Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty disclosed today that President Eisenhower, Lodge, Herbert Hoover Jr., acting secretary of state and Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Young AWOL Airmen Convicted In Slaying

GALLUP, N.M. (U)—A young AWOL airman was convicted yesterday of manslaughter in the slaying of a Texas trucker whose body was found under a bridge near here last April 7. James Hutchins, 25, Forest City, N.C., had contended throughout the trial that he shot Bruce Weibel, 32, in self defense after the Dallas man awoke from a nap in the back seat of a car, ordered Hutchins to pull off the road and started to strangle him. Weibel had picked up Hutchins, a hitchhiker.

The two men are charged in the nitroglycerine bombing death of Mrs. Weaver, a wealthy social leader. They are Harry Washburn, Houston contractor and a former son-in-law, and a Houston carpenter, Carl Heninger.

Stokes, Texas Ranger Ralph Robatsch, Sheriff Cecil Turner and Lee Brazier, police sergeant, conferred today.

Washburn's attorney, one of Texas' most skillful, said he had a job ahead for peculiar reasons. After visiting Washburn three hours in his Tom Green County jail cell yesterday, Percy Foreman of Houston said he found his client in good spirits, "which makes my job harder than ever."

Foreman said he wanted a preliminary hearing, today if possible, and moreover would get Washburn out of jail on bond one way or another.

But late yesterday Stokes and Foreman reached agreement on a tentative Feb. 9 date for a preliminary hearing, subject to their conference today with Judge Joe L. Mays of 51st District Court.

Foreman said he is not representing C. J. (Carl) Heninger, 37, the Houston cab driver turned carpenter who is charged as an accomplice. Heninger, unlike Washburn, has made a statement to authorities denying any part in the killing.

Repairs Begun On Basin At Water Plant

Repairs were under way this morning on leaks which have developed in the sedimentation basin of the city's new filtration plant. The south basin was drained over the weekend when a small stream of water was found pouring from the expansion joint, said City Manager H. W. Whitney. The north basin will be drained and checked after repairs are effected on the south side.

Whitney said that A. P. Kasch and Sons, contractors who built the new plant, should have the south basin repaired today. Reason for the leak has not been fully determined. It could have been caused by expansion or contraction of concrete in the basins or by shifting sand, it was explained.

Repairs Begun On Basin At Water Plant

The leaks found were in the expansion joint on the basin floor. The expansion joint is a space across the concrete walls and floors which is held together by copper sheathing shaped for expansion and filled in with a plastic substance resembling tar.

The huge basins are 120 by 80 feet in size, making such a joint necessary. Manager Whitney pointed out that the sedimentation basin is not being used now because the city is still distributing Martin County water.

Some water did come from the Colorado River Municipal Water District's Lake J. B. Thomas for a while, but pump failure developed at the CRMWD plant and Martin County well water had to be substituted.

Stevens States Need For Army

WASHINGTON (U)—Secretary of the Army Stevens stressed today when he termed the need to guard against "the problem of small wars."

Stevens named no specific "small war" danger area in testimony prepared for the House Armed Services Committee, and he said the Army is doing the best job it can with reduced manpower and funds.

Red Chinese Bid To Talks Asked

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (U)—Sir Leslie Knox Munro of New Zealand, president of the U.N. Security Council, proposed today that Red China be invited to send a representative here to take part in the debate on a Formosan cease-fire.

Munro made his proposal immediately after the Council refused to consider a Soviet demand that Nationalist China be barred from the debate.

The New Zealand diplomat suggested the Council suspend its discussions until the Chinese Communists can get a representative here.

He said U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold already had established contact with the Peking regime. Hammarskjold, he said, should urge the Communists to accept the invitation.

The Council ran into its first controversy when Soviet Delegate Arkady A. Sobolev tossed in his demand to bar the Chinese Nationalists.

The vote was 10-1, with only the Soviet Union voting to consider excluding Nationalist China.

There was speculation here that demand was made by Chief U.S. Delegate Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. and quickly drew support of the other big Western Powers.

The Western Powers thus won the first round test as the 11-nation council squared off to seek an end to the fighting between Chinese Nationalist and Communist forces.

President Eisenhower twice called for U.N. steps for a cease-fire last week but said on signing the resolution that the United States would defend any area from an attack threatening the United States and world security.

Commiss Shell Tachen Islands

TAIPEH, Formosa, (U)—Communist guns on recently-captured Yikiangshan belched in the direction of the tense Tachen tonight but the Chinese Nationalist Defense Ministry reported all the shells landed in the sea.

The combat-ready U.S. 7th fleet stood by for possible orders to evacuate the Tachen Islands, 200 miles north of Formosa and eight miles south of Yikiangshan, but the U.S. Navy boss in the Pacific said Sunday such orders had not yet been given.

The Tachens were fire-bombed by Red bombers Sunday. Tonight Communist guns hurled 22 shells toward the two offshore islands within 10 minutes.

The Defense Ministry reported all was quiet farther south in the Quemoy area.

The 7th Fleet needed only a "go ahead" to begin an evacuation of the Tachens.

However, Adm. Felix B. Stump, commander of the U. S. Pacific Fleet, said on a quick visit to this Chinese Nationalist capital yesterday that an evacuation had not been ordered.

Unconfirmed Chinese press reports said the garrison of 15,000 men was under Defense Ministry orders to prepare for a bitter stand if the Communists should attack before the evacuation takes place, as many observers here expect them to do.

As the belief grew that orders might come this week, the English-language China News said all preparations for the redeployment of Nationalist forces on certain offshore islands had been completed.

Mitchell County Gets Two Oil Well Completions On Weekend

Two completions were reported this weekend in Mitchell County. They are Wadley No. 2 C. A. Hardee and Wadley No. 1 McCarty and Smallwood, both in the North Coleman Ranch field.

Testing operations were under way at Tennessee No. 1 Fambrough, wildcat in Southwest Borden County, and at Sunray No. 1 Read, wildcat step-out to the Howard-Glascock field.

