And it was assuming somewhat of a whale of a lot of responsibility that these Colorado City newsmen asked the WTPA officials to select their little city as the 1955 convention city. It meant no small amount of work to provide food and eating accommodations for WTPA members, now the largest in the history of the organization, and their guests. To successfully meet that requirement meant the display of diplomacy and constant work on the citizenship of Colorado City enlisting their cooperation to an individual to aid in making the event a success. That was accomplished by the Messrs Fox and Bell, and it's for that reason came the beating of the cymbals and singing of highest praise by the visitors attending the convention for the delightful entertainment and hospitality extended by the host city.

It was fitting that Colorado City be selected as the site for the meeting place of the 25th anniversary convention. It was in Colorado City where the West Texas Press Association was organized.

And the more interesting was the fact that J. L. Martin, the first president of the WTPA was present and addressed the convention. He is 82 years old. In his earlier Texas newspapering, Martin at one time published the Ford County News, the Snyder Signal, the Mexia News, during the first oil boom days in that city, and the McCamey News.

THE JUNIOR COWBOYS and cowgirls of Stanton and Martin County, are going to show their riding and roping ability and other western style performances, at the rodeo grounds at east Stanton, on Friday and Saturday night, Aug. 26 and 27.

The event is sponsored by the Martin County Sheriff's Posse and the Stanton Lions Club.

Any boy or girl under 19 years of age is eligible to enter any of the events, including riding, roping, and barrel race.

A parade from the downtown area to the rodeo grounds will be held the afternoon of Friday, to start the two-day event.

The stock for the rodeo will be furnished and the program produced by W. W. Branscum of Clovis, N.M.

Aside from the entertainment to be provided by the Junior Rodeo, it is hoped that the admission fees paid in will be of sufficient amount it will make the building of seats for spectators at the rodeo grounds. This information comes from Sheriff Dan Saunders who is president of the Martin County Sheriff's Posse.

The rodeo grounds is lighted to the point of brilliancy a spin could be recognized.

New Producer In, New Location Is Made Nearby

Another new producer for the Germania (Grayburg) field of Northeast Midland County, seven miles southwest of Stanton is Fryer & Hanson Drilling Company No. 1-O-12 B. T. Hale.

The well finished for a 24-hour pumping potential of 44.9 barrels of 32-gravity oil through perforations at 3,945-52 feet, natural.

Location is 333.3 feet from south and 334.5 feet from east lines of section 12, block 37, W. Glendening (T&P) survey.

Russel Maguire, Wichita Falls, No. 1 Martin is to be drilled as a one-mile north outcrop to the Varel (San Andres) field of West Howard County.

Drill site is 330 feet from south and west lines of section 43, block 33, T-2-N, T&P survey. Cecil L. Hamilton of Big Spring No. 1 Nobye Hamilton, wildcat five and a half miles southeast of Stanton in Southeast Martin County, now is being drilled as a "tight" operation. Operator is not releasing any official information.

Last official report from the well had it drilled to 42 feet and set surface casing to protect fresh water sand.

Location is 380 feet from north and 990 feet from west lines of section 26, block 35, T-1-S, T&P survey.

Pan American Production Company No. 1 Shook, scheduled Devonian wildcat in Northwest Martin County 29 miles northwest of Stanton, was making hole below 10,000 feet on last report.

No shows of oil or gas have been reported, and no drillstem tests have been taken.

Location is 600 feet from north and east lines of labor 90, league 259, Borden County School Land survey.

Vaccine Shipment Expected

Arrival of 50,838 shots of Salk polio vaccine was expected by the State Health Department this week.

This is part of Texas allotment of 1,177,069 shots in addition to the vaccine given free to first and second grade school children.

Under the "volunteer control" plan adopted by the State Polio Vaccine Committee, 83 per cent will be allocated for commercial use, 17 per cent for public agencies.

This week's shipment was to come from the Wyeth Laboratories in Marietta, Pa.

Crop Prospects Improve

August predictions for 1955 Texas farm production, though improved since early summer, fell below 1954 figures.

