ELSEWHERE ON the front page of today's paper you'll see an announcement that, effective March 1, The Cisco Press will be published three times each week instead of five times weekly. The Press will appear each Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday.

The management of The Press has decided on the change after considerable study. We have reached the conclusion that a tri-weekly newspaper would adequately serve the community's needs as a news and advertising medium. In other words, we will have more time to use in making three newspapers better each week.

Cisco has had a daily newspaper for 25 years or longer. In converting The Press to a tri-weekly, we hope the public will not think that we are walking in the wrong direction. Nobody is more interested or concerned about the future of the Cisco community than we are.

More than a year ago, the daily newspapers at Eastland and Ranger changed to semi-weekly newspapers. After a few months, they added Sunday publications to become tri-weeklies. The experiment has been highly successful in those cities, and we have every reason to believe that it will be equally as successful here.

There has been a lot of changes since the beginning of daily newspaper publication in Cisco. The national trend for a good many years has been to fewer and larger daily newspapers and to better community newspapers printed less frequently. We have long recognized the fact that the job for The Press in Cisco was to print local news and provide an advertising medium for the Cisco community, and we have concentrated our efforts in that direction. We can't compete with the Fort Worth and Abilene newspapers as daily newspapers, and they can't compete with us as a local newspaper.

There is no reason why we should not admit that television has hurt the community newspapers. A large percentage of our national advertising dollar has gone into TV programs. And about the only thing the community newspaper can do is to cut expenses a little to offset the loss.

As a tri-weekly, The Press will endeavor to print more news of the county and the community and to make each edition bigger and better. We pledge our efforts to help make Cisco a better city in all respects. And we want your suggestions and advice every time you have some ideas that you think the community ought to have.

