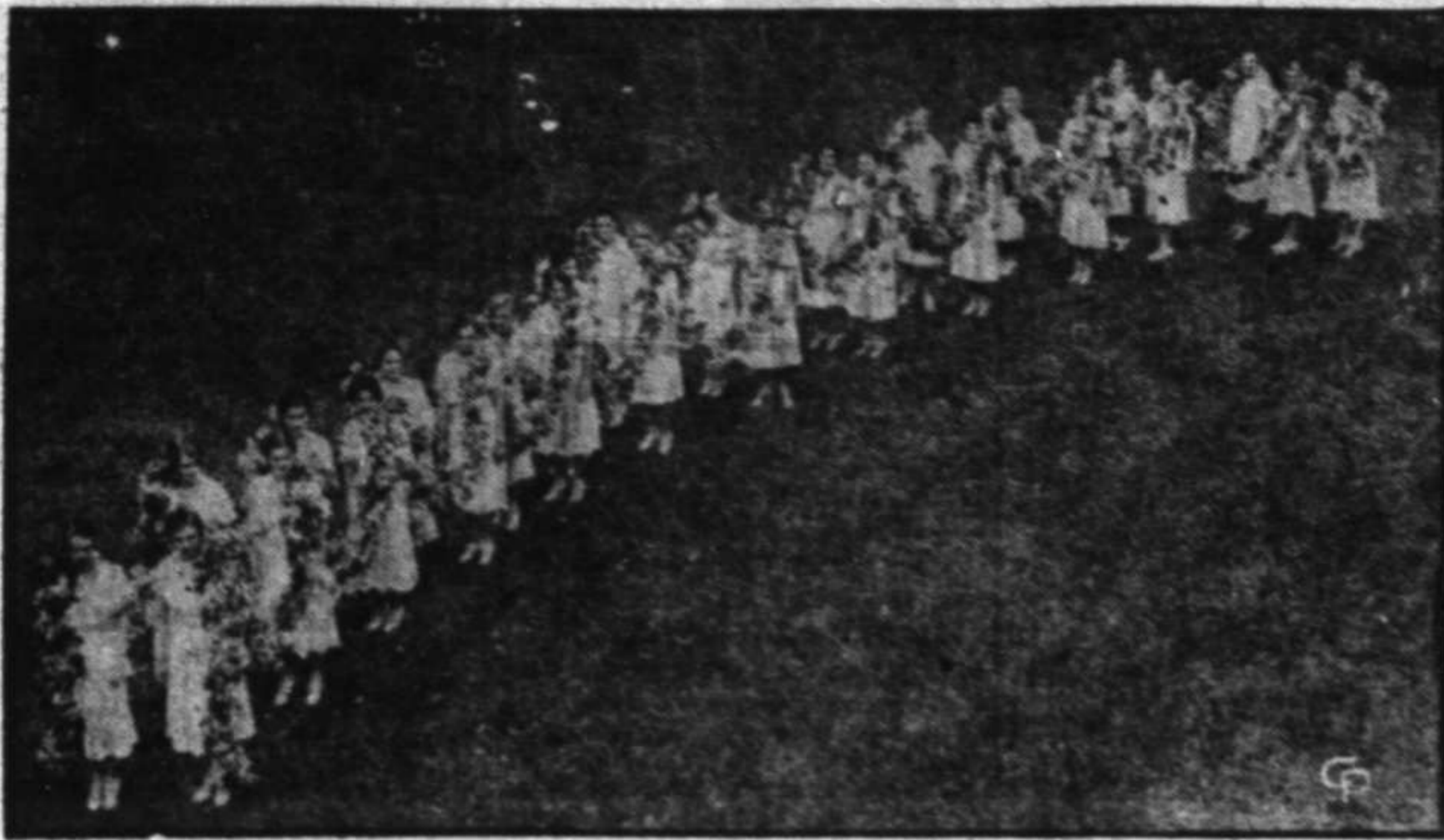

## CALCULATIONS ON NEW COMET MADE

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 18 (AP)—Scientists at Mount Wilson observatory, Pasadena, Calif., have calculated a final period of 251.8 years for the new planet Pluto. Announcement of the calculations was made here today by the Harvard observatory which acts as the official distributing agent for American observatories.

The calculations were made possible through the discovery on photographic plates taken at Mount Wilson in 1919 of images of the new trans-Neptunian body and the computations made by Dr. Seth B. Nicholson and N. U. Mayall of the Mount Wilson observatory. Prof. Frederick Seares, assistant director of the California observatory, sent notice of the discovery to the observatory here.

The new planet will be nearest the earth in 1982 when it will be 30 astronomical units distant or 2,800,000,000 miles. This is approximately the distance of Neptune.
