

# No Rest Until Reds Beaten, Rhee Declares

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—Thousands in this war-torn capital cheered and wept today as Syngman Rhee was inaugurated as president of South Korea.

The 77-year-old president, re-elected Aug. 5 in South Korea's first popular presidential election, proclaimed during open-air ceremonies that Korea's "first charge remains upon the battlefield."

He added that his long-range aim, and that of the U. S. and the U. N., "the restoration of all Korea as a democratic nation."

A cheering crowd estimated at 20,000 jammed the capitol grounds to celebrate the seventh anniversary of Korea's liberation from 40 years of Japanese occupation and the fourth birthday of the U. N.-sponsored republic.

In Pyongyang, the capital of North Korea, Premier Kim Il Sung issued a mild blast at the U. S. in Thursday night ceremonies commemorating the liberation.

"U. S. insistence on compulsory repatriation of Communist prisoners," Kim said, "is the only obstacle standing in the way of the Korean dispute." The speech, broadcast over Pyongyang radio and heard in Tokyo, promised efforts "to settle the Korean question amicably."

(The U. N. stand at the deadlocked talks is that no prisoner should be forced to rejoin communism against his will.)

Russia's Premier Joseph Stalin and Mao Tse-tung, head of Red China, wished the North Koreans success in the war, in anniversary messages.

Gen. Mark Clark, the Allied supreme commander, and Gen. James A. Van Fleet, U. S. Eighth Army commander, were seated with Rhee on the flower-decked platform in Seoul. Clark congratulated the white-haired president and commended "the splendid leadership he has given his country in the valiant fight against communism."

Rhee said the generals assured him U. N. armies would stand firm against the Reds.

A host of military and diplomatic officials watched the president take his oath of office. Armed soldiers, gaily dressed people and naked children craned their necks for a look at the proceedings.

The men from 16 nations fighting in Korea, Rhee said, "have the will and the capability to defeat whatever power the Communist enemies may pour against us."

But ultimately, he added softly, "our broader aim is to bind up our nation's bleeding wounds and to render whole again that which the cruel foe has broken apart."

Rhee traced the losses Korea has sustained in two years of warfare. Two million have died, he said. Ten million "have been uprooted from their homes and must build their lives anew out of the wreckage."

Crowds cheered and waved banners reading "long live our great President Syngman Rhee; destroy the Communist aggressors; unify our fatherland."

Officials said South Korean police had searched the city and the surrounding hills for possible troublemaking Communists. But by early afternoon, no disturbances had been reported.

# Foreign Policy Remains Big Issue, Bridges Says

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman's fresh endorsement of bi-

partisan foreign policy moves brought a call by Sen. Styles Bridges today for vigorous Republican campaigning on international issues.

Bridges, the GOP Senate leader, told reporters Democrats want Republicans to share responsibility for foreign policy decisions and hope to eliminate the issue from the campaign.

"It is ridiculous to say that foreign policy should be kept out of the campaign," the New Hampshire senator said. "It is entwined with every important domestic issue and the American people have a right to discuss and know what their foreign policy is."

Truman told a White House news conference yesterday he endorses a 1951 Senate document which said "the conduct of American foreign policy in the past decade has, in general, been bi-partisan in its aspects."

The President cited this in discussing the rejection by Dwight D. Eisenhower, the Republican nominee, of an invitation to come to Washington for a briefing on the world situation.

Eisenhower said he did not believe there should be any exchange between him and Truman that the American people did not know about.

Truman commented tartly that the general will be at liberty to quote anything he has to say to him. In fact, Truman said, Eisenhower already has quoted a great many things he told the general.

The President added that some of these came out in garbled form, but he didn't elaborate.

Republicans criticized the White House invitation to Eisenhower at an "after-thought" gesture, but Truman told reporters he had decided about 10 days ago that the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) should keep the presidential candidate informed of what was going on in the world. He said CIA officials suggested a briefing for each candidate, such as Stevenson got.

supplemented by weekly reports to them.

Although he rejected the briefing session idea, Eisenhower said he would be glad to receive weekly reports from the CIA.

While he hadn't sent an invitation to Eisenhower until Tuesday, Truman said the general had been informed previously by the Defense Department he could get any information he wanted from that agency.

However, it developed there had been a slipup. Gen. Omar Bradley, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of

Staff, acknowledged in a rueful statement that Truman had asked him a week ago to convey this word to Eisenhower but he had not yet done so. Bradley said he had talked it over with Secretary of Defense Robert A. Lovett and Deputy Secretary William C. Foster and they decided the matter could wait until Eisenhower came east later this month.

"Being unfamiliar with political matters," Bradley said, "it never occurred to me that the timing of notification might become an issue."

# Advisers Are Happy Over Ike's Actions

DENVER (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's campaign advisers figured today the newcomer to politics did all right in his first direct exchange with an old master—President Truman.

The exchange led to a Washington mixup in which the President and one of Eisenhower's World War II comrades in arms combined to give the general a hearty laugh.

Associates of Eisenhower, the Republican presidential nominee, said privately they were satisfied that the general "more than held his own" as one of them put it—in rejecting a Truman invitation to the White House for a confidential briefing on the international situation.

In doing so, Eisenhower said he wanted to be free to speak out against administration foreign policy.

And he said the President's offer wasn't received until after the Democratic candidate for the White House, Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, was given an international affairs briefing which, Eisenhower had declared, made Stevenson subservient to the administration.

In his telegram to Truman rejecting the briefing invitation, Eisenhower did accept the President's offer to furnish him with weekly summaries—provided it would not restrict his discussion of administration foreign policy.

The President said at his news conference yesterday that Eisenhower had been informed a week or 10 days ago by the Defense Department that he would receive intelligence service summaries of world affairs.

Eisenhower's executive assistant, Arthur H. Vandenberg Jr., said a statement in Washington saying Truman told him last Thursday of his desire to furnish Eisenhower with world intelligence reports. But Bradley, an old buddy of Eisenhower, added ruefully that he had failed to inform the GOP nominee.

Eisenhower was told of Bradley's statement by his Press Secretary James C. Hagerty, who reported: "The general laughed. He just laughed."

In turning down Truman's briefing offer, Eisenhower said to accept would be unwise and would create public confusion at a time when the people "are deciding our country's leadership for the next four years."

The President's invitation was to a Cabinet meeting next Tuesday for a complete briefing on the foreign situation.

Eisenhower's reply was not as strongly worded, it was learned, as some of his advisers wanted it to be. Some aides, it was understood, favored telling the President his invitation amounted to imperialism.

But the general overruled that and decided on the more subtly phrased reply that went to the White House. Without being blunt, it put across Eisenhower's point that he intends to make no move which would link him with the administration.

The deliberate theme of the rejection message was to put the general apart from the administration, and—at the same time—tie Stevenson to it as closely as possible.

That is the main reason the GOP nominee's aides feel he came off all right in the exchange.

# Marines Beat Off Two New Attacks On Hill Positions

## US Reserving Right To Use Atomic Bomb

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Aug. 15 (AP)—The U. S. warned today that it reserved the right to use the A-bomb and germ warfare to suppress aggression until such weapons are eliminated by an iron-clad system of international safeguards.

The warning was made by U. S. Delegate Benjamin V. Cohen before the U. N. Disarmament Commission where Russia has repeatedly demanded that the U. N. ban atomic weapons and germ warfare.

