Change In Postal Rates Announced By Owen Taylor

Postmaster, Owen C. Taylor, has announced that some changes have been made in special delivery, insurance, C. O. D., and M. O. fees, which became effective November 1.

He reports that special delivery fees have advanced from 10 cents to 13 cents for letters, and from 15 cents to 17 cents on second and third class mail. The amounts mentioned are the minimum and will increase according to weight.

Insurance rates have decreased. For packages valued from \$1.00 up to \$5.00 the rate is 3 cents, as compared to the old rate of 10 cents. For \$5.00 to \$25.00 packages the rate is 10 cents, and was 20 cents. For packages valued from \$25.00 to \$50.00 the rate is 15 cents, as compared with the old rate of 30 cents. For \$50.00 to \$200.00 packages the rate is 25 cents, and was 40 cents.

C. O. D. rates have decreased as follows: \$1.00 to \$2.50 the rate is 15 cents, and the old rate was 24 cents. \$2.50 to \$5.00 the rate is 20 cents, and the old rate was 24 cents. \$5.00 to \$25.00 the rate is 30 cents, and the old rate was 40 cents. \$25.00 to \$50.00 the rate is 40 cents, and the old rate was 50 cents. Postmaster Taylor states that the fees increase according to the value of the package.

He reports that you may use ordinary stamps, as has been the practice heretofore for special delivery, but asks you to put as much as 13 cents on same, besides the regular postage.

Taylor states, "This will be a little confusing for awhile, but we hope you will be patient and cooperative until we get used to the rates. This change was made necessary, we believe, in order to cover the cost of delivery of the specials, the fees heretofore having not been sufficient to pay their way to their destination."

Miles W. Caudle, Turret Gunner Given Air Medal

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England — The promotion of Miles W. Caudle, 22, from the grade of sergeant to staff sergeant, and the awarding of the Air Medal to him for "courage, coolness, and skill" displayed while on bombing attacks over Nazi Europe has been announced.

The airman is a top turret gunner in the Eighth Air Force B-17 Flying Fortress group commanded by Col. Bostrom, and is now participating in heavy bombardment attacks over Nazi war industries and troop concentrations in support of the allied ground forces.

Sgt. Caudle is the son of James E. Caudle, of Route D, Lamesa, and prior to entering the Army Air Forces in September, 1942, was employed as a bookkeeper for the Planters Gin Company in Welch.

T. Campbell, Well Known Resident, Succumbs Here

Truman Campbell, 39, prominent business man of this city, passed away at his home here Sunday night, at 12:30 a. m., from an acute heart attack. Funeral arrangements had not yet been completed at the time this paper went to press.

Mr. Campbell had made his home in this city since April of 1928, when he moved here from Sulphur Springs. For sixteen years, he had engaged in the wholesale grocery business, when he served as manager of Hestand-Kimbell Wholesale Company here. Last year Mr. Campbell and Gordon McGuire, Jr., entered business together and operated McGuire & Campbell station located on North Fourth and Main Streets.

He is survived by his wife and son Truman Jr., his mother, Mrs. D. M. Campbell of Sulphur Springs; and two brothers, Sgt. Lonnie Campbell, now stationed at Ft. Louis, Washington, and Sgt. A. Campbell, who is in France at the present time.

Sgt. B. Armstrong Blasts Enemy In The French Area

SIXTH ARMY GROUP, France— Among the specialists in ambushing the enemy is Sgt. Bryan O. Armstrong of Ackerly, who is a member of the anti-tank division. His group mans forward positions along the highways which traverse the Seventh Army fighting front.

Their positions are called "road blocks," and are actually traps set up along mountain trails or highways which Jerry might use as avenues of attack. Their weapons are concealed so Jerry won't know they are there until too late, and then they open up with flanking shots from 57 mm. anti-tank guns.

Group members report that they fire their machine guns and rifles more than their main weapon, the anti-tank gun, which isn't suited for tank warfare.

Early in the Southern France campaign, one of the division's platoons knocked out a German half-track and crippled a Mark 6 tank which was later found abandoned at the side of the road.

Board Distributes School Payments

The county School board met Friday, October 3 in the county superintendent's office to distribute transportation funds among the local schools.

County superintendent Humes reports that the county has received three payments thus far and that the last received was an adjustment payment made upon application and request for transportation adjustment payment. It amounted to \$3,400.58. The county had previously received \$17,856.00 making a total of \$21,314.00 for the 1943-44 school year.

Xmas Packages Must Be Mailed By December 1st

Postmaster Owen Taylor reports that the War Department has requested that all Christmas Parcels be mailed by December 1, in order to insure delivery by Christmas.

