## Tornadoes To Play Roswell Friday

### Attention Of Permian Basin Is Centered On Magnolia Wildcat

#### Test May Open Brand New Pool In Dawson Co.

Geologists Believe Test Is Part Of Cedar Lake Pool Three Miles West

Most of the attention in the West Texas Permian Basin Monday was centered on the Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Sandidge, section 110, block M. E. L. survey, Western Dawson County, indicating a three-mile southeast extension for the Cedar Lake area of Northeastern Gaines County.

The wildcat is botomed at 5,065 feet, and was waiting on cement to set on the 5 1/2-inch casing cemented at 4,900 feet.

Operator ran an electrical survey on the hole which showed the first porosity from 4,925 feet to 4,930 feet and the second porous zone from 4,955 feet to total depth. The log disclosed the best section of porosity was from 5,050 feet to total depth.

This wildcat ran more than 400 feet low on the lower lime markers to the nearest production in the Cedar Lake pool. This difference in the markers may cause the wildcat, if a producer, to be classified as a separate pool, although opinion among geologists now is that the wildcat is on the Cedar Lake structure.

#### Immediate Cash On Loan Cotton Being Offered

Announcement is made this week by Mike Garvin, that he is making government loans on cotton, for Alexander Sprunt and Son, Inc., of Houston, a lending agency for the Commodity Credit Corporation, and making immediate cash payment.

Alexander Sprunt and Son, Inc., have been in the cotton business since 1886. They own the Ship Channel Compress Company, on the Houston water front, where they have 100,000 bale storage capacity.

Under this plan, Garvin is paying cash without delay, and the grower knows what he is getting before he is out any expense.

"If the market advances, your loan equities will bring more money due to the fact that your cotton is already at the port," he stated Wednesday.

He is located on the Compress grounds where growers may take their samples to him. Your attention is called to their ad in this issue of the Courier.

#### LNFLA Names Officers At Recent Meet

W. V. P. Baker, C. M. Burton and T. E. Temple of Lamesa, were named directors of the Lamesa National Farm Loan Association for three year terms except Mr. Temple, who was elected to serve in the place of C. A. Barron, whose term expires in 1941, at a meeting of the members, September 13th at the Majestic theater in Lamesa.

Other members of the board are J. P. Gibson and W. C. Speck also of Lamesa. At a meeting of the board following the annual meeting of members, W. V. P. Baker was named president and C. M. Burton, vice-president. J. E. Barron was re-elected secretary-treasurer of the association. Named on the loan committee were W. V. P. Baker, W. C. Speck and T. E. Temple.

Organized in 1918, the Lamesa National Farm Loan Association is a cooperative farm mortgage institution through which farmers obtain long-term loans from the Federal Loan Bank of Houston, Texas. Since its organization more than 10,000 farmers have obtained Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commission loans amounting to more than \$2,283,000.00.

The Association is located in the First National Bank Building in Lamesa. Loan facilities of the Association are available to farmers and ranchers in Dawson, Borden, and Gaines counties.

#### Some Landlords In County Reported Violating AAA

It has come to the attention of the Dawson County A. C. A. Committee that some landlords and operators in the county are charging bonus rent and are making other charges for the purpose of securing for themselves a share of the agricultural conservation payments to which tenant and sharecroppers are rightfully entitled. The devices employed are varied. In some cases the charges take the form of a cash bonus in advance equal to the total payment for compliance that would otherwise go to the entire farm. Other arrangements call for a cash payment on acreage not planted to soil depleting crops. A rental is sometimes charged for the house in which the tenant must live, and in some instances the tenants are required to pay taxes on the land.

Most of the cases reported are for bonus rent where the tenant is required to pay a bonus cash rent in addition to regular third and fourth rent.

Since such bonus rents or charges, when practiced under conditions where they have in preceding years not been regular rental practices, clearly constitute an attempt to deprive tenants and sharecroppers of payments to which they are otherwise entitled under the agricultural conservation program, therefore, payments will be withheld from these parties who are found to be responsible for this irregular practice. Any such irregular practice should be reported to the County AAA office.

