Local representatives play an important part making it possible for the foreign concerns to select the Reporter as a vehicle in which to carry their messages to the public, and for this fact, I wish to convey to these local representatives the appreciation of the management of this newspaper as its means providing a defense measure to keep this editor and his family from starvation. The business the local agencies gave the foreign concerns has made it possible for these concerns in return place some business with the Reporter. But I'm getting into deep water trying to explain what I mean, that I'm moseying back to the bank and leave it with the readers to solve the puzzle. I mention here the foreign concerns here that are using the advertising columns of the Reporter this week:

They include the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association, who caption their advertisement with "THE ROAD AHEAD," and picturing Old Man Texas with the map of Texas spread out before him looking at an oil derrick or more, standing in about every county in Texas, and peeping over his map he observes a long line of workmen trekking to work to a large oil refinery, with the statement "this industry refines with Texas labor over four-fifths as much oil as the State produces." The Ford Motor Company, with the title of its advertisement: "Q: Where's the best place to choose your new car? A: ON THE ROAD." Eiland Motor Co. is the local Ford agency; The Texas and Pacific Ry., "Your Vacation Begins When You Step Aboard a Texas and Pacific Air-Cooled Train," picturing a nattily dressed young man with a golf bag and suitcase alighting from the train and smiling at the thought of some fine golfing he's going to indulge in at this point of embarkation. Our fellow townsman and worthy member of our city's board of alderman, E. Price, is the local representative of the T&P; Chevrolet, "We're Buying A CHEVROLET! Why Pay More? Why Accept Less?", the Blocker Chevrolet Co., local agency; Servel Electrolux, locally represented by the Stanton Implement Co., announcing to the public, "Here's Iron-clad Assurance the Gas Refrigerator Stays Silent, Lasts Longer." By the way other large advertisements from Servel are to appear the balance of this month. The Texas Electric Service company with Paul Peeler, local "trouble-shooter" and all-round utility man for the company in Stanton and Clayton, Burnam, handling electrical supplies, and headquarters to pay electric service accounts, announces, "Your Cheap Electricity Will Help You Be Comfortable This Summer and Every Summer."

AGAIN, another victory falls in the loot bag of Hitler—this time it's the Isle of Crete. MORE THAN 40,000 VISITORS EXPECTED AT ODESSA SHOW

STATE SAFETY PATROL OF TEXAS TO SHOW SAFETY DEMONSTRATIONS

Odessa, June 5 (Special).—The more than 40,000 visitors, oil men, and oil field workers expected for the second annual Little International Oil Show in Odessa on June 21-22 will be privileged to witness absolutely free one of the most inclusive and elaborate Safety Shows ever presented in the United States, W. E. "Bill" Mosher, general chairman of the Safety Show, announced today.

Feature attraction of the Safety Show on Saturday, June 21, will be an industrial First Aid Contest, starting promptly at 3:30 p. m., in the spacious County Auditorium with a stage 30 by 70 feet an arena 60 by 90 feet, and a seating capacity of 2750 persons.

Fifteen teams of six men each, from cities as far north as Panshandle, Borger, and Phillips; from Breckenridge and Sweetwater on the east; and from New Mexico to the west! in addition to teams from the Permian Basin proper, will compete for substantial cash prizes to which will be added the entry fees of the contest.

T. D. Brown, safety specialist of the U. S. Bureau of Mines, has been stationed in this area by the Bureau to work with the first aid teams for 45 days prior to the Little International Oil Show in preparation for the contest. Members of the teams are to be guests of the Oil Show at the de luxe barbecue on Saturday afternoon, June 21, and at the dances on the nights of the 20th and 21st, featuring big-name band.

Colonel Homer Garrison, chief of the State Department of Public Safety, Austin, and Captain George E. Schauer of the Texas Highway Patrol, will jointly have charge of a huge electrically operated and illuminated safety display, 9 feet in height and 50 feet in length. Not a motion picture, the display will present a sequence of illuminated scenes for the visitors.

The Safety Patrol of Texas, will, during the two-day oil show, present safety demonstrations in the auditorium by members of the patrol. Several reels of traffic safety motion pictures are scheduled for showing at regular intervals on the two days.

