'Scouting Veteran' Begins 25th Year

Beginning her twenty-fifth year in the Scouting program, Mrs. Leonard Griswold is just as excited about it today as she was in the very beginning, if not a little more.

In 1950, Mrs. Griswold began receiving training as a Den Mother in Denver, Colo. Two years later, when she was living in Muleshoe, she was Den Mother to five dens of Cub Scouts, a total of 45 boys.

She has been active ever since, serving as Den Mother, training others in Scout work and just about every award that is offered in the Cub Scout program has been bestowed upon Mrs. Griswold. She will receive her twenty five year pin in the fall, she said.

Her latest awards include the Roundtable Conference Award from Philmont Training Center in Cimmaron, N.M.; Craftsman and Den Leader of South Plains Council Award, serving on the Pow Wow in November of 1972; the Arrowhead Honor in March 1973; Den Leaders Coach's Training Award and Blue Ribbon Ideas award for ads used in the Hart Beat in July of 1971. She remarked that other Scout troops had picked up the ad idea and used it in their home town papers.

In the fall of 1973, she received a District Training Service award for helping train leaders throughout the Haynes District, made up of towns located in the area between Olton and Dimmitt, Tulia and Lockney and around Hale Center.

Hart Cub Scouts attended worship services at the First United Methodist Church last Sunday as a group in observance of Scout Week, Mrs. Griswold said.

"We would certainly like to encourage more interest in Scouting. I just finished a training course in new leadership development and will be training Den Mothers in this new method."

"We'd like to see fathers get interested in the Scout program. We women can help the small boys, but when they go out of the Cub Scout program into the Boy Scout program, then they need the

leadership of a man," Mrs. Griswold remarked.

Two Charged With Murder Of Wanda Black's Brother

Two airmen from Sheppard Air Force Base in Wichita Falls have been charged with murder in connection with the death of Lee Wagner, 54, brother of Mrs. Charles Black.

Black was dead on arrival at a Burk Burnett hospital Friday after he was allegedly beaten by the two in an attempt to prevent them from stealing ice from a machine at La Quinta Motel in Wichita Falls.

Wagner, manager of the motel and formerly the manager of an Amarillo motel, was beaten and stomped but autopsy results indicated he died of a heart attack apparently suffered during the beating. He had undergone open heart surgery two years ago in Amarillo.

The incident allegedly occurred about 10 a.m. Friday when Wagner attempted to stop the two from taking ice from a machine in the hallway of the motel. Police found a small piece of paper in Wagner's pocket on which was scribbled a license number and car description.

Funeral services for Wagner were held Tuesday in Faith Baptist Church in Amarillo. Arrangements were under the direction of Boxwell Brothers

Funeral Home.

Other survivors include his wife, Viola; a son, Darrel of Amarillo; two daughters, Mrs. Bonnie Johnson and Mrs. Linda Miller, both of Amarillo; six grandchildren and five brothers, Kell, Bob and Elmo, all of Amarillo, Cecil of Jackson, Miss. and Tommie of Oakland, Calif.

Hill Exhibits Champion At El Paso Stock Show

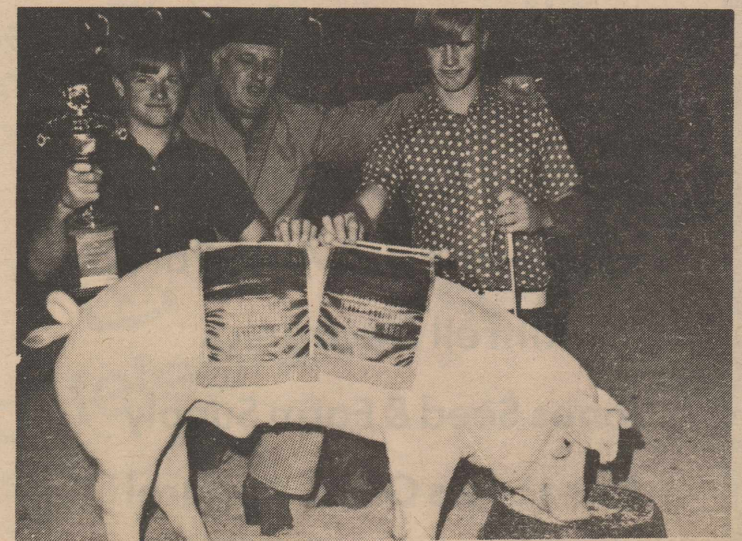

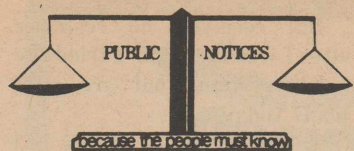

ued. The mother of three handicapped children, Mrs. Griswold said that scouting "has given me so much for my boys, Scouting has helped me through many hard times and has given my family a closer relationship and better understanding of other people and our responsibilities to others."

At one point in her life, Mrs. Griswold recalls that all three of her sons were hospitalized at the same time...in different hospitals in Denver.

Working with handicapped boys or those who have problems is a special delight to Betty.

"I would much rather work with boys in Scouting than to sit on their jury in a court room."

"I keep saying I am going to retire from the Scouting program, but someone always says, 'Just one more workshop before you quit' and then after that one, there is always someone else that needs help." Betty remarked.

So, until she is satisfied that the Scouting program is really "solid" in the Haynes district, she will probably be seen traveling from town to town to help train den mothers, help at home with the dens and continue to do the things that have been so much a part of her life the past twenty five years.