US Department of Agriculture forecasts showed a probable cotton crop of 3.9 million bales—one per cent lower than 1954.

But the prospective 278-pound yield per acre is the highest since 1866. Improved soil moisture, irrigation and new yield-increasing practices by growers are credited for the high figure.

Texas cotton acreage is nearly one million acres less than for 1954.

Widespread summer rains have upped the estimated wheat crop by more than two million bushels. In June the USDA forecast a total of 11,883,000 bushels; by August the figure was raised to 14,212,000.

Even with the improved outlook the 1955 crop will be less than half that in 1954.

High yields of hay also were foreseen as a result of showers. Sorghum, corn and peanuts were aided.

In the unfavorable side, rains delayed insect control programs and created a critical problem in cotton fields.

WEST TEXAS PRESS URGES PRECINCT REDISTRICTING

Calling for legislation that could force redistricting of county precincts and compel public officials to publish annual financial reports, The West Texas Press Association closed its Silver Jubilee convention Saturday in Colorado City. Ed Wischamper, managing editor of the Abilene Reporter-News, was chosen president. Roy V. Fox, co-publisher of the Colorado City Record, was chosen vice-president, and Mrs. Ben Oglesby, wife of the publisher of the Bronte Enterprise, was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

The Stanton Reporter was represented at the meeting by Miss Eugenia Martin, society editor; Weldon Martin, shop foreman, and Mrs. Martin; Granville Graves, printer; and A. Clarence Smith, general manager, and Mrs. Smith, because of the health of Mrs. Kelly, James E. Kelly, veteran editor, was unable to attend for the first time in many years.

E. B. Harris Jr., publisher with his father of the Graham Leader, is the retiring president, and Wischamper was moved up from vice-president to the presidency.

Cotton Looper No Big Threat Says Entomologist

There are not many cotton loopers in Martin county cotton, and not too much danger of a severe infestation, F. M. Fuller, Jr., entomologist from Texas A. and M. College said here after an inspection of cotton fields last Wednesday. And, if there should be an infestation, the proper poisoning processes can take care of them, he said.

The cotton looper worm had made his appearance in some cotton stalks in Martin county during the past week and more, and considerable alarm was felt in some quarters. It was because of this manifest alarm that Fuller was asked to come and make an inspection. Fuller found Martin county cotton in good shape, generally, and pointed out that the proper poisoning processes should enable growers to handle all insect infestations as they come.

County Agent Gerry Hanson and others made the inspection trip over the county with Fuller, and for the cotton looper Hanson recommends a mixture of dust at the rate of 20 pounds of toxaphene mixed with 40 pounds of sulphur, and dusted 20 to 25 pounds per acre. Or a spray of 60 per cent toxaphene, sprayed on at the rate of a half gallon per acre.

We Must Conserve Our Water Supply

In his statement to the people of Texas, Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo paints a gloomy picture of the present water situation in the Lone Star State. He is chairman of the Texas Water Resources Committee. A position that well justifies the fact that from a comprehensive investigation of the state's water problem made by the chairman of TWRC, makes him well qualified to know what he is talking about.

From the way the people of Stanton and Martin County have been witnessing all the water from rains running off the watershed to waste, and the pumping of many thousands of gallons of water daily from the county's underground water supply, going to irrigate the many hundreds of acres of farm lands, they should be eager to do their part to conserve the water supply in their area.

In the first paragraph of his statement, Hardeman warns: "Texans need to gird their loins, bow their necks, and keep moving forward until they solve their water problem."

The statement continues, which throws a hint in the direction of Martin County, whose main water supply is dependent altogether upon that provided in the underground water basin, when it says:

"Water is actually being mined in some sections of the state as owners frantically go deeper and deeper to bring water to the top. Common sense tells us that unless the water is conserved and the water tables allowed to rise, the ultimate result can be but chaos."

