

**O'Donnell Rodeo
Arena Completed;
Show August 14-15**

Construction of the large arena for the O'Donnell rodeo, to be held August 14-15 has been completed, stated O. L. Harris and L. McMillan, co-promoters of the project. Seventy-five yards wide, the huge field is so proportioned that action within it can easily be seen from every angle.

Three big chutes were built in as the fence was being put up, this number insuring plenty of action from the beginning to the end of each performance. The field will be lighted by 18 specially built reflectors which were shipped from Dallas for the rodeo.

Meanwhile rodeo performers from everywhere are sending in their entries and the promoters are jubilant over the prospects. While the size of the purses which are to be given as prizes make it certain the promoters will not get rich, they say they will be more than satisfied if they can break even. Among the best known rodeo stars who are certain to be here is Jess Slaughter from Big Spring. Every person who knows anything about rodeo or western shows knows that Jess Slaughter and his presence at any show indicates that he believes it will amount to something. Another old-timer in the cattle game as well as following rodeos, is Will Dixon, 65-year-old roping star. He has sent word that he will be here with bells on, and that the younger men will be hard put to keep their laurels, because he aims to get right in the arena with them.

In addition to the two performances each day of the rodeo, there will be a dance each night after the rodeo performance.

Dawson County has received \$821,318.46 in rental and benefit payments in the three years since the creation of the Agriculture Adjustment Administration, it has been announced by H. P. Drought, state director of the National Emergency Council.

Rental and benefit payments in this county for the cotton program totalled \$771,150.53; corn-hog \$50,157.93.

Rental and benefit payments in Texas amounted to \$139,412,186.46 for the three-year period, Drought said.

Cotton rental and benefit payments made for the entire state aggregated \$114,070,836.72; wheat, \$16,581,129.10; corn-hog \$6,403,256.44; Sugar, \$705.98; Rice, \$1,975,145.03; Peanuts \$381,111.19.

**Work Of Topping
Highway 15 West
Will Begin Soon**

The State Highway Commission last week let the contract for the asphalt topping of Highway 15 west from Lamesa to the Gaines County line to the Lone Star Construction company of San Antonio, and a crew is expected to arrive in a few days and start work on the project. The same company was successful bidder on the seal coat topping of No. 9 to O'Donnell.

The Commission has since announced that the stretch of unfinished road on No. 9 north of Tahoka will be topped in the near future, \$75,000 having already been allotted from the highway funds for the work. With work now in progress on the Glasscock county cut-off south of Big Spring and expected to be completed within sixty days, and work on the Lynn county portion to begin soon, it looks like No. 9 will be completely surfaced before winter and Lamesa will be on a good highway extending from Amarillo and beyond, on the north, to San Angelo and below, to the south.

The Dallas News recently quoted a highway commissioner as saying that Highway No. 15 was one of the next major projects of the state. Already right-of-way surveying is in progress in Seary county and it is to be hoped that it will not be too long until this important artery of traffic will be completed through to Dallas, and west to El Paso.