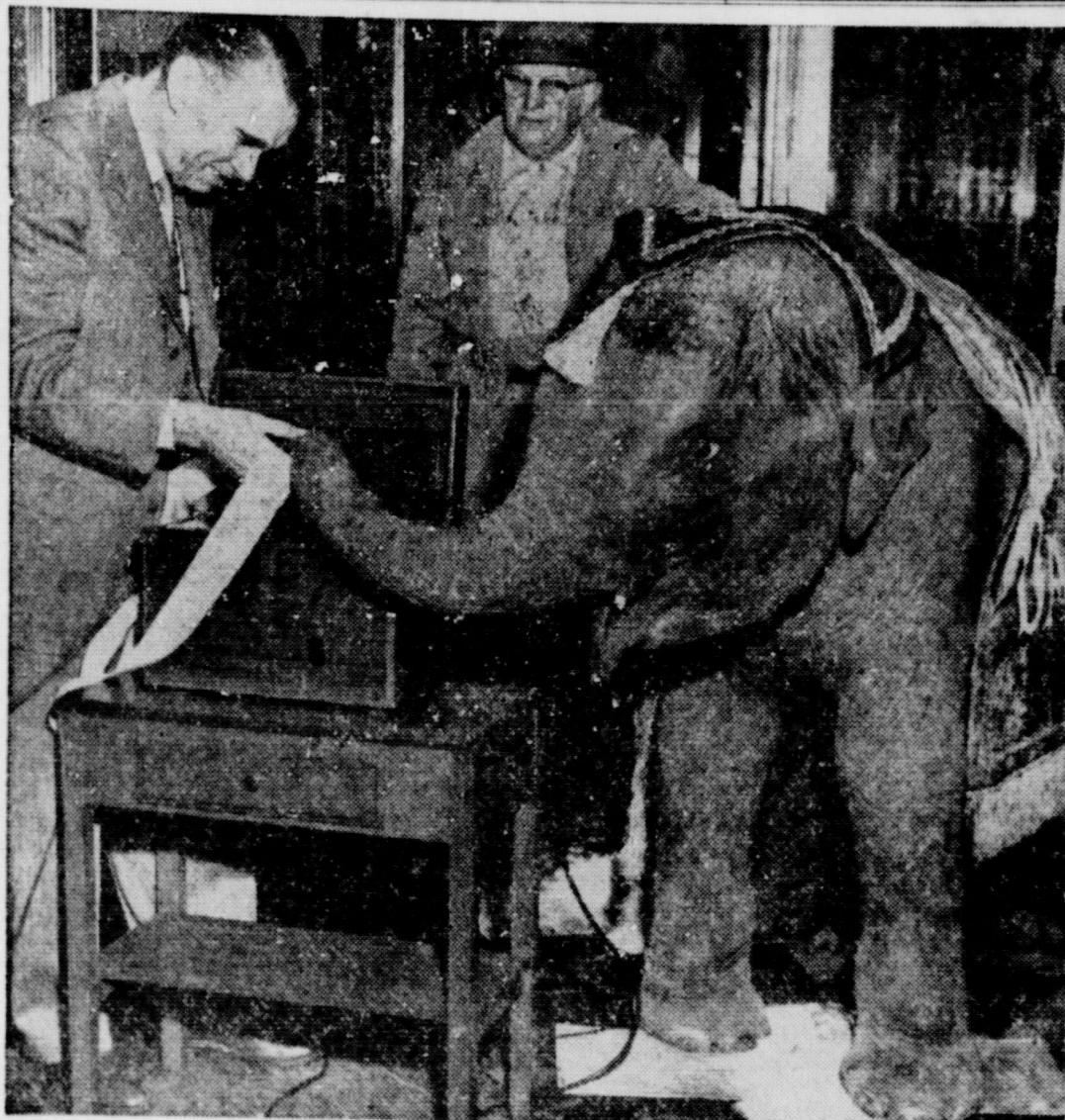

Rev. T. J. Howard, pastor of the First Assembly of God Church in Cisco, has announced that beginning Wednesday night, March 2, at 8 p. m., the singing evangelist, Herschel Murphy, will become the main speaker in the deliverance campaign now in progress in the Cisco City Hall.

MR. ROSENTHAL WILL RUN FOR RE-ELECTION AS CITY'S MAYOR

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported Saturday that he has decided to be a candidate for re-election as Mayor of Cisco in the election scheduled for Tuesday, April 5. A mayor and two city commissioners will be elected in the election, which was ordered recently by the commission.

Mr. Rosenthal said his decision to run for another term was based on his desire to contribute as much as he can to the improvement program now under study and consideration by the city. The program would include refinancing the city's bonded debt and voting new money for water system improvements and other work.

"I am asking your consideration and vote for another term as mayor," Mr. Rosenthal said in a prepared statement. "In this connection, I want to assure you that my entire time and efforts will be devoted to the advancement of Cisco, just as it has been during my tenure of office."

"I am 100% in favor of the plans for refinancing the city's bonded indebtedness and in issuing bonds to complete the Battle Creek water project, with improvements to the present water treating plant and distribution system. I consider these plans are of vital importance to Cisco and they should have the support of each and every citizen."

"I appreciate the honors given me in the past and assure you that your support will be well placed."

A retired engineer for Humble Pipe Line Company, Mr. Rosenthal has served for two terms as mayor. He has been a resident of Cisco for many years and owns his home in the west part of town. Since he took over as the city's chief executive, Mr. Rosenthal has devoted full time to the mayor's office.

Deadline for filing for places on the April 5 ballot is March 5. The terms of Commissioners Albert Hansen and R. N. Cluck also expire in April.

RED CROSS SERVICE PROGRAM IS VALUABLE, CHAIRMAN SAYS

The Eastland County Red Cross, which is holding its annual finance drive during March, has much to offer the county in the home service program, County Chairman Stanley Webb reported Saturday. Plans are complete for the campaign.

Mr. Webb explained that several persons have asked him what the Home Service Program is. In answer, he explained that Home Service of the Eastland County chapter helps families of the men and women in the armed forces and veterans and their families meet personal and family problems.

As examples, Mr. Webb gave three "typical cases."

"A serviceman stationed overseas learns that his wife is critically ill back home. He needs to learn the facts quickly through rapid communications so that he can know whether his presence is necessary or not."

"After her husband went overseas a serviceman's young wife returned to her home town to have her first baby. Her allotment is delayed because of her change of address and she has no money. She looks for somebody to assist her."

"A disabled veteran needs help in obtaining government benefits to which he is entitled because of disabilities he suffered in military service . . .

"These three cases are typical of the problems involving servicemen, veterans, and their dependents which American Red Cross Home Service program in Eastland County handles almost every day."

"For members of the armed forces and their dependents, services include counseling in personal and family problems, communications service between the soldier away from home and his family at home in emergencies, assistance in applying for government benefits, referral service to advice of other means of assistance and direct financial assistance on the basis of need."

"In an annual report completed recently, it was found that under the Eastland County Red Cross Chapter assistance was given 576 families during the past fiscal year. Continued requirements for a large military force to serve overseas indicates a constant need for the Home Service program. Persons separated from families will continue to look to the Red Cross as the link of communications with home."