### HUNDREDS OF DAWSON COUNTY YOUTHS WILL REGISTER FOR SERVICE IN ARMY OCTOBER 16

#### 1,000 Men From The South Plains Area Have Enlisted In United States Service

It is reported that the U. S. Army Recruiting Station at Lubbock has sent the 1000th young man from the South Plains Area to Military service. It is reported that this region is furnishing a very high percentage of the recruits to the armed forces of the United States.

The number of enlistments from a given area will influence the number drafted under the Selective Service Act which is now law. The ratio may be somewhat low in this region because of the relatively large number already in service.

Caryl Baldwin has received notice that openings still exist for young men meeting enlistment requirements for three year terms in Field Artillery, Infantry, Engineers, Air Corps, Signal Corps, and Medical Department. A call likewise is made through him for prospective non-commissioned officers to fill vacancies in new regiments now being created rapidly.

#### Anderson-Clayton Field Man Estimates 431,000 Bales For Plains Area

Lamb County will produce 10,000 more bales than any other of seventeen counties on the South Plains this year according to the estimate of K. N. Clapp of Anderson, Clayton, as carried briefly in a story in last week's County Wide News.

J. Sam Lewis, feature writer for the Lubbock Avalanche, who makes a continuous study of crop conditions on the South Plains, has assembled figures for each of the counties, and totaled them on Mr. Clapp's estimates. He is the second Lubbock expert to place Lamb in first place with 65,000 bales for 1940.

Hockley according to Clapp, should rank second; Dawson third, and Lubbock fourth.

Clapp estimates an increase of 75,000 bales this year over last for the same counties.

In Crosby, Garza, Lubbock, Lynn, there will be fewer bales than this year than last, Clapp estimates.

Reports tabulated indicate further improvement in crop condition over the area, with a few small areas that received some hail damage. Clapp's estimates are:

#### No Estimate Is Made As To How Many From Here

#### County Registration Board Of Three Members Will Be Named By Atty's General

Dawson County young men between the ages of 21 and 35 inclusive, will register under the compulsory military draft act, on Wednesday, October 16th. It is understood that the registration will be made at regular voting booths in the county. Complete information as to the place will be given later.

All those required to register are the ones living in that particular precinct, as well as anyone living elsewhere in the nation, but who is in that precinct on October 16th.

The act states that all men, whether married or single, with physical disabilities or not, who have attained their 21st birthday, but who have not attained their 36th birthday, are required to register.

Registration will start at 7 a. m. in the morning and will continue until 9 p. m. that evening. It will be completed throughout the nation in one day. Employers are requested to make plans to rotate leave periods to allow all employees to complete registration.

The Attorney General of Texas will appoint a Dawson County registration board of three to supervise the registration.

No estimate has been made as to the number who will register in this county, but it will run several hundred.

After registration, all names will be drawn by lot to select the first 400,000 to be inducted into service about November 15.

Exhibitors, also are taking a great deal of interest and many have already laid their plans relative to what they will show.

The premium list has been released, many cash awards are being offered, along with ribbons.

Judges for the livestock and agricultural exhibits have already been named. They are County Agents K. B. Cox of Snyder and George Bond of Slaton.

The Tidwell shows will furnish the midway attraction. They promise several new rides, with plenty of entertainment for both young and old.

The fair will run for three days, opening on Thursday morning, October 10th and closing Saturday night, October 13th.

#### 3AA Basketball Conference Is Formed With Lamesa As A Member In New Set-Up

The Lamesa High School will be a member of District 3AA conference Basketball for the 1941 season's play-off for the District 3AA Championship according to action taken by the district executive committee last Saturday. It was voted to have a district 3AA Basketball League composed of member schools and two games would be played with each member school on a home and home basis.

