## B-29 Crewman Missing in Raid On Jap Territory

Sgt. Wilbur J. Chapman, waist gunner on a B-29, has been reported as missing in action since Jan. 9 in the Pacific area, according to word reaching here a week from Sgt. Chapman's mother, Mrs. J. M. Chapman, who now makes her home in Yakima, Wash.

Sgt. Chapman has been based on Saipan since Nov. 15, 1944 and was among the first B-29 crewmen to take part in raids on Tokyo. In addition to the raids on Tokyo he has also reported participating in a bombing mission on Truk, the Jap Naval Base.

Mrs. Chapman writes that her son's base on Saipan was near the American cemetery where row on row of crosses marked the graves of men who had given their life to take the base which is now a vital part of the American air offensive on Japan. "We really have a big debt to pay to those men," Sgt. Chapman wrote.

Rearred near Hereford, Chapman enlisted in the Army Air Corps, Dec. 2, 1943. He was stationed at Sheppard Field, Kingman, Ariz., Lincoln, Neb., Pratt, Kans., and Kearney, Neb., before being assigned to duty with a bombardment squadron in the Pacific area on Nov. 1, 1944.

Another son of the Chapmans, C. G. Chapman, is serving as a postal clerk at a Navy base somewhere in the Pacific. He has been in service since June, 1944, and on overseas duty since Dec. 15.

## Soy Beans Processed At Amarillo Mill

By special arrangement with the Secretary of Agriculture and the Commodity Credit Corporation, an Amarillo cotton oil company has completed plans for processing soy beans raised in Texas, according to E. G. Collier of the local AAA office. Previously the Amarillo mill had processed beans produced in other states.

The beans may be delivered to the Fraser or Pitman elevators in Hereford and will be shipped to Amarillo by rail in carload lots; as only large shipments are being accepted at the Amarillo plant.

Local elevator men say that one carload of soy beans is already "in sight" for shipment from Hereford and that all farmers having soy beans for processing should make arrangements for shipment from one of the local elevators.

## District Court Adjourns After Active Week

With most of the docket cleared, sessions of the 69th District Court were concluded here for the time being Tuesday afternoon, with the disposal of a record number of civil and criminal cases.

Fourteen civil matters, including two divorce cases, and two criminal cases were acted upon during the one week in which court was in session. A few more divorce suits and some other civil cases and perhaps one more criminal case may receive court action later.

Judge John Aldridge left Tuesday for his home in Farwell and will return for later sessions.

### Friemel Appeals Sentence

Herbert Joseph Friemel, of Umbarger, found guilty of cattle theft by a jury here on Saturday and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary, heard his motion for a new trial denied on Monday, and his attorneys have filed notice of appeal. Friemel was charged with theft.

Young Newman, who held the rank of parachute rigger, third class, had been in the Navy since Nov. 21, 1943, and had been on active duty in the Pacific theatre since May, 1944. He had taken part in several major naval engagements.

The last letter received by Mr. and Mrs. Newman from their son was dated Dec. 29. According to the Navy Department message, some time may be expected to elapse before further information is revealed.

Bill attended grade school in Hereford and high school at Vega, and he has many friends in this community.

## Many Plants Grow From Seed and Cuttings

Stating that almost any shrub or tree can be grown from seed, Miss Sadie Lee Oliver, CHDA, points out that Deaf Smith County farm women are showing great interest this year in the use of seed and cuttings to help out in landscaping plans.

It is easy to root many plants, Miss Oliver said, listing such plants as abelia, eleagnus, gardenia (or cape jasmine), honeysuckle and nandina as being easily rooted from cuttings. You can also root crape myrtle, flowering quince, wisteria, pyracantha, lavender and English ivy, as well as several junipers. Many trees and shrubs come up readily from seed, and the home demonstration agent lists fruit trees such as plum, peach and apple as being started successfully this way. She also names agave, euonymus, ligustrum or privet, nandina, French mulberry, red bud and desert willow.

