Lamesa One-Act Play Wins Regional Title

The Lamesa One-Act Play club scored its second success of the season when it won the regional tournament in Canyon Saturday night. Harry Kemp's "Baccaccio's Untold Tale" was the winning play. Pampa's club, (the 1934 State Champion) won second place with "The Visitor".

The competition in the regional contest was keen, the four district winners, representing the Class A and B schools of seventy or eighty counties. This victory gives the Lamesa the cast the privilege of competing for state honors at Austin, May 3 and 4.

The only individual honor awarded girls in the regional tournament came to Miss Elizabeth Arnett when she was voted best actress.

The criticism of the judges on the play as a whole was indeed flattering and the judges were frank to say that the presentation was remarkable for a high school cast. Especially did they commend the work of Miss Arnett and Miss Betty Burgess.

The history of the Lamesa One-Act Play Club is brief, the school having participated in this event only five years. Nevertheless, the history is one of which the school and community may well be proud.

The plays of Lamesa have always placed in the district meet, and although this is the first time the school has won regional honors, it is its second time to win the district. Never has the Lamesa cast failed to take to the district the best actress, the best actor, or both the best actor and the best actress.

The name Lamesa is one that not only brings fear to athletic groups, but it likewise strikes terror to the hearts of literary and dramatic groups as well.

Lamesa Loses Regional Track Championship

Lamesa's reign over regional athletics was broken last week end when the Tornado track team placed fourth at the regional meet at Canyon. Lamesa won only 9 points, these being scored by Jack Hughes who won first in the discus throw, and Willie Huddleston who won second place in the half-mile race. The relay team was fourth in that event. Pampa, Hereford, Dumas and Mobeetie placed ahead of the Golden Tornadoes in the 1935 meet.

The Ready Writers Contest for Class A schools was won by Ussery Meek of the local high school for a total of fifteen points.

The one-act play cast played twice at the regional meet. Their first appearance was at 12 noon on Saturday when they were declared one of the two best cast at the meet and were placed in the finals with the 1934 State Champions from Pampa High School. Lamesa and Pampa casts met in the final contest at eight o'clock Saturday night and when the acting was over and the decisions of the judges rendered, the Lamesa cast was declared victorious and were certified as the representatives of this region to the State meet to be held in Austin on May 3 and 4. One cast from each of eight regions will compete for State honors at Austin.

Miss Elizabeth Arnett was voted the recognition for being the best of the young lady performers, an honor which was also accorded her in the district competition at Lubbock.

LAMESA DEFEATS HOBBS IN GOLF SUNDAY

Lamesa Golfers won over Hobbs, N. M., Sunday in a hotly contested battle by a score of 22 to 18. One of the biggest upsets of the game was when Bill White, local golfer, considered one of Lamesa's best, met defeat at the hands of Carson of Hobbs by the lopsided score of 6-5. Bill usually plays near the top of the ladder but this season he is barely clinging on the bottom rung. The big monkey is about to get him.

Fire Razes 9 Buildings In Seminole Monday; Loss Exceeds \$30,000

Fire early Monday morning destroyed nine business locations at Seminole and caused a damage that may exceed \$30,000 to \$35,000.

Starting in the Palace Cafe building, owned by Ed Price, the flames spread rapidly and soon swept the south half of the block on the west side of the court house square. The burned area is from the C. C. Cothes and Son Drug store south to the corner.

Without any fire fighting equipment, citizens battled to save the contents of the buildings in the doomed area. Only a few items were saved.

The blaze was discovered about 1:30 o'clock Monday morning. In less than three hours the structures were a huge mass of blazing embers. Scores of residents aided by oil field workers, sought to stay the flames spread.

Some of the owners carried insurance on stock and some on buildings. Amount of this could not be ascertained. Only one building was two stories high, a structure owned by Mrs. W. B. Austin, a pioneer of Gaines county. She operated a dry goods store in the first floor and the Masonic lodge had its rooms and hall on the second floor.

The nine firms suffering virtually complete losses on buildings and contents were: McGill Market and Grocery, Sims Cafe, Palace Cafe, Club cery, Seminole Beauty Nook, Austin Cafe, Haywoods Store, Moore Grocery Goods Store, and Masonic hall. As far as could be learned, owners of the building will rebuild as soon as losses are adjusted.

Helen Norvell Brown Dies of Burns Saturday

Little Helen Norvell Brown, four year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Brown who reside about three miles from Lamesa, passed away at a local hospital on last Saturday evening following serious burns received early Saturday afternoon.

Helen and her little three year old brother were playing in a storm cellar when Helen's clothes caught fire. It is not known just how the fire was started. When the child was found her clothes were completely burned from her little body. She was rushed to a local doctor for medical aid, but her burns were so serious she passed away about 10 o'clock Saturday night.

Funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon at the Higginbotham Funeral Home with Rev. E. F. Cole officiating. Burial was made in the Lamesa cemetery.