Borden

Tennessee No. 1 Fambrough, 600 from north and 2,300 from east lines, 18-24-in. T&P survey, swabbed 24 hours Saturday and made 122 barrels of load oil. Another 24-hour swabbing period ending at 7 a.m. today yielded 20 barrels of fluid. There was no report as to type of fluid, but it is known that 3,070 feet of salt water was recovered. Operator is still testing.

Howard

Gulf No. 1 Read, 467 from north and east lines, 7-25-H&TC survey, bored to 7,877 feet. Operator is swabbing to clean out and test. This is a Sara-Mag field venture.

Mitchell

J. K. Wadley No. 2 C. A. Hardee, 990 from north and east lines, 55-97-H&TC survey, has been finished for a 24-hour pumping potential of 30.20 barrels of oil plus five per cent water. Gas-oil ratio was too small to measure, and the gravity was 28 degrees. Total depth is 3,110 feet, and the 5 1/2-inch casing goes down to 3,080.

Wadley

Wadley No. 1 McCarty and Smallwood, 330 from south and west lines, 96-97-H&TC survey, finished in the North Coleman Ranch field for a 24-hour potential of 166 barrels of oil and two per cent water. Gravity was 28 degrees, and the gas-oil ratio was too small to measure. Total depth is 3,111 feet, and the 5 1/2-inch string goes down to 3,058. Operator treated open hole with 10,500 gallons. This venture is on the Mitchell-Scurry County lines.

Scurry

Sun No. 1 Hudnall, C NE NE, 27-3-H&TC survey, bored to 8,341 feet in shale.

Sterling

Sunray No. 1 Reed, 372 from north and 1,011 from east lines, 372-20-W&NW survey, treated perforations from 3,078 to 3,088 feet with 1,000 gallons of acid. The swabbing operations yielded from two to three barrels of fluid per hour which had a gum of oil. About one and a half barrels of the hourly recovery was salt water. This is a wildcat step-out to the Howard-Glascock field.

Coke

Superior No. 1 Wotjek has a total depth of 4,955 feet in lime and shale. Top of the Canyon sand is 4,866 feet, and the seven-inch casing is bottomed at 4,955 feet. Operator is preparing to perforate and test.

Howard

Shell No. 1 N. H. Read et al, wildcat about four miles northeast of Coahoma, is making hole at 6,014 feet in lime. Drilled to 2,011 from north and 1,980 from east lines, 19-30-in. T&P survey.

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Placement Of Workers Up, TEC Reports

January was a busy month at the Texas Employment Commission office, according to Leon Kinney, manager. The office placed 146 persons in positions during the month, an increase of 33 over the same period last year.

Kinney said 140 of the placements were in non-agricultural positions and six of them were on farm jobs. The highest number of fields was in wholesale-retail trade. There were 51 placements this year and only 29 in 1954.

Other fields where persons were placed were mining, 8; contract work, 20; public utilities, 8; insurance and finance, 4; service, 20; household, 29; and government jobs, 2.

Approximately 125 persons filed 547 unemployment compensation claims during the month, the manager said. And 228 new work applications were received by the office during the month.

Kinney attributed the increase in placements to the fact that there is more business this year. And he said, the TEC office has more employees this year and is more able to assist persons seeking employment.

At the end of the past year it had 39 loans outstanding in the amount of \$11,961.

Mystery Girl Enters Case

NEW YORK (AP)—A mysterious girl, dressed in brown, reportedly seen wandering about Serge Rubinstein's lavish home some hours before he was murdered.

Both Rubinstein's mother and aunt told of seeing the girl, police disclosed yesterday, but so far they have turned up no hint as to who she might be.

Today's investigation of the four-day murder will include questioning of Lee Brooks, a dealer in Canadian securities, police said. Brooks had clashed with the slain draft dodger in a complex oil deal, police reported. In 1947 Brooks was questioned about the unexplained murder of businessman Albert E. Langford.

While police have been following up all possible angles of Rubinstein's social and business life, the body has been on view for two days at a Manhattan funeral home. He is to be buried today after Jewish funeral services.

County Lags In Car Check

Howard, Glascock and Midland counties trail in this area in the number of automobiles receiving their 1955 safety inspections. O. L. Birchfield, supervising inspector for the Department of Public Safety, reported today.

Only 23 per cent of the 16,768 vehicles in Howard County have been inspected. Birchfield said also that only 23 per cent of Midland County's 24,004 motor vehicles have received the inspections.

Glascock County is far down the list. Only 8.7 per cent of the 573 vehicles in the county have been inspected.

Borden County, which registered 530 cars and trucks, has no inspection stations. Consequently, no report was available as to the number of inspections.

Martin County was slightly ahead of Howard and Midland. Birchfield said 25.6 per cent of the 3,088 Martin vehicles have received their inspections.

In Dawson County, 25.2 per cent of the county's 8,361 vehicles have been checked.

Ector County, with the most vehicles in the area, also leads in the number inspected. According to the state inspector, 30 per cent of the 34,081 Ector cars and trucks have received the safety checks.

The number of inspections reported for the various counties include Ector, 10,241; Midland, 6,339; Howard, 3,869; Dawson, 2,111; Martin, 875; Glascock, 49; and Borden, no report.

The inspections made thus far show that 34 per cent of cars need headlight adjustments and 12 per cent need brake adjustments, Birchfield said.

Among the latest reported killed: Two Corpus Christi Naval Air Station ensigns were killed and two others seriously hurt Sunday in a head-on collision witnessed by Police Chief Dick Runyan. Dead were Robert Sheldon, 25, El Segundo, Calif., and John Broadfoot, 24, Short Hills.

R. B. O'Bannon, 53, grocer at Kirbyville in East Texas, was found shot to death in his car Sunday, shortly after retrieving a gun he had lent to a neighbor. Suicide was ruled.

Edward Murray, 60, and Manuel Fonseca, 35, both of Mercedes, were killed Saturday night in a 3-car crash on crowded Highway 80.

Mrs. W. O. Pearson, about 40, Mission, president of the Hidalgo County Tuberculosis Assn. last year and a prominent civic worker, was killed Saturday night in a 2-car collision a mile east of Mission.

A Houston car salesman was crushed to death Sunday when his grandchild touched an auto accelerator. John Welch, 48, had left his car idling in the driveway of his home while he opened the garage door. John Russell, 2, touched the accelerator.

