The Loraine Independent School Board of Trustees met Monday night with several items facing them on the agenda.

Principal Mike Hartman's contract was approved along with the coaches' contracts during the meeting.

The first item was the scheduling of the March Board meeting. The meeting which is normally slated for the second Monday was changed to the third Tuesday for the month of March only.

Ted Lefevere was appointed as Trustee Election Judge and Mike Hartman was appointed as Absentee Judge. The two seats to be voted on are the expiring terms of Eugene Smith and Danny Butler.

The Board discussed allowing the additional homestead exemptions and this was not approved by the Board.

Because of the difficulty of substitute teachers in the LISD, the Board changed the current pay scale of \$25 a day to \$35 a day and from \$30 a day after 10 days to \$40 a day after 10 days.

A matter of a new ceiling in the vocational building was tabled until more bids were received.

Reily Appointed Election Judge

The Colorado Independent School Board of Trustees met in regular session with a very full agenda during their Monday night in the Curriculum Board room.

The first action item the Board had was an executive session to discuss the conduct of a student at Colorado Middle School. This was attended by the parents and the student. The student had been temporarily expelled by the principal. The matter was brought before the Board and was discussed. Following the executive session, the Board took action and expelled the student for the remainder of the school year. The Board will meet for a hearing after an analysis of drugs from the Department of the Public Safety is returned.

The next item facing the Trustees was calling of the Trustee Election to be held on the first Saturday of April this year. The election will be held April 3 and absentee voting will be held 20 days prior to the election. The Board passed the resolutions necessary and appointed the election judge, who is Bob Reily and Alternate Judge, Mary Molina.

Deadline for candidates filing is March 3, 1982 for the school trustees, this is 30 days prior to the election.

J. S. Craddock, Jr., Mavis Marsh and Jeneal Chambers were elected as the absentee voting deputies. The absentee voting will be held from March 15 to March 30 and will be held in the school tax office.

The two Board members up for election are Dr. Billy Bridgford and Dickie White and they announced during the meeting their intentions to file for re-election to the seats. They will be running for a three-year term.

The Board discussed some of the school's policies, including the leave of absence policy. There was an additional statement made on the policy which was to the effect, that if a person was out on leave of absence for less than 30 days, they do not have to have a doctor's excuse.

A job description that was not the Board policy was discussed and this was approved as being an educational secretary for Plan A special education.

Mrs. Louise Johnston, librarian at the Colorado Middle School for the past three years, submitted her resignation to the Board, giving her reason for resigning as retirement. The Board accepted her resignation.

There were some minor changes to the lease agreement with H&H Systems on the radios installed in the schools. A discussion was also held on the insurance of these radios.

The Board then went again into an executive session to discuss the contract of Superintendent Charlie Useton and discuss the evaluation of the

different supervisors at the CISD schools. Athletic Director Tom Ramsey, Business Manager and Tax Collector J. S. Craddock, Jr., Transportation Supervisor Coy Adams, Cafeteria Supervisor Christine Cooley, CHS Principal Jerry Reynolds, CMS Principal Doyle Lowrance, Hutchinson Principal Dell Riley and Kelley Principal Bobby Lemons were the personnel discussed. An evaluation was made on each and the renewal of their contracts will be discussed at the next meeting.

The Board made a recommendation that was approved on Useton's three-year contract and will have the same salary as this year. The number of days on his contract was changed from 226 to 240, as these were the days worked by Superintendent Useton.

Volunteer Fire Department Seeks Funds For Renovation Of Truck

The Mitchell County Commissioners' Court met in regular session Monday, February 8, to discuss a full agenda of items pertaining to the county.

Jerry Hammonds of the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department requested, on behalf of the Department, \$2,000 for the renovation of a 1975 Ford ¾ ton 4-wheel-drive pickup. The Volunteer Fire Department plans to install a "forest service" unit on the truck to help out in local fire-fighting. The total cost of the updating of the equipment is estimated at \$9,000, with the bulk of the funds to be generated by donations.