Cohen told Soviet Delegate Jacob A. Malik that the U. S. would never accept a mere paper declaring prohibiting the use of these weapons.

Cohen said: "We are issuing no ultimatums. We are making no threats."

He went on to say that, until there is an effective international system of inspection to make sure agreements are not being violated, the U. S. does not intend "to invite aggression by informing, or committing ourselves to, would-be aggressors and charter-breakers that we will not use certain weapons to suppress aggression."

"To do so in exchange for mere paper promises would be to give would-be aggressors their own choice of weapons," he said. "For certainly there is no assurance that aggressors, which break their charter obligations not to go to war, will keep their paper promises not to fight with certain weapons if they have them and need them to achieve their evil designs."

Communism, he said, is a threat to the element of surprise, roared into action.

Communism guns pounded Bunker Hill with 100 rounds a minute as 200 more Reds scrambled out of the darkness in a furious frontal attack. Marines, firing from their prefabricated timber bunkers, cut the Reds down at the lower slopes of the hill.

By 3:35 a. m., the Chinese were reported in full retreat.

Daylight brought waves of U. N. fighter bombers which stung Communist positions with bombs, rockets and flaming gasoline.

The U. S. Eighth Army briefing officer said entrenched Reds backed up with heavy mortar and artillery fire have withstood six Allied attempts since Wednesday to recapture a hill west-northwest of Yoncheon, on the Central Front. The action was described as minor.

Temperatures again spurted to the 100-plus mark. Weather Bureau observers could see no end to the extremely hot weather and no rain of significant amount ahead.

Dallas looked toward its 14th consecutive day of temperatures of more than 100 degrees and counted its second heat stroke fatality in four days with the death Thursday of Lewis L. Davis, 58.

Farmers and ranchers looked at brassy skies and saw nothing but high thin clouds, for the most part. Predicted widely scattered thunder showers in West Texas failed to materialize except around far west El Paso. There was some thunder-shower activity in the Lubbock and Maria areas.

Cities looked to their water supplies, dwindling faster as the oppressive heat continued. Firemen warned of grass fires even as they ran hard-pressed equipment to hundreds of the blazes over the state.

Forestry service employees watched drying timberlands with anxious eyes.

City water pressures dropped, well and stream levels fell, reservoirs were drying up, crops and rangelands wilted, and seven million Texans prayed for rain.

Said a Weather Bureau observer: "Nothing's wrong that a good rain wouldn't cure."

But he didn't know when it would come.

## Red Casualty List Is Mounting Fast

SEOUL, Korea, Aug. 15. (AP)—American Marines twice today crushed Chinese Communist attacks on Bunker Hill in the latest of a series of Western Front battles which the Corps said has cost the Reds 3,014 in dead and wounded since Saturday.

U. N. fighter bombers strafed and plastered Red positions with bombs, rockets and gasoline as the leathernecks forced back 200 Chinese who tried to advance on the battle-scarred hill this afternoon.

A briefing officer estimated 39 Reds were killed in the one-hour battle, the sixth futile Communist attempt to recapture Bunker Hill.

Before dawn today, Marines repulsed a 400-man force which launched a sneak attack on the hill from two directions.

The leathernecks seized Bunker Hill early Tuesday, the fourth day of fighting in the area. The U. S. Eighth Army said 1,183 Chinese have been wounded and 897 counted or believed killed in Red efforts to recapture the hill.

The Air Force said its pilots today destroyed 76 troop and supply buildings, six supply dumps, 11 supply stacks, 17 gun positions, 28 bunkers, four personnel shelters and seven field pieces.

Today's Red drive began at 1:20 a. m. Not one of 200 Chinese spotted sneaking through a canyon toward Bunker Hill got there, the Marines said. Allied artillerymen zeroed in and forced the attackers back.

Communism artillery, silent at first to preserve the element of surprise, roared into action.

# Stevenson Is Busy With Conferences

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP)—Farm, labor and political leaders called on Gov. Adlai Stevenson today for talks that may play an important part in the Democratic presidential campaign.

Stevenson—the Democratic presidential nominee—plunged into the conference before meeting tomorrow with his "brain trust" of party chiefs who will advise him on strategy and tactics for the big vote drive ahead.

The farm leaders on the calling list were Allan Kline, head of the American Farm Bureau Federation, and Charles Shuman, the federation vice president. Kline recently was called "the spokesman for the Republican party" by Secretary of Agriculture Brannan.

Kline already has talked with GOP presidential nominee Dwight D. Eisenhower in Denver and received his views on a farm program.

The labor leaders were Arthur Goldberg, general counsel of the CIO, and Joseph Keenan, of the AFL Labor League for Political Education.

Both the CIO and AFL labor groups in Detroit and Chicago are sponsoring the Sept. 1 Labor Day speeches by Stevenson and President Truman formally opening the Democratic campaign.

Another visitor was Sen. Clinton Anderson of New Mexico, a member of the campaign committee.

meeting here tomorrow to map strategy. He is vice chairman of the Senate Democratic Campaign Committee.

John Anson Ford, Democratic national committeeman from California, also was on the list and this visit was being watched with interest. The California delegation was led by Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee in the National Convention.

Kefauver has said he will back Stevenson but that some of his supporters feel he got a "bad deal" at the convention and they are waiting to see Stevenson's program develop before taking sides.

Stevenson's meetings today and the strategy huddles with his advisory board this week and will take up his time prior to his departure Monday for a three-day rest with friends at a Northern Wisconsin resort. The place has not been announced by Stevenson's headquarters.

The discussion of farm-labor problems followed the governor's first major address since his nomination. This was his speech yesterday at the Illinois State Fairgrounds in which he took pot shots at the centralized power in federal government and at the GOP high command.

He said the tidal drift of power toward Washington will "go on and on unless those necessary functions of government which don't have to be performed in Washington are performed, and properly performed, at the state or local level."

Divorces Ordered For All Escapees

BERLIN, Germany (AP)—Communists in the East zone of Germany reportedly are forcing husbands and wives whose mates have fled to the West to get divorces whether they want them or not.

The anti-Communist "Free Justitia"—a group of lawyers and judges who escaped from the East zone and took refuge in West Berlin—said today that information reaching them gave these details:

If an East German wife or husband whose mate is now on the West side of the Iron Curtain applies for a job he or she is told there is no chance for employment unless a divorce is obtained.

In some cases, the jurists said, the applicant either must yield or face starvation.

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## Martin Well Ready To Final; Dawson Ventures Abandoned

A Martin County well was prepared for completion Friday when two Dawson County prospects were plugged and abandoned.

Plymouth No. 1 W. R. Morris, C NW SW, 24-5-1, T&P, was pumped to clean out hole, test and complete. All lead oil has been pumped out and the well was pumped for 11 hours and recovered 30 barrels of new oil. There was a small amount of drilling water in the fluid, but no water was credited to the formation.

Report on a 24-hour pump test is expected Saturday.

Abandoned in Dawson County were the Blanco No. 1 Halliday, State, C NE NW, 9-8-M, EL&RR, and the El Tee No. 1 Lindsey, C NE SE, 10-8-M, EL&RR. The Halliday-State well had reached a total depth of 8,800 feet in lime and shale, but found no true reef and no indications of production. El Tee's Lindsey had drilled to 5,878 in lime and shale.