Considerable interest is also being shown in pruning, and Miss Oliver has information and publications which she will be glad to furnish on this and other types of landscaping problems.

## Former Hereford Man Listed Among Prisoners Freed at Cabanatuan Camp

"I am in the hospital for treatment. Don't worry, mother, for I can take it."

That was the eighth card which Mrs. Myrtle Wheeler of Seagraves had received from her son, Lt. Tony J. Wheeler, formerly of Hereford, who with all other veterans of Bataan, Corregidor and Singapore, was a prisoner of war at the infamous Cabanatuan camp in the Philippines.

Mrs. Wheeler stated that she literally "hung on the dial of her radio" when news of the liberation of the men at Cabanatuan began to come through—and several lists had been read before her son's name was mentioned. In fact, in her frantic radioing, Mrs. Wheeler missed the reading of his name altogether but neighbors arrived almost immediately with the good news.

Mrs. Albert Farris of Hereford, an aunt of Lieutenant Wheeler, says that static on her radio pervasively blotted out every

reading of the names of liberated prisoners; but at 7:30 on Thursday night a neighbor, E. W. Cawthon, arrived to tell her that he had heard Wheeler's name. "And from then until one o'clock, I got telephone calls," says Mrs. Farris. Late that night Mrs. Wheeler called and they compared notes—deciding that it was remarkable that neither one of them should have gotten the news first hand.

Lieutenant Wheeler attended grade school in Hereford and Canyon and high school at Ralls, where he was an outstanding football player. He enlisted in the Army at Lubbock on Nov. 2, 1939 and reached the Philippines in the spring of 1940. He was stationed with the Army Quartermaster Corps in the Manila Port Area when the islands were invaded and received a battlefield commission on Bataan in January of 1942.

He is a brother of Geron Wheeler, formerly of Hereford, who last year received his discharge from the Marine Corps.

## Work Starts on Addition to Pitman Elevator

Excavation work started this week on a new 550,000-bushel concrete storage unit for Pitman Grain Company of this city. The new elevator addition will be located due west of the old iron elevator parallel to the Santa Fe tracks.

This new addition will bring Pitman facilities to slightly more than one million bushels of storage space and is expected to be finished in time to handle the 1945 wheat harvest.

While the new bins will be basically similar to the present concrete bins, they will vary in that they will be around 23 feet, taller and somewhat smaller in girth. The new addition will include 42 separate concrete bins as compared with 20 in the (Continued on Page 12)

