LBJ's Surprise Visit Honors Local Students

Kathy Anderson of Colorado City and Larry Wiggins of Ira were part of a youthful audience being surprised with an unexpected visit from President Lyndon B. Johnson on the White House lawn. The local students are part of a 63 member tour group sightseeing in Washington as winners of the "Government in Action" Tour contest sponsored by Lon Wolff Electric Co-op.

At the time of the President's visit they were assembled with more than 700 rural youth from all over the nation in the Rose Garden of the Executive Mansion. President speaks to the youth group, the President said, "We are part of the volunteer generation," in regard to the 90,000 men and women serving in the United States Peace Corps in 36 different countries around the world. "We have no war except the war on war," the President told the group. The visit with the President came as a climax to three days of meetings, sightseeing

and educational activities for the 63 members of the Texas delegation that returned to Texas Monday.

Return Trip
On the return trip to Texas the group toured Norris Dam in Tennessee where they received an explanation of the development of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

AROUND THE WORLD IN TWO YEARS'

Argentina Travelers Charm Local Friends

Argentina came to Colorado City Friday afternoon on the wheels of a 1926 Model T Ford. Norberto and Mabel Alvarez passed through the city on a route designed to carry them around the world.

The couple departed from Ushuaia, Tierra Del Fuego, the town nearest to the South Pole, on November 27 and then arrived in Colorado City some seven months following. Their primary destination in the United States is Washington, D. C.

Minor auto repairs caused their visit in Colorado City at the service station operated by Frank Connard. Noting that the couple looked somewhat bushed from their days on the road, Connard and the Eldon Smith family offered the hospitality of their homes to the couple for a relaxing rest.

The couple only spoke somewhat broken English and communication was a little difficult. In the end, however, broad smiles and friendliness bridged the language barrier and the couple's car was put into top condition.

The Car
The 1926 Model T Ford was in excellent condition for its age and Norberto said that they usually made about 300 miles per day over an average route.

Signs denoting membership in various auto clubs in Argentina and South America were plastered over the vehicle.

Long Road
Norberto and his wife have traveled some 20,000 miles thus far on their journey around the world which they expect will take in the neighborhood of two years.

Some of the countries they have passed through thus far include Bolivia, Peru, Mexico, Ecuador, Colombia, Panama, Costa Rica, Nicaragua, Honduras, El Salvador and Guatemala.

Norberto said he felt Mexico was the prettiest country visited thus far, but his wife seemed very partial to the United States which they crossed into at El Paso.

Before the two-year jaunt ends the couple expects to have visited 75 different states and countries.

Good Will Tour
In addition to being a sight-seeing journey the couple explained that they were on a personal good will trip for their country of Argentina.

They are showing film strips in various parts of the country about Argentina. On reaching Washington, D. C. the couple will visit the grave of the late President John F. Kennedy where they will place a vase of soil from Tucuman, the place where the independence of Argentina was won.

Own Expenses
When asked about the expense of traveling over the vast expanse of the world, Norberto said that they had spent around \$3,000 thus far on the journey. He noted that they cut down on expenses by sleeping in tents by the roadside and in parks to defray lodging costs. Also, he said many people had befriended him and his wife such as the two families in Colorado City had done.

Gas and Film
Norberto said his vintage automobile had used about 1000 gallons of gas on the trip. He moves quite slowly compared with today's rapid pace on the highway usually driving about 25 miles per hour.

He added they had taken 700 snapshots and over 2000 feet of movie film since leaving their homeland in November.

No Bandits Seen
Norberto noted that all the people along the route had generally been hospitable. He added they were particularly cautious of bandits when traveling through Colombia where highwaymen are estimated to kill some 23,000 travelers per year.

He explained, however, that the bandits were usually in search of money and probably expected anyone traveling in a Model T to be quite poor. Norberto had rather mixed emotions about the roads he had traveled over on the trip explaining some were fair, but that many of the dirt roads were hard to travel.