Wildcat completion in Sterling County was the Austin No. 1 ELL, wood, 660 from the south and west lines of 78-18, SPRR. It flowed 92.12 barrels of oil in 24 hours through a 24-5-1 choke. There was 0.2 of one per cent basic sediment and water. Gas-oil ratio was 1,650-1, gravity 42, top of pay 8,070, total depth 8,157 and 54-inch casing set on the bottom. Perforations were from 8,070 to 8,084.

... or I would have gotten in touch with Gen. Eisenhower immediately after my conversation with the President.

Referring to his talk with the President, Bradley said:

"We discussed the fact that Gen. Eisenhower recently had been on active duty and was acquainted with many of the matters involved. This indicated there was no immediate need to take this up with Gen. Eisenhower."

The Senate document, referred to by Truman in expressing his evident view that the Republicans can't criticize something they helped develop, turned out to be a study made by the staff of the Foreign Relations Committee.

Printed at the request of Sen. John Sparkman of Alabama, now the Democratic vice presidential nominee, the document was not signed by any committee members although Truman alluded to it as an unanimous report.

Along with other Republicans, Bridges applauded Eisenhower's rejection of the White House invitation. The senator said an acceptance might have led Eisenhower into a trap.

"By declining, Gen. Eisenhower leaves himself free to campaign on these issues," Bridges said.

That he plans to do so was further emphasized in a letter made public in New York last night by Gov. Sherman Adams of New Hampshire, one of Eisenhower's top political advisers.

In the letter, Eisenhower said "our cause is with fighting for," and added at one point:

"It is the cause of peace against policies which are misleading us toward a third world war."

Bridges joined other Republicans in blasting the Democrats for last Tuesday's White House briefing of Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois, the Democratic nominee for president.

Bridges said it was an "outrage" that Gen. Bradley and Walter Bedell Smith, director of the Central Intelligence Agency, had been put to "cheap political use" in briefing Stevenson.

Earlier in the day Truman conferred with Stephen A. Mitchell, the Democrats new national chairman picked by Stevenson to replace Frank McKinney, Truman's appointee.

Mitchell told reporters he was assured by the President of "complete co-operation" in the campaign.

## Aiken Predicts GOP To Carry Midwest Area

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—Sen. George D. Aiken, who criticizes some members of his own party as freely as he does the Democrats, predicted today the GOP would carry five Midwest farm states it lost in 1948.

"With these five states and a co-ordinated campaign effort," the Vermont Republican said, "there is better than a good chance to win the Presidency."

Such statements from the gray-haired New Englander usually get attention. Top-ranking Republican on the Senate Agriculture Committee, Aiken frequently lambasts "the Old Guard" in his party and, in turn, is chided for sometimes voting with the Democrats in Congress.

Early this year, Aiken correctly forecast Tennessee Sen. Estes Kefauver's victory over President Truman in the New Hampshire presidential primary, first of the year in the nation.

Aiken told a reporter today that the five Midwest farm belt states, which he believes will vote Republican this year, are:

Illinois with 27 electoral votes; Iowa 10; Minnesota 11; Ohio 25; and Wisconsin 12.

"I think the farmers resent the hoodwinking that President Truman and Secretary Brannan gave them four years ago about grain storage," Aiken said.

During the 1948 campaign, Truman and Brannan contended the Republican - controlled 80th Congress (1947-48) had voted against the farmers' interest in blocking a grain storage program.

### Tourist Spend Big Money In Mexico

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 15 (AP)—Foreign tourists spent \$271,600,000 in Mexico last year but Mexicans offset this by spending \$88,400,000 abroad, mostly in the U. S.

The Banco de Mexico said last year's tourist spending was \$32,700,000 more than in 1950. The 411,000 tourists were 6 per cent more than 1950.

The bank gave no figures on the tourist influx this year. Some hotels and air lines have complained that the total is lower than last year despite the big Lions and Rotary conventions.

### Man Finishes Term For 'Mercy Killing'

ALLENTOWN, Pa. (AP)—Happy that his friends "stuck by me" 38-year-old Harold A. Mohr was home today after serving 29 months and five days for the "mercy" killing of a blind, cancer-ridden brother.

### Secrecy Surrounds Transport Plane

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Aug. 15 (AP)—The Navy threw an air of secrecy about a transport plane which arrived here in apparent trouble last night and left today for Tinker Field, Oklahoma City.

The transport Constitution arrived shortly after the U. S. destroyer tender Dixie docked from Honolulu with a group of Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana mayors and business men aboard.

The Navy declined to say whether they were the passengers which the Constitution departed with for Tinker Field.

The plane circled the city for nearly an hour yesterday after reaching here from Moffett Field, south of San Francisco. Officials at Municipal Airport, where it eventually landed, said it was reported to have had landing gear trouble.

Navy sources at San Francisco also adopted the secrecy role. The Navy Department in Washington said it had no report.

The civilians arriving on the Dixie yesterday were guests of the secretary of the Navy.

### Crump Comes Out For Demo Ticket

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP)—Shelby County political leader E. H. Crump says he hopes persons who "are ready to accept the Republicans or anyone at any price" will reserve judgment.

The 76-year-old veteran politician made the statement yesterday in endorsing the 1952 Democratic ticket of Adlai Stevenson and John Sparkman.

Crump backed the States Rights ticket in 1948 and it carried this country by a 3,000 vote majority.

"Stevenson and Sparkman guarantee there will be a house cleaning from top to bottom," Crump said, "and they are men of fine character and high reputation."

The political leader called the Republicans a "selfish inconsiderate party" and said much of their "propaganda sounds like . . . pipe dreams. . . ."

### Action On Election Dispute Is Planned

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 15 (AP)—Congress called 101 members of the new Chamber of Deputies into session today to pass on the remaining 60 elections, all disputed on fraud charges.

The new Congress does not formally meet until Sept. 1, when President Miguel Aleman will make his final report to it before leaving office.

However, since Mexican law gives the Chamber the final say in disputed election returns, the new deputies held a preliminary session for this purpose.

The National Electoral Commission has reported there is no doubt of the legality of the elections of the 101 deputies. All members of the Official Party. It said that in 60 cases more there is reason to believe there were irregularities.

### Eisenhower Strategist Is Called In McCarthy Suit

WASHINGTON (AP)—Paul G. Hoffman, a top Eisenhower campaign strategist, was listed today as a witness in Sen. Benton's (D-Conn.) defense against a two million dollar libel-slander suit filed by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

Lawyers for the embattled senators squared off for a court fight Tuesday before U. S. District Judge Burnita S. Matthews. The hearing will determine whether Hoffman should be permitted to give his testimony the same day at a deposition hearing.

The suit is an outgrowth of Benton's efforts to have McCarthy expelled from the Senate. McCarthy contends that, in this move, Benton wrongfully defamed him with baseless accusations of fraud, perjury and calculated deceit.

Gerhard van Arkel, counsel for Benton, declined to reveal his reasons for calling Hoffman as a defense witness or the nature of questions to be asked.

Edward B. Williams, a lawyer for McCarthy, in his motion for a court-ordered postponement, said Van Arkel's stand deprived him of opportunity to prepare to cross-examine the witness. He also asked for the delay to permit him to consult first with McCarthy, whom he described as too ill for such a conference now. McCarthy is at a Wisconsin resort, recovering from an operation.

