AUSTIN, Nov. 21.—A test case to determine the legality of giving the Texas Railroad Commission the right to regulate motor bus transportation was filed in the Court of Criminal Appeals today by H. S. Sparks, of Paducah, Cottle county, when he requested a habeas corpus hearing before the higher court. Sparks was arrested recently and charged with unlawfully operating a motor bus. Sparks attorneys claim the law is in contravention to the fourteenth amendment to the federal constitution.

King No. 1 is Spudded In; Others Busy

The Watchorn-King No. 1, Domingo Diaz survey No. 532, five miles north of Ballinger, was reported to have spudded last week with J. T. Wylie as the drilling contractor. This is the latest test for oil in this county.

Gibson & Johnson, Abilene operators, have a derrick on the A. P. Serratt farm, three miles north of the city, and are preparing to start operations within the next few days. This is a steel derrick.

Empire-Collins-Gray No. 1, 4 1/2 miles north of Ballinger, was drilling at around 1,200 feet Sunday morning. The drillers have been making good time on this hole.

Sweeney-Alworth-Werner No. 1, at Benoit, is reported to be drilling around 1,725 feet in blue shale.

May-Schneider No. 1, three miles south of the Colorado River from Ballinger, is reported to be having trouble with "walking boulders" at 1,062 after setting casing to 1,032 feet to shut off water.

Noble et al Sims No. 1, ten miles south of Ballinger, is reported to be underreaming again to 2,820 feet preparatory to setting more casing to shut off another flow of water which was encountered at a depth of 2,820 feet.

Miles Oil Co.-Lawhon & Sons No. 1, two miles northwest of Miles, is reported to be down about 2,000 feet with casing set to 2,125 feet. The drillers were running the bailer Sunday afternoon to clean out the hole.

Farnsworth-Kennedy-Talley No. 1, ten miles north of Ballinger, is reported to still be closed down at a depth of around 1,500 feet.

AUTO PARKING
HERE IMPROVES

Parking on the paved streets of the business district has become much less congested since Chief of Police F. V. McCall has been enforcing the no-double-parking ordinance.

"The people have to be educated to this method of parking," Chief McCall says, "you have to let some of them go by now but tell them that it is against the law. The country people seem to take it better than the city drivers, and are almost always willing to comply with the rules. When the motorists start bowing their necks and ignore this law, fines will then be assessed against them."

No one has yet been fined for this infraction of the traffic law but everyone who violates the double parking law is being notified of the fact and warned not to do it again.

GAS UTILITY IS
LARGE CONCERN

(San Angelo Standard of Nov. 18, '27.)

The Western Gas Service Company, now serving San Angelo with natural gas, is allied with one of the largest natural gas purveying corporations in the United States as a result of the purchase of the Oklahoma Natural Gas Corporation and other properties by the Geo. L. Ohrstrom Company of New York and associates as announced this week.

A new corporation, known as the American Natural Gas Corporation, has been organized to administer the properties involved in the transaction which have a monetary value in excess of forty million dollars.

Perhaps the asset of the new corporation of greatest interest to local consumers is the fact that the new concern controls gas rights on 250,000 acres and gas purchase contracts on 125,000 acres more. A gas reserve comprising more than 100,000 acres in the Panhandle of Texas is included in the deal. This was acquired from the Phillips Petroleum Company. Other gas acreage is located in the leading Oklahoma gas fields. Present gas output from the 950 gas wells in operation totals over two and one half billion cubic feet of gas daily, open flow.

Over 2,200 miles of pipe line for the transmission and distribution of gas to patrons of the new corporation are in operation. More than fifty communities with a population in excess of 600,000 including the principal cities of Oklahoma and southern Kansas are served either wholesale or retail.

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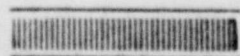

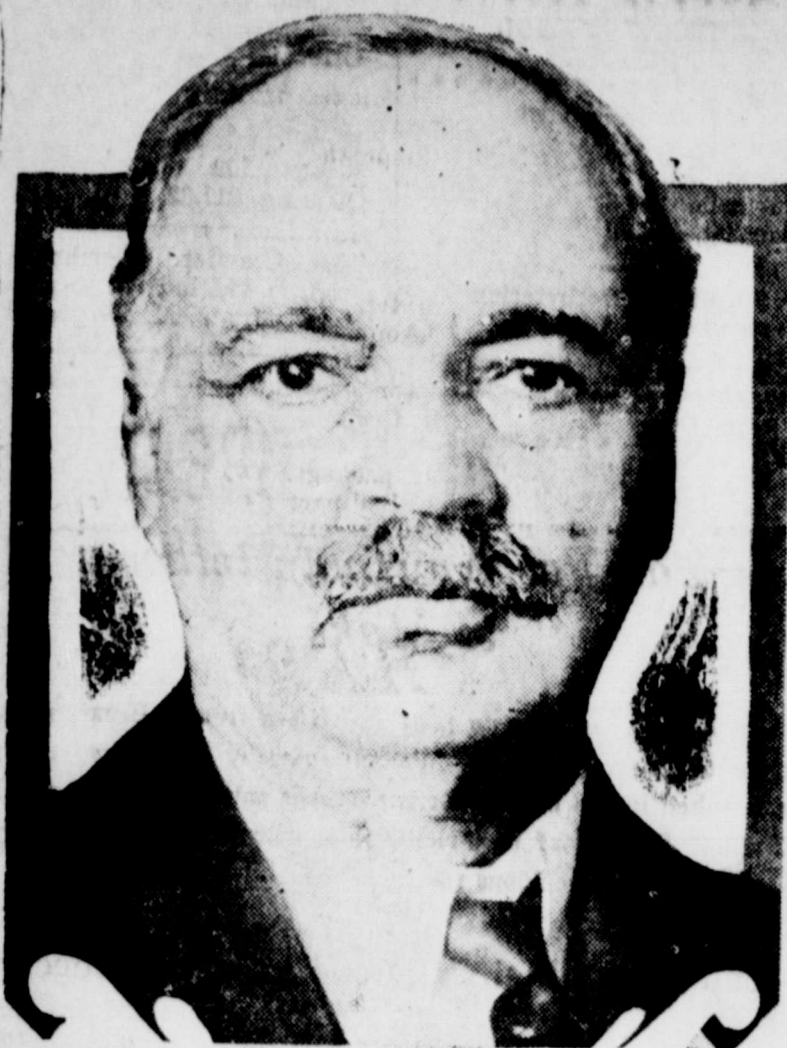

The car was in the same condition as when it was stolen. Two boxes of shot-gun shells, some bread, and Mr. Koch's sweater were still in the car.

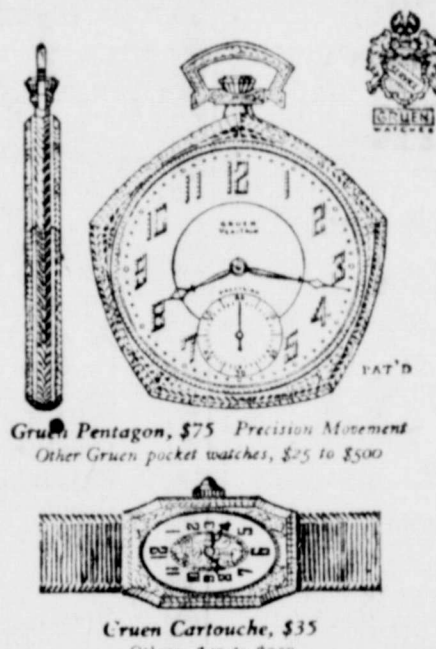
