To The Residents of North Wheeler County Hospital District

The Board of Trustees of Parkview Hospital will appreciate the assistance of you, the voters of North Wheeler County Hospital District by your clipping and returning this article to the Board of Trustees, expressing your opinion.

From October 1972 through today, Parkview Hospital has been operating quite consistently with 100 plus percentage patient occupancy. Throughout this period of time, as many of you have experienced, we have not only been unable to furnish private rooms for those requesting and needing such, we have quite often been forced to put patients in screened off beds in the ends of the halls. This high rate of occupancy cannot be attributed to seasonal illnesses or epidemics, but only to the increased usage of the clinic Doctors and the Parkview Hospital facilities by the people of North Wheeler County Hospital District.

It has become most evident to the Board of Trustees of Parkview Hospital in the last few months, that some provision must be made for the continuous proper care of our community health needs for the immediate future.

After due study and investigation, the Board of Trustees has arrived at the conclusion that this problem can be solved in one of three ways. We are setting out these solutions below and ask that you, as taxpayers, advise us of your feelings as to which one of the three approaches would, in your opinion, best resolve the problem of overcrowded conditions at Parkview Hospital.

We would also appreciate your expressing your thought as to the financing of this addition and/or construction, and once again we, the Board of Trustees, feel that there are two different avenues through which this can be accomplished. These we are also setting out below in order that you may check the method you feel would meet with your approval.

CONSTRUCTION

1. The addition of 16 to 20 private rooms to Parkview Hospital, estimated cost of the construction and equipment: \$125,000.00.

2. 40 to 50 bed Nursing Home to operate in conjunction with Parkview Hospital, estimated cost of construction and equipment: \$160,000.00 to \$180,000.00.

3. 8 private room addition to Parkview Hospital and approximately 30 bed Nursing Home, estimated cost of construction and equipment: \$160,000.00 to \$180,000.00.

FINANCING

1. Voting a bond issue for the amount needed to properly complete your choice marked above. This method will result in a small increase in property tax.

2. Asking the Commissioners Court to allocate that amount of money received from revenue sharing and assigned to Precincts 1 and 2 toward the cost of construction on your choice above. This method could quite possibly accomplish the needed additional space, without resulting in any additional increase in property tax, paper and discussing with the elected board member in your district and your commissioner, if you care to, and return to the Board of Trustees of Parkview Hospital with your comments.

(Editor's Note: Citizens of North Wheeler County are asked to consider the above information and after due consideration please respond. Your opinion is being requested by the Hospital Board.)

Homemakers, would you like to improve your home-making skills, continue your education for self-development, or increase community interest in life? There are many ways to do these things, but an excellent way is to belong to a home demonstration club.

A club is very easy to organize. It must have only five members to organize. The members should decide on their meeting date. Some clubs enjoy getting together every two weeks, once a month, or even every two months. Not only is each meeting a learning time, it is also a time for socializing and exchanging new ideas.

The club motto "To Make a Better Way of Life" describes the topics discussed each meeting. A club may choose the topics for their programs for example: home furnishings, housing, child care, food preparation, clothing selection, or construction, driver re-education, and arts and crafts.

Do you plan to preserve some of your family food at home? Do you know how much you want to preserve? When should you start planning? A good time to start planning for fruits and vegetables is before harvest season starts, whether you grow your own food or plan to buy it.

Consider the amount of freezer space you have whether it is a chest type, upright or a part of your refrigerator. If your freezer space is limited, you may want to preserve part of the food your family needs by canning. It costs

money to keep food frozen throughout the year, while canning is only the jars and lids. Do you have jars and other canning supplies on hand. Will you need to purchase some new supplies? (Remember you can reuse undamaged jars and rings but always replace used lids.)

And how much space - do you have for storage of canned foods? Do you need to consider adding some new cabinet or shelf space for these extra canned foods? Be ready for the season and preserve the food at the peak of quality and when they are plentiful or lowest in price.

With good planning you can stretch your family food dollar by preserving some of your food at home and assuring your family of garden fresh foods the year round. This can help you to provide your family with the needed food nutrients for good health.

