nal and deciding decision.

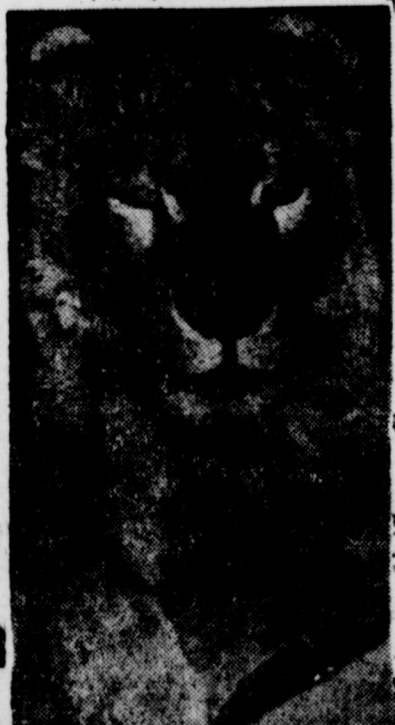

WORLD WAR VETERAN MEETS TRAGIC DEATH IN OIL FIELD ACCIDENT

Early Saturday afternoon, No-
vember 2, a telegraphic message
received here from Andrews, Tex-
as, informed Mr. and Mrs. E. E.
Jackson of Gatesville, of the death
through an oil field accident, of
their only son, Marshall Floyd
Jackson, 21 years of age. He had
been at work in the Andrews oil
fields for only two weeks. The
News has learned no actual de-
tails of the accident, and has been
told by friends of the family that
he was alone at the derrick when
some part of the drilling machine-
ry broke or became loosened and
fell on the boy. He was not res-
cued until evidently some two
hours after the crash.

hid the mound beneath which he
sleeps, and their fragrance was as

an incense wafted to Heaven on
the wings of the prayers from
broken hearts.

Paratrooper in World War II
A native of Coryell county,
Marshall Floyd Jackson was born
to Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Jackson

volunteered for armed service and
trained as a paratrooper at Fort
Benning. He saw service in South
France, and for a time was station-
ed in New York. He has a record
of bravery in the response to ev-
ery call to duty on the war front,
and was noted for honor in con-
duct in the service and at home.
He was industrious and found
profitable employment in the oil
fields.

rents are his sisters, Miss Jackie
Neil Jackson, and his grandparents,
Mr. and Mrs. Dick Kemp, of Cor-
pus Christi, and his grandmother,
Mrs. Jennie Jackson of Gatesville.
The youth also leaves many friends
to mourn his untimely and tragic
death.

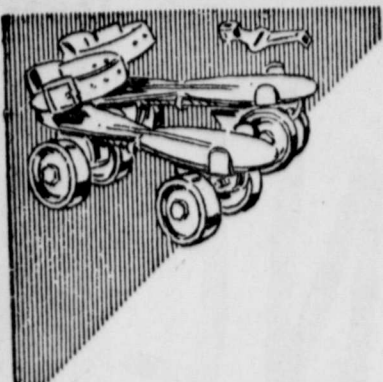

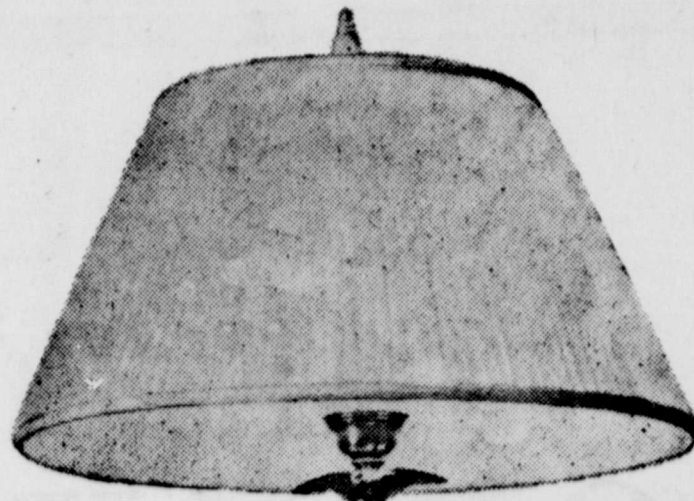