Hoffman, a former economic cooperation administrator, was closely associated with Gen. George C. Marshall, whose career as wartime chief of staff and postwar secretary of state has figured prominently in the bitter McCarthy-Benton feud.

Among other things, McCarthy contends Benton libeled him with accusations of telling the Senate "a towering lie" about Gen. Marshall in a speech June 14, 1951. Benton made the accusation to a Senate Rules Subcommittee in sworn testimony last September.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 15 (AP)—The director of the National Electrification Commission flew today to Cleveland to arrange for air shipment of remaining machinery for Monterrey's new power station.

Alejandro Paz Urquiza said most of the machinery, 16 tons of it, has already arrived in Monterrey by plane. The commission is pressing work on the new power station in hope of opening it before the end of this month. But Paz Urquiza said some small odds and ends have not been shipped so he will try to expedite them.

The Nuevo Leon state Legislature, meanwhile, guaranteed a 10 million peso (\$1,150,000) bond issue to finance the city's new water supply. Bonds will be issued by the official city improvement commission, with the proceeds of the state merchants' tax dedicated to their repayment.

### End Of Controls On Milk Is Sought

CHICAGO, Aug. 15 (AP)—A drive to end government price controls on dairy products has been started by the National Milk Producers Federation.

A special decontrol committee of representatives of five dairy producers associations was appointed yesterday to meet with members of dairy groups throughout the country.

The federation says it represents farmers in 46 states who produce more than one-fifth of the nation's milk and cream.

An opposition slate headed by Mervin Mounce, 43, Spokane, Wash., contractor, was swept into office by a 1,457 to 430 vote margin over Aloise S. Knapp, Chicago, Boone's candidate.

In his acceptance speech, delivered in the nude, Mounce said: "Before you stands a humble man."

The new president then promised what he called a more businesslike, democratic association.

Boone, who fought for a year to retain control of the bareskin cult, took his defeat gracefully. Said the rotund, roundly-named preacher: "I have given 20 years of my life to nudism and I shall welcome a brief period of retirement before I kiss old Mother Earth goodbye."

## CIO Leader Urges Rally To Stevenson

By ROWLAND EVANS JR., WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—CIO President Philip Murray, attacking Dwight D. Eisenhower's expressions on social security, said today he doubts "the average citizen can find any comfort or grace in his candidacy."

Murray addressed a "get-behind-Stevenson" rally (PAC). The CIO Executive Board endorsed Democratic nominee Adlai Stevenson yesterday.

Murray quoted from what he said were past speeches and letters by

Eisenhower and declared the GOP candidate's views run "counter to the expressed purposes of the American people throughout the last 20-year period."

Heavy sarcasm in his voice, Murray said Eisenhower's 1948 and 1949 speeches on social security introduced a "fine, statesmanlike, broad vision of what America should be." He quoted Eisenhower as saying this:

"We seek the illusion called security. We want to wear fine shirts and have caviar and champagne when we should be eating hotdogs and drinking beer."

Smiling broadly, Murray commented: "Now there's a philosophy to be introduced into the American political scene."

(In a statement at Denver Aug. 9, Eisenhower called for expansion of the social security program to cover an additional 14 million persons and for increased old-age assistance grants.)

Murray made a general attack, too, on the Republican Party. He said it has "stood against any legislation to control inflation."

He said 79 per cent of Senate Republicans "voted consistently against any form of rent control," and 80 per cent of Senate Republicans and 87 per cent of House Republicans favor the Taft-Hartley Labor Relations Act which the Democratic Party platform pledges to repeal.

Murray asserted, too, that controlling forces in the Republican Party are "isolationists at heart" and have a strange, foolish notion that America can live and live alone.

Along with endorsing Stevenson yesterday, the C

KINGSVILLE, Aug. 15 (UP)—Louis Nunez found a fortune but it slipped through his fingers so fast he didn't have time to count it.

Nunez was digging post holes for a fence when his digger hit a hard metallic object. He dug out a rusted half-gallon can. The can was filled with rolled greenbacks—the old large size which the government hasn't made since 1929.

Nunez eagerly began unrolling the money. It disintegrated.

"There was nothing I could do about it," Nunez said sadly.

Neither Adan Perez, on whose lot the car was buried, nor Manuel Tijerina, who lives next door, knew anything about the money, nor did the people who lived there before them.

"A lot of money," Nunez said. "You'd just have to guess how much a can like that would hold."

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 15 (AP)—Foreign investments in Mexico increased 13 million dollars last year. At the same time, the Mexican government bought out foreign companies for a total of 17 million dollars.

The government during 1910 bought the Southern Pacific Railroad of Mexico from its U. S. owners for 12 million dollars and also bought the Mexican Gulf Oil Company from its U. S. stockholders for 2 million dollars.

Of the new foreign capital entering the country, 94 per cent came from the U. S., 4 per cent from Britain and the rest from Switzerland, Canada and France. More than half the new capital went into manufacturing.

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Aug. 15 (U.P.)—A competent source said today that Communist troops of Bulgaria fired on a Greek blockhouse near the border village of Kula Wednesday, killing two Greek soldiers.

The new Greek-Bulgarian border incident was reported amid rumors of possible joint Greek-Turkish Army maneuvers in Greek Thrace next month. Six Greek and six Turkish destroyers are engaging in joint naval maneuvers in the Aegean Sea beginning Saturday.

Last week, Greek troops, with machine guns and mortars, tiny Gantma Island in the border Evros River to force a Bulgarian patrol from the island, claimed both countries. An earlier Greek ultimatum failed to dislodge the Bulgars. The situation, looking somewhat ominous for a time, quieted down.

## Civil Construction Projects Computed

DALLAS, Aug. 15 (U.S.)—Texas will get \$11,166,000 in civil construction projects from the federal government during the present fiscal year, a division survey of the Army Engineers shows.

More than a fourth of the money, Col. Herbert D. Vogel said yesterday, will be spent on the Trinity River flood control program. Colonel Vogel is division commander of the Engineers.

The largest Trinity appropriation, Vogel said, is for \$1,118,000 for the

Garza-Little Elm Dam. Work this year will finish 65 per cent of the project. The resulting reservoir will be used to increase the water supply of Greater Dallas.

Vogel said the Dallas Floodway project will be the only new project included in recent appropriations. Congress set aside one million dollars for the project which will cost eight million when completed.

Dredging of the Houston and Galveston ship channels and other coastal installations will take \$3,500,000 of the appropriation. The engineers will spend several million dollars to maintain and repair present installations.

In other parts of the state, the Army Engineers will direct work with the following fund outlays:

1. \$2,488,000 for the \$17,750,000 Belton Reservoir of the Leon River near Belton and Fort Hood.
2. \$173,000 for finishing a power house for the already-completed \$42,000,000 Whitney Dam.
3. \$143,000 to finish locks on the Gulf Intracoastal Canal at the crossing of the Colorado River.
4. \$5,000,000 on the \$33,000,000 Texarkana Reservoir to bring the project from 42 per cent complete to 63 per cent complete.

Other Trinity appropriations include \$400,000 to complete the \$11,600,000 Layon Dam, and \$700,000 to continue work on the Fort Worth Floodway.