The National Safety Council is sending a representative from Chicago to the Little International Oil Show with hundreds of safety posters designed especially for this event. These posters will decorate the interior of the auditorium and furnish suitable atmosphere for the show.

The U. S. Bureau of Mines, in addition to taking an active part in the First Aid Contest, will have a mammoth safety exhibit, with trained personnel present to demonstrate the latest safety devices in all phases of work.

Exhibits of more than a dozen manufacturers of safety equipment and safety appliances will furnish additional interest at the gigantic, all-inclusive Safety Show, said Mosher, who has for the past 15 years devoted his energies and time to the program of safety for oil companies, city police and fire departments, and the State Department of Public Safety.

250 ACRES OF WHEAT BOTHERING BARFIELD

J. K. Barfield has some 500 acres on his ranch in crops, of which 250 are in wheat, the finest kind of a prospect for a handsome yield. BIDS TURNED DOWN ON REA EXTENSION IN MIDLAND COUNTY

BIDS TOO HIGH IT WAS CLAIMED; ANOTHER TRY IS SET FOR JUNE 12TH

O. E. Bryan, supervisor of the Martin-Howard REA, was in Stanton a short time Monday from his office in Big Spring, and stated that work staking an extension line to the Martin-Howard line, some 25 miles in Midland county began this week.

An allotment of \$16,000 has been made by the government for the extension, and Friday, bids were opened, but none accepted because too high. Mr. Bryan stated. Bids will be received again on June 12th.

The Midland line will cover a 25-mile area, going in sort of a horseshoe fashion, and will supply 45 families. The line will tie-in two miles south of Germania.

The Martin-Howard REA line covers a 172-mile area in both counties, and serves 348 families. Recently the Martin County Fresh Water District was added to the Martin County line supplying current for two electrical water pumps installed by the district. Heretofore, the district has depended upon gasoline engines to pump the water.

MARTIN COUNTY 4-H CLUB BOYS OFF TO FORT STOCKTON

TWENTY-FIVE LOCAL BOYS TO JOIN OTHERS FROM 32 WEST TEXAS COUNTIES

Martin County 4-H Club boys plan to spend the week end at Ft. Stockton where they will join club boys from 32 other West Texas counties in the annual summer encampment. County Agent George Bond, reports that approximately 25 boys are planning to attend the encampment from this county. The camp will run Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, and swimming, baseball, and contests in marksmanship and plant identification, will form the program.

The camp will be held at the park in Fort Stockton where shelter is available in case of bad weather.

This is the first year the boys have gone to Fort Stockton, having gone to Balmorhea and San Angelo the last two years. The camp this year will also be for all of the West Texas Extension Service district, where in the past two camps were held. Approximately 300 boys are expected to attend.

FOUR COUNTY BOYS IN JUNE 16TH CALL FOR ARMY TRAINING

TEXAS TO PROVIDE 2,319 TRAINEES DURING INDUCTION PERIOD JUNE 11-19

State Selective Service headquarters today announced the Army's sixteenth and seventeenth calls on Texas' 351 local boards for 2,319 trainees to be delivered for induction during the period June 11 through June 19.

General J. Watt Page, State director, said that 214 negroes have been selected to meet the sixteenth call on June 11, and on the seventh call 2,105 white men will be inducted between June 12 and June 19.

When these two calls have been completed, Texas will have 29,704 men in training under the Selective Service Act. Texas is credited with 825,429 men registered last October, and the quota assigned by the War Department for the first year of the program ending June 30 is approximately 33,213 trainees.

General Page said that Texas leads the nation in number of men furnished the armed forces. In addition to the 29,704 men called under the Selective Service, Texas has more than 80,000 men—all volunteers—serving in the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, National Guard and Coast Guard.

quota of supplies to be sent to the drastically in need countries of Europe. The local Red Cross work has been carried on in the home of Mrs. Houston, who explains that since the number of workers and the amount of supplies have increased, the present working space is inadequate. So, as his or her part in aiding in the defense program, it is up to some local citizen who owns a vacant down-town building, "to come to the aid of his country," and provide this workshop free, to these faithful few and industrious members of the Martin County Chapter of the Red Cross. From the vacant buildings I see downtown Stanton it should not be too much of a sacrifice upon the part of the owner to donate his building to the members of the Red Cross to carry on this most worthy cause through providing more convenient and comfortable surroundings, therefore, enable them to care for the increased load that is rapidly shaping itself due to the acuteness of the war.

