Body Of Hockley County Child Taken From Well Joyce Shepard, Condemned Slayer, Gouges Out Eyes

Renders Self Sightless as Death Looms

Convicted Slayer Scheduled to
Go to Chair Early This Morn-
ing; Both Eyes Put Out Two
Weeks Ago

Explains Torture Doomed Man Quotes Biblical Quotation in Telling of Plunging Sharpened Nail Into His Eyes in Prison

HUNTSVILLE, Oct. 16. — Joyce Shepard, convicted murderer, who will be executed in the penitentiary here early tomorrow, two weeks ago gouged out both eyes with a nail, it was revealed tonight when newspapermen were led to his cell for a last interview with the doomed man.

"If the eye offendeth thee, pluck it out. It is better for thee that one of thy eyes be cast into hell," he explained.

With this biblical quotation, Shepard explained why he had rendered himself sightless by plunging a sharpened nail into his eyes. He explained that he worked a small nail house from a ventilator in his cell, sharpened it on the concrete floor and then gouged out his eyes, one at a time.

Prison Manager Lee Simmons declared Shepard's act had been discovered immediately. He explained that Shepard blinded himself during one of his "maniacal" spells.

Shepard, who feigned insanity for months in a vain effort to escape the death chair, late tonight told the Catholic priest, Chaplain Father Hugh Finnegan of Houston, that he is ready to die.

A week ago, Shepard admitted, he told fellow inmates of "death row" that he did not believe "this crazy business will work this time."

"I wanted to prove that I would not try to escape," Shepard said in detailing how he had destroyed his own sight.

He was calling for cream when his interviewers were led into his cell.

"Pardon me," he said, "I want to finish this. You know I can't wrap it up and take it with me."

He had requested the delicacy a short time earlier. His wish was granted immediately by prison officials.

As the end neared for Shepard, the man whose weird cries had inspired a famous drama of the prison life sought place in religion. He asked the last rites of the Catholic church be administered by Father Finnegan.

He shouted defiance at fellow inmates of death row. When some of the doomed called to him, "Are you ready to go over the banks of a short time earlier," he replied: "Boys, I'm not going to have a tear."

Japanese Robbed, Found Murdered

HOUSTON, Oct. 16. (P) — K. San-
gawa, Japanese produce man of
Houston, was murdered about nine
miles from Eagle Lake on the Gar-
wood road late this afternoon, ac-
cording to advice received by
Houston officers. He had been rob-
bed.

The man's hands were bound be-
hind him with a piece of rope he
had been shot through the right
temple with a .22 or .28 calibre re-
volver. Apparently he had been
dead since Tuesday.

Sangawa's truck, parked on the
road about 50 feet from where the
body was found on the banks of a
small bayou, had been seen at the
spot since Tuesday, but it was not
until today that officers began in-
vestigating after communicating
with Houston officers. G. W. Keith,
farmer, found the body had been
thrown into the stream.

Cut in Price Of Crude Oil Put in Effect

Declines Ranging from 18 1/2
to 38 Cents Per Barrel in
Seven North Texas Counties
Announced by Humble

(By The Associated Press)
HOUSTON, Oct. 16. — Declines of
18 1/2 to 38 cents per barrel in
price offerings for crude oil in seven
North Texas counties were put into
effect today by the Humble Oil
and Refining company.

Counties affected include Wichita,
Wilbarger, Archer and northern
Young. In these counties crude oil
is sold above the former price of \$1.19
against the former price of \$1.37, a
cut of 18 cents per barrel. Gravities
below 28 are listed under the new
price schedule at 65 cents against
72 cents per barrel formerly paid.

In the same area, but listed
separately, crude runs from Gray
County will be \$1.14 per barrel
against the former price of \$1.46
1-2, a cut of 26 1-2 cents. Gravities
below 28 suffered a 15 1-2 cent cut
from 75 1-2 cents to 60 cents.

Production in Carson and
Hutchinson counties in the Pan-
handle will be run at \$1.09 per bar-
rel, against the former price of
\$1.27 1-2 for the high gravities, a
cut of 18 1-2 cents per barrel. Gravities
below 28 will bring 55
cents per barrel against 71 1-2 cents,
a cut of 22 1-2 cents per barrel.