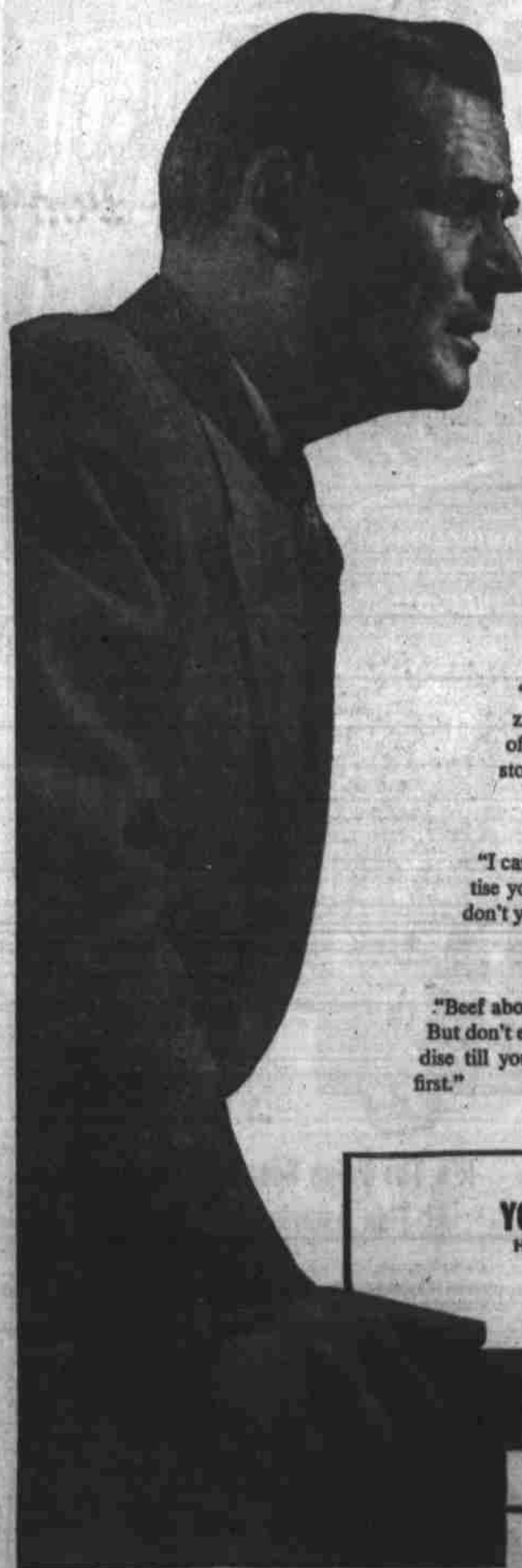

## Costello Surrenders To Begin First Prison Term In 37 Years

NEW YORK, Aug. 15 (AP)—Frank Costello, underworld gambling kingpin, surrendered today to begin serving his first prison term in 37 years.

Costello, who had been free in \$5,000 bail, was convicted of contempt of the Senate for refusing to answer questions concerning his finances before the Senate Crime Committee at a televised hearing in New York in March, 1951.

Dapper as always, the gambler, 62, wore a light blue flannel pencil-striped suit and light blue-figured tie as he stepped from an automobile and entered the Federal Court-house to begin an 18-month sentence.

Courthouse attaches said the sentence probably will be served in the Federal Correction Institute at Danbury, Conn.

There, the fashion-plate and jay-jay tipper will be required to don drab dungarees and limit his expenditures to \$10 a month for such items as cigarettes and shaving supplies.

Costello disappointed a crowd of about 200 persons waiting at the courthouse main entrance by entering through a side doorway.

He was smiling and appeared undisturbed. He shook hands amiably with several reporters he recognized but amiably declined to comment on how he felt about going to jail for the first time since serving

a short term on a gun carrying charge in 1915.

But to questions concerning his health, he replied:

"I feel fine, just fine."

Costello pushed his way through the courthouse crowd and coolly asked directions to the marshal's office. When he reached the office, he turned to photographers and asked patiently:

"Boys, what do you want me to do? You have many pictures."

Then a deputy marshal appeared at the door, took him by the arm and escorted him into the office.

A courthouse spokesman said Costello would be held in the Federal House of Detention here over the week end and the director of prisons would decide where Costello would serve his sentence. He will be eligible for parole in six months.

Often termed the "prime minister of the underworld," Costello previously served only one jail sentence — a 10-month stretch in a New York State institution in 1915 for illegally carrying a gun.

During his meteoric rise to a top underworld figure, the government tried to jail Costello on rum-running, stolen jewelry and tax charges, but he beat off every attempt.

Costello, in and out of bigtime racket news for more than a quarter of a century, held the interest of the nation during the televised crime committee hearings headed by Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.).

After he refused to have his face televised, millions watched his nervously twisting hands while he hoarsely croaked his answers to committee probers.

Living quietly but sumptuously with his wife of many years, Costello always tried to dodge the limelight.

He once protested to newsmen that he didn't have enough political influence in New York City "to fix a traffic ticket."

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—Eleven congressmen left today for a four-week tour of Pacific military installations, including Korea.

Members said they intended making a thorough inquiry of all phases of the American position in the Pacific, from the cost of military construction to future strategy in the Korean War.

The party, traveling by special plane, will visit Hawaii, Johnston and Kwajalein Islands, Guam, Manila, Okinawa, Tokyo, Korea and Alaska. They will return Sept. 14.

Included are Reps. Fisher and Wilson of Texas.

## Tax Reduction Not Indicated In Democratic Party's Platform

Taxes, like death, are certain and unavoidable, and both platforms adopted in Chicago take notice of that. Condensed for quick understanding they read:

Democratic—"As rapidly as defense requirements permit, we favor reducing taxes, especially for people with lower incomes. But we will not imperil our nation's security by making reckless promises to reduce taxes."

Republican—"We advocate... reduction of expenditures by the elimination of waste and extravagance so that the budget will be balanced and a general tax reduction can be made."

The Democratic plank in the platform formulated under direction of the administration gives no hope of tax reduction nor of reduced spending. It proposes tax reduction as rapidly as defense requirements permit, and as those so-called requirements are increasing daily instead of diminishing, we cannot look for tax re-

duction "in our time."

The Republican plank proposes to approach that reduction by reducing spending that is wasteful and extravagant. That there is much of the spending that fairly comes under that head has been shown so often and so plainly that there can be no denial of it. Spending for defense and for many other purposes can be reduced without endangering or hampering the safety of the nation.

The Republican platform does not promise tax reduction unless and until there is a saving by reason of stopping the waste. It is a reasonable proposal, and can be taken in good faith by the people who pay the taxes. For the waste by overbuying and by paying unduly high prices can be stopped and should be stopped. Unless it is done we shall be staggering under a load of debt not only during our lifetime but during the lifetime of unborn generations.

## The Practical, And Legal, Way Is Simply To Split The Ticket

Meeting in Austin to canvass the vote in the first Democratic Primary, the Executive Committee received resolutions adopted by Gregg and Rusk County conventions, asking that the committee submit to the voters in a referendum whether the names of the nominees of the Chicago Convention should be put on the ticket in the November election.

