Blat On Life In Army Camp Given By "Draftee" Daniel in Letter To Editor

(Editor's Note: We pass on to our readers an interesting letter received last week from J. P. Daniel, who was drafted for a year of military training in January.)

Fort Clark, Texas
112th Cavalry B. Troop
Feb. 19, 1941

Dear Buford,

Well, I'm in the army now! It surely is lonesome this far from home, but I suppose that one year away will not hurt me.

We were sworn into the U. S. Army on the morning of January 21st, and that afternoon we left for El Paso. The next morning at 7:30 o'clock we left the train for the Reception Center which is northeast of El Paso.

The Reception Center is a U. S. Army Center for all the boys who are drafted, or who volunteer, to go to get clothes, vaccinations and take a test. Then, the boys are sent to various camps to continue their year of training.

J. F. Buske, Raymond Coughley (Coy), G. R. Brown and I were sent to the 112th Cavalry after staying four days at the Reception Center. We lived in tents, both at the Center and after we moved to the 112th at Fort Bliss.

The 112th Cavalry was composed of National Guard boys before they were drafted for the Army. All of them came from Dallas, or some town near there. They surely were friendly toward us.

On February 5th the 112th left El Paso by train for Fort Clark. That same day the 5th Cavalry left Fort Clark for El Paso. The 5th Cavalry boys got our tents and we inherited their rock barracks at Fort Clark. They really hated to have to move from here to tents.

This is like paradise compared to living at Fort Bliss. The grass is green and flowers are blooming here. You should see the Army when it moves. Trucks were running at 3 o'clock in the morning on Feb. 5, men were loading and unloading them, some were leading the horses to the train, and all together it surely did make lots of noise. We had about 25 coaches on our train and there were three train loads of us. J. F. Buske and I are still together,

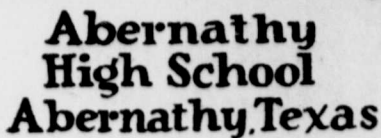

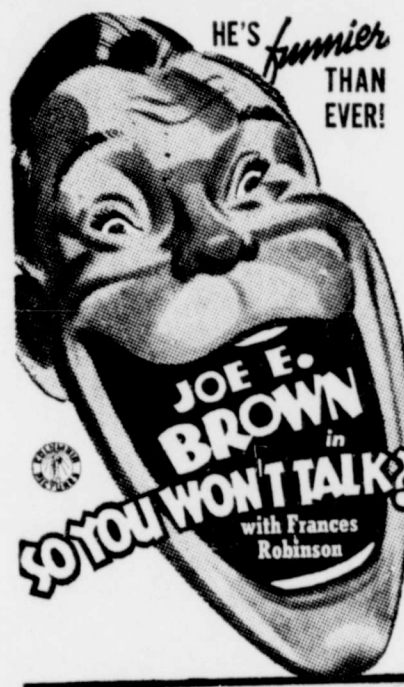