Mrs. Pinkie Collins, 28, was found shot to death Sunday in her Houston apartment. A man, 34, said his revolver went off while it was being unloaded.

Three small children burned to death at San Antonio Saturday when flames destroyed their two-room home while the father was at work and the mother was visiting a nearby relative. Dead were Inna Boston, 4; Russell Boston Jr., 3, and Clarence Boston, 1.

Connie Castelow, 65, burned to death at Orange Sunday when he was trapped by an explosion of kerosene stove in his one-room house.

Baylor Day Is Set

AUSTIN (AP)—Gov. Shivers designated Feb. 1 today as Baylor Day in recognition of the issuance of a charter to the Baptist university Feb. 1, 1845, by the Republic of Texas. Shivers' memorandum noted that Baylor has become one of America's outstanding educational institutions, the largest Baptist school in the world.

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Hearings Begun On Civil Cases

Hearings were started in 118th District Court on non-jury civil cases which were set for trial during the week.

Judge Charlie Sullivan set 18 cases for trial this week, two for Feb. 2 and another for Feb. 4. The judge advised attorneys to file written motions in cases not ready for trial. Otherwise, non-appearance will result in dismissal of a case, he warned.

Sinclair To Pay More

WELLSVILLE, N.Y. (AP)—The Sinclair Refining Co. said today it would increase by 15 cents a barrel the price it pays for Pennsylvania Grade crude oil. Sinclair's price will be \$3.50 a barrel, the same as all other major purchasers in the Bradford-Allegheny area.

Benson States Cotton Exports To Rise 20 Per Cent This Year

HOUSTON (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Benson said today cotton exports this year are expected to increase about 20 per cent.

Benson said the Agricultural Trade Development and Assistance Act is providing real help in moving American farm commodities abroad.

"Altogether, we anticipate sales of about 500,000 bales of cotton in exchange for foreign currencies under this program," Benson told the National Cotton Council.

President A. L. Durand of Hobart, Okla., said the synthetic fiber industry has been stunted by the comeback cotton has made in recent years.

Benson said procurement authorizations covering the sale of 50,000 bales of cotton to Yugoslavia have already been issued.

"Within a few days, similar orders will be written involving 175,000 bales for Japan," he said. Negotiations are continuing with several other countries for additional sales of about 275,000 bales.

The sales, he said, will be over and above normal commercial transactions. Currencies received, he explained, will be spent in the various foreign countries to develop and build further markets for cotton and other American farm products.

Congress last year authorized a \$-year distribution of \$1 billion in surplus farm products held by the Commodity Credit Corp. The bill permits \$700 million to be sold for foreign currencies, the remainder to be donated for relief and assistance.

Foreign currencies acquired must be used for specified purposes, including development of new markets and financing of purchases for friendly countries.

Benson said foreign trade is important but that the domestic cotton market is of even greater significance.

He said America urgently needs expanded consumption today, that

the long-term solution lies in increased efficiency and improved techniques which stem from research and education.

"Controls are at the best a stop-gap remedy," he said. "We must never permit them to distract our attention from the long-term solution."

Benson said cotton acreage allotments, as they now stand, are in accord with the law and were approved by 92 per cent of the cotton

producers who voted in December. "Therefore, we have not accepted the suggestion that acreages be increased," he said.

"We expect a cotton carry-over of 9,800,000 bales, which is above last year and considerably in excess of a full year's domestic requirement."

"Despite production controls, we are actually increasing the carry-over this year."

LED ADVENTUROUS LIFE

Capt. Roy Aldrich, 85, Veteran Ranger, Dies

AUSTIN (AP)—Capt. Roy Aldrich will be buried tomorrow but his deeds will live long among those who love high adventure.

He was a soldier of fortune, a gold miner, a self-educated scholar, a botanist, an historian, a Texas Ranger longer than anyone else.

In his younger days he roamed the hemisphere and beyond in search of adventure.

Son of a Missouri banker, Aldrich went as a youth to Arizona and worked as a miner and lumberjack. Then he went south of the border to work on a Mexican coffee plantation. He showed up near Enid, Okla., in the Cherokee Strip days as a horse trader, then back in Arizona, as a gold miner near Bisbee.

He fought with the 2nd Missouri Volunteers in the Spanish-American War. This took him to Cuba and the Philippines. After that he joined the British in the Boer War in South Africa.

A comparatively peaceful period followed. He served five years as sheriff of Kiowa County, Okla., and even joined his brother in the real estate business at Corpus Christi. That must have become monotonous.

About ten years after 1900, border bandits began raising Cain along the Rio Grande. Aldrich joined the Texas Rangers, and patrolled the turbulent border country on horseback from El Paso to Brownsville. He was with Co. A, headquartered at Rio Grande City.

A worse trouble spot brought Aldrich farther north in the 1920s. Big-time gamblers and hoodlums had moved into the booming Ranger and Mexico oil fields. Towns were running wide open. Aldrich led raiding parties of Rangers. In one hotel raid they arrested 58 people.

Once he and another Ranger stuffed more than three million dollars in state-owned securities in suitcases, climbed on a train, and delivered it a few days later to a St. Louis bank. That saved Texas a whopping express insurance fee.

Services will be at 3 p.m. tomorrow with burial in nearby Oakwood Cemetery.

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Sen. Jenner Asks Curb On Red Pals WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Jenner (R-Ind.) said today some means must be found to curb the activities of some American citizens whom he accused of spreading Communist propaganda after returning from Red China.

"They must not be allowed to aid an enemy of the United States abroad and then return to the United States and enjoy freedoms and privileges for which other Americans fought," he said. "At the very least, they should be required to register as foreign agents."

Morse Says Solons Feared Resolution DENVER (AP)—A majority of senators were "privately opposed" to President Eisenhower's proposed resolution in the opinion of Sen. Wayne Morse (Ind-Ore).

Morse, one of three senators who voted against the resolution, told a press conference yesterday: "The majority of senators unquestionably regretted the resolution that was before them. Had they been asked about it privately, the majority would have said no."