That the cuts were induced by
price cutting in the area affected
by other refineries was suggested by
a statement issued by W. B. Parish,
president of the Humble Oil and
Refining company.

SHOOTING EXHIBITION

'World's Foremost Fancy Shot'
To Be Seen Here Today

A shooting exhibition will be pre-
sented by Mr. and Mrs. "Ad" Top-
perwein at 3 o'clock this afternoon
on the site of the old gun club in
the county park, under auspices of
Winchester Repeating Arms com-
pany and its local dealer.

Billed as "world's foremost fancy
shot," Topperwein is credited with
firing eight hours a day for 10 days
at small wooden blocks thrown in-
to the air in rapid succession and
missing only nine of 72,500, at San
Antonio. Drawing of cartoons with
bullet holes on a sheet of tin is another
of his tricks.

Mrs. Topperwein also is an ex-
pert shot, holding trap shooting
records and sometimes shooting a
crayon or cigar from her hus-
band's fingers or mouth. Rifles,
shotguns and revolvers will be used
in the exhibition, which will be free
to the public.

Hearst Named Defendant by James Cannon

Methodist Bishop Sues Head of
Newspaper String for
\$5,000,000 Libel Damages
in D. C. Supreme Court

Stories Are Cited

Church Official Alleges His
Reputation Injured, Influen-
ce Impaired as Result of
Newspaper Articles

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 16. — At-
tempts to discredit Bishop
James Cannon, Jr., of the Metho-
dist Episcopal Church, South, and
 malign the character of the present
Mrs. Cannon were charged today
in a \$5,000,000 libel suit the bishop
filed against William Randolph
Hearst in the District of Colum-
bia supreme court.

The churchman charged that
last July 24 and 27 the New York
Evening Journal and other Hearst
newspapers printed accounts say-
ing the bishop had been at the
home of his present wife, then Mrs.
Helen Hawley McCallum, and his
secretary, at the time of the late
Mrs. Cannon's death and while
there telephoned his sons to obtain
information as to his wife's condi-
tion. The first Mrs. Cannon died
two years ago.

Wed in England
The bishop and Mrs. McCallum
were married in England last July
and went on an extended home-
ymoon to South America. Just be-
fore they sailed to return to the
United States, four ministers of the
Methodist church filed charges
against him. They have never been
made public.

Bishop W. N. Ainsworth, with
whom the charges were filed, is
expected to appoint a committee of
12 ministers to determine whether
a church trial is necessary.

In his suit today, the bishop also
found fault with an Evening Jour-
nal account Sept. 27 last. It in-
ferred, he said, that C. Bascom
Simpson, an attorney and a secre-
tary to Calvin Coolidge, had been
employed by Cannon to defend a man
named Goldhurst, charged with a
criminal offense.

Cannon also said he understood

Foul Play Feared by Parents
of Thirteen-Year-Old How-
ard McCormick After His
Disappearance Tuesday

Thirteen-year-old Howard McCor-
mick, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E.
McCormick, of Lubbock, still was
missing Thursday night. Police and
county officers said they had re-
ceived no reports indicating his
whereabouts since he disappeared
late Tuesday afternoon.

Fear that the boy had been a vic-
tim in foul play was expressed by
his parents and older brother.
Relatives said they had not
seen or heard of Howard since
they missed him late Tuesday after-
noon. When last seen, he was de-
scribed as wearing overalls, a blue
shirt and cap, and black lace boots.

The missing boy was short and
stockily built and had blond hair.

"This is the first time he ever
left home without notifying us,"
Howard's older brother said Thurs-
day morning.

"We can't help but feel that
something has happened to him.
He and I always chummed together
and I have never heard him even
speak of such a thing."

Entire Brazil Infantry Taken By Insurgents

Surrender of Federal Infantry
Reported by Rebels in Thurs-
day Battle; Forces Concen-
trate Along Border

(By The Associated Press)
PORTO ALEGRE, Oct. 16. — The
surrender of federal infantry in the
state of Minas Geraes and defection
of large federal forces to the in-
surgents were reported in an official
rebel communique today.

The communique stated a heavy
concentration of troops was in pro-
gress along the Parana-Sao Paulo
frontier, a region where federal
and insurgent armies have been
gathering for the last few days for
what has loomed up as a major en-
gagement. Observers today expressed
opinion the present gathering of
troops along this line was the
greatest concentration ever seen in
South America.