Then, too, I have been informed the local chapter needs more

workers. Cases have come to light where some parties approached on the subject of enlisting in the Red Cross service, have been met with the story they had so much of their own work to do they had not time to spare for this work. God forbid the time will ever come that Hitler will ever attempt to invade the United States, but where is there a man or woman today that believed Hitler would be the conqueror of so many countries as he is today? Not one country yet that Hitler has attempted to take that he has failed in his attempt. Who is there that can say with fact his next attempt will not be the British isles? Each battle won by Hitler is proving one more step nearer to the invasion. President Roosevelt and his aides have been drumming it into the ears of the American people that the United States' safety from the mailed fist of Hitlerism lies in Britain's safety, and that means "all out aid" to Britain. Translating "all out aid" to Britain, means every community in the United States is called upon to aid in the defense program be that Red Cross assistance, or what. All must help, if it means a sacrifice that cuts to the quick.

Martin County has young men training in the army camps, and in this fast transition of worldly things, who knows but the very garment on which the deft fingers of the members of the local Red Cross are knitting, will go to help keep warm the body of your son.

Hears From Boy in Navy

Mrs. Lula Metcalf is in receipt of a letter from John L. Hawkins this week in which he said "Being Transferred Somewhere at Anchor and Well." As they are not allowed to tell their location Mrs. Metcalf was pleased to even hear he is on the U. S. Battleship, Albermarle.



When I was a boy I lived in Texas until my father's death and then, when I came back after growing up and becoming a newspaper reporter, it was the determination to write something about the great romance of oil. I'll never forget the thrill of seeing, south of San Antonio, my first derrick, though the view was from a train window and at a distance.

While doing some temporary work for Doc Sellers' Brady Sentinel, I received two offers, one from Coleman and the other from Eastland. Sellers (now publisher of the Rising Star Record) knew of my desire to be in the oil fields and so he recommended that I go to Eastland, capital of the county that witnessed the development of the famous Ranger and Desdemona districts.

As the one-man news staff of the Eastland Daily Oil Belt News, the slender, young editor had no time for anything else; but all through the crowded weeks that lengthened into months that glided into years (including editorships in Cisco and Ranger) I was storing up information, much of it subconsciously—in short, was absorbing atmosphere, color, incidents, characters.

A few days ago, the first copy of "Oil Boom" arrived from the nationally-known publishers, the Caxton Printers of Caldwell, Idaho—and the long-cherished ambition to write a book about the romance of oil had been achieved.

To tell you of the trips crisscrossing the State to get thousands of facts—(to keep your story from being slow and dull, you discard ten facts for each one you use but you have to know the other ten so as to know for sure which should be chosen); of how Col. J. K. Hughes of Mexia, said, "I'm

giving you information that I have refused to a dozen other interviewers, and I don't know why I'm giving it to you"—but he did; of digging up photographs of booms 25 or even 40 years ago; of listening throughout a Sunday afternoon while Walter Cline, with hardly a question necessary, fluently and vividly told of Burkburnett; of a chance meeting with Garland Adair in Austin who had traveled with Col. Humphreys, "king of wildcatters"; of discovering an elderly man in San Antonio who is entitled to be called the "father of Spindletop," which was the birthplace of the present-day Texas oil industry; of innumerable conversations with old drillers, teamsters and shoe-string operators; and then finding time, mainly at night, to write—anyhow, enough has been said to show that a book is no slight venture.

At least, "Oil Boom" wasn't—for me, anyhow. And if you are interested (and I hope you are) "Oil Boom" is a portrait gallery of famous oil rushes, all but one in Texas; Spindletop, Burkburnett, Mexia, Desdemona Ranger and Smackover, the last-named being in Arkansas.