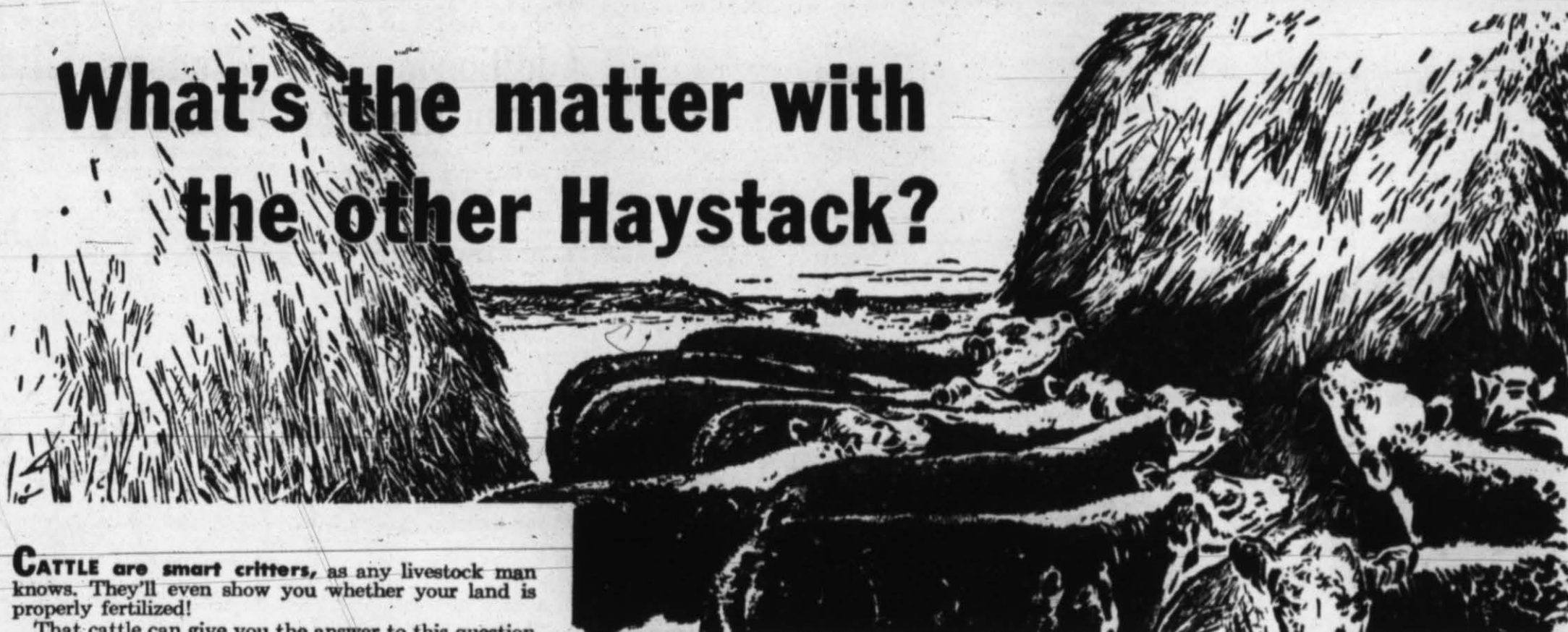

**CATTLE** are smart critters, as any livestock man knows. They'll even show you whether your land is properly fertilized!

That cattle can give you the answer to this question has been proved by an experiment reported by Dr. Wm. A. Albrecht of the University of Missouri, which is illustrated here. The cattle were turned loose in a field in which there were two stacks of hay. The grasses were the same species; the curing was the same; they looked and smelled the same. But the cattle ate one stack and never touched the other.

The hay from the stacks was analyzed in a laboratory. Then it was discovered that the stack the cattle liked contained much more calcium and phosphorus—two minerals cattle must have for good health. The good hay came from soil that had been treated with lime and phosphate... the poor hay from untreated land.

Minerals essential to both human and animal health come from the soil, are absorbed into plants and so get into the bodies of grazing animals. Human beings, of course, get their supply of minerals from plant foods like fruits, vegetables and cereals, and from foods of animal origin like meats, fish and eggs.

Cleanliness is the first rule of profitable hog raising. Dirt breeds disease and parasites, so it pays to move young pigs to clean pastures and to keep them away from old pens and yards. Old dry bedding has been known to start *Strep. dysenteriae*.

*Strep. dysenteriae* can be prevented by early vaccination, and transfer of diseases from newly purchased hogs can be controlled by a period of isolation.

## THE EDITOR'S COLUMN



So many important things are happening in the livestock and meat business that it is difficult for an editor to decide which to write about and which to leave out.

Few people realize how much beef, pork, lamb and veal must be set aside by meat packers operating under federal inspection for the armed forces and Lend-Lease. As of January 7, 1945, 50% of all utility steers, heifers, and cows are set aside for the government canning program. The government will continue to call for 60% of the choice, good, and commercial steer and heifer beef carcasses, excepting extremely light weights; also 80% of the cutter and canner beef. Of the total pork meat produced, excluding lard, approximately 50% has to be set aside. Government priorities on "Good" and "Choice" lambs have averaged from 40 to 50% of the suitable lambs. Priority orders also apply to approximately 50% of the "Choice," "Good" and "Commercial" veal produced within specifications.

