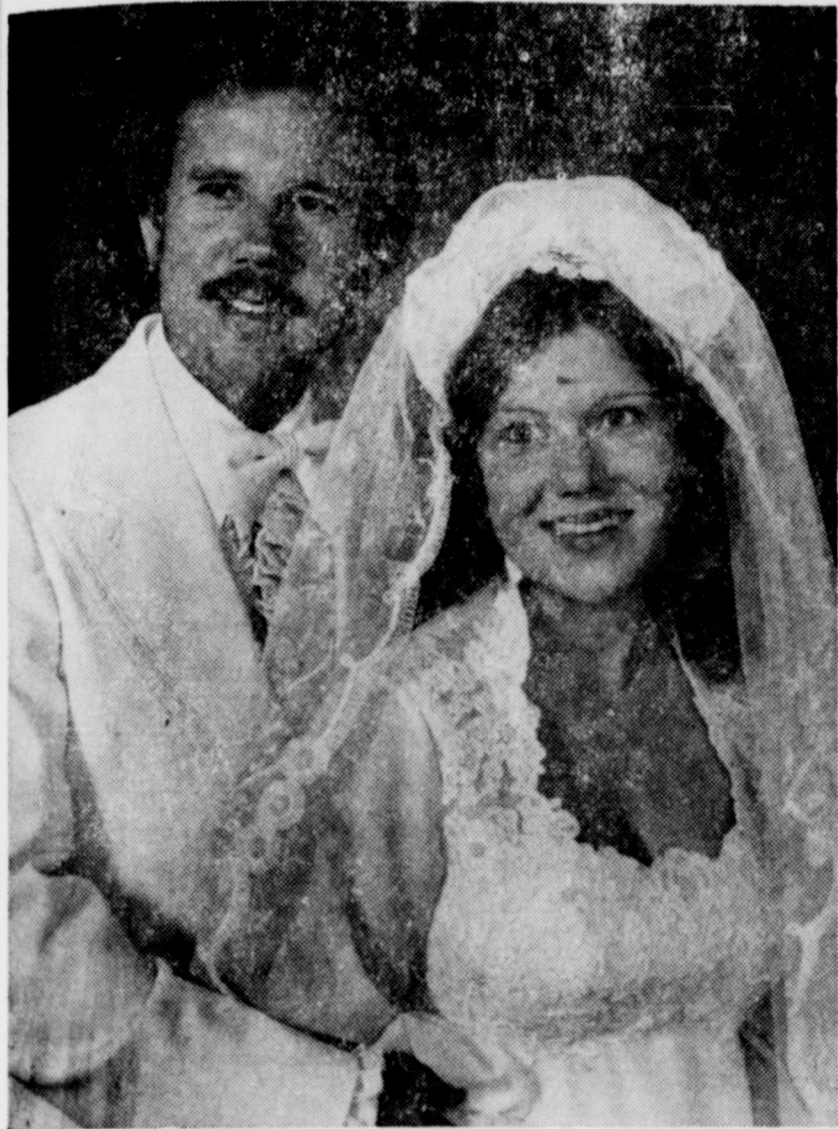

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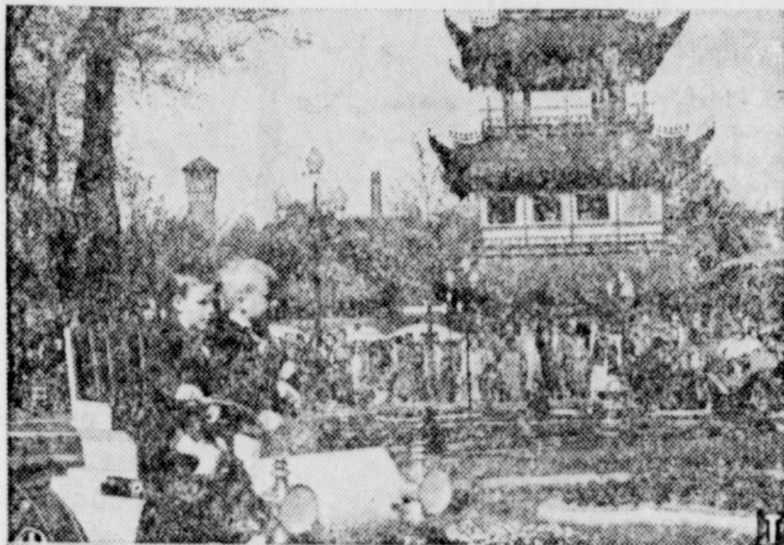

One of the questions you hear over and over again when tourists plan their vacation is: "Where do we find a place where all members of the family can have fun and where prices fit our family budgets?"

The answer is easy. For tots and teenagers, for 20-year-olds to senior citizens, Denmark offers a variety of fun that can't be found anywhere else.

Your children will be completely captivated by a visit to a real fairy-tale park with its Renaissance castle Egeskov, erected in a lake, on the island of Funen. In the barn there is a museum filled with vintage aeroplanes, cars and motorcycles.