He explained that one of the more thrilling parts of the trip was from Colombia to Panama which was made entirely by boat as this is the only access.

Previous Trip
This jaunt was Norberto's second stop to the United States as he had been on a similar one in 1958-59 when he traveled from Argentina to Canada. He had plans of going all the way to Alaska, but winter weather cut the former trip short.

Makes Friends
Norberto and Mabel Alvarez left Colorado City after a experience with famous West Texas hospitality putting along at a turtle's clip on their way around the world. And with their bright smiles, perseverance and trusty Model T, they'll probably make it.

BY BOARD, COMMITTEE

Study Planned On Curriculum

Plans for a future study designed to improve the curriculum of Colorado City schools are being made by the Board of Trustees and administration.

Chamber of Commerce education committee will be contacted in connection with the study by the Board.

In the school board meeting Monday night the participation of the group was urged by the Board.

Despite the fact that the coming year's curriculum has already been set, it was the general feeling of the board members that the project to study needs and improvements should get underway as soon as possible.

Initial report from the study groups is scheduled to be presented at the August 9 meeting of the Board of Trustees.

Past Work Cited

This will mark the second time in recent months the education committee of the Chamber has been called on by the school board for aid in planning school system projects.

The committee supervised various study groups made up of a cross section of the town's citizenry in planning the recent school bond issue which passed.

The groups gave their thoughts and ideas in the first project on what should be included in the school expansion program.

Board members an administration praised the work of the groups in the initial project.

C of C Helps Team

An industrial employment survey in Mitchell County is slated to begin on July 6.

Purpose of the project is to determine the actual labor supply and force available in Mitchell County.

The inventory of workers is designed to find the potential number that would be employable by industry.

Accurate labor statistics are vital to the growth of the county and is needed to attract industry.

Industries inquiring into the possibility of locating in area must be supplied with the number of workers available.

Colorado City Chamber of Commerce is working with the Industrial Team on the project by compiling results gained from the survey.

The files are to be used for information purposes only and are not applications for positions. All files will be held confidential.

Questionnaires will be translated into Spanish for non-English speaking persons filling them out.

Questionnaires will be distributed by a combination of mailing and personal contact. Total co-operation of workers in Mitchell County is urged by those taking the survey as the information is vitally important to the future economic growth of the area.

Following the kickoff date of July 6 the project will continue until the information is collected and interpreted.

Paving Crew Working On Lake Access Road

Final work on the paving of the lake road connecting Interstate 20 and State Highway 163 is underway as of Friday and Saturday.

Finishing of the project will offer a paved access to the City Park and other sections of Lake Colorado City.

Schools Holding Summer Slate

Summer activities at Colorado City schools are in full swing with four classes being taught.

At Colorado High a total of 20 students are enrolled in the civics class being taught by Miss Carolyn Baumgart. In addition there is a class of English being conducted for students needing to repeat the course.

Doug Chitsey is in charge of over 70 students engaged in driver's education. These in the course are required to get six hours of actual driving experience and six hours of observation.

The non-English speaking class being taught at Primary School has an enrollment of 16. Mrs. Swan Cramer is teaching the group. This course is designed to aid students entering the first grade this coming fall who have difficulty in speaking English. Following this study it is hoped they will be able to gain a normal amount of education in their first year of school.

Recreational activities are being conducted at the Colorado High gym each morning and evening for all local youngsters interested in participating.

The gymnasium is open from 8 a.m. until noon and from 5-7 p.m. Monday through Friday with Coach Dell Riley in charge of the programs. From 8-9:30 a.m. ages 13 and under may take part in track and field events. Grades 8-12 participate in basketball between 9:30 and 10:30 each morning.

Program of weights is conducted from 10:30-11:30 a.m. for all age groups. In the evening portion of the program from 5-7 p.m. the weight room is available to all age groups and track is available for students aged 14 through the high school grades.

Participants in the various sports are required to furnish their own personal clothing for the program. Coach Riley explained that the program of summer recreation would be continued until August 1.