Of course, such regulations are necessary in order to insure the proper conduct and winning of the war. Nevertheless, producers and consumers should know of these regulations as a partial explanation of why they are having difficulty in getting the supplies of beef, lamb, pork and veal which they want.

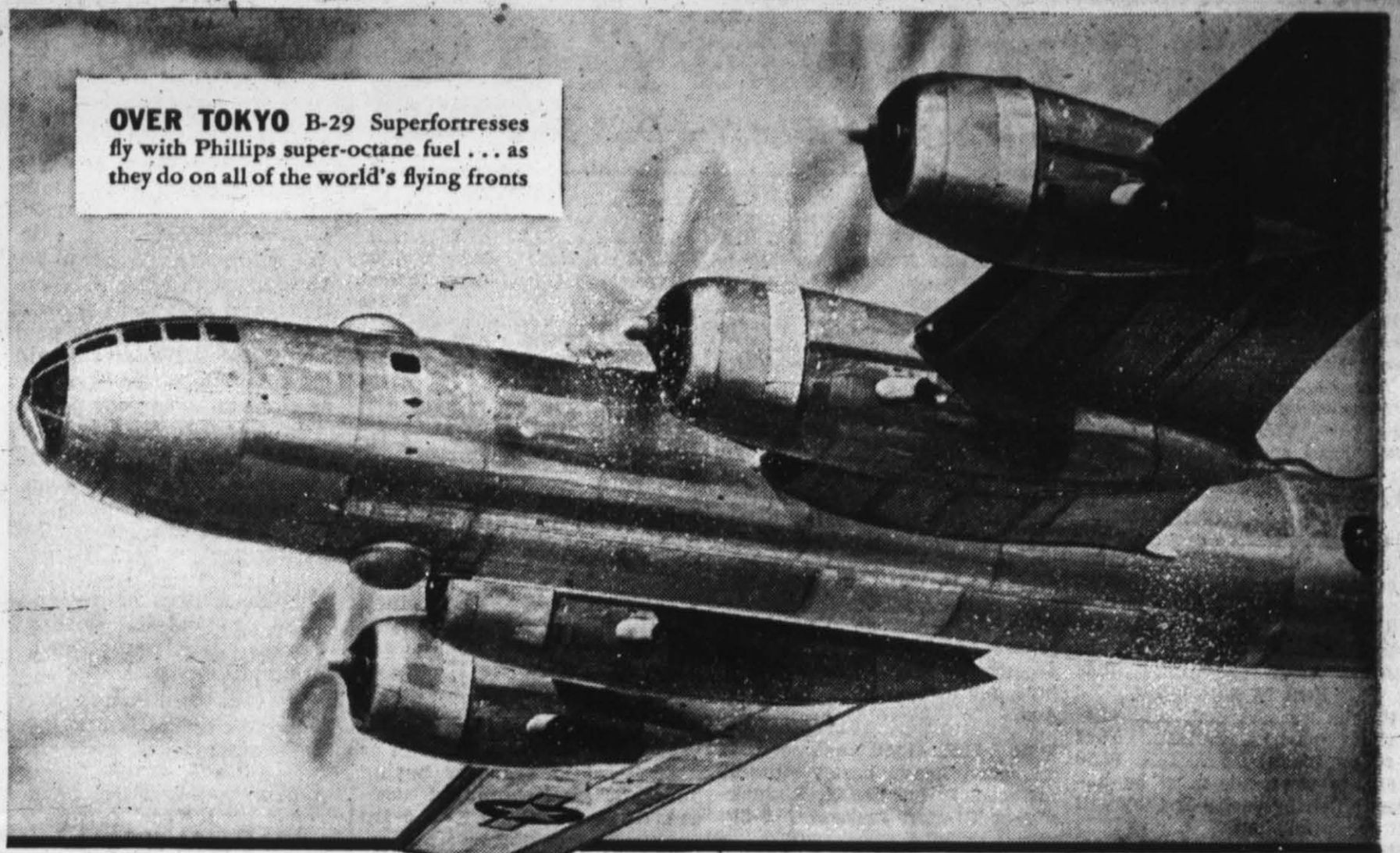

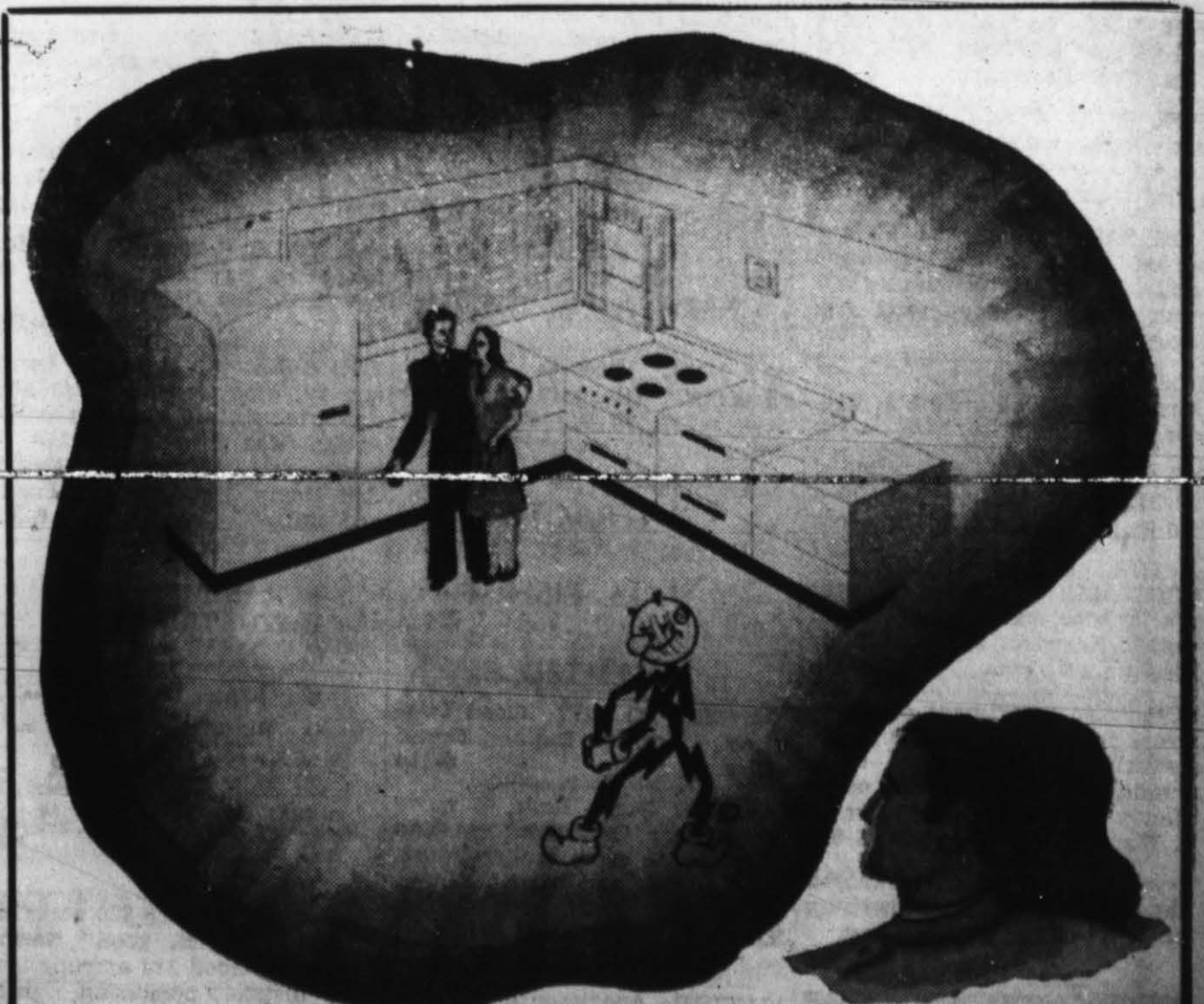

## SONS In the Service

**With Railway Bn.**  
**SIXTH ARMY GROUP,**  
**FRANCE**—The 759th Railway Operating Battalion, of which Pfc. Robert G. Curtis of Hereford, Tex., is a member is cashing in on valuable experience gathered in North Africa and Italy as it plays an important part in the operation of railways in Eastern France.

The bridges and building section, the signal section and the track section of the battalion did much to reopen the railroads north and northeast of Lyon, enabling movement of essential supplies for the U. S. 7th and French 1st Armies during their lightning progress in the early days of the Southern France campaign.

Air brakes on their trucks, modern equipment generally, and wholehearted cooperation by French civilian railwaymen have made the 759th's job in France much smoother than it was in North Africa and Italy, although tremendous problems caused by Nazi demolition have had to be overcome.

### With Service Group

A U. S. TROOP CARRIER FORCES BASE, Technical Sgt. George L. Tiefel, whose wife is Mrs. Coralle Tiefel, 511 Roosevelt Avenue, Hereford, is now serving with a Service Group of Major General Paul L. Williams' U. S. Troop Carrier Forces.