Morse termed the resolution "a complete surrender to the preventive war theory of one Adm. (Arthur) Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff."

Commonwealth Meet Is Opened In London

By SEYMOUR TOPPING

LONDON (AP)—The prime ministers of the British Commonwealth met in London today amid grave war fears and plunged straight into talks aimed at helping to end the Formosa fighting.

The China coast crisis topped the agenda at the opening of the 10-day parley of eight prime ministers and one deputy premier.

Other topics were shored into

the background as Prime Minister Churchill worked to muster the influence of the Commonwealth behind today's move in the United Nations Security Council for a China cease-fire.

On hand for the closed-door meetings with Churchill at his official 10 Downing St. residence were:

Prime Ministers Nehru of India; Louis St. Laurent, Canada; Robert G. Menzies, Australia; Sydney Holland, New Zealand; Mohammed Ali, Pakistan; Sir John Kotelawala, Ceylon; Sir Godfrey Huggins, New Central African Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland; and Deputy Premier Charles R. Swart, South Africa.

The premiers' first plenary meeting was scheduled after a busy morning of contacts on the Formosa situation among the conferees and members of Churchill's government. Before the opening session, Churchill was briefed on the latest Formosa developments by Foreign Secretary Sir Anthony Eden at a Cabinet meeting.

Diplomatic informants said Churchill and Eden already have appealed to Nehru to use his influence with Red Chinese Premier Chou En-lai on behalf of the U. N. mediation effort.

Nehru, leader of the Asian neutralist bloc and logical East-West go-between, recently visited Red China and has frequent contacts with Peking's leaders. The Indian Premier was reported dubious that the Chinese Reds would attend Security Council meetings on a cease-fire or that U. N. mediation could succeed at this stage.

Nehru's view has prompted some of the premiers to think about the prospects for an approach to Peking outside the U. N. But British informants said Eden had not given up hope Red China would at least send delegates to participate in the Security Council hearings.

Ambush Blamed In Three Deaths

MOUNT PLEASANT, Tenn. (AP)—Charred evidence indicated today Mr. and Mrs. Dudley Moore and their guest walked one at a time into a dead-shot ambush Saturday night.

Each had bullet holes in the face or head. The three bodies were sprawled in the charred living room of the Moores' home, a scant two steps from the front door. Police said the motive probably was robbery.

As police chief Clare McAfee figured it, this much could be assumed: First came the guest, a jovial bachelor farmer, James Cooper, 47, who customarily watched wrestling on television with the Moores on Saturday nights.

He arrived at Moore's hardware store a little before closing time and then went on to the house to wait for the Moores there.

About 45 minutes later Moore drove up, let his wife out at the front door, then put his pickup truck in the garage at the rear while she went in.

A little later some boys saw flames flickering inside and notified the fire department. Firemen put out the blaze but did not know anyone was in the house until they forced open the front door and stumbled over the bodies.

Moore, 56, had two pistol bullet holes — apparently of .32-caliber size — in his head, and Mrs. Moore, 53, and Cooper each had one. All had on outdoor clothing.

A coroner's jury said they were murdered. Police found no pistol, no stray bullets, no bloodstains. Fire Chief J. E. Hardison said there was no evidence of arson. "But to catch as fast as it did, it had to be set."

After a check of the store's receipts, Homer Copeland, assistant police chief, said the Moores probably were carrying \$500 to \$600.

GI Falls 1,000 Feet With 'Chute Unopened, Lives

ELMENDORF AIR FORCE BASE, Alaska (AP)—Pvt. Stanley Melczak's parachute failed to open and he fell 1,000 feet — without breaking a bone.

He landed hard on his back in deep snow.

The 20-year-old paratrooper with the 11th Airborne Division was reported recovering at the Ft. Richardson hospital today.

Melczak, of Pittsburgh, Pa., jumped with other paratroopers over Talmatna during the Operation Snowbird maneuver Saturday. From his hospital bed, he said today he didn't realize his main 'chute had failed to open until he was too close to the ground.

He yanked open his reserve 'chute but he said it began to unfold only a "breath" before he hit in 38 inches of snow.

Doctors found no broken bones but said Melczak apparently suffered internal injuries.

Keep An Eye Out For Industry

The second annual West Texas Industrial Conference sponsored by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in Abilene last Thursday drew some 130 managers of smaller-town chambers of commerce who heard 11 experts in industrial development tell how to attract new industries and explain the various steps required to get them.

A roundtable discussion went into clinical details. An obvious pitfall was pointed out: communities going after types of industry for which they do not have proper resources and advantages. But in spite of West Texas' unfavorable situation with respect to freight rates, low rainfall and overpresent water problems which militate against several types of heavy industry, there is a broad field which the region can draw upon in developing a variegated industrial economy.

It is a multitude of small industries of many kinds that West Texas may find its best line of approach toward creating job opportunities for the tens of thousands of people heading this way.

We might as well face the fact that our two principal props, agriculture and the

petroleum industry, can give employment to only so many people, and when either falls on evil days it affects profoundly our general economy. The trend in agriculture is toward fewer and fewer workers as mechanization progresses, and adverse federal legislation, such as repeal of reduction of the depreciation allowance plus failure to place some sort of checkrein on foreign imports, could work havoc with the oil industry. So much of our state tax revenues come from that source that any serious setback would immediately be reflected in all phases of our economy.

Also, the advancing atomic age is a real threat to the future of any economy based primarily on oil and the tax revenue it produces.

So West Texas should intensify the drive for industrial enterprises of all sorts, and these annual conferences sponsored by the WTCC are of primary importance to every community in the territory.

Every community should pause long enough to take stock of its industrial potential, and map out a continuing program looking to steady development.

Stronger Place At Bargain Table

While the U.S. Senate approved the issue of granting full power to President Eisenhower in the military phases of the Formosa crisis, the rest of the diplomatic world was pretty well astir with plans designed to produce a cease fire between Red and Nationalist China.

Reputedly with approval of the U.S. State Department, British Ambassador Hayter in Moscow talked for 30 minutes with V. M. Molotov. In an effort to induce Russia to intercede with Red China to moderate its attitude and also to gain Russia's support of a United Nations effort to bring about a cease fire.