Hardeman makes this plea to the people by calling upon: "The farmers, the ranchers, the bankers, labor and industry, our utility companies, our city and county officials, chambers of commerce, civic clubs, newspapers, radio and TV stations, women's clubs—in short—all thinking adult men and women in whatever walk of Texas life they happen to be, need to band together for a single purpose . . . solve our water problem. Organize, have a central clearing house and fan out and make Texas so water conscious that our public officials will know exactly what the people of Texas want, waterwise, and will give it to them."

The Cotton Grower Really Has His Worries

What makes the growing of cotton an interesting occupation is that it's a six or seven month in the year job of work on the part of the grower, and the same number of months he spends in worrying if he's going to raise a crop. The grower prepares his land and plants his seed in April . . . that is if the soil has any moisture in it. Otherwise, it may be May or June before he gets the seed planted. That will mean a late cotton harvest, bringing on the worry that winter weather may get his crop.

The cotton plant gets up to a stand and the job of chopping it enters the picture. By the time the chopping job is laid by, the worms start their pilgrimage into the field with the intention of eating it up. The grower hastens to buy poison and spray the field in the hope of killing the insects before they destroy his cotton.

In most every cotton growing season a new insect appears in the cotton. The grower has never seen it before but finds his field pretty well run over with them. They are eating holes through the leaves of his cotton and puncturing the bolls. The new addition to the family of cotton insects sends the A. & M. specialists in the line of detecting cotton bugs, hurrying to their laboratories to place the "newcomer" under a microscope to locate the genealogy of the destructive insect. Name it. Instruct the grower the poison to use to kill it.

After the grower has spent a sizeable amount of money for poison and consumed many hours of labor spraying poison over his field, the cotton bolls are rapidly opening and pickers must be secured to gather the crop. The lint cotton is to be hauled to the gin to be converted into a bale. With all the expense money invested in this bale, the grower must have a price that will recover it, and a living price besides. That the grower must run the risk.

The grower with normal weather conditions may wind up his cotton harvest in September or early October. He will take stock then as to how well he fared financially with his crop.

If he has had good luck the grower may find he has made expenses and a little money besides.

But with all the labor and expense the grower has been out raising his crop, the worry he has gone through, etc., our way of thinking he is about the poorest paid in any class of business men or industrialist in the world.

We would much rather risk our chances of making a living working on a weekly newspaper. At least we will know when we can expect our check. Something the cotton grower must wait for until all the bills of expense are in and paid.

I read in a newspaper last night about a big industrialist who has turned his resort home over to a bunch of big brains for two weeks of meditation and loafing, and right now they're up at his place, taking things easy and thinking.

The newspapers seemed to think this was unusual and newsworthy but I'd like to point out it's the system I've been using for years out here on my Johnson grass farm.

As I understand the deal, this industrialist invites a bunch of scientists, business men, professors, etc. to come out to his place and just loaf. He doesn't assign them anything to think about, just lets it develop. His contention is that if you turn some good minds loose and let them pursue their own course with all the leisure they want, something is bound to result.

I believe he is absolutely right, and I have clipped the article out of the paper and have pasted it on the wall, to explain my absence during plowing weather to my wife.

However, there is one flaw in his system. He invites the brains to come out and think for a couple of weeks. It's not long enough.

It takes a lifetime. Thinking is not something a man can decide he will do between 10 and 10:30 each morning, or for two weeks in the summer, it's something he has to stay with pretty close, day and night, week after week, right through the crop season and in to another. A man who lets his work get in the way of his thinking, ain't thinking hard enough.

But this industrialist has the right idea, he doesn't expect anything definite and positive to come from the thinking session. That's the way it ought to be. Lots of times I've spent the whole day thinking and when my wife asks, well, what came of it, what conclusions have you arrived at, I have no answer. There are some thoughts so profound they can't be expressed, and they're the safest kind to deal in.