Composed of aircraft specialists especially chosen for their skill, the unit's mission is to salvage and reclaim gliders used in the First Allied Airborne Army's aerial invasion of the Netherlands.

The planes of U. S. Troop Carrier Forces, which are maintained by men of Service Groups, not only fly paratroops and tow gliders to pre-designated spots near the front and behind enemy lines, but also keep these troops supplied with food, clothing and ammunition until they can be supplied by ground forces.

Before entering the service,

Sgt. Tiefel worked as a salesman. He has been overseas for 15 months.

### Attends Xmas Mass At St. Peter's in Rome

Allen Plummer, who celebrated his first "hitch" in the Army on Jan. 16 when he completed three years of duty, figures that Christmas Eve, 1944, will linger in his memory for a long time. On that night he and a friend went to church at St. Peter's Cathedral in Rome and witnessed a Christmas Mass celebrated by the Pope for the people of Rome and for Allied soldiers in the city. Plummer wrote an account of his experiences for The Bugle, weekly newspaper of the Truck Com-

pany of which he is a member, and parts of the description follow:

"... We found out that an Italian ex-soldier who lived in the house where we were staying wanted to show us around. This was a bit of luck we hadn't expected and we appreciated the favor. We found a solid stream of people crossing the Tiber River Bridge and entering Vatican City. . . but it was 10:30 p. m. when we got inside the cathedral, so we had some time to look at the architecture of the building before the Pope made his entrance.

"... I was not impressed so much by its size as by the splendor and beauty with which the ceiling and walls were finished

. With designs of gold leaf, mosaic combinations and famous paintings. The world-famous dome, designed by Michel Angelo, is a great achievement in architecture and Renaissance art.

"At 11:45 the curtains of the Chapel of Relics were drawn and the trumpets started to play. The first of the procession were the colorful Swiss Guards . . . followed by high-ranking officials . . . then the Pope, carried in a huge chair on the shoulders of attendants. When he came to the altar under the beautiful Bernini bronze canopy, he put on the golden chasuble and celebrated the first low mass. The Sistine Choir sang and the allied soldiers sang Christmas

songs in English.

"We were not close enough to see the Pope administer Holy Communion to a few hundred people near the altar . . . and when the Italians started struggling to get to the center aisle . . . we proceeded to get out. . . It has been officially estimated that 50,000 people were in the crowd in the cathedral and about three times that many were turned away at the doors."

