RELIEF OFFICE FORCED TO PAY CLIENTS WITH DISBURSEMENT ORDERS

There has been a certain amount of controversy over the fact that the relief board here have been paying some of the relief workers with disbursing orders instead of checks. This action entirely uncontrolled by the local board. Administrator Halle would like for everyone to understand the purpose of these script payments.

If a client is reported to have been spending his relief wages for pleasures other than living expenses, such as gambling, drink, slot machines, etc., officials immediately order that they be paid in disbursing orders or script payable to any NRA store in exchange for groceries, clothes, etc. These orders are for merchandise only and no change is to be given with the purchase. The merchant who varies from this purpose lays himself liable to a fine of from \$10 to \$50 or imprisonment just the same as the client who gives false representation in order to get relief. Although there have not been any cases of infringing upon these rights, locally, it is reported several merchants in central Texas have been fined on these charges.

There are 14 clients on the Spearman list who receive these orders and the purpose is to assure the family of receiving full relief from the wages. Mr. Halle stated that he had tried to have some of these cases changed to checks but was unable to do so at present.

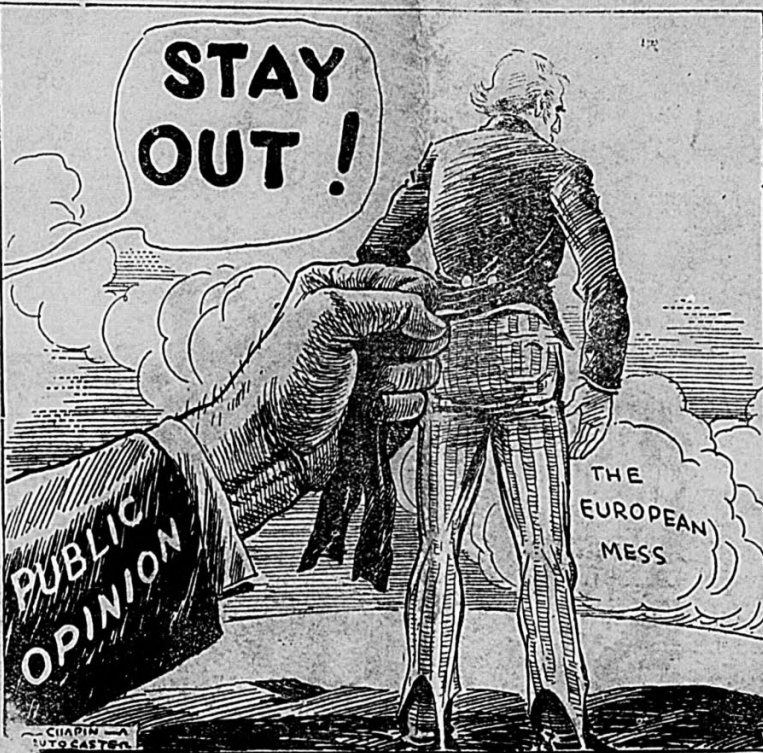

Drive to Have All State Taxes Omitted Pushed By Panhandle Counties

Uniting in a concentrated drive to have all state taxes omitted for the next few years, representatives of about eight Panhandle counties met at Dumas last Saturday to discuss the advisability and methods of effecting such a movement. There was heated argument both pro and con of the question. However, there are four or five counties in the Southern part of the state that have been exempted from their state taxes for several years and the majority of those present felt that this part of the state had suffered just as severely from adverse conditions as any place and that it was no more than fair that we should expect the same consideration. With an amalgamated petition representing the entire Panhandle, they feel that this could be accomplished.

Judge J. H. Broadhurst was among those representing this county, reported that the main thing accomplished at this meeting was to gain the sentiment of those counties and appoint each county judge as a chairman to discuss the matter with their home people and see just how they stood. Judge Noel McDade, of Moore county was appointed as chairman of the organization present and C. E. Johnson was appointed secretary.

A meeting will be held in Amarillo this next Saturday to decide just what will be done about the movement.

Judge Broadhurst said that he and all of the county commissioners would be present at this meeting, to vote on the propositions brought up.