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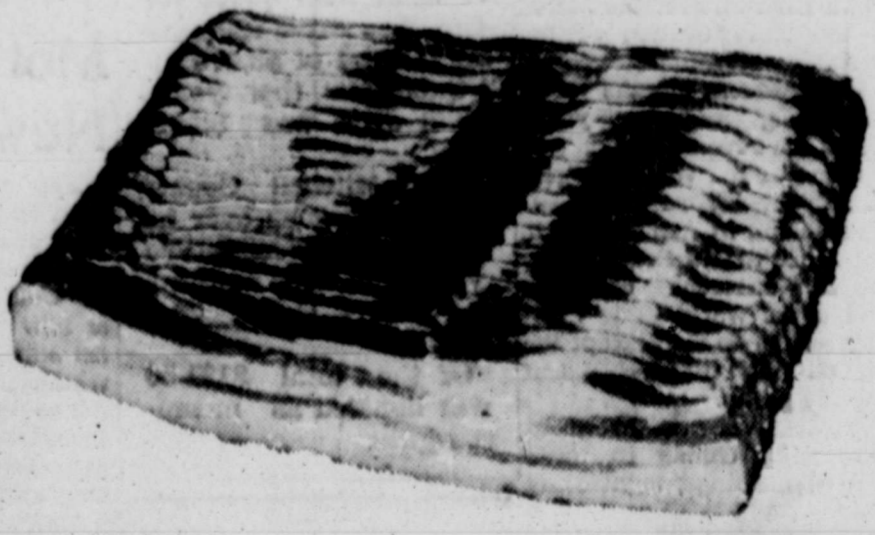

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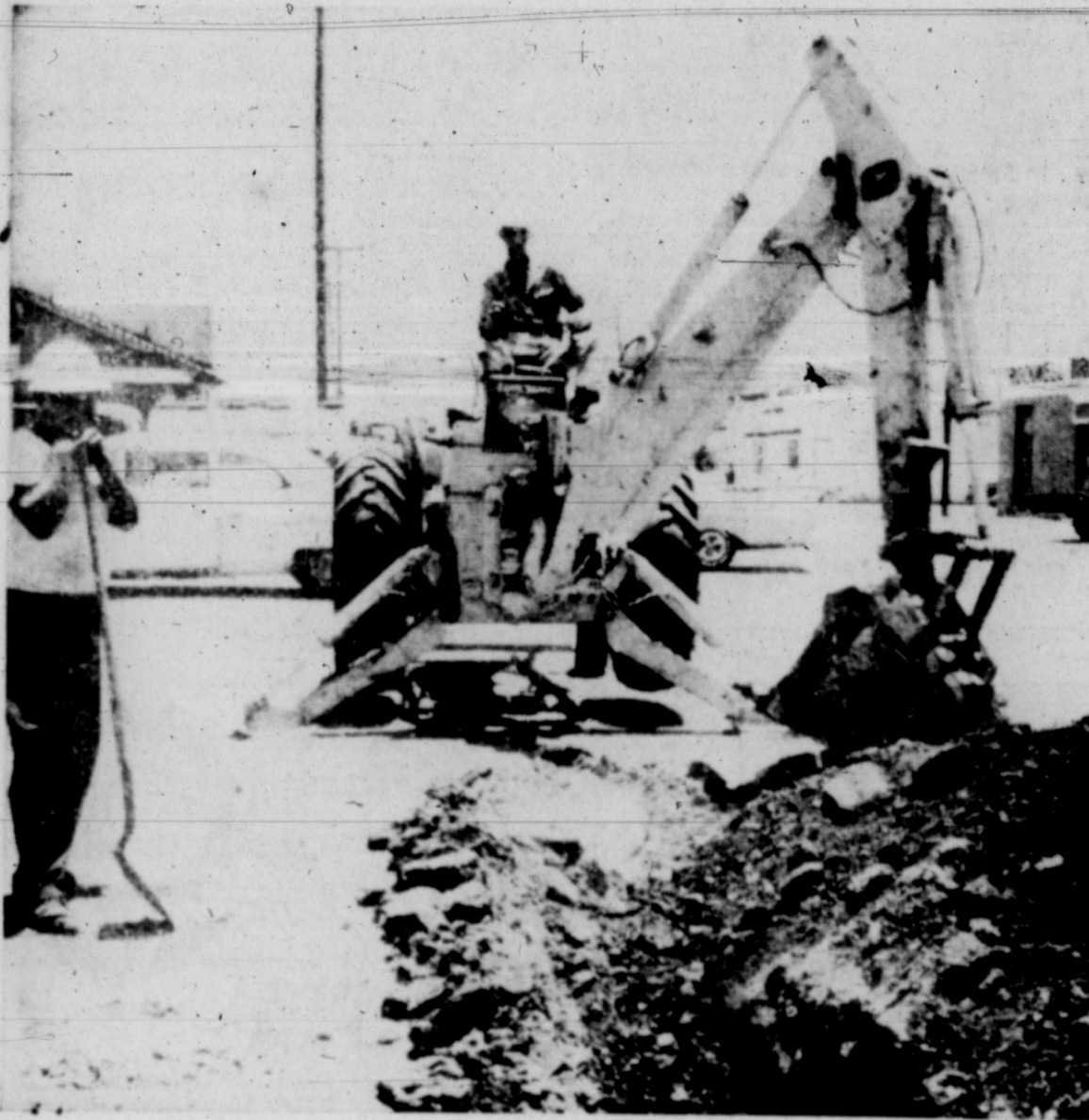