### Kerosene Explosion Results in Burns

ed painful facial burns last Friday morning when a gallon can of kerosene he was carrying exploded in his face. The can came in contact with a stove, heat from which caused the explosion.

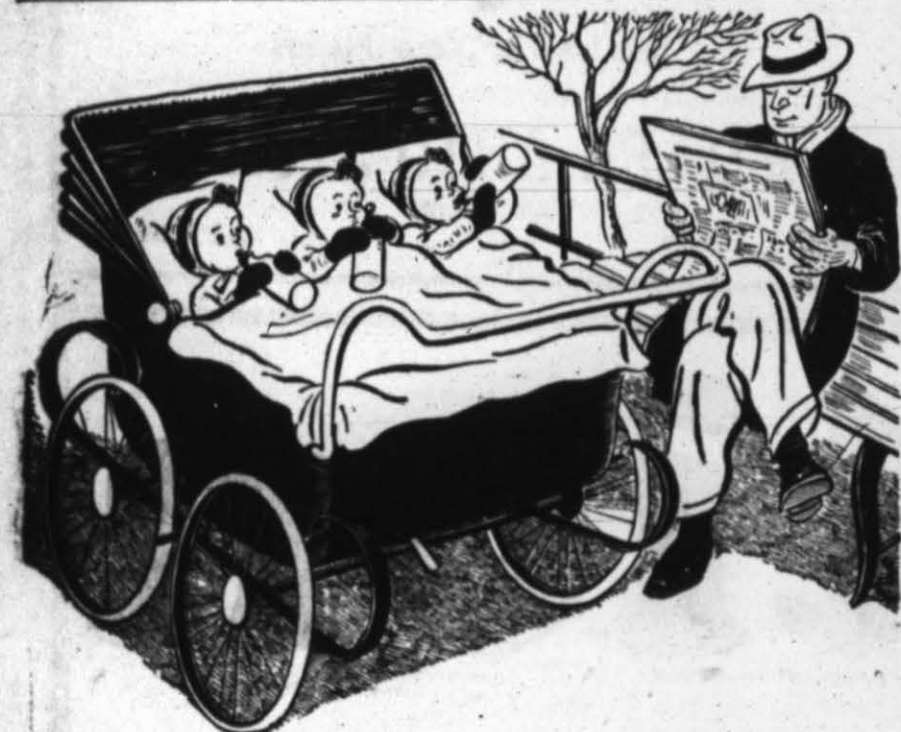

## Notice to the Public

From time to time, the City Commission has passed certain Ordinances for the purpose of safeguarding the health and well-being of the Community. These Ordinances are reasonable and necessary, and should be enforced. They are:

### (1) PLUMBING AND GAS FITTING ORDINANCES:

These Ordinances lay down minimum requirements for laying Gas and Sewer lines and the installation of all Fixtures. They require that permits be applied for before work is begun, and that all work and materials must be inspected and tested before being put into service. Faulty or improper work or materials will be condemned and must be replaced. Only experienced and responsible persons should be employed to do this work. Poor plumbing will endanger your health, and unsafe and improper Gas lines will endanger life, health and property.

### (2) ELECTRICAL ORDINANCES:

A permit must be secured before electrical work or installations are made — it must pass inspection before put into service. Faulty wiring is the cause of many destructive fires. The requirements apply on both new construction or changing or remodeling of old structures.

### (3)

This Ordinance requires a permit to build, remodel or move a house into the city, or from one location to another within the city.

These Ordinances were passed for the benefit of all, and it is to the interest of all that they be enforced. It is hoped that every citizen will do his duty by co-operating to the fullest extent.