J. H. CHAMBERS, 64, DIED IN SPEARMAN FRIDAY MORNING

J. H. Chambers was born in Toledo, Arkansas April 10, 1871. He moved to Texas about 50 years ago, and his last close relative, his brother, died about that time leaving him all alone at that age. He was married March 6, 1892 and to that union was born 7 sons. Two of the boys died soon after that time and the remaining, Charles, Destal, Marvin and Olin all of Spearman and Walter Chambers of Nacoma, Texas are left to mourn his loss. He has been a member of the Methodist Church for the past 25 years and a well liked and respected man in his community.

Mr. Chambers died at 5:30 Friday morning, April 5th after having been in ill health for the past year or two. The funeral was held at the Union Church Saturday, April 6th, at 10 o'clock, and was conducted by Rev. H. A. Nichols, assisted by Bros. Loftin and Finley. A host of friends were on hand to pay their last tribute and respects and to accompany him to his final resting place in the Hansford cemetery.

MANY GARDENS ARE IRRIGATED THROUGH RELIEF TILE PROJECT

30,000 feet of garden tile has been put down in gardens in Hansford County this spring, working through an agreement with the County Relief Office, whereby the office furnishes all labor of making and installation, and the farmer furnishes the cement, sand and one-fourth of the produce from the garden for the year 1935, only.

In addition, twenty other gardens, using 12,000 feet of tile, have been tiled by farmers themselves, in the county, as a result of demonstration in making and installation conducted by G. L. Boykin, County Agent, in connection with the relief office and individual farmers in all parts of Hansford County.

Tile is being made at Spearman and Gruver, by the relief labor. The cost of the tile, complete, has averaged from 1c to 1-1-4c on all gardens installed.

CHEMICAL TESTS ADVOCATED FOR DRUNKEN DRIVERS

When is a Man Too Drunk
 To Drive? Courts
 Want to Know

One of the outstanding needs
 of the public safety officials in
 dealing with the drinking driver
 is a simple scientific method of
 measuring inebriety that will stand
 as evidence before a court or jury.

This method, the National Safety
 Council says should be accurate,
 easily administered and in-
 expensive, in order to be of the
 widest possible benefit. Unfortun-
 ately, while most authorities
 agree that one does not have to
 be drunk to be a menace when
 driving, and even small amounts
 of alcohol may measurably impair
 efficiency, they are not all in full
 accord as to what this amount of
 alcohol shall be. Nor have they
 standardized a test as yet, which
 can be used to determine the
 degree of intoxication.

Numerous tests, both chemical
 and visual, have been advocated
 and some have been enlisted.
 Most of the chemical tests, how-
 ever, must be administered by
 doctors or skilled technicians,
 while some call for elaborate ex-
 pensive equipment. Both these
 factors tend to place them beyond
 reach of the average police dept.

Individuals React Differently
 One of the difficulties, of
 course, is the variability with
 which individuals react to alcohol.
 One person may absorb a given
 dose of alcohol more readily and
 more thoroughly than another and
 with different results. The alcohol
 may have been consumed under
 different physical conditions, as
 for example, on a full and an
 empty stomach. These variables,
 of course, are important.

The chemical test for deter-
 mining the amount of alcohol in the
 system may be applied to the
 blood, saliva, urine, spinal fluid
 exhaled breath, and in post mor-
 tem cases, tissues from the liver,
 kidneys and brain. Obviously
 most of these are beyond the skill
 of police officers and some are
 impracticable for the smaller com-
 munities because of expense in-
 volved. The visual or common
 sense tests which are usually

given by police, cover such mat-
 ters as breath, co-ordination.

