Curtis R. Wilkinson, Lamb County Attorney plans to leave today, (Sunday) for South Texas, to attend a state-wide conference on organized crime, to be held in Austin, March 30, 31. The invitation came from Attorney General Price Daniel. The attorney general has called for action the state's 315 prosecutors to stamp out organized gambling and has invited them to meet with him for a discussion of the situation. Two speakers at the Austin meeting, Wilkinson said, will be Chairman Fred Meredith of the House Crime investigating committee, and Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the State Department Public Safety. Wilkinson also plans to attend the 12th annual Texas Safety Conference which will be held in San Antonio, Monday and Tuesday. Attorney General Price Daniel has called a meeting of the state's 315 prosecuting attorneys to consider means of waging a more vigorous fight against organized crime in Texas. "In addition to stamping out the organized gambling which now exists, Texas should let the world

know that it will not tolerate entry into this state of the gamblers and racketeers who are now being run out of other states by exposure of the Kefauver crime investigating committee," Daniel said. "I know of no group which can sound the warning and back it up better than the county and district attorneys acting in cooperation with their local law enforcement officers," he continued. The meeting, to be held in Austin March 30-31, will be patterned after a national conference called last year by the Attorney General of the United States at the request of the state attorneys general. Speakers will include Fred Meredith, chairman of the House Committee charged with investigating organized crime in Texas, Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Department of Public Safety, Bill Decker of Dallas, president of the Texas Sheriffs' Association, Carl F. Hansson, president of the Texas Police Association, and Bill Hauck, president of the Texas Constables Association. "Since the race-horse bookie wire was ousted by court injunction, Texas has fewer tie-ups with

the national gambling syndicates than any of the larger states, but outside gambling interests have made definite attempts to enter the state in recent months and they will do so again if we do not take preventive action immediately," the attorney general said. Daniel said, "Recent bomb killings aimed at Fort Worth and Dallas gamblers and charges of corruption of local officials by gambling interests in other areas indicate that the situation is already bad enough to be of state-wide concern."

### Paschal Full Moon and Equinox Determine Time of Easter Arrival

"Why does Easter Sunday come so early this year" is an oft-repeated question, just as in the past when this religious Holiday has seemingly arrived extremely late, the same question has been a topic or question.

The reason for either the early or late arrival of Easter Sunday is, to an extent, like the tides, governed by the moon—only instead, as it pertains to Easter, it is governed or fixed by the date of the paschal full moon.

The word "paschal" probably comes from "passover", but the "Paschal Chronicle", which in turn received its name from the fact that it was based on the Easter Canon, contains an outline of events supposedly chronicled from the time of Adam and Eve, up to the year 629 A. D.

But the arrival of the equinox, or as we would think of it—of spring, also has a bearing on the Easter date, because the paschal full moon, as it relates to Easter, must follow the arrival of the equinox.

The equinox arrived this year at 4:26 a.m. last Wednesday morning, and it so happens that on this same date the moon was full. The Sunday following, therefore, is the first Sunday following the Paschal full moon, and is therefore designated Easter Sunday.

Had the moon reached its fullness on Tuesday, instead of on Wednesday this year, it would of course have been ahead of the equinox, and 28 days would then have to elapse before it could again become full, following the Equinox, which in turn would have made Easter come extremely late instead of the earliest date possible.

Not only is the date of the arrival of Easter so designated today, generally throughout the world, but the movable feasts or observances of the Catholic, Lutheran, Anglican and Protestant Episcopal churches, are also similarly designated and observed—that is the number of days before or after Easter.

The perfect calendar has not, even yet been devised, which needs no further proof than that each year in four, we have an extra day on our yearly calendar—February 29th, and this difficulty has posed vast problems in religious circles through the centuries, in setting the Easter date. It has often varied.

Almost universally, now however, Easter is determined to be the first Sunday after the paschal full moon, that is the 14th day of the calendar moon, or the full moon which matures upon or next after the 21st of March. If such full moon should occur on a Sunday, Easter would be on the following Sunday.

Realizing that new revenue must be found by the state, Judge Dent believes that instead of taking money from the counties, it would be better to place a tax on natural gas, which he opines is now severely under taxed, and is throwing his support and the support of the association which he heads behind the bill introduced by Jim Sewell of Navaro, which proposes to raise \$30,000,000 yearly, by levying a gathering tax of one cent per thousand feet of natural gas.

# You and Your Congress

A Spirit of independence and legislative leadership is developing in the halls of Congress.