The committee very properly decided it had no authority to call a referendum. The delegation from Texas to Chicago gave assurance that it would do everything possible to have the names of the nominees put on the November ballots, and that promise should be kept by the people who were represented by the delegation.

What seems to be the motive behind these petitions is that a lot of voters want to vote for the Republican nominees and still keep the name of Democrats. They cling to the label that for twenty years has been meaningless so far as

representing principles which it originally supported. The time for that has gone by. Labels mean nothing today in politics, and voters may as well begin to understand that.

Substituting the names of Eisenhower and Nixon for Stevenson and Sparkman under the label "Democratic" in Texas would not make them Democrats and a voter casting a ballot for them would not be a Democrat in national politics, for the men and not the label would determine the vote.

The simple way, and an entirely legal way, for such voters to mark their ticket is to vote for the Republican nominees for the national offices and for the Democratic nominees for state and county offices. Texas did that in 1928, and if any man who then voted for Hoover and Curtis instead of Smith and Robinson ever had his democracy questioned, it was not on a very serious basis.

## Merry-Go-Round—Drew Pearson

### Eisenhower Discovers His Need For An Advisory 'General Staff'

WASHINGTON.—Close friends of General Eisenhower report that he is now almost getting accustomed to American politics. It is no secret that at first he was most unhappy.

Even during the Chicago convention, Ike gripped privately at the things he was required to do. Once he confided to a friend: "If I'd known it was going to be like this I'd never have gotten into it. The people who came to see me in Paris didn't tell me about all these things. They didn't tell me about all the backslapping and the silly questions."

"What I need," Ike continued, "is a good chief of staff."

The General has been a good sport, however, and despite an occasional private grumble, has settled down for the long, tough campaign that he knows will begin right after Labor Day.

He is not, however, sticking his neck out on any important decisions until after consulting his "general staff." He has surrounded himself with some of the best professional GOP politicians in the business, and he is leaning heavily on their advice. Politics, he has concluded, is no game for amateurs.

While the U.S.A. is engaged in domestic politics, some significant and different kind of politics is taking place below the Rio Grande. The Kremlin is sending its toughest ambassador and skilled saboteur to direct a new drive to win over Latin America.

He is Vasily Y. Yezhov, who replaces career Russian diplomat Nicholas Gorkin as ambassador to Uruguay. His appointment marks a new and important shift in Kremlin policy.

The fact that Ambassador Yezhov is being stationed in Uruguay is due to that country's being one of only four south-of-the-border republics which still retain formal relations with the Soviet Union. The others are Argentina, Mexico and Guatemala. Brazil, Chile, Cuba and Venezuela have all severed diplomatic ties with Moscow.

A few years ago, Mexico and Cuba were the western hemisphere's most active centers of Communist propaganda. Control of organized labor in both countries was in the hands of Reds or faith/b party-liners, while the Communists always had strategically placed friends inside the Cuban and Mexican governments.

Moreover, local communists could count on liberal help from the large staffs and fat budgets of the Soviet embassies in Havana and Mexico City. But, as the cold war settled in, and especially after fighting started in Korea, all the Russian money that was available couldn't keep the Red cause from losing Mexican and Cuban sympathizers by the thousands.

When the Batista regime took the first opportunity to force a break with Moscow, Russian embassy personnel in Havana, including cooks, chauffeurs and gardeners, had dwindled to a total of 14, against 40 in 1948.

During that same period, Mexico, although maintaining outwardly correct relations with the Kremlin, was getting progressively tougher in her official attitude toward domestic Reds. Furthermore, President Miguel Aleman's government has dealt out some pointed social snubs to Russian diplomats in the last two years.

Real barometer of the drastic wave of Communist influence in Mexico came with last month's general elections, when Labor-Leader Vicente Lombardo Toledano, a fellow traveler, received only about 10,000 votes for the presidency—less than

one-half of 1 per cent of the total cast.

Meanwhile, little Uruguay, politically the freest and most democratic nation in Latin America, became increasingly the focal point for Moscow's maneuvers. Uruguayan immigration laws permit citizens of all adjoining countries to enter and leave at will without so much as a tourist card. Taking advantage of this, the communists made Montevideo their chief international meeting-place in the western hemisphere.

Ambassador Gorkin, Moscow's envoy there since 1940, was a shrewd, smooth customer with a record of 18 years' loyal service in the Soviet diplomatic corps. He made few personal friends in Uruguay, but he also avoided making conspicuous enemies. He also showed a fine knack for engineering Communist reunions without inconvenient publicity and helped a handful of native Red leaders to keep several key labor unions under Moscow's thumbs.

However, Communist influence in Uruguay also began to slip badly—and, with it, Ambassador Gorkin's prestige in the Kremlin. Now he has been recalled in favor of a man with a quite different background and a sharply revised mission.

Vasily Yezhov, the new ambassador to Montevideo, is a personal protégé of NKVD Chief Lavrenty P. Beria—perhaps the most powerful individual in Soviet Russia today and frequently mentioned as Stalin's possible successor. Yezhov only entered the Moscow foreign office 18 months ago, and the Uruguayan job is his first assignment abroad. He is a hard-boiled Communist first, and a diplomat second.

He will not follow his predecessor's policies of seeking to woo workers while soft-pedaling Russian aggression. His task, aided by a handpicked five-man staff, is to promote trouble, unrest, and sabotage.

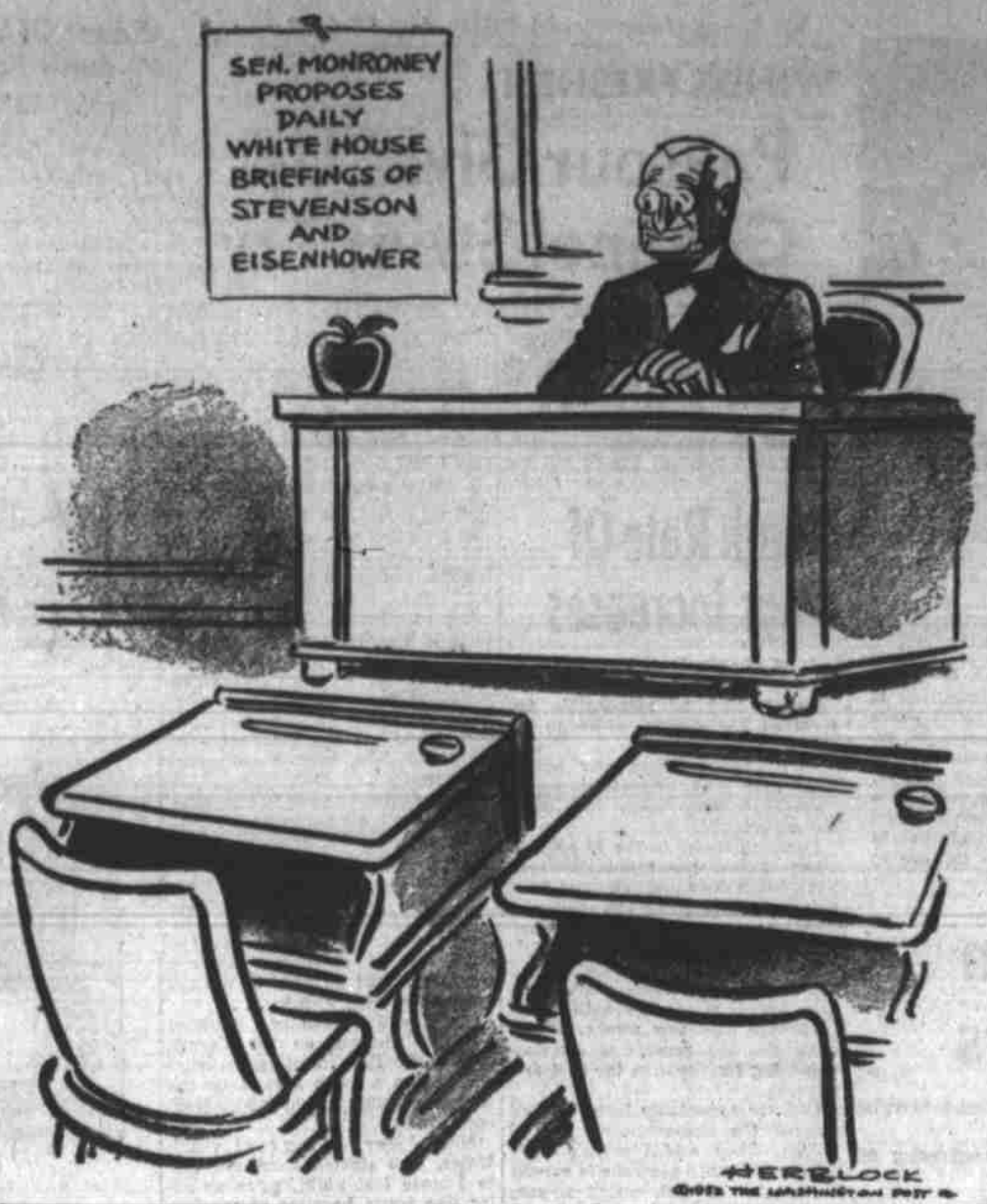
Nor will that undertaking be confined to Uruguay. Soviet leaders are reported to be convinced that Eva Peron's death provides a made-to-order opportunity for stepped-up Communist activity in Buenos Aires.