Anthony Eden of Great Britain was carrying the ball on this. He has a plan. Pandit Nehru of India would be the go-between, his specific chore being to persuade Red China to cooperate. Before leaving New Delhi Thursday night for a London conference of Empire prime ministers, Nehru held a conference with the Red China ambassador to India, and on arrival in London was to confer with Eden.

Eden's plan, boiled down, seeks these objectives: To get both Chinas to agree

to a cease fire, without prejudice to their rival claims on Formosa; to induce Chiang to withdraw his troops from all China's coastal islands; to get a pledge from Red China not to attack Formosa or the Pescadores pending eventual peaceful settlement of the issue; fresh consideration by Western Powers of Red China's bid for U.N. membership.

This is certainly a mouthful, but on the theory that it is better to negotiate than to shoot, something may come of it all. The first something would be a conference in Geneva between U.S. representatives on one side and Red China's on the other, with the U.N. secretary-general, Dag Hammarskjöld acting as referee, for the release of American prisoners held by the Communists in China.

These more or less behind-the-scenes maneuvers may explain why President Eisenhower asked Congress for a free hand in Formosa. By convincing the Communists that we mean business in Formosa, and not monkeybusiness either, we would occupy a stronger bargaining position in the prospective negotiations revolving around Eden's plan.

George Sokolsky About Ghostwriters And Censors

Some weeks ago, Harrison Smith, associate editor of "The Saturday Review," quarreled publicly with the Library of Congress, because:

"My pleasure gave way to amazement and anger, however, when I received this week a script in which what I was to say in the discussion was all written out — by someone else — and without my having been consulted at all. I was invited to add or alter."

It is announced subsequently that Mr. Smith made his peace with the Library of Congress because he realized that the limitations of radio time or something of the sort required an avoidance of repetition of the same material by different speakers. I heard that one about 20 years ago.

I am sometimes asked to speak on "un-rehearsed" programs on radio or television; you know, those so-called debates. If I say "yes," shortly before the occasion, a request comes for a copy of the opening statement. To this my office replies routinely that I shall have no copy. A hassle ensues and I provide no copy. If the sponsor, advertisers, radio stations and FCC require an advance copy, they can do the appearing.

If the inviter still keeps me on the pro-

gram, another dodge is tried: Will all the guest speakers come to the studio about an hour and a half before time to talk things over? One shindig even provided a meal. This talking things over is a rehearsal and the subtle idea is that if a speaker is to foul their rules, they will know in advance how to handle him. For television shows, the dodge exists that makeup time is necessary, this consists of smearing your face with pancake makeup and painting your eyebrows, if necessary. This operation takes a minute or two.

Now along comes tape, a process that is so wonderful that any part of the tape can be cut away and the rest of it pasted together and no one can tell the difference. The censors can get their dirty work in and no one would be the wiser, except the poor devil who submitted to the treatment if he is willing to listen to his own voice.

It is astonishing how many speeches that we hear are written by others than those who speak them. If men are made great by the words they utter, the ghostwriters should hold high office. In my younger days, when the wolf bayed at the door, I used to ghost-write. I would be dishonored to tell who my clients were, but there were those who rose to fame and fortune on my words, some of which, I am sure, they did not quite understand even after they rose to fame and fortune. The speech-writing mill of any candidate for the presidency these days is a disgraceful shop, the employees of which usually determine in advance what the candidate ought to say. The most successful ghostwriters of our time are Robert Sherwood and Sam Rosenman who did remarkably well by their principal.

It is too bad that Harrison Smith made his peace with the Library of Congress. The issue was Sinclair Lewis about whom Smith knows much and most others too little. Red Lewis was a famous writer, now unfortunately not too remembered. Smith telegraphed the Library of Congress:

"When I accepted your invitation to participate in a discussion of Sinclair Lewis and 'Main Street,' I assumed you expected me to speak my own words. I decline to deliver words written by some one else on any subject, much less one I know so well as I do this one. Editing some one else's script is not the answer."

I wish he had stuck to that. They could have found someone else to talk on Lewis, maybe someone who never knew him and never read "Main Street" and therefore could be wholly objective. As objectivity and not knowledge is the current measure of correctness, to say nothing of scholarship, the less one knows, the more nearly his position is likely to conform to the moderation which is now so popular. Sinclair Lewis lacked the quality of moderation in his private life as in his novels. Had he received a script from the Library of Congress, he probably would have eaten the script and spewed it on the steps of the Library, with reporters present

James Marlow Ike, Like Truman, Wants U.N. Cease Fire

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower follows President Truman in wanting the United Nations to settle the Formosa problem. Once again the U. N. tackles the case. The story begins to look like a rerun of an old picture.

And if the Red Chinese repeat themselves, as they have so far, they will demand a seat in the U. N. as the price of a Formosa cease fire. This time their chances look better.

Truman was so fed up with the failures of Chiang Kai-shek and his Nationalists that, when the Reds routed them to Formosa in late 1949, he said on Jan. 5, 1950, the United States would not — "at this time" — defend Formosa from the Reds.

The phrase "at this time" would let him intervene if the United States got involved in Asia later. It did on June 25, 1950, when the North Korean Reds invaded South Korea. Truman ordered the 7th Fleet to defend Formosa.

Truman said he did it to prevent spread of Asian fighting. It was not a permanent solution for Formosa. Truman said a solution would wait upon the restoration of peace or consideration by the U. N.

Chou En-lai, Red Chinese foreign minister, responded at once. He defied Truman, said the Reds would "liberate" Formosa. On Aug. 24 he sent a note to the U. N. charging the United States with aggression against Formosa.

The United States said it would welcome U. N. discussion. The world organization asked the Red Chinese to send a delegation to U. N. headquarters in New York. At first Chou rejected the offer, said Formosa was no concern of the U. N.

Soon he changed his mind, sent a delegation. It arrived in November 1950. By then, since it had jumped into the Korean War, Red China was in poor shape to convince anyone the United States was an aggressor in Formosa.