Some of it can be attributed to the investigations that have reached the headlines. Most of it stems, however, from a deep feeling of responsibility for the future of the nation and our economy.

On balance, the result is a middle-of-the-road legislative pattern which usually rejects extreme viewpoints on any given issue.

Consider the soul-searching debate in Senate Committees on the "troops-to-Europe" question which now is before the full Senate for debate.

The Committees discarded both the idea that no foot soldiers at all should be sent across the Atlantic, and that President Truman should be given full discretion to act in this field as he sees fit.

The final result probably will be that the Senate will give its approval to the sending of four more divisions to Europe—we have two there now—but will state that any further commitments must be subject to Congressional review.

Whatever the final language may be, it will not have any effective binding force on the Administration. At most, it would be a very few in the Senate really challenge the constitutionality authority of the President as commander-in-chief to act independently.

UMT-Draft presents another example of compromise, carefully hammered out after exhaustive study of all sorts of ideas.

Although only the Senate has acted, it seems certain that Congress will approve a Universal Military Training program which never before has attracted the votes of a majority of the members. But the Senate has added many important restrictions to the original Pentagon proposal that the moment a youth becomes 18 he be inducted for training and service. The House, if it follows the lead of its Armed Services Committee, also will approve UMT.

The final Congressional product may contain such limitations as these: no man can be actually

used in combat before he reaches the present draft age of 19; no 18-year-olds may be called before all eligible in the present 19-25 age brackets have been inducted; the overall ceiling of the Armed Forces may not exceed 4,000,000 men, just 500,000 more than the July 1 level the Armed Services now are seeking to attain; UMT could not be put into operation anyway without Congressional approval.

No other subject in recent years has provoked the current exhaustive debate; nor has any other issue produced the same volume of mail from the folks back home.

The Expose of influence-peddling in activities of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation led to renewed demands for the complete liquidation of that agency. Instead, Congress may approve a reorganization of top RFC personnel, just as President Truman belatedly recommended. The House already has taken that step.

A one-man Administrator would be substituted for the present five-man board which governs its operations.

In other phase of reorganization, Mr. Truman suffered an unexpected setback. With conservative Democrats teaming up with Republicans, the House killed a previously-passed Senate bill to grant him broad emergency powers to reshuffle government agencies. House members were skeptical over what Mr. Truman might do if the bill became law.

A Coalition of Southern conservative Democrats and Republicans in the House dealt the Administration a second body blow during the week. It killed the proposed \$3 billion "defense" subsidized public housing bill.

The style of the defeat was important because it was unusual. A bill approved by a committee normally takes its place on the House calendar and is considered sooner or later. But in this case, the members voted, 219 to 170, against even discussing the bill. It now goes back to the House Banking Committee until President Truman's lieutenants figure out some new strategy.

## Urges Shower Of Easter Messages On Iron Curtain

New York, Mar. 14—The Common Council for American Unity today appealed to the nation, and especially to first and second generation Americans, to send a barrage of greeting cards and letters reminding of the approaching Easter season and the cause of religious freedom to Europe's Iron curtain countries.

Henry Lee Munson, director of the Council's "Letters from America" campaign, said the appeal was part of the organization's effort to counteract Communist propaganda in those countries and to help keep alive "the flame of religion where it may otherwise die out."

The Common Council, an organization that has been engaged for 30 years in helping American citizens of foreign extraction, has spearheaded for the last year a campaign to encourage and assist Americans to utilize their messages to relatives and friends abroad in the world-wide fight for freedom. According to the Post Office, Americans write over 400 million letters abroad annually. More than 21 million of these go behind the Iron Curtain.

The Council said it believed that Easter cards sent behind the Iron Curtain would help prove the existence of religious freedom in America and would not endanger the recipients as they do not mention political questions.

"Easter in America is a great religious festival," said Mr. Munson, "which not only exemplifies the freedom that all religions enjoy here, but also aids in keeping that freedom alive by its very observance."

"Every Easter card sent to Europe, particularly those sent to relatives and friends behind the Iron Curtain, is a reminder of the season and a symbol of hope which may help rekindle the flame of religion where it may otherwise die out."

The appeal forwards and letters to be sent to Europe will be carried in more than 250 foreign-language newspapers, on 190 radio programs and direct to 2 million members of nationality organizations throughout the country. It will be translated by the Common Council into 21 foreign languages, including Russian.

"Every message sent out of the country, no matter how trivial, reveals something about America," said Mr. Munson. "We want those messages to reveal an accurate and impressive story because each one is a mighty weapon in fighting Communism."