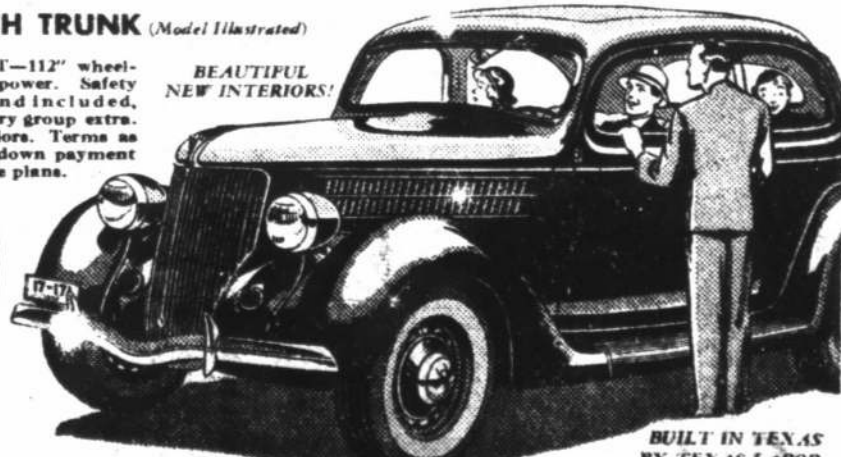

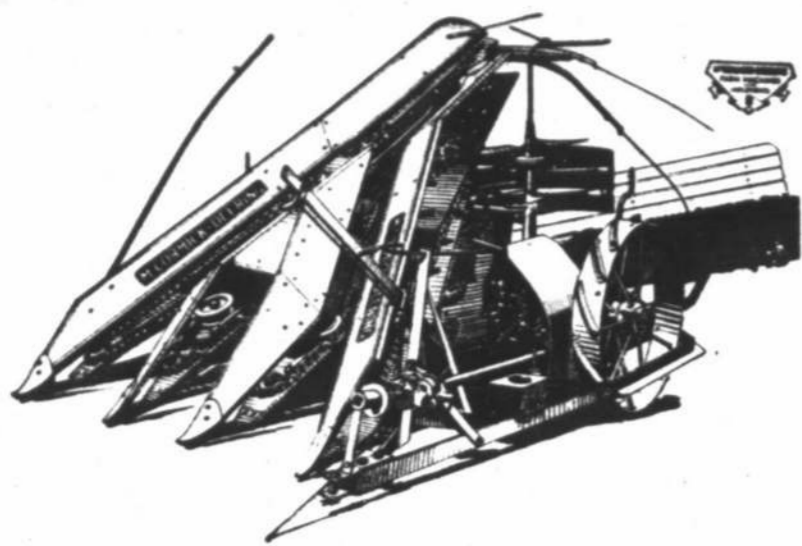

S. I. R. No. 3-A A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by striking out Section 20 thereof; providing for local option on the question of the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes; providing that spirituous liquors, or liquors composed in whole or in part of the products of distillation shall not be sold for private profit, except to the State; providing that the Legislature shall pass laws relative to the sale, possession, transportation and manufacture of such spirituous liquors; providing for the establishment of State dispensaries; providing for the manufacture, sale, transportation and possession of all liquors which are exclusively products of the fermentation process; providing that intoxicating liquors shall not be manufactured, sold, bartered, or exchanged for beverage purposes in an county or political subdivision wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, until a majority of the qualified voters in any county or political subdivision shall determine such to be lawful at an election held for that purpose; providing for an election on the question of the adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and the publication thereof; and prescribing the form of ballot.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by striking out Section 20 thereof and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Article XVI, Section 20: (a) It is hereby declared to be the policy of this state that the open saloon shall not be re-established. The sale of spirituous liquors, manufactured in whole or in part by means of the process of distillation and or liquors compounded and or composed in part of such spirituous distilled liquors, for private profit, is prohibited within this State except when such sale is made to the State. The State of Texas shall have the exclusive right to purchase at wholesale and to sell at retail such distilled spirituous liquors. Such sale shall be made only in unbroken packages and no such liquors shall be consumed on the premises where sold. The Legislature shall pass laws to prescribe regulations relative to the manufacture, sale, transportation and possession of such spirituous liquors and relative to the establishment of State dispensaries; provided, however, the Legislature shall have the power to regulate the sale for private profit and possession of distilled liquors for medicinal, scientific and mechanical purposes.

"(b) The Legislature shall enact a law or laws whereby the qualified voters of any county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, may, by a majority vote of those voting, determine from time to time whether the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes shall be prohibited or legalized within the prescribed limits; and such laws shall contain provisions for voting on the sale of intoxicating liquors or various types and various alcoholic content.

"(c) In all counties, justice's precincts or incorporated towns or cities wherein the sale of intoxicating liquors had been prohibited by local option elections held under the laws of the State of Texas and in force at the time of the taking effect of Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, it shall continue to be unlawful to manufacture, sell, barter or exchange in any such county, justice's precinct or incorporated town or city, any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or medicated bitters capable of producing intoxication or any other intoxicants whatsoever, for beverage purposes unless and until a majority of the qualified voters in such county or political subdivision thereof voting in an election held for such purpose shall determine such to be lawful; provided that this subsection shall not prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages containing not more than 3.2 percent alcohol by weight in cities, counties and political subdivisions, thereof in which the qualified voters have voted to legalize such sale under the provisions of Chapter 116, Acts of the Regular Session of the 43rd Legislature."

Section 2. Such proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas, on the third day of November, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write, or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for the establishment of a state dispensary system having the exclusive sale of distilled liquors, and providing for local option."

And the voters opposed to said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for the establishment of a state dispensary system having the exclusive sale of distilled liquors, and providing for local option."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the same published and such election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication, and election.

S. J. R. NO. 18 A JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an Amendment to Section 48, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the establishment of Teachers' Retirement Systems, and making an appropriation for the election. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto immediately after Section 48, a section to be known as Section 48a, and to read, as follows:

"Section 48a: In addition to the powers given to the Legislature, under Section 48 of Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement Fund for persons employed in public schools, colleges and universities, supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Retirement Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and -or school districts, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred Eighty (\$180.00) Dollars for any such person; provided no person shall be eligible for a pension under this Amendment who has not taught twenty years in the State of Texas, but shall be entitled to a refund for the moneys paid into the fund. All funds provided from the compensation of said persons, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement Funds, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amounts that may become due each year under such retirement plan as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held on Tuesday, after the first Monday in November, which is November 3rd, 1936, at which election all voters favoring said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing retirement and the creation of a retirement fund for persons employed in public schools and colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state." Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing retirement and the creation of a retirement fund for persons employed in public schools

and in colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State." Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendment; thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

Each year during the month of July, the War Department of the United States Government supervises a Citizens' Military Training Camp for the young men of the nation. There are 100,000 camps in the United States and in each camp area several C. M. T. Camps are held each year. The aim of one attending the Camp is to receive a commission in the Officer's Reserve Corps of the United States Army.

As a compensation for the services of the Trainees while in Camp, the government allows five cents per mile by the nearest railroad route, to and from your residence. Also the government boards you, clothes you, and furnishes bed clothing, cots and tents.

In Camp various sort of entertainment is furnished for the Trainees pleasure. Stunt nights, dances and other forms of entertainment. Also a track meet is held, swimming meet, tennis tournament, baseball tournament, basketball tournament, and volleyball tournament.