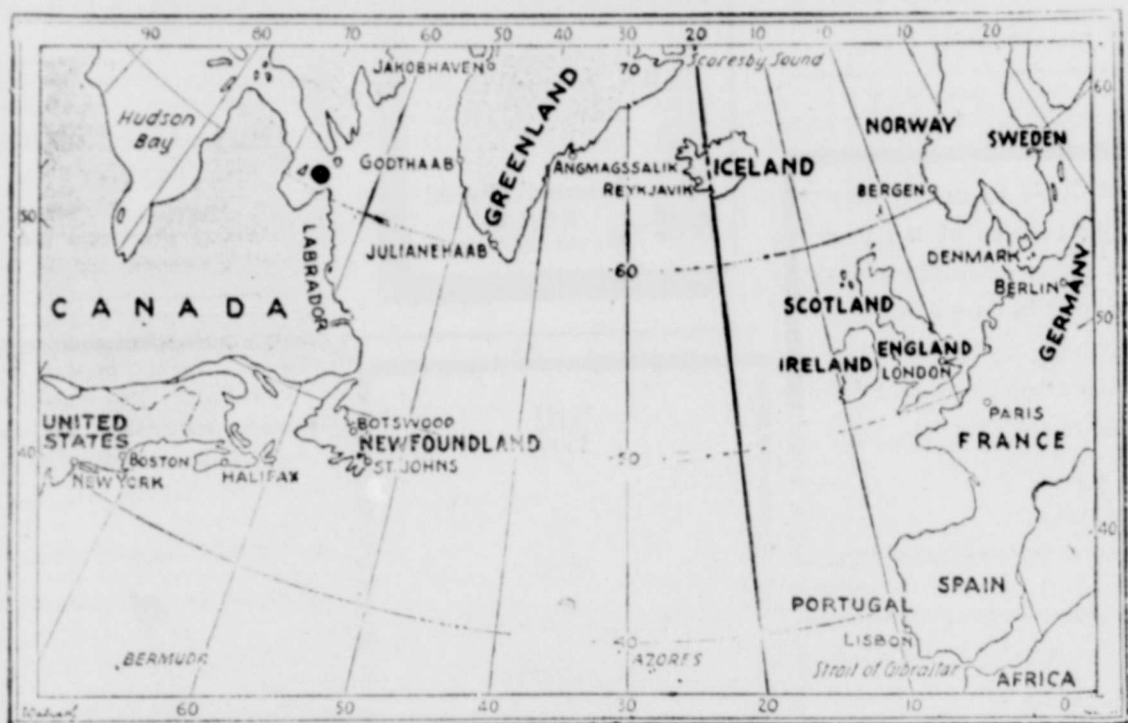

INDIAN LANGUAGE TO BATTLE ENEMY



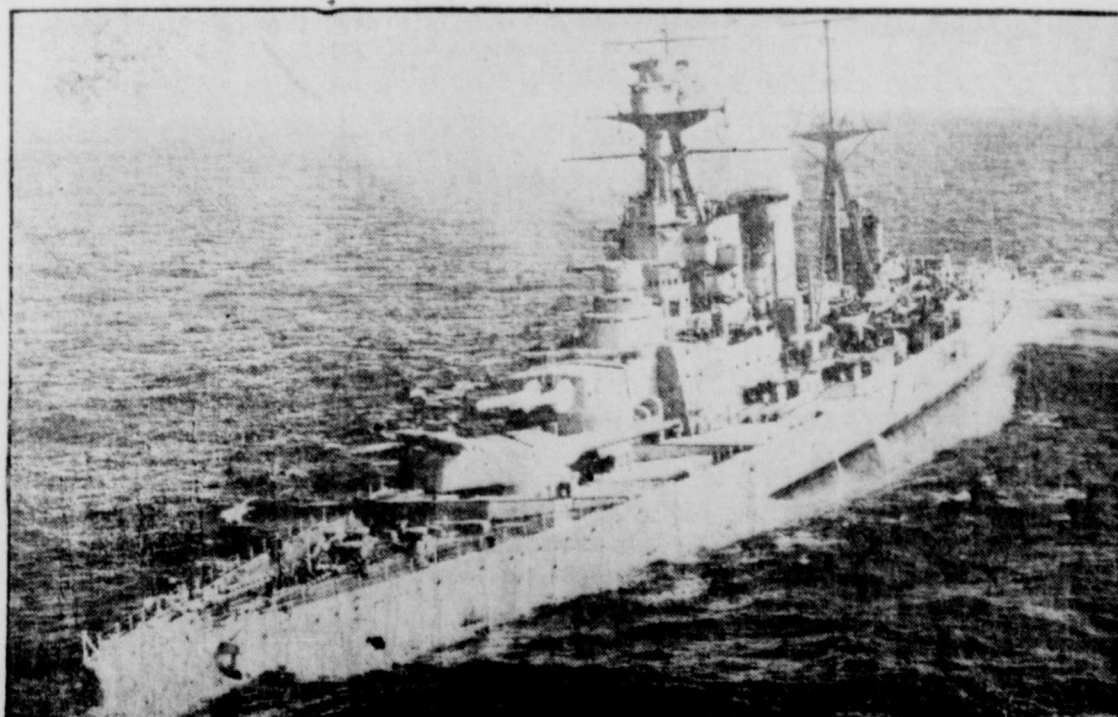

LOTS OF RAIN AND LOTS OF MOSQUITOS; CLEAN UP CESS POOLS

"A marked saving in human lives and improved health conditions may be obtained by an educational program for the control of the mosquito," suggests Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Malaria is transmitted to humans," he said, "by bite of the Anopheles mosquito. This mosquito acquires the malaria parasites by biting a person who has the parasites in his blood. She (it is the female who transmits this disease) then bites a well person. The parasites enter the blood, grow, and multiply there. Poisons are found and carried in the blood stream to all parts of the body. The person bitten by the carrier mosquito begins to shiver with chills, burns with fever, and to have a headache.

"Prevention of malaria should start with the protection of humans from the bite of the infected mosquito and continue through to the elimination of the mosquito.

"The protection of humans may be accomplished by screen-

ing all houses to prevent the entrance of mosquitoes. A 16-mesh screen should be placed over all openings. Be sure that all chimneys, cracks, and other openings are covered.

"The malaria mosquito breeds in still water and the pools and grassy edges of running water, as well as in places where water is allowed to collect or stand. The female mosquito then lays her eggs on the surface of the water, where they float, and in a few days hatch into 'wiggle-tails.' These live in the water and in time turn into mosqui-

toes. These changes must take place in the water and require twelve to fourteen days in summer to complete the cycle.