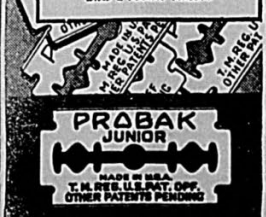

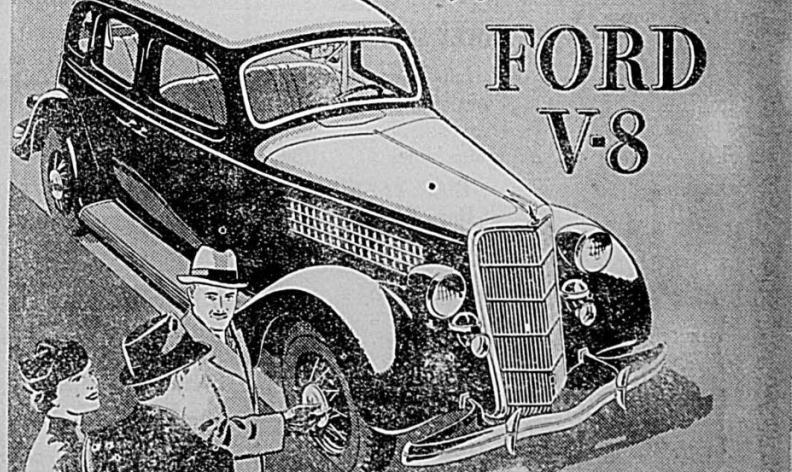

"Unto you is born Christ the Lord." Luke 2:11. The essential fact of the angel's proclamation is, not that the Christ had at length come to Israel, but that a Savior had been born. Before his birth Joseph and Mary had both been instructed that his name was to be Jesus, meaning Savior. The Jews had associated many things with the advent of the Messiah Isaiah, indeed, described it in terms of salvation! So Simeon here (cf. Luke 3:6). No matter by what names we call our Lord, "Savior" added gives that name a fuller, more satisfying meaning.

CHRIST'S PORTRAYAL OF HIMSELF AS THE SAVIOR

John 10:9-16.

I am the door. John 10:9. Christ as the ever open door is the assurance of at least three great mercies for us—first, absolute safety; second, unlimited freedom; and third, an adequate supply for all of life's needs. The fold is always near the pasture. And in Christ, we are near supplies that are sufficient for all our needs. I am the good shepherd. John 10:10. Sir Wilfred T. Grenfell, writing of a recent visit he made in the near East, gives the most interesting account of one of his experiences: One of our party, as we climbed, noticed a shepherd driving his sheep into a large kind of cave with an open mouth. In reply to her question he said I am putting them away for the night to be safe from the jackals and dogs. But she objected: There is no door to the cave. He replied simply: I am the door. It is the Eastern shepherds' custom to lie down across the doorway of such caves, and with his own life to protect the sheep.

LIFE THE UNIVERSAL DESIRE

As one studies the Gospels, he is amazed to discover how continuously Christ speaks about life which is always to all men of all ages, the transcendent subject of thought and the most significant of all objectives. The richest and fullest life obtainable, a life which contains the maximum of vivid and exquisite experiences, is the end of every civilized man's desire. There is no wealth but life. John Ruskin. But more than philosophers and poets, and other spiritual leaders ever could imagine is the life which Christ promises and bestows. There is no life compared with his, and our life which we have from him, because it is indeed the very life of God, life eternal, rich, full and satisfying in every sphere of human experience, bringing liberty and power, and peace, and abiding joy.

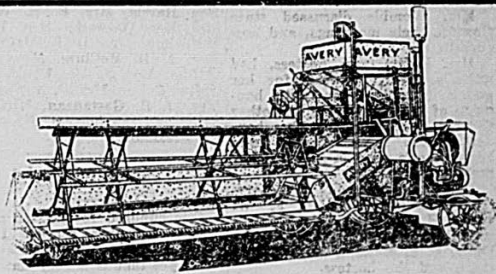

AN EMINENT French inventor, interviewed on his ninetieth birthday, commented that life is too short. Life, he felt, should be longer. "There are so many interesting things to be done," he said, "so much to learn."

Don't we find it thrilling, one of our readers wants to know, that a man of ninety should be so untiring as still to feel that life is too short? Since this man is an inventor, perhaps he will have an idea for prolonging our lives—and wouldn't that be great!

Sorry to be so perverse, but not for me. From a detached viewpoint, going on indefinitely after ninety holds few charms for me.

And this nonagenarian who is not only willing but eager to go on taking it strikes me as rather exceptional. It may be his luck in what he chose as his life-work. Inventing can make the hours fly, so perhaps he can make ninety years seem as nothing. More usually, men and women who reach that age are not "untired."

As for the things to be learned, I should say that what we cannot learn and do before we reach ninety, we are not very likely to learn afterward.

If such powers are to be given to scientists, I should say try to prolong youth—rather than prolong life after ninety. By youth, I do not mean childhood, but the years of power—power of body and mind—power to learn and do and enjoy. To prolong that time for everybody to beyond sixty would seem to me more important than to prolong mere living to beyond a hundred.