"Funds to support the Home Service program of the local Red Cross, as well as Eastland County's share of the national Red Cross program, will be solicited during the forthcoming Red Cross Campaign March 1-31," Mr. Webb said.

Press to Become Tri-Weekly

Effective March 1, The Cisco Press will become a tri-weekly instead of a five-times-a-week daily newspaper. Publication days will be Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday of each week. The Press will continue to be delivered by carrier boys or by mail, as in the past.

Subscription rates for The Press will remain 15 cents per week by carrier boy. Mail subscription rates will remain \$3.00 per year in Eastland and adjoining counties (except at Cisco Post Office boxes where the rate will be \$5.00 per year) and \$5.00 per year elsewhere in Texas and the nation.

Classified advertising rates will be 3 cents per word for one insertion (minimum of 50 cents), and 6 cents per word for three insertions. Advertising deadlines will be 5 p. m. on day before publication, and the news deadline will be at noon on the day of publication.

Bobwhite Quail Restoration Gets Public Support

AUSTIN, Feb. 26. — The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission said public interest continues unabated in proffered literature designed to aid bobwhite quail restoration.

Each day, he added, brings many new requests especially for the pamphlet by Wildlife Biologist Dan Lay of Buna, citing that the sure way to bring back quail is to provide them with cover, natural food and water. Lay's literature stresses that it was the loss of these ingredients mainly in the face of encroachment by civilization, that cut down the popular little game birds. He describes steps necessary to create proper environment.

The director of Wildlife Restoration said requests for information on what to do are coming from every part of Texas. Distribution of the data already has become national, and even international in scope.

The Educational Director of Virginia's Commission of Game and Inland Fisheries, wrote for five copies of Lay's "Quail Management in East Texas," describing it as "an excellent publication." And from the South Bay Mouth, Ontario, Fisheries Research Station, came a request for the same document.

County Agent Ross Brison of Pittsburg, in East Texas, wrote for 100 copies of the quail management handbook following a meeting of quail hunters and farmers. "We are getting enough interest in quail management among hunters and farmers," Brison wrote, "that in the near future some multiflora rose and food crop will be planted on many farms of the county. For that reason Bulletin No. 34 will be lots of help in selecting sites for planting the rose and food plants."

County Agent Robert Fowler of Center wrote for twenty-five copies of Lay's quail handbook, describing it as "the best source of information on the quail situation ever to have been written."

A Dallas feed store dealer wrote for a supply of the pamphlet, saying he had several customer requests for the information. Several requests have come from other big cities like Houston, San Antonio and Fort Worth. One Fort Worth firm asked for six copies.

The women folks are sharing in the help-bring-back-the-quail movement. One postal card brought a request for the Lay handbook to be mailed to three different women in Houston.

EXPANSION IN INDUSTRY

Since World War II industrial expansion in this country has been running at levels which, in pre-war times, would have seemed incredible and perhaps impossible. A virtually endless stream of billions has been poured into new plants and other physical facilities, to meet our apparently insatiable demand for goods and services.

Everyone knows, as a generality, that such expansion creates new jobs, new markets, new and improved products, new sources of taxation for government, higher living standards, and all sorts of other results. But more specific information on what happens when an industry expands in a huge way is not always available.

A recent article in Chemical News, which is published by the Manufacturing Chemists' Association, deals in specific terms in what has been and is happening in that field. The chemical industry has been a bell-weather of the postwar expansion boom. It now employs more than 700,000 workers. Its sales in 1953 were not far from \$2,000,000,000 and preliminary figures indicate that the 1954 total was substantially the same. We live in a chemical age, in which all sorts of chemicals, some old, some almost as new as this morning, play ever-

increasing roles in the lives of individuals, and in the operations of industry and agriculture.

In the 12 months which ended last October 31st, the chemical industry finished 215 new construction projects costing \$1,216,000,000. It has 219 additional projects under construction which will cost \$933,000,000. It has another 138 projects planned, and budgeted at \$581,000,000. This makes a grand total of 572 privately financed projects at an outlay of \$2,730,000,000. Here is what that means:

A third of construction costs goes in wages and salaries to workers and supervisors. So these people will get some \$910,000,000, and will use it to buy goods, build up their savings, and pay taxes.

Most of the balance goes for equipment and building materials, and engineering services. The purchase of these will involve an estimated additional \$603,000,000 in wages and salaries.