Denmark is truly a children's wonderland. Of course there are summer camps, riding schools and sailing schools. But what about the real children's traffic school at Legoland? The miniature village in Jutland is virtually a children's paradise.

From June through September, you can ride the Veteran Railway every Sunday from legendary Elsinore (site of Hamlet's castle) to the resort of Gilleleje, and there's a parade every Friday by the Elsinore Girl Guards.

For the adventurous, there is Givskud Lions Park, where you'll see African Lions, enor-

mous elephants and gentle giraffes in natural surroundings. Driving your car among these exotic animals is comparable to enjoying a mini-safari.

At the Circus Building, Benneweis, Scandinavia's biggest circus, presents world artists in the ring every night, from mid-April to September 30. Tivoli, Denmark's world-famous fairy-tale garden in the heart of the city, is filled with amusements for children and adults, restaurants and dancing from May 1 to September 16. It features a fascinating playground, Children's Holiday Shows, the Pantomime Theater, The Open-Air Stage, the Tivoli Boy Guards, parades and fireworks. And every Tuesday throughout the summer, there is a very lively children's circus in the Odense Zoo.

Denmark even has its very special Hans Christian Andersen Festival held in the Funen Village, in his native town Odense, from July 6 to August 5, where children enact Andersen fairytales on an open-air stage, that will delight the whole family.

CAN I SELL AN INSURANCE POLICY FOR THE TOTAL CASH VALUE?

Yes. The cash value may also be borrowed—using the policy as collateral and continuing the policy in force. The latter would seem to be the better course of action. You could probably not replace the policy at an older age for the premium you are paying now. Also, because the spread on the increase in cash value becomes greater as the policy becomes older, you could find yourself in the position of paying \$100 in premiums and getting an increase in the cash value of \$120-\$130 for the \$100 of premium. Therefore, it would seem wise to borrow the cash value of the policy and to continue with the policy in force.

Free or Reduced Lunches at School

The Sterling City Independent School District has announced a free lunch-breakfast policy for Sterling County school children unable to pay the full price.

Local school officials have a policy that allows families with few children to receive free or reduced school lunches or breakfast with income going from \$2,940 for the smallest family to a high of \$22,770 per year income if children total 12 or more in number.

Prices of reduced lunches will be 20c and reduced breakfasts will be 10c.

Families falling within the scale or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for reduced or free lunch-breakfasts for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office at the school.

Regular cost of the meals is to be 50c for lunches and 20c for breakfasts, said school superintendent James Thompson. Teachers will pay 30c for breakfasts and visitors will pay 40c. Teachers will pay 55c for lunches, visitors 90c and carary out lunches will be \$1.00.

During the six weeks training at Lackland AFB, Tex., the airman studied the Air Force mission, organization and customs and received special instruction in human relations.

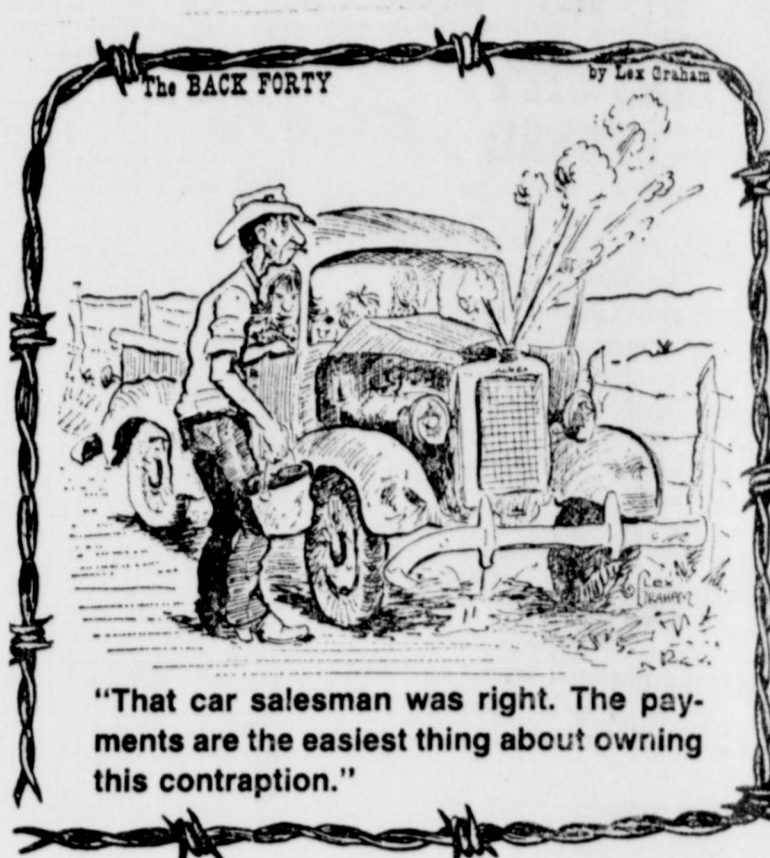
Airman Vogel will now receive specialized training in the aircraft equipment maintenance field.