While not stating the number of
soldiers involved, insurgents made
the claim that 60 companies of fed-
erals at Catanduva had gone over
to the revolution. These men were
said to be under the command of
Captain Mario Carvalho. Two ma-
chine guns and much more material
were taken over.

The federal regiment reported to
have surrendered was described as
the 11th infantry in the state of
Minas Geraes. These troops had
been surrounded by the insurgents
and their surrender was said to be
without condition.

In reporting this victory, the of-
ficial rebel communique stated that
thus far the rebels had not met
with a reverse in Minas Geraes.

States attorney, filed a complaint
charging embezzlement of \$30,000

J. Bacon, federal commissioner,
here late today.

Closing of the Billings National
bank, in which Fitzgerald was
principal stockholder, and the
American State bank of Covington,
in which he was an active officer,
resulted in an official investigation
of Lewis today.

Desperate Attempts to Save Life of 21-Month-Old Child Fail on Farm Near Levelland

Royce Mauldin, Jr., Suffers Broken Neck When Volunteers
And Parents Seek to Rescue Victim from Sky-Roofed
Grave; Weakening Cries Urge Workers Onward

LEVELLAND, Oct. 16. — The limp body of tiny Royce Mauldin, Jr., 21
months old, who fell into a well on a farm nine miles southwest of
here near sundown Wednesday, was recovered at about 3 o'clock this af-
ternoon.

Examination revealed that the child had suffered a broken neck. The
injury was believed to have been sustained shortly before dawn
as the little boy was pulled upward by ropes which had been dropped
about him by rescuers. Until that time, the child's cries had spurred
those who had worked unceasingly to rescue him.

The little boy was the only child
of Mr. and Mrs. R. N. Mauldin.
Mauldin was working in the vicin-
ity of the well as a cotton pick-
er. The mother was prostrated and
placed under care of physicians af-
ter she had touched her child, only
to have him fall deeper into the well.

The Woman's Angle

THE CHARM school that is being conducted under the auspices of the Young Women's Christian association, Texas Technological college should yield results, for the organization has hit upon a plan to meet a need that is felt by practically every freshman co-ed. Some few young women in the college may know how to act upon the various occasions and how to make the most of their personalities and innate charm, but the few who cannot benefit by this school are negligible.

A series of lectures have been arranged by the Y. W. C. A. and free freshmen girls are invited to attend. A demonstration follows the lecture in order that the young women may have opportunity to put into practice the thing that is being discussed.

Real charm is an elusive thing and most of us need to use every opportunity to develop the quality. This school does not deal at all with the intangibles. Monday's lecture, for instance, was on the etiquette of the dance and the lecturer, Miss Johnnie Gilkerson, asked questions of a number of young men on the college campus about their likes and dislikes concerning the actions of girls at collegiate dances. Using their reactions and the Emily Post sort of instructions about proper behavior, she was able to give her listeners some pointers that should contribute to their poise and popularity this winter.

THERE ARE OTHERS
NO MATTER how good one may be as an executive, he should not hold the presidency of an organization season after season and it is the wise person who gracefully withdraws. Announcement was made yesterday that Mrs. F. S. Davis, of Dallas, who has been president of the Baptist Women's Missionary Union of Texas for the last 15 years, will permit her name to be presented for re-election.

This came as a surprise to her members, according to the story. Mrs. Davis was firm in her position. And when she stepped down and let some other woman of the state serve as the head of the organization.

Mrs. Davis is probably as well suited for the presidency as any other woman in Texas and her years of experience should certainly have acquainted her with facts about the women's missionary union that no other woman in the state possesses. But out of the thousands of Baptist women in Texas, there must be scores who are capable of service as president of the society. And, too, the personalities of the various women should enrich the state society if they are given an opportunity to serve.

The officials of any organization should be changed at reasonable intervals in order to infuse the society with new life. No man should serve as president of the United States for more than a few years. No matter how good and wise he may be, no state wants a governor to serve for more than a few years. For churches can have the same disaster for many consecutive seasons without some sort of strife or discontent arising within the congregation, and few societies of any nature prosper as they should without changes among their leaders.