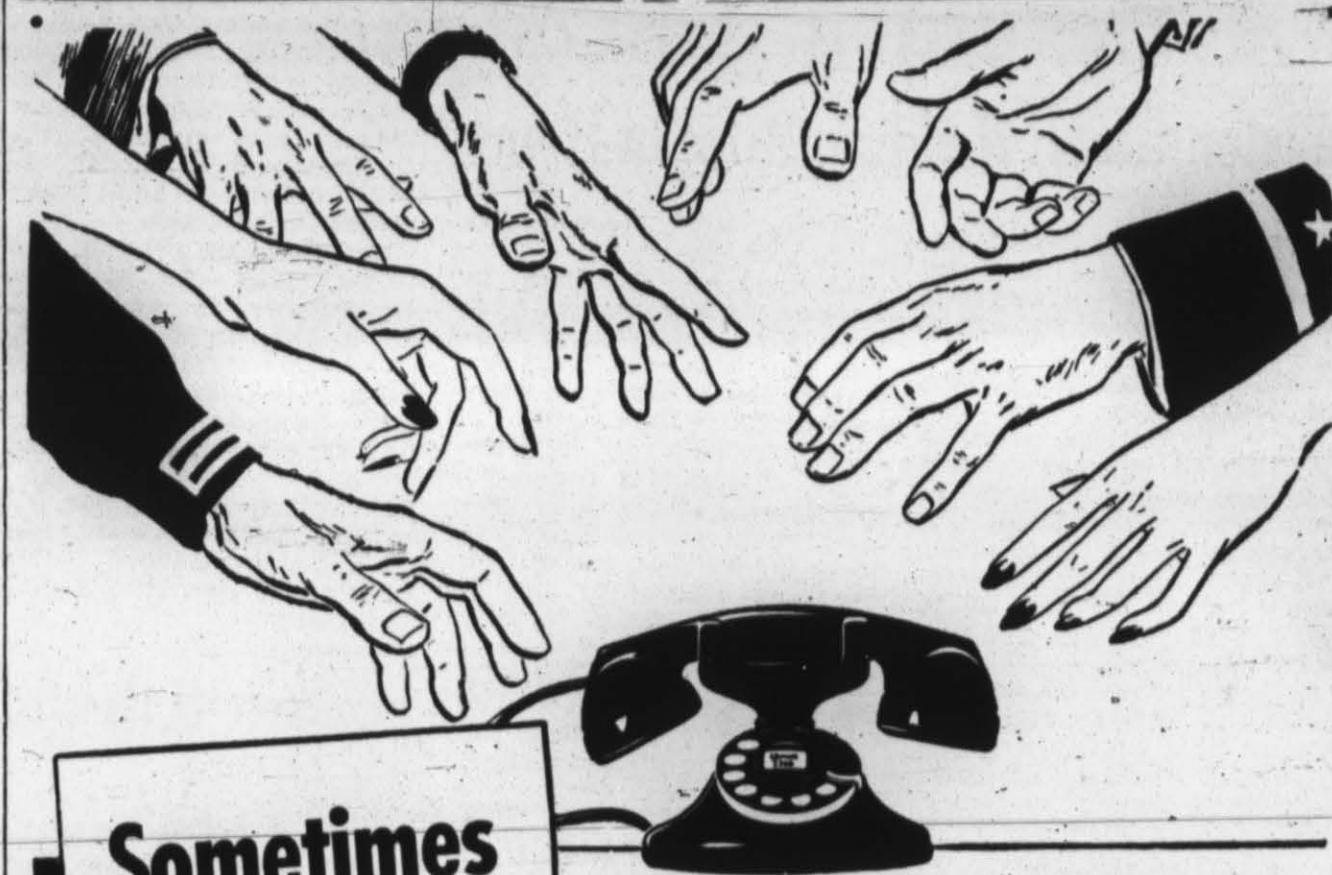

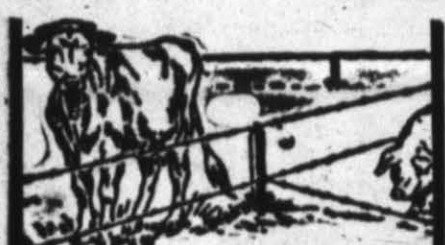
