City Will Spend \$37,345 On Park

Plans Go Forward On Annual Rodeo

\$19,804.00 WPA Grant Is Allowed City On Greatly Needed Improvements

Two-Day Event Expected To Draw Big Crowd

Plans are now virtually complete for the biggest rodeo event in the history of Lamesa, according to information released this week by officers of the Lamesa Rodeo Association, Inc.

It was announced that this is strictly a non-profit organization with only the thought of bringing this form of entertainment to the people of this section, in an annual celebration. All funds accumulated, after expenses have been paid and the actual money that the stockholders are out has been refunded, will be put into a special fund to purchase a special Rodeo grounds and construct a permanent arena, officers further stated.

Officers in the association are W. E. Boyd, president, Guy Weekes, vice-president and Bub McDonald, secretary-treasurer. Directors are Jack Phenix, Dick Jones, Elmo Smith and J. M. Harrington. Cash prizes totaling \$1,300 will be awarded during the two days, exclusive of the merchandise prizes which will be given.

At each of the four performances there will be contests in five standard rodeo events, bronc riding, calf roping, steer riding, bulldogging and one-and-breakaway. Thus there will be in all twenty separate contests, participated in by a varying number of riders and ropers.

A schedule of entrance fees and prize monies for these five contests has been mailed to prospective entrants over all the Southwest during the past few days. This schedule is as follows:

Bronc Riding—Entrance fee, \$15.00 for both days. Purses, \$100.00, \$50.00, \$25.00, \$15.00. Saddle given for best two-day average.

Calf-roping—Entrance fee, \$15.00 for both days. Purses, \$100.00, \$50.00, \$25.00, \$15.00. Saddle given for best two-day average.

Steer Riding—Entrance fee, \$10.00 for both days. Purses, \$50.00, \$30.00, \$20.00, \$10.00. Pair of shop made boots for the best two-day average.

Bull Dogging—Entrance fee, \$5.00 for both days. Purses, \$30.00, \$20.00, \$10.00. Stetson hat for best two-day average.

Rope and Break-away—Entrance fee, \$5.00 for both days. Purses, \$35.00, \$25.00, \$15.00. Pair of spurs for best two-day average.

President Of McMurry College To Preach Here

The long awaited grant from the Works Progress Administration for Park improvement in Lamesa, was granted this week, according to dispatches in the daily press Wednesday.

Improvements which are expected to cost approximately \$37,345.00, received a grant from the WPA of \$19,804.00. The balance of the cost will be borne by the city.

Plans were approved by the City Commission last December, and it was thought at that time that work would get under way within a few weeks, but several changes in the plans were necessary and that took time. Although no definite announcement has been made by city officials, it is expected that actual work will get under way on the project within a short time.

The plans call for the improvement of the present park, located in the west part of the city on Sulphur Draw, and the ten acres just south, which are already owned by the city. Besides landscaping the entire area and putting in paved drives and walks, there will be one large rock building and two smaller ones constructed.

The larger building which is to be 30 x 67 feet will contain an apartment to be used by the caretaker and the balance will contain one large room, approximately 30 x 40 feet to be used for various purposes. The two smaller buildings will contain ladies and gentlemen's restrooms.

It will be necessary to transplant some of the trees in the present park area and the plan, they will be transplanted to the unimproved area. Shrubs, flowers and grass will be used in the beautification of the entire park.

The plans also call for playground equipment, such as swings, merry-go-rounds, etc. as well as picnic tables and barbecue pits.

This improvement is one that will be welcomed by every citizen of the town.

Building Bone-

No scientist can make bones by shaking up a mixture of calcium and phosphorus in a test tube. But in the body, through some complicated processes, those two minerals are combined to make up a large proportion of the rigid structure of the bones and teeth.

Of course, other substances are needed for the building of bones. One of the most important is vitamin D. Although this vitamin does not actually go into the structure of the bones, Vitamin must be present to help the body in absorbing the calcium and phosphorus, but it will not take the place of either mineral.

As children grow, they build bones at a rapid rate. So a supply of calcium and phosphorus and vitamin D is particularly important for them. Even before a child is born, his bones and teeth are forming. Then during infancy and early childhood these soft structures are becoming hard firm bones. Besides, the child's bones become longer and thicker as he grows.

When the child does not get enough calcium, phosphorus, and Vitamin D, a disease known as rickets is liable to develop. And the unlucky child may have bow legs, a flat chest and other misshapen bones for the rest of his life.

The wise mother checks to make sure her child is getting enough of the materials needed for building sound bones. Daily sunbaths and out-of-door play will supply vitamin D. But foods rich in calcium, especially the fish-liver oils, are a more dependable source all the year round.

The best way to give a child his daily supply of calcium is in the form of a quart of clean, pasteurized milk. In addition, this milk furnishes a generous amount of phosphorus, the other bone-building material. Phosphorus is also supplied by the egg yolks and cereals that are added to the child's diet at an early age; and later, lean meats and fish supply additional phosphorus.

But even after a person is fully grown, he needs a supply of bone-building materials. Although the bones are no longer growing larger, they must be maintained and kept in good condition.