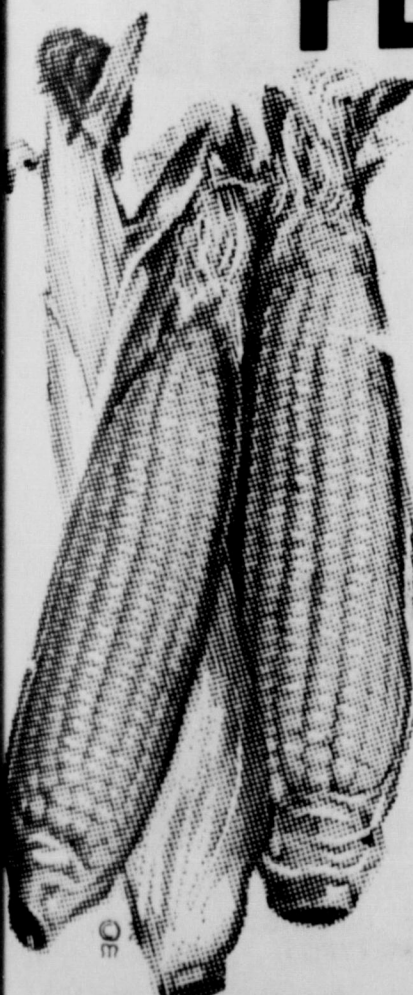

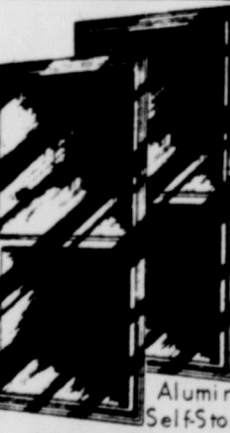

When Engagement is Broken

Getting engaged came easy for Gwen and Andy. But getting married seemed so scary that they finally decided to call the whole thing off.

At that point, however, a new problem arose: which one was entitled to keep the engagement ring? When Gwen refused to give it back, Andy hauled her into court.

After due deliberation, the court ruled in Andy's favor.

"An engagement ring is a symbol of the coming marriage," said the court. "If the engagement is broken off, the ring should be returned. The gift was conditional and the condition was not fulfilled."

Most courts agree that the engagement ring is returnable—at least, unless the man was solely to blame for the breakup. Returnable also are other gifts exchanged between the two parties in contemplation of marriage.

But this does not extend to gifts given prior to the engagement—that is, gifts given during the period of courting.

Thus, a court rejected the effort of an elderly suitor to reclaim some jewelry he had given to a younger woman. The court said the gifts had been made at his own risk, on the chance this his courtship would succeed.

What about gifts from friends and relatives, when the marriage plans fall through? Consider this case:

A doting father was so delighted when his daughter became engaged that he set up a \$5,000 joint bank account for the betrothed couple. Soon afterward, the romance cooled. But the young man retained his affection for the \$5,000.

"That was an outright gift," he argued in a court test. "Her father didn't say we had to get married."

But the court decided that even if the father didn't say it, he clearly meant it. The court said he would scarcely have set up a joint bank account except on the assumption that the two would soon be husband and wife.

Texas Highway Patrol Is Recruiting Applicants

The Texas Department of Public Safety is actively recruiting applicants to fill the ranks of its uniformed services. Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the DPS, announced that the training school for new uniformed law enforcement personnel will begin Sept. 25, 1973.

The Major noted that the DPS has been increasingly successful in recruiting persons from minority groups to these positions and said efforts in this direction will continue.

Also in keeping with the current trend, female applicants will be considered for these rewarding careers in law enforcement.

Major Bell said general qualifications for DPS officers are these: applicants must be 20 through 35 years of age; height not less than 68 inches; weight not less than two pounds per inch of height; visual acuity of 20/40 correctable to 20/20 and a minimum of 45 semester hours of college credit.

Applications may be obtained by contacting a DPS employee or any DPS office. The completed application form should be taken to offices in Lubbock, Amarillo or Wichita Falls where the competitive examination is given each Tuesday and Wednesday 9:00 A.M.