The next item on the agenda was the opening of bids for the purchase of a grid roller for use in Precinct 4. Treanor Equipment of Abilene submitted the only bid, \$14,500 for a Hyster Model "D" to be delivered in Loraine. The commissioners accepted Treanor's bid.

Commissioners next deliberated on whether to accept a check from Valero Energy Company for the corporation's 1981 taxes. The check received was in the amount of \$4,794.24 while the actual tax owed is \$10,779.01, according to county records. According to commissioners, Valero did not speak to the board of review, the usual course of action when valuation is

thought to be high. The Appraisal Board has set a hearing in this case for March 31. If the county were to deposit the check, virtually nothing more could be expected from Valero in the way of tax payment. The commissioners authorized the return of the check pending the outcome of the hearing.

District Attorney Rusty Carroll appeared before the court to request the purchase of dictating equipment to expedite his preparation of case briefs. The cost to the county is expected to be in the range of \$600. The request was granted by the court.

The contract with Pritchard and Abbott for the preparation of the 1982-83 tax roll was approved by the commissioners in other action Monday. It was noted that the county would be charged \$.35 per item per year to provide the county with the taxing list.

The commissioners heard two bids, sought by Sheriff Wendell Bryant, for the purchase of carpet for the jail offices. Teal Carpet of Snyder bid \$13.50 per yard, a total of \$594 while Penton and Sons Carpet Shop of Colorado City bid \$12.95 for a total cost of \$535.22. The court settled on the low bid of \$535.22 of Penton and Sons. Prices are for a commercial grade brown carpet.

The commissioners also decided to purchase a new stove for the jail when it was learned that repairs for the old stove, nine-10 years old, would cost almost as much as a new one.

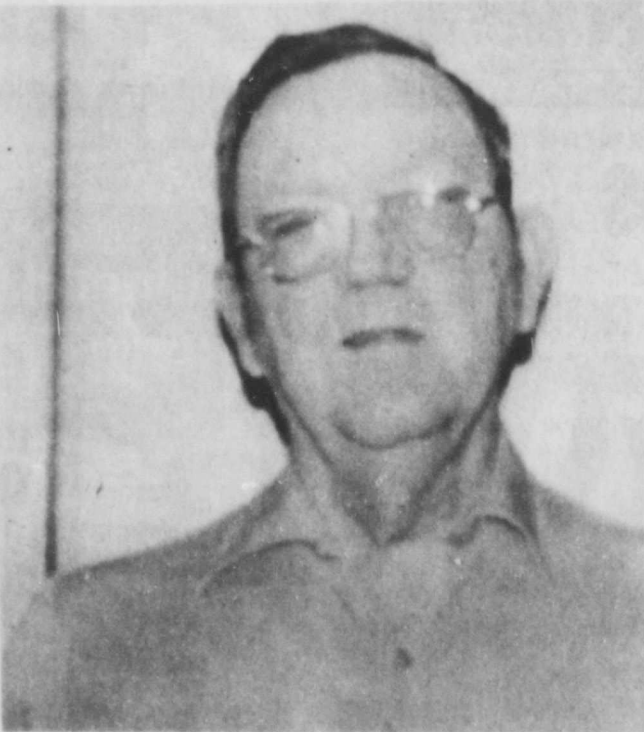
District Clerk Will Seek Re-Election

The IRS center where the return was filed should also be notified in writing of the address change. This will help the IRS to forward the refund check to the new address as soon as possible. When advising the IRS of the address change, the taxpayer's Social Security number should be included in the correspondence.

Income Tax Tip

Commercial tax return preparers must comply with certain requirements when making out clients' returns, the Internal Revenue Service advised.

The IRS explains, paid preparers are responsible for providing a copy of the completed return to the client for his/her records when the client signs the return. Preparers are required to keep copies of returns or a list containing taxpayers' names and identification numbers for three years. These records must be available for IRS inspection during this period.