Russia, however, had backed up her Chinese ally by calling the United States an aggressor in Formosa. On Dec. 22, 1950, Chou laid down his terms for a cease fire in Korea: a seat in the U. N. for Red China, plus withdrawal of American forces from Korea and Formosa.

Now the picture is being rerun. Two weeks ago Eisenhower suggested the U. N. try to work out a cease fire in the Formosa area. Chou responded at once. Just

as he had defied Truman, he defied Eisenhower, vowed to take Formosa, and said the Formosan problem was no business of the U. N.

Nevertheless, the U. N. Security Council arranged to discuss today a cease fire around Formosa. And yesterday, just as it had before, Russia called the United States

an aggressor against Formosa. The Red Chinese haven't been invited to send a delegation to the U. N. yet but probably will be. After more talk of not wanting U. N. intervention, Chou no doubt will send a delegation. If he repeats himself, he will demand a U. N. seat as the price of a cease fire.

Hal Boyle Old Sergeant Keeps Army Ways

NEW YORK (AP)—You can take an old sergeant out of the Army, but you can't take the old Army out of a sergeant.

It's that way with Marty Maher, who retired in 1946 after 50 years at West Point. One of the best loved men in the history of the Military Academy, at 78 the white-haired old sergeant still goes back every day except Sunday to visit "The Point."

"I must go around seeing my friends who know me well," said Marty. "A man must keep in touch with his friends."

"There is no man ever lived enjoyed himself as much as I did there and I'm still having the tang of my life. Working with the boys so long has kept me young."

Marty admits "I was a wild boy myself when I came here from Tipperary." That was in 1896, he was only 20, and his first job at West Point was as a mess hall waiter.

"I got \$13 a month pay—with breakage taken out," he recalled. "And one day I fell with my arms full of dishes and it cost me a couple months pay."

"As soon as I could I enlisted, because I liked the brass buttons very much."

Thirty years later he retired as a sergeant, but merely went home and changed his clothes and came right back as civilian superintendent of the West Point gym. That was in 1928. When he finally retired in 1946, the Cadets paraded before him in special review and gave him a gold watch. Marty's blue eyes still get misty when he talks of that day.

Over the decades Marty and his wife, who reared no children of their own, became father and

mother confessor to the Cadet Corps, helped hundreds of future colonels and generals to iron out their youthful troubles.

Marty remembers when cadet Douglas MacArthur, ordered to do knee bends during a hazing, resolutely kept at it without complaint until he fainted; when cadet Omar Nelson Bradley could throw a ball from anywhere in left field unerringly to home plate; when cadet Mark Clark was nicknamed "Contra-band" because of his success in smuggling food tidbits into the barracks; and when "I told the only lie in my life" to cadet Dwight D. Eisenhower.

"He had hurt his knee in football and I took care of it for him," said Marty. "I told him the knee would be all right in two or three weeks, but I knew it wouldn't. He won his 'A' but he never got to play again."

Japanese Consider Offer By Russians

TOKYO (AP) — With Formosa holding the world spotlight, Russia over the weekend offered to discuss resumption of normal relations with Japan, and the Japanese government cautiously considered the idea.

"I want the Soviet Union to declare first the state of war existing with Japan is ended, after which we can advance talk of normalizing relations," said Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoyama.

Suits are being stream-lined with natural shoulders, narrow lapels and tapered legs. Even headpieces have been given the slim look.

Some experts insist the 'new look' came about because modern man is always in a hurry, that he needed to rid himself of as much weight as possible.

Consequently, they point out, using ma-

terials are now down to about 11 ounces a square yard in place of the 15 ounces a few years ago.

Modern heating systems found in the home and offices helped stream-line the bulky clothes, too. Heavier clothes are no longer needed in an era of central heating and for short trips from home to office.

The use of synthetics in clothes are a boon to the industry, of course. Addition of the synthetics to natural fibers gives bulk without weight, increases crease retention, and wrinkle resistance, adds strength and greater durability.

Even tweeds, originally designed for much colder climates than Texas generally has, have yielded weight in the dressing up process. Their weight has been cut up to 20 per cent and even silk has been added to give a smoother, more elegant look.

Political Playback Fewer Women In The Legislature

January, 1955, had records cut out for it, marking the fewest women in legislative and state offices in three decades, and marking the 30th anniversary of their greatest advance in state affairs.

Elected to the 1955 Legislature were one woman senator and two House members, the smallest feminine delegation in the House in about 15 years.

By contract, the only woman elected governor of Texas took office for her first term in January, 1955. Governor Miriam A. Ferguson also appointed the first woman secretary of state, Mrs. S. W. Meharg.

Outgoing Gov. Pat M. Neff recognized the swing to women in office, and a few days before his term ended, when he was called on to appoint an entire special Supreme Court, he named the state's only all-woman court.

This special Supreme Court was made up of three women lawyers, Mrs. Hortense Ward, chief justice; Miss Ruth Brazill and Miss Hattie L. Hemenberg, associate justices.

It was in a case affecting the Woodmen of the World fraternal order. All three members of the regular court were members of the WOW, so they disqualified themselves, and under the procedure then followed, the governor appointed special judges to hear the one case.

The voluntary retirement of Presiding Judge Harry N. Graves of Criminal Appeals Court, Jan. 1, 1955, was the only change made by the voters in the selective state official family.

At around 72 when he decided not to ask another term, Judge Graves was the "youngest" of the last three presiding judges of this court who had retired—Judges F. L. Hawkins and W. C. Morrow being the others.

This has been a reminder that the state has had a considerable number of upper bracket officials in the judiciary, the legislative and executive branches, serving on well up into the 70's several of them beyond 80.

Marquis Childs Formosa Defense Leaves Questions

WASHINGTON—Once President Eisenhower had put before Congress the resolution asking authority for American air and sea forces to defend Formosa, its swift and virtually unanimous acceptance would have been fatal to the effort to demonstrate American unity behind the resolve to hold not alone Formosa but those offshore islands essential to the defense of Formosa.

But while they may or may not register their doubts publicly at this point, some senators, both Republicans and Democrats, are distinctly unhappy over the abruptness with which the problem was dumped in the lap of Congress. This sudden action came when, as these same senators point out, it should have been apparent for months that American responsibility had to be more closely defined.