Major Bell said persons selected as cadets will be assigned to Austin for training at the DPS Academy. Salary during training will be \$625.00 per month. Upon being commissioned as an officer, the salary is raised to \$719.00 monthly with the opportunity to advance to \$848.00 per month.

Uniformed personnel receive additional longevity pay for each five years of service to 25 years. They are also granted a monthly uniform cleaning allowance and receive travel expenses when away from their state.

Uniforms, vehicles, weapons, ammunition and related equipment are furnished. Group life and hospitalization are paid for the employee and dependent coverage is available at reasonable rates. Officers participate in the Employee Retirement System of Texas as well as Social Security.

Vacation, holidays and sick leave are as provided for State employees.

Successful graduates will be assigned to the Highway Patrol, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, or Driver License Service, according to the needs of the DPS and consideration of personal preference.

All officers are eligible to compete for promotions after two years of service. Experienced uniformed DPS personnel interested in criminal investigation may apply for appointment to positions in the Criminal Law Enforcement Division, which includes Narcotics, Intelligence, Motor Vehicle Theft and Texas Ranger services at vacancies occur.

Arrangements will be made for a physical examination. A character investigation will be conducted and those persons who are accepted for employment will be notified prior to the beginning of the September recruit school.

JOE WAS A GOOD FELLOW

By: Marlon McWilliams He provided well for his family. He was a good father and husband. He paid his debts and gave to charity. He was fair in his business dealings. He was a good citizen. He left his family with a comfortable income and a good home. There were many flowers and lots of friends. The preacher made a nice talk about Joe's good qualities, but he didn't have much to say about Joe's hereafter. You see, Joe was not a Christian. Religion was "for little children, or perhaps women," but not for him. So Joe ignored God in his life; he didn't obey his will; he didn't talk to him; he made no effort to become a Christian, or to worship and serve as a Christian should. If there was a hereafter, he trusted in his own goodness to carry him through. He had no promise that it would. He just figured it out that way.

But Joe was guilty of sin, even as you and I. There were some things that he did when he was younger that he didn't like to think about, and he had tried to avoid these mistakes since then. But those sins were committed and they injured others and himself, and the sins and the injuries still stand on Joe's record. He was much like Cornelius, who in some respects was better than Joe (Acts 10:1-2). But the goodness of Cornelius was not enough to save him. 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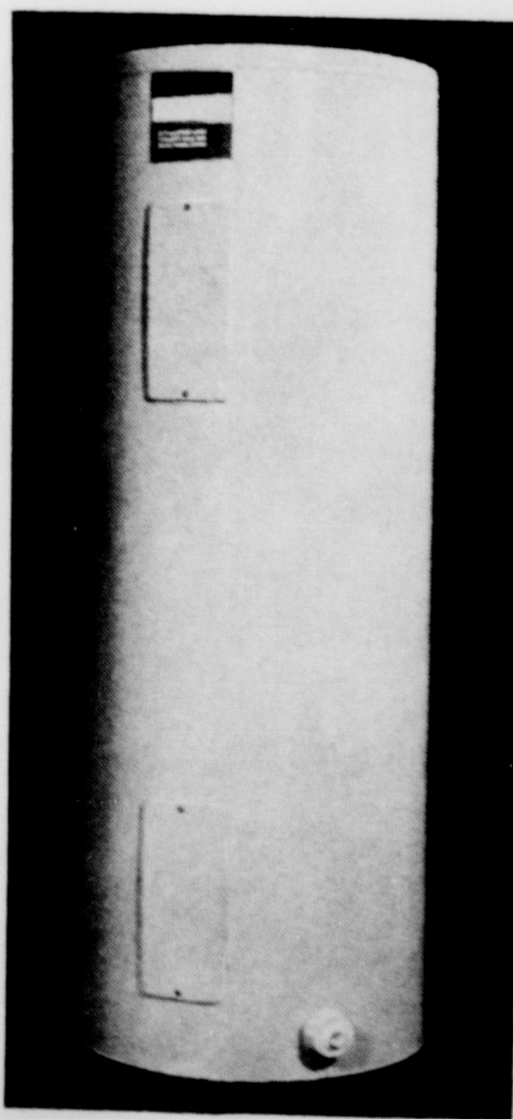