Bernard M. Baruch, Mrs. Franklin Roosevelt, Paul Hoffman, Secretary of Defense General George C. Marshall, Walter Reuther and William Green have contributed special articles to assist the "Letters From America" campaign.

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## Texas Postoffices Increased

WASHINGTON, March 14—(AP)—991 miles. The number of routes Texas has gained in population for 50 years, but the number of its postoffices has shown a steady 1950 the total was 41,454.

On Jan. 1, 1951, there were 1,996 postoffices in Texas, compared with 2,261 in 1925 and 3,112 in 1900.

Development of highways and growth of larger towns and cities, say postal authorities, accounts principally for the trend.

The automobile and good roads along with the expansion of rural mail service have eliminated the need for the cross-roads country store postoffice.

There were 2,209 R. F. D. routes in Texas in 1925, aggregating 60-

class rating. The others are fourth class offices.

Postmasters are appointed by the president. Those appointed at first class offices get \$4,570 or more a year; second class jobs pay between \$3,970 and \$4,370; third class offices, \$2,370 to \$3,570, and fourth class from \$264 to \$2,079.

As of January 1 there were 133 first class postoffices in Texas, 319 second class, 579 third class and 974 fourth class.

Establishment of new military installations and industrial plants has brought many new postoffices in the past decade and higher classification for others.

**Cornet's Blue  
Notes Removed  
By Science**

Champaign, Ill.—The clarinet and the cornet have undergone a tune-up job at the University of Illinois.

Prof. Mark H. Hindsley, direc- tor of University bands, recently redesigned the instruments with the aid of science. His improved cornet and clarinet were developed from research conducted with an electrical device called a chro- matic stroboscope.

Little wheels in this device light up as various tones are sounded. If they are sharp, the spokes turn to the right. But if the tones are at correct pitch, they stand still. Hindsley's new instruments cause the wheels to stand still, indicat- ing they are perfectly tuned.

The clarinet's improvement in- volves a new tone-opening in the instrument. There is a re-arrange- ment of the key mechanism. The fingering of the keys is the same.

The cornet has been made more easy to tune. Two rings for left- hand operation have been added. One is for the thumb and one for a finger. The thumb ring varies the tuning slide to bring off-tones into line. The finger-operated ring works with a spring slide that

Since February 15, when the authorization system went into effect to conserve ma- terials and manpower for the mo-

bilization program, only 18 field offices have been acting on the applications.

Hereafter, any person in this area desiring to commence con- struction on an office building, store, or other type of commercial building which requires authoriza- tion may obtain an application form and information from the El Paso District Office of the Depart- ment of Commerce, and may sub- mit the completed application to the El Paso office for approval or denial. In writing passage of the bill, Judge Dent pointed out that natural gas is not bearing its fair share of the tax burden and that it is being carried away from Texas to the East almost tax-free. Texas has 65 per cent of the known national reserve of natural gas, Judge Dent said. Its estimated 24.2 trillion cubic feet of gas is being removed at the rate of five trillion cubic feet annually, indicating that in 20 years the supply will have been wholly depleted.

**Reserves To Be Depleted**  
"Before long, this great natural resource will be depleted and we will not have received anything in return for it," Judge Dent declared. "We'd better get some money from it for our schools, streets and roads while we can."

"Eastern interests," the judge charged, "are carrying Texas gas away comparatively tax-free and pumping it back into the ground in Eastern states into reservoirs that formerly held natural gas there but that have since been depleted."

Reports of the Federal Power commission, he said, show that the Eastern interests which have been getting Texas natural gas have made a profit of \$124,646,176 on an investment of \$446,919,184 over a short period of time.

"In time, if we don't watch these manipulators," Dent warned, "they may be paying this gas back out here to be at an enormous profit to keep us from freeing to death and to produce as with the fuel for heating."

to an address by John Ben Sheppard, Texas Secretary of State.

In Carl F. Sheppard of Chicago, Illinois, founder of Optometric Research for the Northern Illinois College of Optometry and Journalism on Television, the American Optometric Association, spoke on "The New Science of Optometry as a Profession." Dr. Woods was introduced as president by Dr. J. Herman Thomas of Ft. Worth. After adopting a resolution highly commending Dr. Woods for the outstanding service rendered by him as president, convention delegates presented him with a gift of wearing apparel.

Dr. Woods has been active in many local civic affairs and is an immediate past district governor of Rotary International.