Paid preparers are also required to sign completed returns and to provide their employer identification number on the return. Rubber stamps and signature facsimiles are not accepted by the IRS.

The handling of refund checks is also regulated. A \$500 penalty can be assessed against paid preparers (other than bank preparers) who endorse, cash, or in any way negotiate a client's refund check. In addition, understating a client's tax liability can result in a penalty of \$500 for willful understatement of \$100 for negligent or intentional disregard of rules and regulations.

Services were Wednesday at 2 p.m., at Ellis Chapel. Officiating was Dr. Daniel Vestal, minister of the First Baptist Church.

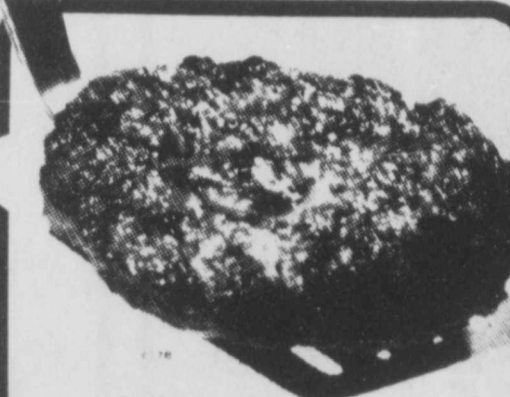

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Electricity is costing more in 1982, but ...

You can help hold down winter bills.



Electricity is costing more this year because the fuels we need to make it cost more. But here's what you can do to help hold down your heating bills and save money:

No-cost suggestions

- Set your thermostat at 68° or lower. Remember, the lower you set it during the winter, the lower your bill.
- At night and when you're going to be away from home, set your thermostat at 55° or lower.
- Open drapes and blinds during the day to let in sunlight, then close them at night to hold in warm air.
- If you have a dishwasher, set water heater to 140°; otherwise, set temperature to 120° or lower.
- If away for two days or more, turn down water heater thermostat.
- Try to minimize traffic through outside doors.
- Economize when doing kitchen or laundry work; for example, wash and dry only full loads of clothes and plan meals

so several dishes can be cooked in the oven at the same time.

Cost-effective suggestions

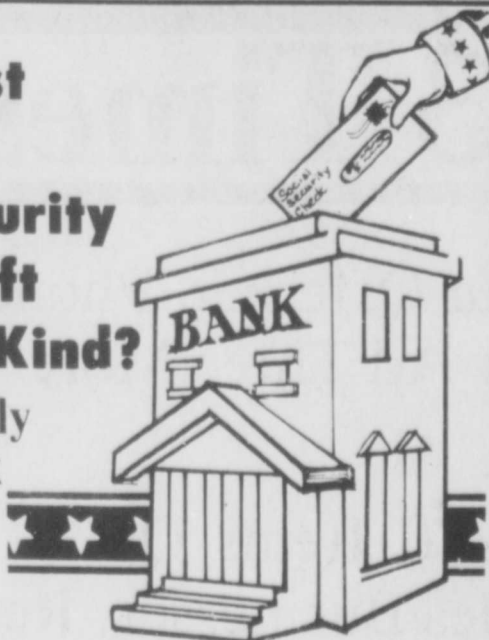
- Install water-flow devices in showers and faucets to limit flow.
- Repair water leaks in pipes and faucets, and seal air duct leaks.
- Check the filters in your system at least once a month. Clean permanent filters or replace disposables as needed.
- Caulk and weatherstrip around doors and windows to help prevent excessive heat loss.
- Add insulation to ceilings, walls and floors.
- Insulate ducts, especially in the attic.
- Insulate hot water pipes in attic.
- Install insulation blankets on water heaters, especially in garage or basement.
- Use scrap insulation to plug air leaks in attic and around fireplace dampers.
- Investigate cost-effectiveness of storm doors and windows.

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