What Was The News Of Note?—Twenty-Five Years Ago—

From the Files of The Stanton Reporter of August 22, 1930

Stanton school will open Monday, Sept. 1. The faculty is complete, announced C. B. Slone, superintendent. They are M. E. 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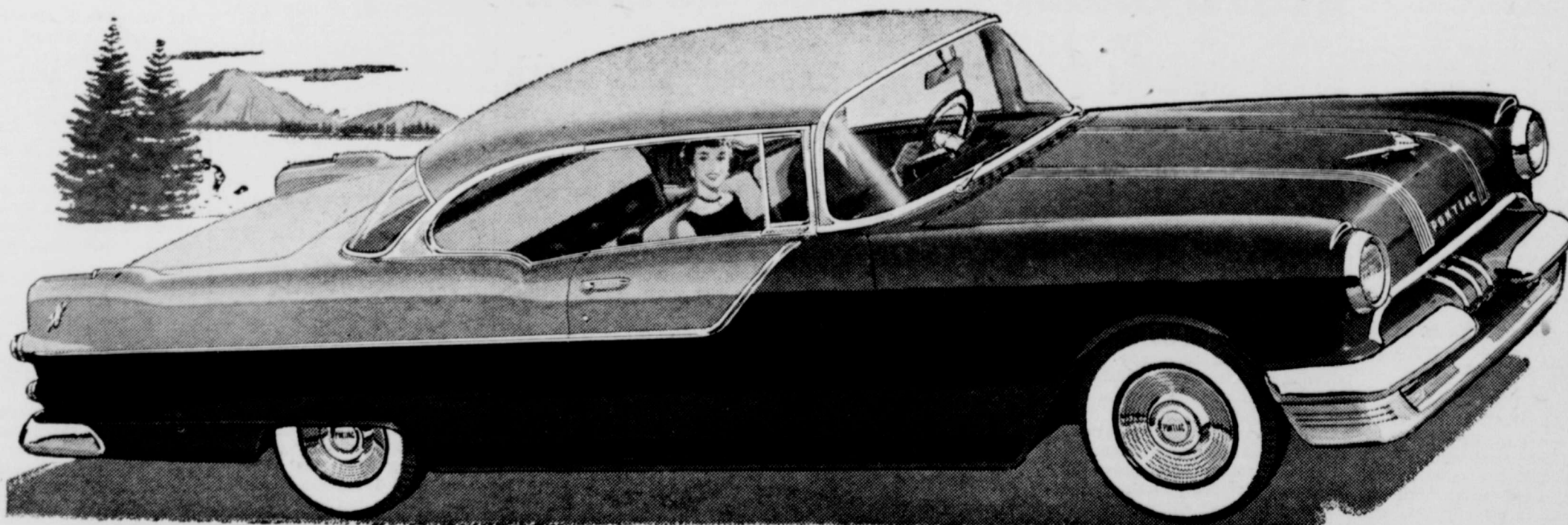

Farm & Ranch Review



By JAMES E. KELLY

Foy Proctor of Midland has bought the registered Angus cattle from the estate of the late F. F. Elkins of Midland. Included in the purchase were 46 cows with 35 young calves at side, 15 heifer yearlings and 12 bulls. These are the first Angus cattle Proctor has ever owned.

We note a news story carried in The Reporter last week reported that County Agent Hanson, had made a 50,000-bale estimated yield for Martin County's 1955 cotton crop.

Hanson has been in the various cotton fields over the county inspecting the work of insects on the plants, which has placed him in a position to make a pretty close estimate on the cotton yield.

Reports coming from the irrigated farms in the county, marks their yield will considerably outrank the record in production they made last year. More acres are under irrigation this year than last. The dry land farms promise a much better yield than last year. Taking into account this fact, the cotton crop production for 1955 has a good chance to reach the 50,000-bale mark, and may better the figure.

Assuming that the average price paid for cotton will bring this year—37 cents per pound—and the bale will weigh in at an average of 500 pounds, and the yield will reach 50,000 bales, looks like Martin County's 1955 cotton crop will be a \$9,250,000 cash crop.

We ask the readers to save throwing their old shoes and tin cans at this column for doing a little estimating himself on this year's cotton crop. When we make a guess we just as well make a good one.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announces that taking into account the livestock production, the total farm output this year will be the largest of record.