"In order to prevent the malaria mosquito from breeding, destroy their shelters by removing all brush and weeds; and drain or otherwise control their breeding places in water by spraying the surface with oil or putting top-feeding minnows in waters where oil or drainage cannot be used. Such a campaign will be waged around all military areas in Texas."

QUERY CORNER

HOW CAN SPATTER-
ING BE AVOIDED?

There's no need for a spattered oven or a scorched surface of the steak if you follow the right method of broiling. That important rule, "A low temperature for cooking meat," holds good for broiling as well as roasting. So the solution to your problem is to place the steak far enough from the source of the heat so that the meat cooks slowly half way through while the surface is nicely browned. For a steak one inch thick allow a distance of two inches; for a thicker steak, three inches. No spattered oven, so hard to clean! No smoky kitchen! And it's easy on the cook, too, for he doesn't have to stand over the steak turning it often. When one side of the steak is done, season it with salt and pepper, turn it and broil the second side and the steak is ready to serve. This method is also used in broiling chops and patties.

WHEN SHOULD A ROAST
BE SALTED?

Salt your roast whenever you find it convenient, before you put it in the oven, when you take it out, or at any time between. In fact, you needn't salt it at all. You can be a thorough individualist when salting a roast! For steaks and chops, the rule is that they should be salted after they are broiled. Salt has a tendency to draw out the juices of meat, but in the case of a roast, with its small proportion of exposed surface, this doesn't make much difference. As for the idea that the salt "soaks into" the meat, this is not so important because it penetrates only a short distance into the meat anyway. That cooks find that seasoning a roast before it is put into the oven is the most convenient way.