The supply of calcium merits special attention because diets are so often low in this mineral. In fact, the Federal Bureau of Home Economics recently made a diet study of the city families the country over and found that less than half the families surveyed were getting as much calcium as they could use to good advantage.

A pint of milk a day will supply the adult's need for calcium. This milk can be used as a beverage or it can be used in cooked foods. Cheese is also an important source of calcium. The green leafy vegetables furnish generous amounts of calcium. Too, unless a person takes milk in some form, it is almost impossible to get a liberal supply of this mineral.

Nearly all of the calcium-rich foods also contain phosphorus. In fact, phosphorus is so well distributed throughout the common foods that there is little danger of a shortage in this mineral. If a person eats a good assortment of the everyday foods.

Eliminating "Lean Months"

No longer is the farm family's income largely confined to the fall months and cotton picking months. For rural families are finding substitutes for cash crops which no longer can be grown at a substantial margin of profit.

To solve the problem of distributing the cash income from the farm more evenly throughout the year, the Runnels County Land Use Planning Committee has developed a calendar which suggests sources of income to people in that area. Similar efforts are being made by numerous county land use planning committees over the state, according to G. E. Adams, assistant state agent of the A. and M. College Extension Service, who is directing extension coordination in the planning movement.

For instance, the "income calendar" for Runnels County has no less than four suggested sources for any one month. Here are some random examples: February, eggs, pork products, fat hogs, and planting seed; May, wool, vegetables, berries, fryers, and eggs; August, cotton, maize, melons, fruits and hens; November, eggs, dairy products and turkeys.

Despite the fact that the acreage planted to cotton now is about 10,000 acres less than it was five or six years ago, the committee feels that the change in income sources can be profitable not only to the people but to the land. To bring about a more permanent prosperity the committee recommended that the farm families of Runnels County: (1) participate in a well-rounded live-at-home program; (2) build up and maintain their soil fertility; (3) increase their yield per acre; (4) improve and increase farm livestock and poultry flocks; (5) develop new cash crops such as wild-life production; (6) take advantage of better markets through cooperative efforts such as frozen food lockers; and (7) employ better farm management methods.

Regular care of a mattress after it is once in use should include sunning and beating once a week and turning often from side to side and end to end. A table 83" by 61" is a useful piece of equipment for sunning and beating mattresses.

Other practices recommended for adding years to the life of a mattress are the use of a spring cover, a mattress slip cover, and a mattress pad. These can be made from flour or fertilizer sacks or other inexpensive material and can be laundered often, the specialist pointed out. With such treatment a well-made cotton mattress should give service for a number of years.

No Charge For AAA Help

Reports have reached the state headquarters of the AAA that persons in some areas have set themselves up as "AAA experts" and are charging farmers fees for assistance in getting applications filled out and certified. These so-called experts are "setting up offices and handling all AAA business for groups of farmers for a share of their payments," the reports stated. All information and assistance necessary for participation in the AAA program can be obtained free of charge at the county AAA office.

"No farmer should pay any kind of fee for information or assistance in doing the 'paper work' connected with the AAA program," George Slaughter, chairman of the state committee declared. "All such services are furnished without cost by the county AAA office, and farmers are invited to take advantage of it."

Persons who are charging fees for such services have no official status and cannot be depended upon to furnish accurate and complete information, the chairman continued, pointing out that any farmer using such assistance will have only himself to blame if errors in forms and applications result in loss of payments. When farmers pay a fee in order to receive AAA payments, their payments are necessarily reduced to that extent, while farmers who handle all such business through their local AAA office can be assured of receiving full payments earned for participation in the program. Slaughter said.

Long Life For Mattresses

A long life for mattresses is possible providing they are given proper care during their youth as well as their later years.

This fact has been pointed out by Mrs. Bernice Clayton, specialist in home improvement for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, who says she hopes the thousands of mattresses to be made in Texas within the next few weeks will live to a ripe old age. In addition to the usual manufacture of cotton mattresses in the state hundreds are being made daily in community centers under the governments program for supplying mattress making materials to low-income farm families.

First of all, after mattress has been completed it should be sunned and beaten every day for approximately two weeks before it is ever used. Mrs. Clayton says, also the mattress should be turned over frequently and beaten thoroughly on both sides.

DEMANDS FOR FISH HEAVEN

With new, huge lakes being built in Texas constantly, the demand for fish raised by the State Game Department in its ten hatcheries increases monthly. The largest lake to be stocked is Possum Kingdom. Bass numbering 71,000 were planted, in it recently, it was announced by the executive secretary of the Department. That was the first of many shipments which will be placed in the lake.

All the new lakes being stocked by the Game Department are being studied by aquatic biologists to determine the amount of fish food the various bodies of water will produce. Too, they are determining the species of fish most suitable for each lake.

The state hatcheries produced more than 5,000,000 fish last year, but by improved methods of fertilization, some of them developed by Texas Game Department aquatic biologists, and by making use of other recently-discovered methods of propagating fish, it is hoped to double the hatcheries' production this season. To date it appears the hatcheries will reach the 10,000,000 mark set for them, despite the fact