It can safely be assumed that Ambassador Yezhov, thoroughly trained in terrorist technique by the acknowledged world master of that dread art, has the Argentine situation high on his list of orders from Moscow.

Prominently posted in the office of Congressman Frank Chelf of Kentucky, chief prober of the Justice Department, is this "prayer"—"Dear Lord: Teach me to keep my big mouth shut until I know what I'm talking about and deliver me from babbling what little I do know.—Amen."

The late great Sen. Brian McMahon of Connecticut, whose death from cancer at 46 recently shocked the nation, literally gave his life for his country. McMahon sacrificed his health while working a man-killing schedule of 14 to 16 hours a day as chairman of the Atomic Energy Committee and for his constituents.

Homer Capehart of Indiana never opens his mouth about one example of New Deal "creeping socialism" right in his own home town of Washington, Ind., population about 10,000. In contrast, Arlington, Va.—population about 100,000—in Senator Byrd's domain across the Potomac from the nation's capital, hasn't a single public pool for water-heated kids in this hot weather.

### Members Of The Press Didn't Expect Startling News At This Conference

WASHINGTON.—It was like a meeting of the stockholders with the chairman of the board of directors.

There wasn't much they expected him to say. It was as if they were thinking more of the two younger fellows scrambling for his job.

The place was the small auditorium on the fourth floor of the old State Department building next to the White House.

Newsmen and radio and TV commentators wandered in and took seats, which weren't hard to find. Many times in the past the auditorium had been packed for just such an occasion as this. But yesterday there was plenty of room.

And the men and women did what they had always done on other days in this room while waiting for the hands of the clock to reach 4 p.m.

They talked casually. This time it was about Gen. Eisenhower's refusal of President Truman's invitation to a White House briefing. And they chuckled over Gov. Stevenson's speech earlier in the day in Illinois, a speech taking amused digs at Eisenhower and the Republicans.

The hands moved on until they reached 4. Then President Truman came in, natty and lively as usual. Through the round tinted lenses of his glasses he looked at the men and women facing him and grinned in greeting.

Very often at the opening of these news conferences the President had a statement to make. He raised a mimeographed sheet of paper and said there were plenty of copies for anyone who wanted them.

It was a letter, he said, bemoaning the fact that most of the old White House furniture had disappeared or been sold in years past. That was the only announcement he had. He was ready for ques-

tions, and, like everyone there, he knew what was coming: questions about his invitation to Eisenhower and when it was sent.

The newsmen seemed to be having difficulty in thinking of questions to ask. In times past they had tumbled over one another in their clamor for answers.

No, the President said, and even in no time, however, they

seemed to run out of questions altogether. There were long pauses.

One of the regular White House correspondents thought it was about time to put an end to this. He got up and asked the President if he had "anything else you want to tell us?"

No, the President said, and everybody laughed. So that was that.

## Around The Rim—The Herald Staff

### If All Candidates Stay In The Middle, Collision Might Result

Terminology used in political campaigns can be very confusing (some of it probably was developed specifically for that purpose) but there is a chance that some of it is based on logic, when considered on the basis of literal meaning.

For example the terms "left" and "right" came in for strange usage when mentioned in connection with a candidate. Of course most people who keep up with politics are aware that a "left" candidate is supposed to be a liberal, while a "right" is generally conceded to be a conservative.

There are both "left" and "right" candidates who claim to be headed for the same objective. They could reach it, of course, by taking occasionally, because it stands to reason that a person can turn either direction and still reach any given goal by turning back the other way at the proper time.

Hence, it should not necessarily be confusing when a candidate comes along with "left" ideas on some things and "right" ideas on some others. It may be his method

of tackling — tackling into office, that is.

If we are to believe much that we hear about the presidential candidates of both major parties this year, each has put himself in a position to do some tackling, and in our estimation the type of administration the country has during the next four years could be virtually the same under leadership of either Ike or Adlai. (Not necessarily the same we have had during the past four years, however.)

Our interpretation of proceedings so far indicates that Ike is somewhat "left" of many leaders in his party, especially the Robert A. Taft people, while Adlai shows signs of settling somewhere in the "right" of the Kefauver and Truman forces in that party.

Apparently neither Ike nor Adlai plans to spend much time dilly-dallying around the "middle-of-the-road." After all, that's a good position for a fatal collision in the heavy traffic of this modern era.

## Gallup Poll

### GOP Strength Up By 15 Per Cent In Large Cities Outside South

PRINCETON, N. J.—Judging by the first reaction of the electorate in the present "warm up" stage of the campaign, the Republican party appears to have gained ground in the nation's big cities—vital territory for the Democrats in 1952.

Eisenhower's chances in November depend in part on whether he can cut into the large Democratic majorities in metropolitan areas. All but one of the 17 cities with 500,000 population or more went Democratic four years ago.

To determine what the situation is in the big cities this year, interviewers for the Institute polled voters in the nation's 15 largest cities outside the South on the following question:

"If the presidential election were being held today, which POLITICAL PARTY would you like to see win—the Republican party or the Democratic party?"