With all the "fuss and feathers" made over the appearance of the cabbage looper invading the cotton fields of the county last week by the growers, it amounted to just that. An entomologist from A&M was called into service. He visited some of the cotton fields and discovered many loopers, but their damage was really of minor nature, and too, it was learned the looper would readily succumb to the proper poison sprayed on the plants.

Report issued out of Lubbock by representative of Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Experimental Station, of

results gathered from county agents in this area, shows insect infestation in cotton fields included aphids, medium to heavy in the area; fields fairly heavily infested by fleahoppers; bollworms, increased over that of last week; cabbage loopers and yellow striped army worms, occurred in medium to heavy infestations in cotton in five West Texas counties, including Martin. The report says Endrin, will effect best control of these insects.

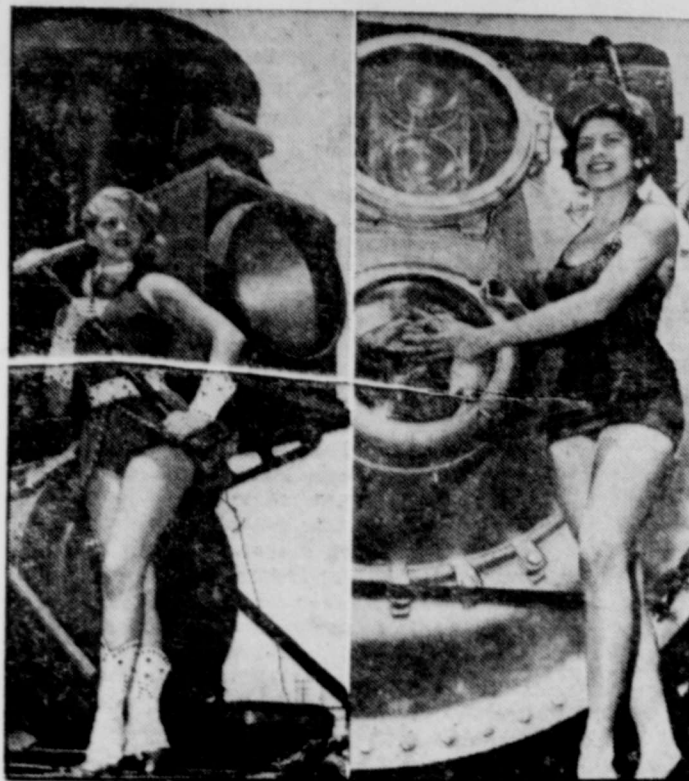

More Than Score of Bills Which Affect Retailers Made Into Law

AUSTIN — A review of bills
passed at the recent session of
the 54th Texas Legislature, com-
piled by the Retail Merchants
Association of Texas, shows that
more than a score of measures
affecting retailers of the state
have been signed into law.

Charles T. Lux, RMA executive
vice-president, said bills relating
to collections, wage assignments,
sale prices (grocery items), and
taxes were among the more im-
portant enacted.

A breakdown by subjects of
the laws passed follows:
Unfair Sales—Effective Sep-
tember 6 a new law prohibits
grocers from limiting purchases
on merchandise offered for sale
below cost.

Collections—The Small Claims
Courts Act has been amended to
provide for a fee of \$1 to the
citation serving officer and
authorizes the usual court fees
for levying executions to en-
force judgments.

Holidays—November 11 has
been officially designated Vet-
eran's Day. Bank and Trust
Companies are given permission
to close on Saturdays.

Sales taxes—A one-cent a gal-
lon additional tax on gasoline. A
one-cent a package additional
tax on cigarettes. A \$2.30 per bar-
rel increase in the tax on beer.
A 25-cent additional levy per
\$1,000 on corporate capitaliza-
tion.

Collection of State taxes—The
method of collecting a 22 per
cent tax on radio and TV sales
has been amended in a measure
that will become effective Sep-
tember 1. The tax remains on
the seller making the final sale
and requires wholesalers to pay
the tax on sales to institutions,
hotels and others. The retailer
is required to file a quarterly
report showing a starting and
ending inventory on both TVs
and radios. The bill further re-
quires TV and radio dealers to

be bonded to guarantee pay-
ment of the tax and requires
retailers to secure a permit and
authorizes the State Comptroller
to collect audit fees from the
dealers.