A member school may decline to enter the play-off but it is judged from expression and voting that all teams will enter. Lamesa will have games at home and away with Abilene, Sweetwater, Big Spring, Midland, Odessa and San Angelo for district honors. It should be remembered that the State Championship will be run off as heretofore, that is, county champions will be determined which will play at the district tournament followed by the regional elimination and then by the State meet.

The new district arrangement will care for schedules and opportunities for spirited competition needed for preparation for team development.

The district will also hold a track meet for member schools in the Spring season for current members only. No action was taken on a proposal to add baseball to the list of interschool contests since time remains for consideration of that subject.

#### Strong Mexico Team Expected To Give Trouble

Lamesa High School is host Friday night to one of three out-of-State football teams to come to Texas for competition. Roswell, New Mexico visits Lamesa. Las Cruces goes to El Paso and Shreveport, La. Texarkana. These inter-sectional games are watched with considerable interest by Texas football followers because of the differences in conference rules and regulations in the states bordering Texas and the Texas stringent regulations. Lamesa went down in the records last year as losing to Raton, New Mexico in a hard played game. As a general rule, Texas teams fare quite well against out-of-state opposition. The Texas age limit is now lower for Conference AA than formerly and comparisons are watched for what may be revealed in these football matches.

Roswell High footballers come from one of the most populous cities of our Western neighboring state and have a long football history. They are accustomed to hard competition from El Paso, Albuquerque, Clovis, Amarillo and Lubbock. Roswell as a city is football minded and the citizens follow the high school and college teams with the result that their team ranks among the strongest in that State. ## Texas U. Opens Exercises That Test The "PTQ"

It takes more than brute strength to perform many of the physical tests devised by a University of Texas physical training expert. Dr. D. K. Brace is perfecting the tests which indicate your physical "training quotient" just as intelligence tests check up on your mind. Intelligence and coordination are to be measured in the physical tests.

Here are some of the more difficult of Dr. Brace's tests. See what you can do with them.

1 Stand with feet together. Jump into air making a full turn to the left. Land standing on same spot. Don't lose balance. Don't move feet around in landing.

2 Stand on right foot. Grasp left foot behind right knee. Bend and touch left knee to floor and stand up without touching any part of the floor with foot or hand.

3 Hold toes of either foot in open hand. Jump up and land with feet over foot that is held. Stand without letting go.

4 Stand with both feet together. Squat down putting hands through knees. Clasp hands in front of ankles.

5 Kneel with toes flat on floor. Bend feet together. Jump to feet without rocking.

6 Cross both arms in front of chest. Sit down, propped up on elbows. Stand up without rocking. Balance and without crossing arms.

7 Stand on your left foot. Place right foot against knee with right knee pointing out to right side. Stand thus for ten seconds with eyes closed.

8 Stand straight. Raise left foot from floor. Sit down on right heel, extending left leg out straight in front of you. Go back to standing position without losing balance. Do the same with opposite foot.

## Protest Is Filed Against High Candidate For County Judge In Borden By Nunnally

Plaintiff in Borden County reached the voting stage again in the trial with the July 27 primary still giving political candidates plenty of ammunition for verbal cannon fire.

Cause of the greatly revived interest in Borden's political arena is a protest filed in the office of County Clerk Maagie Williams by Judge Dell Barber, prominent Colorado City attorney.

The protest was filed as an afterthought of the July 27 primary held in Borden County with respect to the county judgeship when three candidates sought the nomination.

As agreed by the candidates for county office no runoff was held following the primary and on August 26 County Chairman S. C. Keen certified the nominees to the county clerk.

The protest, filed by Charles Nunnally, incumbent in the county judges office alleges that S. C. Keen without consent of the county executive committee, filed the certificate of nomination and did not call a second primary election, which it is now alleged should have been done according to law.

In the protest, Judge Nunnally claims the nominee, L. A. Pearce did not receive a majority of the votes cast and therefore should not have been declared the nominee for county judge.