Wind Erosion Program

Applications for the wind erosion program for grants from the Texas Relief Commission are coming in at a rapid rate. To date over 100 applications have been approved by the committee for this work. The regulations provide that the amount of 10c per acre for bedding the land may be had, each party who gets the per acre allotment must use the funds as they agree to use them. Several have asked if the funds can be used for knifing the land. Knifing the land as a rule just gets it set to the place that will make it blow in a real hurry.

All farmers who are contemplating on getting the per acre allowance will

please keep in mind that the funds so allowed can expect a man to check up on the use of the funds and also on the number of acres that have been so plowed according to instructions. The parties who get the money agree to bed the land and work every day weather permitting until the number of acres agreed on is bedded in a workman like manner. Parties that are planning to make application just for the per acre allotment just to get the money and not use the funds for feed and fuel should not make application. Applications will be made out here in the agents office. All applications are to be made out not later than May First.

SIGNS FOR SCHOOL BUSES

(House Bill 455, Chapter 215, page 368, General Laws, Regular Session, Forty-second Legislature)

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1: All vehicles used for the transportation of pupils to and from any school or college, shall have on each side of the front and rear and on each side of said vehicle, showing the words "School Bus" and said words shall be plainly readable in letters not less than six (6) inches in height. It shall be the duty of the operator of such "School Bus" vehicle to see that such signs are displayed as above provided, and it shall be unlaw-

ful to operate any such "School Bus" vehicle unless such signs are so displayed thereon. When any such "School Bus" vehicle stops, every operator of a motor vehicle or motorcycle approaching the same from any direction shall bring such motor vehicle or motorcycle to a full stop before proceeding in any direction and in event such "School Bus" vehicle is receiving and/or discharging passengers, the said operator of such motor vehicle or motorcycle shall not start up or attempt to pass in any direction until the said "School Bus" vehicle has finished receiving and/or discharging its passengers.

Section 2. Any party who violates any of the provisions of Section 1 of this Act shall, upon conviction thereof, be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than Ten (\$10.00) Dollars nor more than Five Hundred (500) Dollars, or confined in the county jail not to exceed ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment; provided, however, that if death results to any person, caused either actually or remotely by a non-compliance and or violation of any of the provisions of this Act, then and in that event, the party or parties so offending shall be punished

as is now provided by law.

Section 3. In event any part of this Act should be held to be unconstitutional, then the remaining part shall be held unaffected thereby and shall remain in force and effect as the express intent of the Legislature.

Section 4. The fact that many children are transported to and from school in "School Buses" and that there is no law adequately providing safe guards and protection for said children from death and injury from passing motorists, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity requiring the suspension of the Constitutional Rule which requires all bills to be read on three several days in each House, and such rule is hereby suspended, and this Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted.