FOR CHRISTMAS SEASON
HERE is something that may be made now and saved for use during the Christmas season. It is candied watermelon rinds. Several women have asked me for this recipe. Miss Ruth Stockton said yesterday, in sending the recipe in, it is as follows:

One pound watermelon rind; 1-2 cup water; 1-2 cups sugar. Use only a thick watermelon rind for this candy. Remove all green and pink from the rind. Soak the rind in lime water, using 1 tablespoon lime to one quart water and allow to stand for 3 hours. Drain and wash in fresh cold water for one hour. Drain again and cut the rind into crescent shapes.

Cook the crescents until tender. Roll the sugar and water for five minutes. The crescents may be dyed their natural color and flavored with ginger by adding strong ginger to the syrup, or they may be colored. If colored a delicate red, use only the best vegetable coloring and flavor with a few drops of oil of cinnamon or according to taste. If crescents are colored green, have a delicate shade and flavor, with a few drops of peppermint.

Add crescents to the syrup and cook until tender and transparent or glassy in appearance. The syrup should be very low and thick. Drain the crescents on a plate and save syrup. Place them on a clean white cloth over a rack in a warm place and dry until the slices are not sticky and when they are thoroughly dried, they should be crystallized by dipping them into a hot syrup. This syrup is made of 1-2 cups sugar and 1-2 cup water boiled until a good thread hangs from the spoon. Keeping the syrup boiling by placing it in a pan of boiling water. It should be heated for a few seconds before the crescents are dipped. When the candy is thoroughly dry, it may be packed in boxes, using oil paper between layers.

"All Weather" Mail Route Is Demonstrated

Practical Operation of New Southern Transcontinental Air Route Proven Fact on First Day of Schedule

PORT WORTH, Oct. 16. (AP)—Practical operation of the new southern transcontinental "all weather" air mail route was demonstrated today as Postmaster General Walter F. Brown and other officials who made the trip here yesterday by plane from Atlanta reviewed the success of the first day's schedule.

The planes of Southern Air Transport, Inc., from Atlanta to Dallas, Dallas to Los Angeles, Los Angeles to Dallas, and Dallas to Los Angeles, all arrived safely with their cargoes of mail and passengers, although delayed in several instances far later than their schedules by reception and celebrations along the routes.

Brown, Postmaster General, seemed greatly pleased. Last night he was fitted in a "10 gallon" hat, typifying the hat he had reached by a swift flight from the old south.

The postoffice department is not merely setting up a system for the movement of mails, he said, "but is trying to develop a transportation system to serve the entire nation, by carrying passengers as well as mail."

He termed the mail contracts given the air companies "subsidies" and declared that no matter how generous congress might be, such contracts could not be continued indefinitely.

Up To People
"It is up to the people who will use the air mail and who will ride on these lines," he said, "to pick up and carry forward the burden which the government has borne thus far."

He also pointed out that although the United States is not warlike in its aviation development, the emergency value of commercial air lines cannot be denied.

Transfer John Alsup's Trial

Murder Case Growing Out of Fatal Shooting of Negro in Fort Worth Bank Holdup Is Sent to Dallas Court

PORT WORTH, Oct. 16. (AP)—The John Alsup murder case growing out of the fatal shooting of George Terrell, negro, at the First State bank of Polytex last April 10, was transferred to Dallas county, criminal district court number 2, by Judge George E. Hovey, today.

The change of venue was on the court's own motion.
Alsup was tried here two weeks ago in the Terrell case, and a hung jury resulted. He has been tried twice in the Will Tate case, growing out of the same affair at the bank, and was given a 20-year sentence at the second trial. This is now on appeal.

The court set out, in transferring the case, that a fair and impartial trial cannot be had here, since the defendant is well known in Port Worth, and there is "a deep prejudice and bias both for and against him." At the previous trial, many jurors were disqualified because of opinion, the court said. The wide newspaper publicity given the case also was cited.

Osie Rogers, attorney for Alsup, indicated he will contest the jurisdiction of the Dallas court, on the ground that the transfer was an "abuse of discretion."

BOSTON, Oct. 16. (AP)—The American Federation of Labor today offered an unemployment relief plan in the form of a cooperative committee of public and private groups headed by President Hoover.

A report of the Resolutions committee said:
"Public works should be started at once and all procedures and practices making for delay should be removed. Private enterprises should not withhold necessary extensions, improvements and repairs, but all should do their share for this emergency."