Nunnally alleges in his protest that the county chairman's certificate of nomination states that at the election held July 27, L. A. Pearce received the greatest number of votes for county judge of Borden County; that Charles Nunnally received the second highest number of votes, and that J. E. Nance received the lowest number of votes.

Such is not the case, the Nunnally protest pointed out. L. A. Pearce, the government states, did not receive a majority of votes cast for the office of county judge in said election, which, under the law would require and necessitate a second primary or run-off for deciding the nominee for county judge that the two candidates whose names should have been on the ballot would have been L. A. Pearce and Charles Nunnally.

### Texan To Teach In Nicaragua

#### 57th Session Of

Dr. John H. Ashton, associate professor of agricultural journalism at Texas A. and M. College has received notification that he has been selected by the Nicaraguan Government to serve as an exchange professor at the University of Nicaragua under the terms of the Convention for the Promotion of Inter-American Cultural Relations.

Dr. Ashton was one of the first professors selected under the agreement between the Latin-American nations and aptly fitted for the work.

He speaks English, French, Spanish, and Italian, which has enabled him to travel to all parts of the world while studying agricultural methods in general and livestock in particular. He is an authority on breeds of horses and cattle for the past few years has been at work gathering data for the preparation of a book on the development of the livestock industry in Texas and the Southwest.

He is the author of several books on hogs, mules, horses, beef cattle and has collaborated with several other writers in preparation of their works. He also has written innumerable articles on American and foreign agriculture for publication in this country, and others where he has traveled.

Dr. Ashton also is a former editor of the Breeder's Gazette and the

### Valley Farmer, published in the lower Rio Grande Valley.

He was born in England in 1880 and after completing his elementary and secondary education, came to America and attended Texas A. and M., graduating with the class of 1906.

He received his Master of Arts degree from the University of Missouri in 1924 and his Doctor of Philosophy from the same school two years later. In 1927 he came back to Texas A. and M. to accept the position he now holds. He has been granted a leave of absence to accept the Nicaraguan professorship and is expected to return to the college in September 1941.

During the World War I. he served for four years with the Allied military forces overseas and received decorations from Great Britain and France for his work as a military interpreter during the war and on the Rhine following the Armistice. He also received the Order of the Crown of Belgium for his writing on Belgian agriculture and Merite Agricole (France) for similar writings in that country.

He has been listed in "Who's Who in America" since 1922.

**Permian Basin Association Offers Many Services To Each Community Served**

Typical of one of the many services which the Permian Basin Association can render to the people of West Texas was the outstanding accomplishment in tax rate reduction last week in Yoakum County. Through detailed study by committees and the employment of recognized tax experts, it was possible to secure the fine cooperation of the Yoakum County Commissioner's Court in a 14 cent reduction to effect a saving of \$28,000 for the property owners of that county.

Similar program in other counties and other political subdivisions will be carried by out this new organization during the next year.

In addition to a strong tax program, the Permian Basin Association is alert to legislative matters. Watchful for legislation which may be adverse to West Texas people, it will also be active in supporting new legislation for the benefit of the territory.

The Permian Basin Association begins its membership campaign in Lamesa on September 19th. Carl Rountree, M. C. Lindsey and S. L. Forrest, local Directors of the Association will be in charge of the campaign and have indicated that approximately 200 prospects will be visited for membership.

An outline of the five-point program of the Association follows:

- I. Federal and State
  - A. Work to insure equalizing of all taxes particular attention to readjustment in method of collecting gross production tax.
  - 1. Present practice of same per barrel tax on cheaper West Texas oil and higher priced oil of other areas should be adjusted.

  - 2. Employ experienced auditors or tax experts for detailed study.