He states, "We realize that the December 1 deadline seems early, but remember that the department is short of experienced help, short of transportation facilities, and short of sacks for mailing packages. If you delay mailing your packages until after December 1, don't be disappointed if they fail to reach their destination until after Christmas." He continued, "We hope everybody will take this into consideration and mail early. With everyone cooperating, we can handle this Christmas rush and everybody will be happy."

The local postmaster also reports that Christmas greetings for the boys overseas must be sent first class mail and sealed and should be mailed at once if they are to reach the boys for Christmas. He states that it is very urgent that you mail your greetings now, if you want them to get to foreign bases by Christmas.

Nolan Von Roeder of Knapp, who is a breeder of Western Prolific Cottonseed, presented the program at the Lions Club meeting Thursday, November 2. He showed the group movies which he had taken. One film concerned hunting and fishing, and pictured scenes of men hunting elk, deer and other wild life.

The Army ANSWERS Your Personal War Problems

Your question on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters, Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. My allowance check for the month of September hasn't come yet. I think it may have been lost. How should I report this loss?

A. Before reporting, check with your mailman and postmaster. If you are still unable to locate your check, write the War Department Office of Dependency Benefits, Newark 2, New Jersey, and inform them of the loss. If they have a record of mailing the check, and it has not been returned to them as unclaimed, payment on the check will be stopped and it will be reissued to you.

Q. I have heard that veterans in business for themselves can receive unemployment benefits under the G. I. Bill of Rights. Is this true?

A. Yes. Self-employed veterans are eligible to receive unemployment benefits. They must, however, be earning less than \$100.00 per month.

Q. My husband is soon to be discharged from the Army. Will he have to seek employment through the U. S. Employment Service even if he can otherwise obtain work through his own efforts?

A. Veterans may now be hired by any employer without referral to the United States Employment Service.

Q. I am receiving payments from the insurance of my son who was killed in action. Can creditors attach these payments.

A. No. Payments of insurance to a beneficiary are exempt from the claims of creditors and are not liable

to attachment, levy or seizure. The only exception is that the government may recover for any illegal or excess payments.

Q. Do soldiers receive reductions in train tickets while traveling on furlough?

A. Yes, if they buy roundtrip tickets, they pay approximately 1.25 cents per mile in coaches or chair cars only. Government tax does not apply on tickets sold to military personnel traveling in uniform.

Latest News From COUNTY AGENT

There is a new method of outwitting coyotes, in addition to the several old methods such as planes, traps, spades, rifles, and perhaps other methods. This new method is the use of gas guns, according to County Agent Lee R. Pool.

The use of the gas gun has gained prominence in combatting the coyote. This gas gun is a short length of a small pipe driven into the ground. Inside is a spring mechanism with a firing pin to set off a cartridge loaded with sodium cyanide.

A bit of rabbit fur is securely fastened on top of this trap and is treated with some scented bait to

attract the coyote's attention. The fur also hides the gun muzzle. The animal picks up this bait of fur, thus pulling the trigger, and the gas is shot into his mouth. He naturally sets off in a high run but the gas usually overcomes him within 75 yards of the spot; so it is no trouble to find the coyote. The remarkable thing about this type of a gun, stated Pool, is that it may be stepped on by an animal or human being and it will not release the gas. But a slight pull on the gun causes it to go off. The Bureau of Biological Survey and Predatory Animal Control Service have been using this type of bait for the few years with great success. More information can be had on this subject at your County Agent's office.

