City Bond Proposal Is Favored By Voters

1950 Building Permits Total \$314,466.00

Building permits for 1950 totaled \$314,466.00, covering business, industrial and residential construction during the year. Permits issued from the office of Mrs. Hayden Pearce at 715 Ave. C during December amounted to \$8,150.00, and were made to O. H. Cecil, 5-Rm&B residence on lot 10, block 127, Curry Motor, 16 x 20-ft. building, \$250; Monroe Waits, 4 Rm&B residence moved to Ave. H between 12th and 13th Streets, \$2,700; Doyle Hiser, repair shop, \$200.

Abernathy voters Saturday favored the \$70,000.00 bond proposal by an overwhelming majority. Eighty-nine votes were cast, with the water works extension and improvement proposal getting 73 votes for to 6 against. The sewer system extension and improvement proposal drew 72 votes for to 8 against.

O. B. Ratliff, representative of the company to handle the issue, met with the city council in special session Monday night to transact other business in connection with the bond issue. Money is expected to be delivered to the city next month.

Plans will be started soon on improvements and extensions and other moves made possible by bond issue.

MEMBERS SOUGHT FOR SOUTH PLAINS TELEPHONE CO-OP

Hale County Farm Bureau chapters will concentrate on securing members of the South Plains Telephone Cooperative during the next few weeks.

The community groups will appoint committees to make contacts in their areas with the aim of securing the \$50 equities from a minimum eighty per cent of potential REA telephone subscribers before January 31st, said Melvin Glantz, a director of the South Plains Telephone Cooperative.

The Hale County Farm Bureau office in Plainview will be open every week day and Saturday afternoon during the membership drive to accept applications. Glantz urged that those who wished to get their equities in soon to fill out application forms and send them along with a \$50 check to the South Plains Rural Telephone Cooperative, Box 292, Lubbock.

Glantz stressed the time element in the procedure. He pointed out that Hale and Lubbock counties were apportioned a large share of the RFC's \$25,000,000 for rural telephones in the United States and is urging farmers to take advantage of the opportunity for rural dial telephone service. The South Plains Co-op is to receive approximately \$1,200,000.

Plans call for exchanges at Aiken, Halfway, Hale Center, and Abernathy in Hale County.

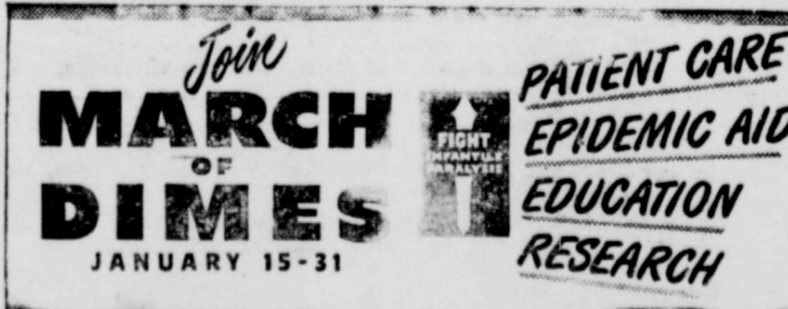

STATUS OF THE FARM WORKER IS GIVEN BY STATE SELECTIVE SERVICE DIRECTOR

AUSTIN, Texas, Dec. 26.—Emphasizing that the draft law provides no blanket deferment for farm workers, Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, declared today that local boards are required both by law and regulation to consider each agricultural worker's case individually, just as other men's cases are considered.

General Wakefield said that regulations issued by the President provide for a deferred classification for farm workers only when the following conditions are met to the satisfaction of the local board:

1. The man must be "employed in the production for market of a substantial quantity of those agricultural commodities which are necessary to the maintenance of the national health, safety, or interest."

2. "The production for market of a substantial quantity of agricultural commodities should be measured in terms of the average annual production per farm worker which is marketed from a local

average farm of the type under consideration. The production of agricultural commodities for consumption by the worker and his family, or traded for subsistence purposes, should not be considered as production for market. Production which is in excess of that required for the subsistence of the farm families on the farm under consideration should be considered as production for market."

The state draft director observed that "this draft does not give a complete picture," and added that a man, to be eligible for farm deferment, must also meet the requirements in the section of the Selective Service regulations defining necessary employment.

He quoted as follows: "A registrant's employment in industry or other occupation, service in office, or activity in study, research, or medical, scientific, or other endeavors shall be considered to be necessary to the maintenance of the national health, safety, or interest only when all of the

1. The registrant is, or but for a seasonal or temporary interruption would be, engaged in such activity;

"2. The registrant cannot be replaced because of a shortage of persons with his qualification or skill in such activity; and

"3. The removal of the registrant would cause loss of effectiveness in such activity."

General Wakefield stressed that deferments based on agricultural and other civilian occupations are not permanent. "They are issued for one year or less," he said, "and local boards have instructions to classify a registrant as available for service whenever the cause for his deferment ceases to exist."

He explained that the designation of Class II-C is used to indicate deferred because of agricultural occupation.

Advertisers Benefit Capitalists, Nation's Economic Leaders

THE IMPORTANCE of the farmer in American economy was highlighted by Thos. J. Watson, International Business Machines Corporation Board Chairman, in his address to the New York Advertising Club when he was recently presented with the Club's annual bronze Plaque of Achievement. "Our farm assets total 127 billion dollars," Watson said, "and our equity in their farms is the soundest capitalistic position of all."

Mr. Watson described the farmers as having an influence on everything done in the United States — socially, economically and politically — because of their position.

"Advertising has played a very important part in putting the farmers where they are," Mr. Watson added, "by proving through advertisements the value of farm machinery and how much the farmer can accomplish by farming in the right way. Some of the finest advertising today is in the farm papers and farm journals."

The speaker also stressed the need for advertising to keep the American way of life before the people of the country. "We must always keep in mind," Mr. Watson said, "that when any local or any country or any organization feels it has become complacent, it is very long before it will get in the other direction."

Mr. Watson described the rise in spiritual and educational values throughout the country. "These values," he said, "are what we have to depend on for the success and security of our future. Membership in churches is growing faster than the population. In edu-

cation, we are increasing the number of schools and improving facilities for educating our young people.

"Some 30 years ago, we were spending \$48 a student a year. As of 1947, we were spending about \$132 a student annually. This figure continues to increase. In the past two years we have added 155 new colleges and universities in the United States," the speaker said.

The Advertising Club's award was bestowed on Mr. Watson by Andrew J. Haire, past president of the Club and president of the Haire Publishing Company. Last year's award recipient was General Dwight D. Eisenhower.