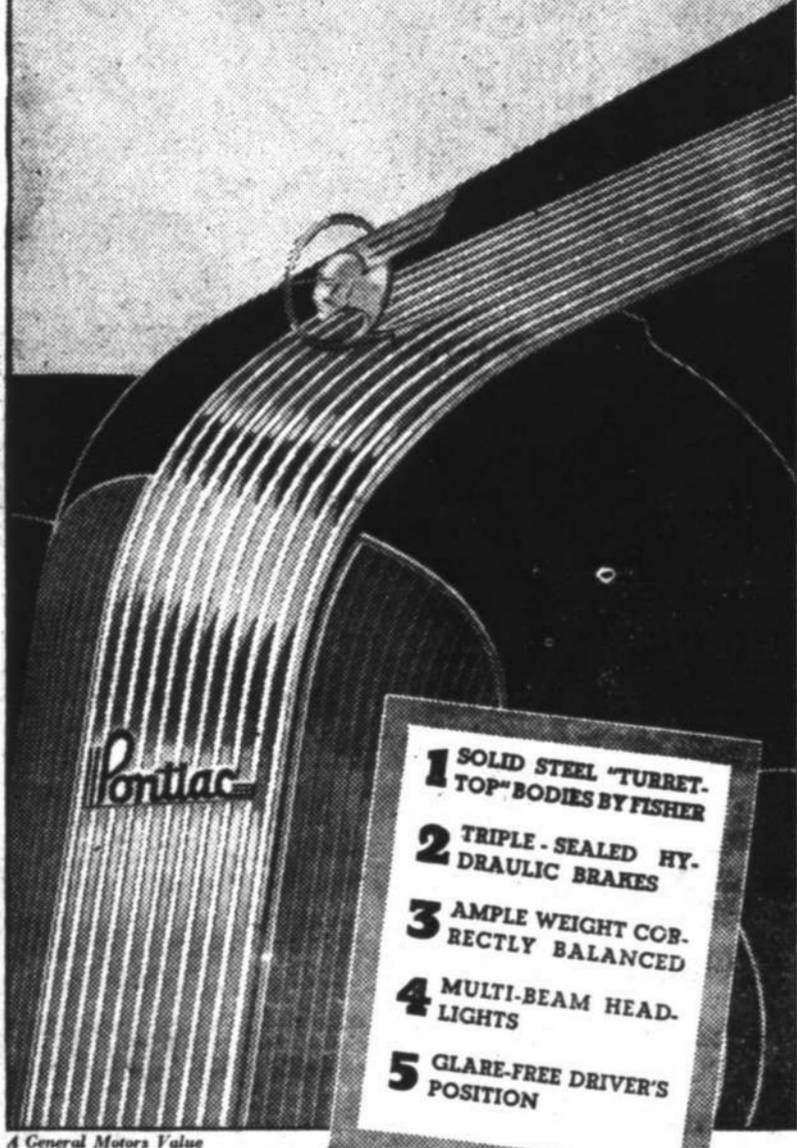

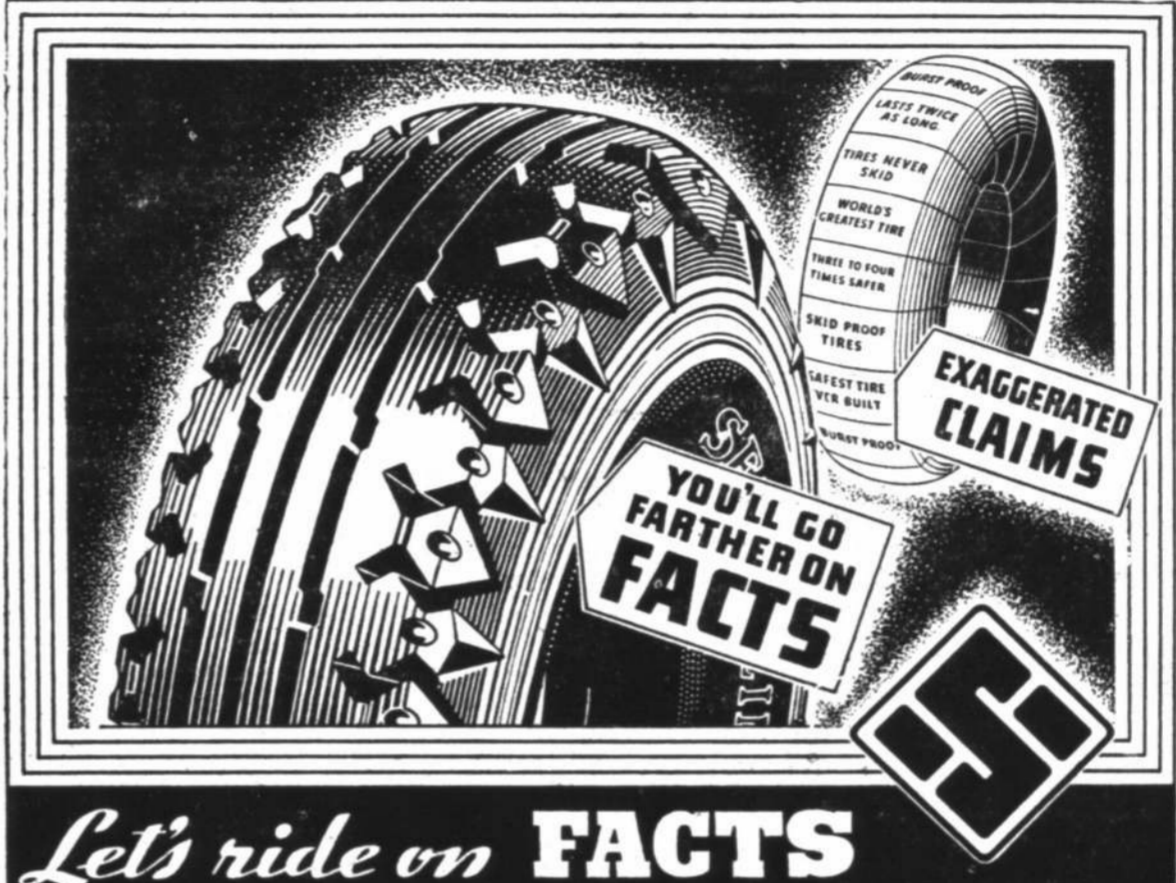

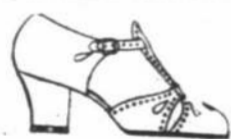

4,986 TEXAS BOYS TO ENROLL IN CCC CAMPS

Austin, April 16.—Authority to enroll 4,986 Texas boys in citizens conservation camps in the eighth corps area was received here last week by Neal E. Guy, enrollment supervisor for Texas.

County administrators were notified immediately to instruct boys selected to report to recruiting stations between April 17 and 23. Enrollment will be for a six months period as usual with an opportunity to reenroll for an additional six months.

Effect of this new enrollment of boys will be to take approximately 5,000 Texas families off the relief rolls by June 1, at which time first checks will be received by beneficiaries of enrollees.

Guy said approximately 2,725 young men will be sent out of the state to camps in Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming. The remainder will go to the 55 camps in Texas.

Enrollment of these boys will again bring the quota of Texas young men in CCC camps to the maximum figure of slightly more than 14,000.

Dawson county's quota of this new enrollment is twelve boys according to Mr. Tom Burnside, county administrator.