Nothing was done until Red China's attack on the Tachen Islands made a decision urgent. The Nationalists could not hold those islands without American support. Once the Communists launched their attack, the military commanders on the spot had to know how far their authority extended.

There also are grave doubts both in the Foreign Relations and the Armed Services Committees of the consequences of this step. While the President insisted it was a move for peace, some Senators feel it can lead to war of indefinite duration and of unforeseeable magnitude. These fears arise partly from the extent of the authority put in the hands of military men on the spot.

The attitude of top air and naval commanders is well known. They have talked in the recent past of the inevitability of a showdown and they want that showdown to come as quickly as possible. From the beginning of his tour of duty as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff on appointment by President Eisenhower, Adm. Arthur W. Radford has privately urged measures, including a naval blockade, for undermining the power of the Communist regime in China. He said that America should press such measures even though it might mean an undeclared war of 50 years' duration.

Only a few days before the President asked Congress to act, Radford returned from a swing around the Far East, which included a visit with Chiang Kai-shek on Formosa, and advocated publicly a blockade of China if all other measures for freeing the 11 American fliers should fail. Radford is believed to have been one of those most influential in determining the language of the message to Congress, with its broad scope and the inspired interpretation that it covers the islands of Quemoy

and Matsu immediately off the China coast.

But it can be stated with authority that when the Joint Chiefs testified before the Senators in closed session, Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, Chief of Staff of the Army, did not modify the view he has held from the beginning of the controversy over Chinese intervention. Ridgway reaffirmed his opinion that to permit American bombers to attack airports and points of concentration on the China mainland is to invite a full-scale Asian war in which American ground forces certainly will be involved sooner rather than later.

The senators who heard the Joint Chiefs on the President's resolution felt that Radford had finally had his way. In Radford's interpretation the military commanders in the Formosa Straits will have authority to determine what islands are vital to the defense of Formosa. Before the committee Ridgway was a lonely figure. Adm. Robert B. Carney, Chief of Naval Operations, sided with Twining and Radford.

Those senators who fear an incident, or a series of incidents, that will mean all-out war in Asia have a sense of helplessness before the present situation. They are asking questions for which there seem to be no definite answers. If, for example, there are American casualties as a result of American efforts to help the Nationalist Chinese evacuate the Tachen Islands, will American commanders then have the authority to bomb Chinese air bases and naval centers? And will such bombings not precipitate the kind of war that the President said so earnestly in his message he wishes to avoid?

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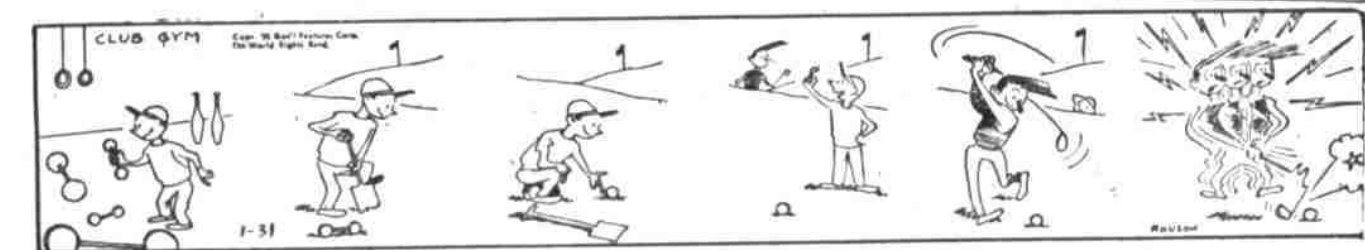
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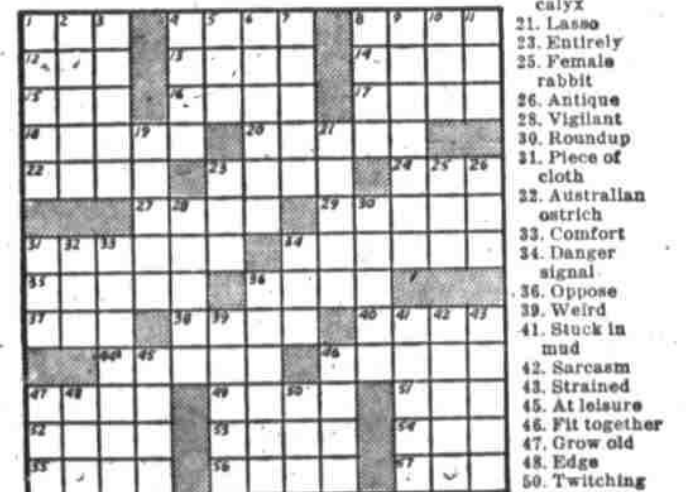

Financiers Inspect Route Set For Proposed Texas Toll Road

DALLAS (U)—A chartered airliner today flew a load of Yankee bankers along the route of what's scheduled to become the newest of Texas' boasts—the nation's longest toll road.

The visitors, 15 New York and Chicago men, represent some of the biggest money in the country; the kind that's needed in million-dollar chunks to build the 450-mile superhighway planned to run from the Texas-Oklahoma border to the Gulf Coast city of Corpus Christi.

Today the road was still on the drawing boards and the visitors saw only picturesque Texas scenery. But in two years, engineers say, they'll be ready to open the first section of the road, giving Dallas-to-Houston motorists 223 miles of four and six-lane divided pavement with no cross traffic, no

stop lights and a 70 m.p.h. speed limit all the way.

That first leg will cost around 140 million dollars, well over a half million per mile.

Other segments, running north from Dallas to the Oklahoma border and southwest along the Gulf of Mexico from Houston to Corpus Christi, will be comparable in cost.

Completion of those sections will make the turnpike the longest in the nation, engineers say. Longest at present is the New York State Thruway, running 427 miles from New York to Buffalo via Albany.

Engineers for the project are DeLeuw, Cather & Co. of Chicago, who handled work on the Oklahoma road and several of the Eastern projects.

John D. McCall, chief counsel for the Texas Turnpike Co., a private concern chartered in 1950 to

build the highway, calls the Chicago firm's plans a motorist's dream.