At least half of the construction represents new facilities, as against replacement. It costs up to \$25,000 in investment to create a job in the chemical industry. So a minimum of 54,400 new jobs will be created, and, at an average annual wage of \$4,000 per employee, will add new income of some \$217,600,000 a year — income that never existed before.

If the earnings from all these projects return only one per cent a year in dividends to shareholders in the chemical companies, that income will be boosted by \$27,300,000 — and, like the salaries and wages, will go to pay taxes, for savings, and to buy all manner of necessities and luxuries.

This doesn't by any means exhaust the results of this expansion program — for instance, the increased volume of chemicals produced will mean additional millions of income to dealers and salesmen and others. And, as Chemical News points out, "This new wealth is financed by private not government funds. These private funds are profits from business already done, accumulated as savings by companies and investors, after the payment of taxes. Without such investment of these savings, this new wealth could not be created."

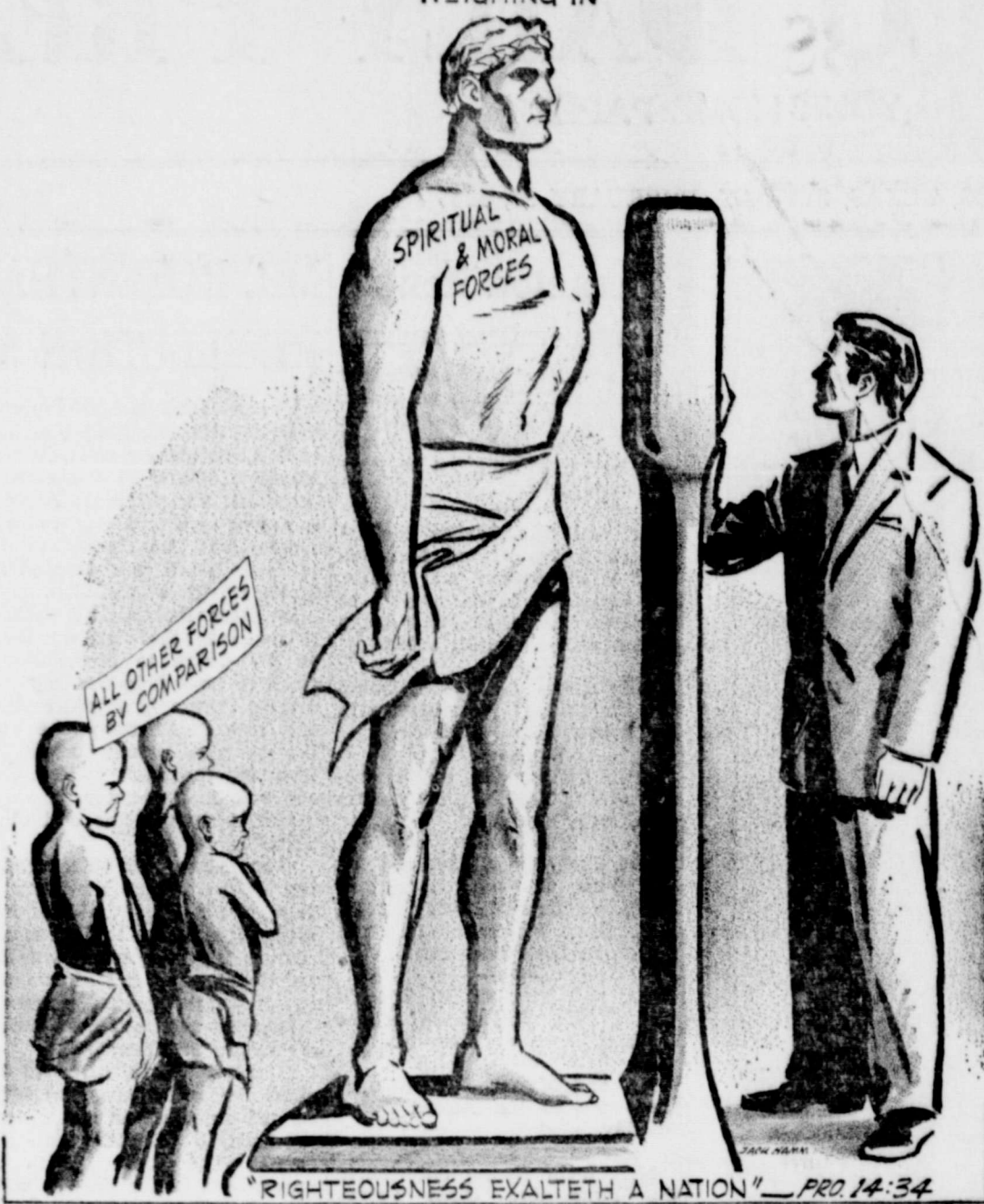

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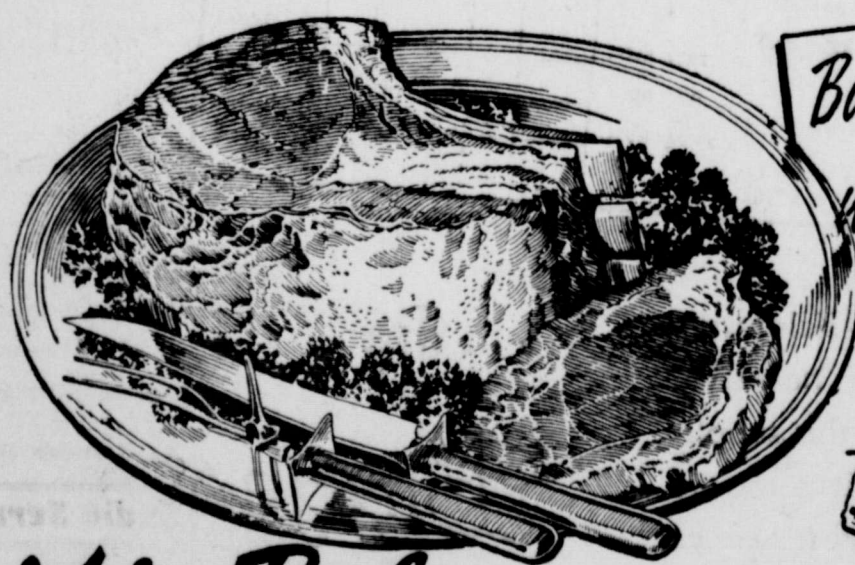

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BEEF BRIEFS

DALLAS, Feb. 22. — Miss Louise Garrett, a Pittsburg, Texas, home economist, was named winner of the \$100 Grand Prize in the Texas Beef Council's "Texas Experts" Recipe Contest here yesterday.

Miss Bobby L. Hughes, Woman's Director of the Council, made the announcement following the day-long judging session, in which the 25 recipes qualified for the finals were actually cooked, tested and tasted by a panel of food experts.

Emphasis was on economy beef throughout the day, as most of the winners featured ways of serving fine-flavored dishes with the less expensive cuts. The statewide contest was open only to graduate home economists or dietitians.