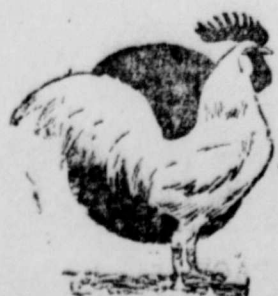

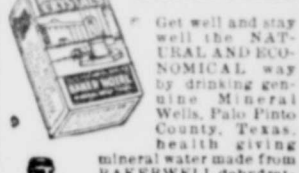

CONSERVATION AREAS GIVEN APPROVAL

(Big Spring Daily Herald)

Approval on five watersheds for complete problem areas for conservation were announced at the Big Spring office of the Soil Conservation Service Wednesday. The announcement followed a meeting of the Martin-Howard County Soil Conservation district board of supervisors at Stanton, Tuesday.

Included in the group, all approved since the May 6 meeting of the board, are areas northeast of Coahoma, south of Vealmoor, near Luther and Soash-Garner in Howard county and around Lenorah in Martin County.

In addition, two divided units out of 10 applications not grouped were given the stamp of approval.

By groups, the watershed areas northeast of Coahoma embraced 10 applications for 2,614 acres of cultivated land and 7,553 acres of pasture. Others are:

Lenorah: 11 applications, 2,534 acres cultivated, 441 acres pasture.

Ulmer Lake (south of Vealmoor): Four applications 1,189 acres cultivated, 114 acres pasture.

Luther: 10 applications 2,329 cultivated, 6,270 acres pasture.

Soash-Garner: 31 applications, 8,993 acres cultivated and 2,073 acres pasture. Field work on this group has been completed and individual farm information compiled. Dudley Mann, SCS supervisor, said that this data had been distributed to farmers and that SCS men would begin contacts on contemplated programs of work Thursday morning.

In the un-grouped classification of applications, there were 2,614 acres in cultivation and 7,553 acres pasture. However, only two out of this amount had been sanctioned for development by supervisors.

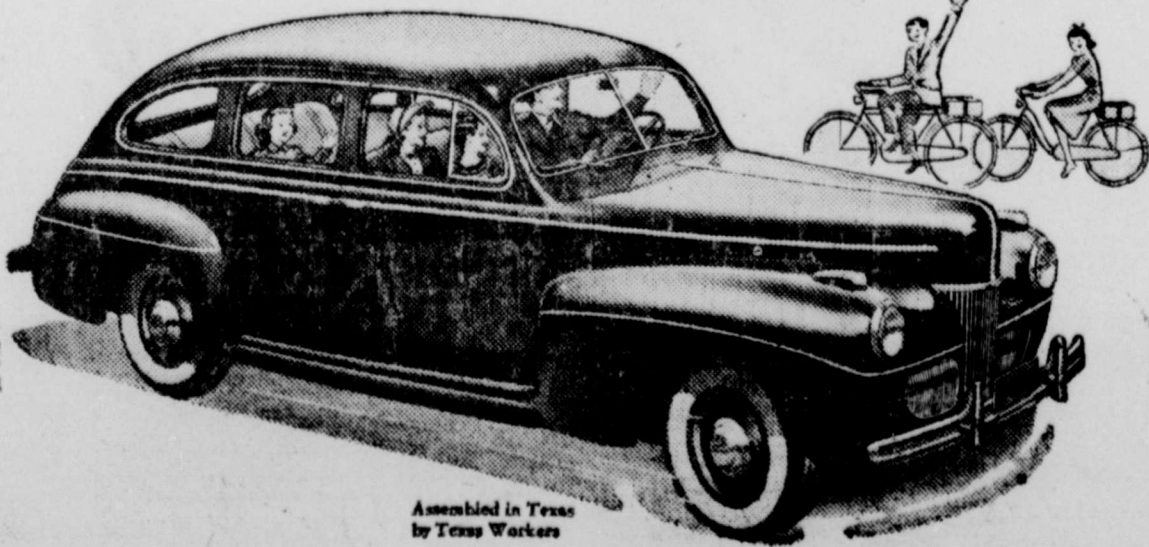

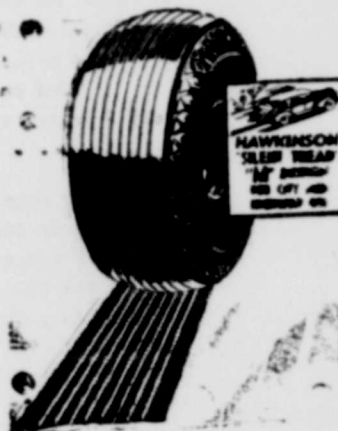