Effective October 1 the maxi-
mum weekly unemployment
compensation benefits will be
raised from \$20 to \$28.

Assignment of wages — Em-
ployers, under terms of a new
law, are exempt from legal ac-
tion in cases where an employee's
wages are pledged to a creditor,
if the employer can prove that
he was not notified in writing
of such an assignment and did
not assent to such an assign-
ment in writing.

Assignment of accounts re-
ceivable—A bill that has already
become law protects assignments
of accounts receivable regard-
less of whether such accounts
are in existence at the time
notice of assignment was filed,
provided, however, that the re-
cording of such notices consti-
tute constructive notice and re-
gardless of whether the contract
out of which the accounts arose
was in the contemplation of the
assignor and assignee when the
notice of assignment was execut-
ed.

The Retail Merchants Associa-
tion of Texas review noted that
an effort was made during the
latter part of the Legislative
session to have a gross receipts
tax on retail sales passed. The
proposal was defeated in com-
mittee.

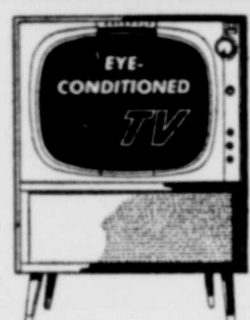

on to their record for oil potential.

A MOOTED QUESTION FOR the citizens of Stanton to mull over was emblazoned before their eyes last week in a black headline across the top of the front page of The Stanton Reporter, "screaming" out, "Telephone Rate Increase Is Asked!"

The news story carried the announcement that representatives of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, appeared before the regular meeting of the city council last Tuesday night, and asked for a 25 per cent increase in telephone rates.

An increase in the telephone rates then in force was granted the company in August, 1951, for installing a dial system, but it was two years from that date before the new system was established.

After a pert discussion pro and con between the members of the city council and the telephone representatives had subsided, the council decided to take the matter under advisement. In other words, the council called for time to feel out the sentiments of the patrons of the telephone company.

The present rate for a business telephone is \$7.00 per month and residence phone \$4.00 per month. The new increase of 25 per cent asked by the telephone company will establish a rate of \$8.75 per month for business phone, and \$5.00 per month for residence.

In their request for rate increase the telephone representatives said:

"Present rates are too low to meet today's costs of doing business, including a fair return on

our investment here after all expenses are paid."

That's a condition which most all businesses in other lines of industry are finding, especially, those of the smaller type businesses. They have to meet the increased price on merchandise by increasing the price they sell their goods to the customer. In that event the merchant's survival depends on whether the customer will stand the price hike or do without. He can go buy the goods he wants from another merchant. But there is only one telephone company doing business in Stanton.

The telephone user has his choice of doing one of two things. Pay the rate increase and keep the telephone service, or reject the increase and do without the telephone service.

It must be taken into consideration by the telephone user while he mulls over the rate increase, one emergency call over telephone could bring the fire company in time to save his home from burning down. A call over the telephone can bring the ambulance in haste to your home to carry some member of your family to the hospital. It may mean the saving of a life.

The saving of your property from fire, and the saving of a life of a member of your family, are services rendered by the

Petitions and suggestions will be heard by the 15-member state textbook committee between Sept. 15 and Oct. 1. Its recommendations will be drawn up Oct. 3-8.

Schools Satisfy Parents

Seven out of eight parents either are satisfied with Texas public schools or are too uninformed to have an opinion.

That conclusion was drawn from study of 16,788 "parent reactionnaires" circulated in 59 school districts by the Texas Association of School Administrators.

Survey results were announced last week in Austin by Dr. Kenneth E. McIntyre who coordinated tabulation.

Criticism, he said, was aimed more at high schools than lower grades. Also some parents felt the schools fell short in developing "good behavior."