Miss Garrett's winning entry was a beef brisket recipe, calling

for cooking the beef in bay leaf and other seasonings, and serving it in a delicious horseradish sauce. The winners were selected by the six-member judging panel on the basis of originality, economy, taste and appearance, clarity of format, simplicity, and availability of ingredients.

Miss Garrett's entry led a starting field of 251 recipes submitted. These had been reduced to 25 finalists by previous conference of the judging group.

Second prize of \$50 went to Miss Aline McKenzie, Chairman of the Home Economics Department of Texas A & I College, Kingsville, for her recipe for "Apricot Steak"; third prize of \$25 was awarded to Miss Ruth J. Cooper, Consultant Home Economist of Dallas, for a "Texas Goulash" recipe; and \$5 honorable mentions were made to the following: Jean Lucille Lowder, Houston, for "Prunecot Brisket"; Mrs. Kathryn Smith, Home Service Advisor, Gulf States Utilities, Port Arthur, for her "Sportsman's Grelard"; Miss Marthe Ritter, Division Home Economist for Lone Star Gas Co., Abilene, for "Special Texas Burgers"; Mrs. Robert Stevenson, College Station, for her "Pepper Steak of Beef"; and Mrs. Charlotte G. Chester, Consultant Dietitian of the Chester Clinic & Hospital, Dallas, for her "Barbecue Burger Mix."

"The panel of judges, experts in their own right, represented every key, professional food association in the state," Miss Hughes stated.

"And, to our knowledge, this is the first time in Texas history that such a galaxy of food authorities has ever served together on the same contest panel."

Brisket Of Beef
Entered by Miss Louise Garrett, home economist of Pittsburg Texas.

4 to 5 lb. brisket of beef
2 medium onions, sliced
1 bay leaf
5 carrots
Salt and pepper
boiling water
1 stalk celery

Place the meat in a heavy kettle, add seasonings, vegetables, and enough boiling water to cover. Bring to a boiling point and reduce heat. Cook slowly until tender or 3 - 4 hours. Remove meat from broth, slice and serve in Horseradish Sauce.