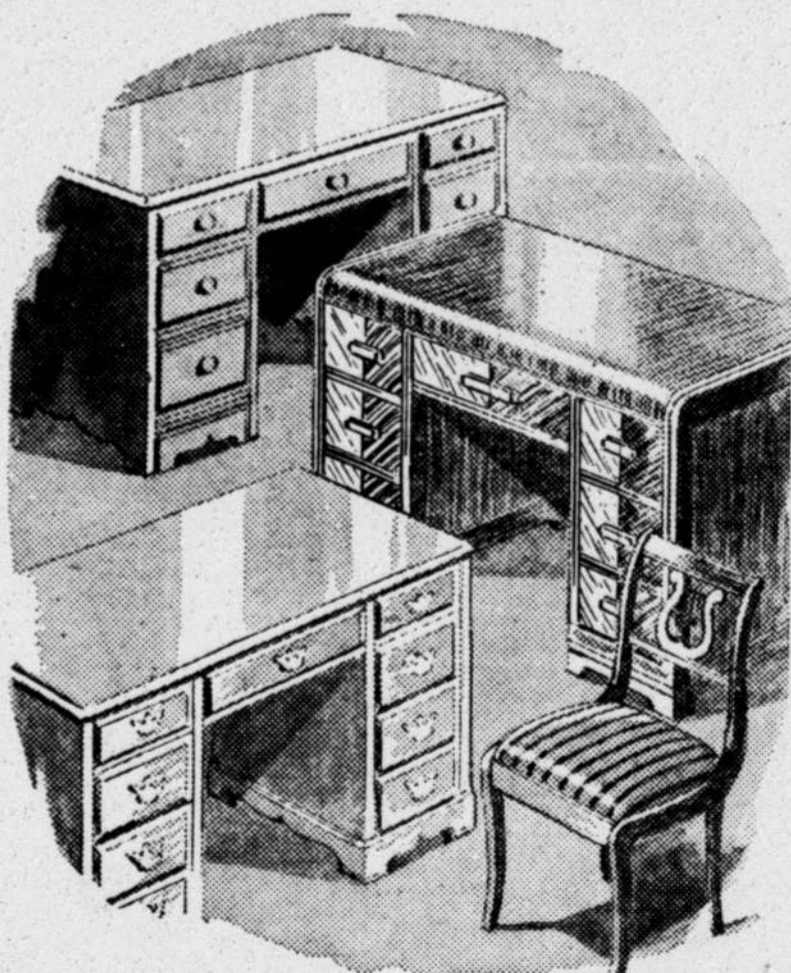

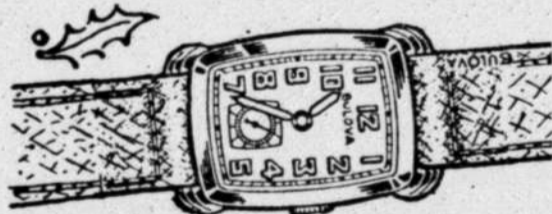

Sun Carnival Is To Be Celebrated In El Paso Soon

EL PASO — The Southwestern Sun Carnival Association opened headquarters today for the tenth annual Sun Carnival, which will be celebrated here Dec. 29 through Jan. 1.

The 1945 Sun Carnival schedule calls for the El Paso Symphony Orchestra concert on Dec. 29, coronation ceremonies on Dec. 30, a parade on Dec. 31, and the Sun Bowl football game on Jan. 1.

The Sun Queen and her princesses and duchesses will be honored guests at the concert. On the following evening, the Sun Queen will be crowned at elaborate ceremonies, with her duchesses and princesses from neighboring communities in attendance.

Because of war-time conditions, the spectacular parade that always marked the Sun Carnival will again be omitted. However, there will be a parade this year, but along less ambitious lines. Details of this parade are being worked out by the Old-Timers of El Paso.

Teams have not yet been selected for the Sun Bowl game, annual gridiron classic which has developed into one of the nation's outstanding bowl games. It is contemplated, however, that two of the top-ranking service teams will be lined up against each other in the battle for the Sun Bowl champion-

ship trophy. Tickets for the football game are already on sale.

At the same time, the Chamber of Commerce is broadcasting a warning throughout the East and Mid-West, urging Sun Carnival visitors to obtain confirmation of hotel reservations before leaving for El Paso.

SEALS SHOULD NOT BE PLACED ON ADDRESS SIDE OF PACKAGES

The requirement that domestic mail, including that for all the possessions of the United States, which bears adhesive seals or stickers other than lawful postage stamps on the address side be treated unmailable has been suspended from November 1 to January 1, 1945.

Post office officials suggest, however, that in order to expedite mails, seals and stickers should not be placed on the address side.

They state, "If you must put Christmas seals on your packages, put them on the opposite side from the address."

Marine Fox Killed Twenty-Five Japs In Guam Invasion

SOMEWHERE IN THE PACIFIC—Texas and California can claim the honor of calling their own two Third Marine Division flame throwers who killed 45 Japs between them during the Guam campaign. Raised near each other in West Texas, Marine Pfc. Marshall L. Fox, 19 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. George M. Fox, formerly of Lamesa, and Marine Pfc. Tommie J. Burns, formerly of Vego, migrated to California but never met until assigned to the same infantry regiment.

Both volunteer flame throwers, Fox accounted for 25 Japs, and Burns killed 20 Japs. Exposed to Japanese fire when working in close to enemy fortified positions, the two Marines had many narrow escapes. A grenade exploded 10 feet in front of Fox, embedding fragments in his helmet. On D-Day Fox killed 11 of the enemy that evening in a large cave on Asan Point, a Jap stronghold.

Japanese ingenuity momentarily stopped Fox on Cabras Island, just off Guam's west coast. The Japs sniped at Marines and when the Marines returned fire, the Japs merely closed a heavy metal door. A rifle grenade finally blew the door open, and Fox burned out the enemy.

The Marines said the only time they saw organized Japs turn and run was from flame throwers. "The Japs have good reason to hate and fear them," Fox said.