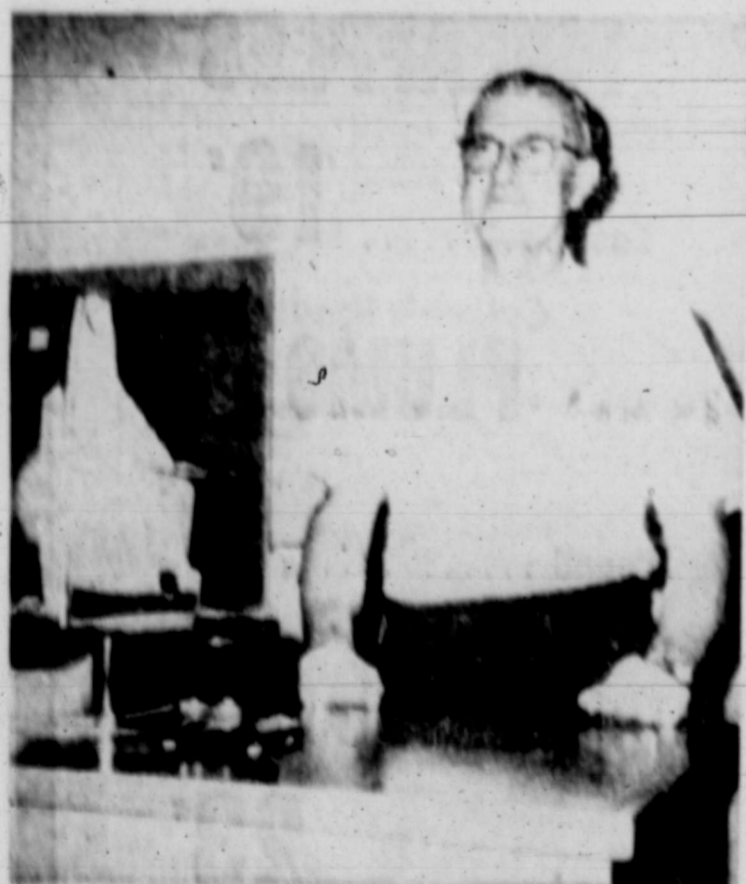

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44, proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:
"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members."
"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible."
"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."
"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