Horseradish Sauce
1 large onion, chopped fine
4 T. butter or margarine
2 T. flour
2 c. soup stock
1 c. fresh horseradish
1 c. vinegar
2 cloves
2 bay leaves
1 t. salt
pepper
½ c. granulated sugar

Saute onion in butter or margarine until brown. Add flour and soup stock gradually, then add remaining ingredients. Boil 10 minutes. Heat the sliced meat in the sauce. Serve with minced parsley sprinkled on top.

GOLDEN-CRUST OVEN-FRIED CHICKEN

For one of the tastiest and most easily digested fried chicken dinners you can prepare, try this recipe for "fried" chicken that actually is baked. The pieces of chicken are coated for frying, but instead of being placed in deep fat, they are dipped in margarine and baked in the oven.

(5-6 Servings)
1 3-pound frying chicken, cut up
1 cup sifted flour
1 teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
½ to ¾ cup margarine

Mix flour, salt, and pepper. Roll pieces of chicken in flour mixture. Melt margarine in saucepan. Dip pieces of floured chicken in margarine, coating all sides. Lay chicken in single layer in baking pan 1½ to 2 inches deep. Bake uncovered in moderate oven (375° F.) 45 minutes to 1-hour, until meat can be pierced easily with fork but not until meat falls from bones. Spoon or brush melted margarine over chicken 3 or 4 times during cooking. When chicken is done, remove from pan to hot platter. Keep hot while making gravy. Measure 6 tablespoons of the margarine from the baking pans into saucepan and add 6 tablespoons flour. Stir until smooth. Gradually add 3 cups milk, stirring constantly. Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Produce the body!
That in effect is what a writ of "habeas corpus" demands of a sheriff or jailor. That means: Bring the prisoner to court on a valid charge or turn him loose. Habeas corpus has long been a standby of the "who-done-it" writer, but it has been a standby for us and our liberties for a much longer time.

In old times, the king or tyrant could jail you on a whim, with no chance of a day in court. No one dared to question him.

In 1215 the English barons had taken all they could from King John. They demanded his written guarantee of their rights — the Magna Carta. Among their rights, they wanted the right to a day in court.

The English Petition of Rights asked for habeas corpus in 1628. It said, "no man should be put in jail or held without cause shown to which he may answer according to law."

The Habeas Corpus Act became law 51 years later.

Ours national Constitution says that "the privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in case of rebellion or invasion of the public safety may require it." Let's see how habeas corpus works.

Suppose a policeman arrests and puts you in jail. You have the right to be brought to court

for a hearing. In court the judge should tell you of the charges against you and your rights to counsel and a fair trial.

But what if you don't get a hearing in a reasonable time? Then somebody is unlawfully taking away your freedom. Consequently, your lawyer may go into court and get a writ of habeas corpus on your behalf.

The writ commands your jailor to "produce the body." Your jailor must show that he holds you lawfully or turn you loose. In court, the judge looks into the charge against you. He may hear witnesses. If he cannot find that you are held lawfully, he will order you turned loose. If he finds cause, you then can ask for reasonable bail.



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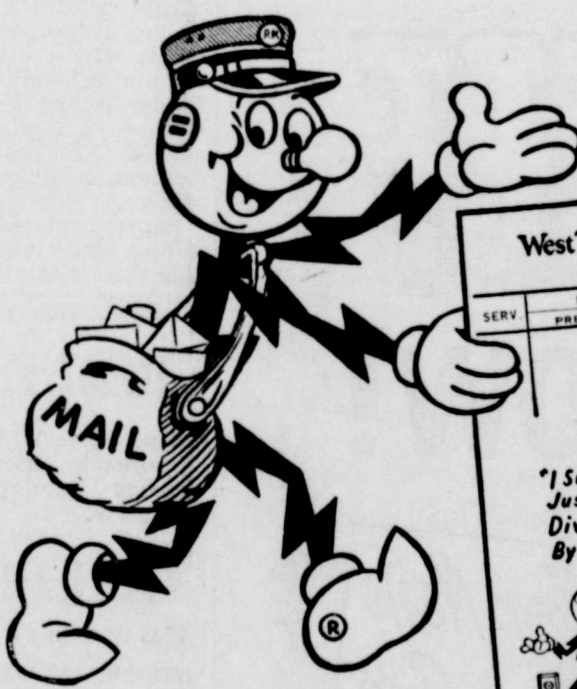
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