There'll be no sharp curves, no steep grades and limited access to the road from surrounding areas, McCall said. Present plans call for seven interchanges giving access to cities and towns along the Dallas-Houston leg.

Backers of the plan are mostly Texas oilmen who McCall says got into the company for investment purposes. When Texas laws ruled out the chance of profit from the venture, McCall says some of the leaders stuck around more or less as a hobby. R. L. Wheelock of Corsicana, W. L. Pickens of Dallas and H. H. Coffield of Rockdale—officers of the company—receive only their expenses for work on the road.

The turnpike will be financed on a 40-year basis with interest-bearing bonds, although backers say they expect the road to pay for itself in 24 to 26 years. When the highway is free of debt, it will be turned over to the state for free operation.

The Dallas area terminal of the road will be the junction with the Fort Worth-to-Dallas toll road planned by the Texas Turnpike Authority, a state agency. The two roads will come together near Arlington.

The road will be approximately parallel to U.S. Highway 75 from a point near Corsicana to Houston. Entry points planned include Midlothian, Waxahachie, Corsicana, Teague, Jewett, Madisonville, Huntsville and Conroe.



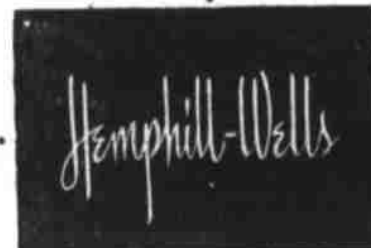

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UNCLE RAY'S CORNER



The "wind carriage" shown here was tested in Europe long before automobile pioneers started their work.

Before the time of the steam engine people used two forces to make machinery move. These were flowing water (which turned water wheels) and the wind. Thanks to the wind, people were able to pump water with windmills.

Another service of the wind was to make boats go. There were sailboats on the Nile River thousands of years past, and the ancient Egyptians used good-sized vessels to sail the sea.

Three centuries ago inventors in Europe tried to make "wind carriages." These had sails, and they moved across the land at certain times. Those times, came when the wind was strong in places where the ground was smooth enough for the wheels.

An invention of that kind was hardly practical. The amount of smooth ground was limited, and the vehicle was at the mercy of the wind. If the wind died down, the motion stopped. When the wind did blow, it was more than likely to blow in the wrong direction.

Something was needed in the nature of an engine. Steam engines of a weak kind were made by Denis Papin and others 250 years ago.

Memory Refresher Jolts Two Sailors

NORMAN, Okla. (U)—After getting into a brawl with a quartet of teen-age hoodlums, two sailors were asked to appear on an Oklahoma City television newscast.

Plane Crash-Lands On Farm In Illinois, None Of 41 Injured

COAL CITY, Ill. (U)—"I kept losing altitude and decided I would have to come down at the Joliet airport. Then I knew I wouldn't be able to make it. It was dark below, but I had no choice."

Thus Capt. Edward Kuhn, pilot, told of his decision to crash-land an airliner with 41 persons aboard into a farmer's bean field early yesterday. None of the five crew members or 36 passengers, all military personnel, were injured.

The Southeast Airlines' twin-engine C-46 was chartered to fly the 36 soldiers from Camp Kilmer, N.J., to Ft. Ord, Calif., and the Oakland, Calif., Army base.

Kuhn, 30, of Miami Springs, Fla., a former Air Force combat jet pilot, said the plane developed engine trouble near Bloomington, Ill., about 180 miles southwest of Chicago.

He turned back toward Chicago, he said, but with the one engine out he gradually lost altitude until he was down to 100 feet. He decided to belly-land, without wheels.

"All the odds are against you when you come down nowhere in the middle of the night like that," he said.

The plane skidded 500 feet to a safe stop in the snow. Damage to the craft was minor. The area is dotted with hills and rough strip mine fields.

South Korea Set To Begin Parleys

SEOUL (U)—South Korea is preparing to negotiate with the United States on administrative agreements covering the status of American forces stationed here, the Foreign Ministry said today. The ROK government said the agreements would give the ROKs the right to try off-duty and off-base U.S. military personnel in Korean courts.

Wide Waterways To Handle Runoff

Technicians of the Big Spring Office of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District have designed and laid out a terrace system with a wide waterway on the Morris Patterson farm southwest of Big Spring. The waterway is designed to take care of several hundred acres of outside water. Patterson believes this the best way to handle extra water and also the cheapest method. Waterways are calculated to reduce maintenance of the terraces on either side of the waterways. If a waterway was not installed then the size of all terraces might have to be increased to take care of the water, which would be costly and require frequent maintenance.

The Big Spring State Hospital is rebuilding terraces that were marked by the Soil Conservation Service technicians. Besides the terraces they are constructing a waterway for outside water. The work is being done by the Texas State Highway Department. Terrace lines have been run on the A. L. Clyburn farm east of Knott and these terraces have been built. V. L. Jones of Knott has put his small farm on the contour and is building some terraces. W. H. Forrest has completed his deep plowing that was approved by technicians. Soil of a pond site was checked for J. L. Mundell, who owns the Talbot farm south of Knott. No suitable soil was found. Echols brothers of Coahoma have completed a pond for livestock water.

Attention is called to all cooperators by the district supervisors that cover is needed in which to plant grass and that maize stubble is satisfactory providing there is sufficient height and volume left on the land. This land should not be listed or plowed, but left undisturbed at this time. This applies to blue panic as well as other grasses. Sorghum stubble cover is also needed to reduce wind erosion this spring.

Checking new irrigation wells for volume of flow has been one of the major activities of Soil Conservation Service personnel in Dawson County during the past week. New wells checked include: Troy Burdett of Arvada, Bill Weaver just north of Lamesa, Glynn Hanson, four miles south of the Stanton Highway, G. E. Erwin and Stanley Applegate near Ten Mile on the Stanton Highway, Norris Barron, four miles south of Lamesa, Pat Fortenberry of Welch, A. J. Taylor of Midway, A. L. Moss and Alton Youngblood of the Key area, and D. D. Woodul, 2 1/2 miles east of McCarty. The District's flow-meter was used to check these wells. Rate ranged from a low of 168 to more than