3. Urge publication of tentative budgets at least thirty days prior to equalization board hearings.
- III. Cooperation with West Texas Chamber of Commerce
  - A. Endorsement of Tax Program
  - IV. Other Organizations
    - A. Secure information on and emulate successful tax practices of older, established organizations whose purposes are similar to Permian Basin Association.
    - V. Education
      - A. Formation of Local Tax Committees.
      - 1. Stage local meetings with outside speakers.
      - 2. Issue regular publicity releases.
      - 3. Membership Bulletin
      - 4. Pamphlets.
      - 5. Organizations and Clubs
      - 6. Employer to Employee
      - 7. Direct mail releases to public officials.
      - 8. Newspapers
      - 9. Radio

Farming to hold water on the land where it fell is a practice being followed more and more by the farmers in the Lamesa Camp Area.

Since the amount of rainfall is important in determining the amount of crop which a farmer receives, it is very essential that none of this valuable rain be allowed to run off during the periods of heavy rainfall, a total failure of the and crop rotation are very effective will probably be the result.

Various methods of farming have been developed in order to hold moisture during the periods of heavy rainfall. Terraces, contour tillage, and contour strip cropping and cro protation are very effective in controlling erosion and increasing yield.

On nearly level or gently sloping land, contour tillage may hold all the water from moderate rains, but considerable runoff will usually follow heavy rains, especially after cultivation has leveled the surface unless the field is terraced.

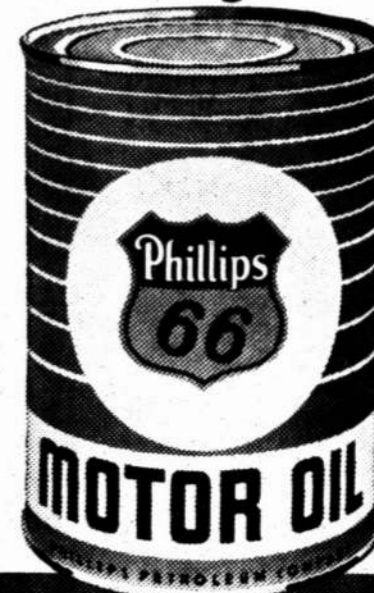

### Football Periods Must Not Run Over 12 Minutes

The time limit for football games has been established at twelve minute quarters this season and there is no option for agreement between rival coaches for longer time. The national rules for high schools have been definitely established at twelve minutes as a safety measure. Fans who have been accustomed to fifteen minute periods may think the new time limits are short. The period between halves is unchanged at fifteen minutes but since the rules provide that each team shall use the last three minutes for getting ready for resumption of the game at exactly fifteen minutes after play in the second quarter, the field must be cleared of band, pep squad or other groups at the end of twelve minutes.

Pep squad groups and bands will divide time and make their performances within the twelve minute interval. The auxiliary organizations may use time after the game for entertainment features if more time is desired.

This announcement is made that the public may understand the reasons if pep squad and band events appear short during the half period.

Delays in beginning games in the third quarter have resulted in players getting cold and stiff. The injuries which occur in football games happen in greater numbers in the third quarter and since this discovery, the authorities responsible have insisted that precautions be taken to let the game proceed with out interruption in the interest of the welfare of the players.

### Klondike Consolidation Is Upheld By Supreme Court

The Supreme Court Wednesday affirmed the decision of the Court of Civil Appeals at El Paso in the Pleasant Valley-Klondike School consolidation case, thus upholding the consolidation of the Pleasant Valley Common School District No. 7 of Martin County with the Klondike Independent School District of Dawson County.

In June 1939, the District Court of Martin County rendered judgement for Klondike upholding the consolidation, and these tax payers appealed to the Court of Civil Appeals at El Paso which court affirmed the judgment of the District Court last May. The Supreme Court's decision has likely terminated the matter.

Consolidation elections were held in each of these districts in March 1939, and the proposition to consolidate carried by a vote of 26 to 20 in the Pleasant Valley District and 17 to 0 in the Klondike District brought in suit in the District Court of Martin County contesting the consolidation proceedings.