The vote of those expressing a definite preference or a "leaning" is as follows for the 15 cities combined:

Republican ..... 39%  
Democratic ..... 52%  
Undecided ..... 9

100%

If the undecided were to vote approximately as the rest do, the two-party vote would be:

Republican ..... 43%  
Democratic ..... 57

When this is compared with the vote for the same areas in the 1948 election, the Republicans register a gain of about 4 percentage points, as follows:

General Eisenhower runs about 3 percentage points more popular than his party in the same big city areas. This is perhaps due to the fact that his opponent, Gov. Adlai Stevenson, is still relatively unknown to the public.

The 15 cities, which cast a total of more than 10 million votes in the 1948 election, are:

New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Los Angeles, Detroit, Baltimore, Cleveland, St. Louis, Boston, San Francisco, Pittsburgh, Milwaukee, Buffalo, Minneapolis and Cincinnati.

Boston showed the lowest percentage of Republican vote of these 15 cities, Cincinnati the highest.

## Uncle Ray's Corner

### Earth's Light, To Half Of Moon

Before a visit to the moon is attempted, many tests should be made inside vacuum rooms. The air in a tight room can be pumped out to such an extent that the vacuum will be almost like that around the moon.

If a person stood in such a room while the air was being pumped out, he would die unless he had special protection. In a diving suit, with an oxygen supply and with air pressure around his body, he might live while the early part of the pumping was going on. An ordinary diving suit, however, could hardly stand the strain of such an almost-complete vacuum as it is possible to make.

Tests might prove that a man would be safe in the midst of a vacuum if he stayed inside a long and very strong barrel.

With such a barrel, fitted with motor-driven wheels, a visitor might travel across parts of the moon. Other parts would be too rough for passage. We know that much of the moon's surface is rough land, and there are tall mountains.

The moon rotates only once in four weeks. This means that a person at any given spot would see the sun for two weeks, and then would go through two weeks of darkness. Scientists tell us that the surface of the moon is very hot during the daytimes and very cold at night. It is far colder at night than at the North Pole or South Pole of the earth.

During the moon's night, the earth usually shines in the sky. To a man who looked from there, the shining earth would seem more than three times as wide as the moon does to us.

There is a way to prove that the earth shines on the moon. Many a time a person is likely to see "the old moon in the new moon's arms." This sight is observed at the time of the New Moon, when the

In approximately half the cities the G.O.P. vote amounted to less than 40 per cent—an indication of the tough fight facing Eisenhower if he is to change the situation.

One factor favorable to the Democrats this year in the big cities is the absence of any strong third party.

In 1948 Henry A. Wallace, running on the Progressive ticket, so seriously split the Democratic vote in New York City that the party lost the state to Dewey.

The Wallace vote also drew substantial support away from the Democrats in Los Angeles and San Francisco.

## AT UNIVERSITY

### Texan In Carolina May Be New Prexy

AUSTIN, Aug. 15 (U-P)—A Texan holding down a top post at the University of North Carolina has been reported "out front" for the choice as president of the University of Texas.

He is Logan Wilson, academic vice president of the consolidated University of North Carolina.

University of Texas regents met here yesterday to pick a successor to retiring President T. S. Painter. But a regents subcommittee screening presidential prospects announced it would postpone a report until next Thursday.

Subcommittee Chairman Tom

Sealy of Midland, however, said three men were under "serious consideration," with one of the three "out front."

And a reliable source said Wilson was the man "out front." Sealy explained the delay in a recommendation with: "We just know it's an important step, and we're going to be darn sure we're right."

Wilson was in Austin when the regents met. But he declined to answer questions.

Wilson, 45, is the son of the late Calhoun Wilson, a professor of agriculture at Sam Houston State Teachers College at Huntsville.

He attended Sam Houston State from 1923 to 1926, received a Master's degree in sociology from the University of Texas in 1927 attended Southern Methodist University in 1928-34, tutored at Harvard and received another Master's degree and his Doctor's degree from Harvard in 1939.

Wilson, who worked briefly as a reporter for the Houston Press in 1927 and taught at East Texas State College before going to Harvard, became an associate professor of sociology at the University of Maryland from 1939 to 1941.

He was head of the sociology department at Tulane University 1941-42, held the same position at the University of Kentucky in 1943-44, and returned to Tulane as dean of Newcomb College from 1944 to 1951.

He then went to the University of North Carolina as vice president.

Wilson is married and has two sons, Marshall and Reed Calhoun. The University of Texas presidency pays \$15,000 a year, plus a home and utilities. Dr. Painter is stepping down from the post after nearly eight years to return to his teaching and research as a distinguished professor of zoology.

## Poison Death Trial Moves Along Slowly

WETUMPKA, Ala. (U-P)—The slow-moving day-old murder trial of Mrs. Earle Dennis, charged with poisoning her infant niece, proceeded methodically today with only two witnesses heard from thus far.

Court was called for 9 a. m. (CST) after an overnight recess. Although the trial began at 9 o'clock yesterday morning, it was almost seven hours later before testimony started, after attorneys and Circuit Judge Oakley Melton had finished the painstaking job of qualifying and striking a jury.

Women are barred by law from jury duty in Alabama.

The former operating room nurse at Wetumpka General Hospital is charged with giving fatal doses of arsenic to two small nieces—one of them nearly three years ago and the other last May 1. But she is being tried now only for the death of the latter child, curly-haired 2-year-old Shirley Dianne Weldon.

Whether the 34-year-old widow will be prosecuted also for the poisoning of Shirley's sister, Polly Anne, will depend on the outcome of her first trial. Polly was two

years old when she died.

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. G. Weldon of rural Claud Community near Wetumpka, were the only witnesses heard yesterday. Both testified that Shirley Dianne became violently ill after she drank two soft drinks given her by the visiting aunt.

Mrs. Weldon told the jury the middle-aged nurse tried to keep her from taking the stricken child to a doctor but finally agreed and went along herself when the mother insisted.

Sheriff Lester Holley has said the aunt admitted giving arsenic to Shirley Dianne but denied intentionally poisoning the first child. He said she admitted collecting \$5,000 in insurance on Polly Anne and that she reportedly had two policies on the second child totaling \$6,000.

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## The Tragedy of Saul

DISOBEDIENCE CAUSED HIS DOWNFALL

Scripture—1 Samuel 13-14; 15; 28; 29; 31.

NAPOLÉON BONAPARTE died a lonely exile on the island of St. Helena; Benito Mussolini was slain by his own people, and Adolf Hitler is reported to have shot himself in his Berlin bunker when defeat was certain.

These three men may have thought they were "chosen by God," but they arrived at their eminence through their own ambition and selfish planning. Saul, who was chosen of Jehovah to be king of Israel and the conqueror of its enemies, came to a tragic end because of his self-will and disobedience to Jehovah's commands.

He was a fine man in many ways, brave, and of a good mind but strong-willed and possibly not too sure of his position, distrustful, unsure of himself.

We cannot go into all the details of this long lesson, as space will not permit. It is too bad because it is full of dramatic action. Saul had been ordered by Samuel to wait for him to come to

Jehovah as great delight in burnt-offerings and sacrifices, as in obeying the voice of Jehovah? Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice, and to hearken than the fat of rams."

Samuel grieved over Saul, and prayed all one night for him. David had slain the Philistine giant, Goliath, and the people loved David above all the people of the kingdom.

Saul had become increasingly jealous and afraid of him, so when after the victory the king heard the women dancing and singing, "Saul hath slain his thousands, and David his tens of thousands," he began to hate the youth.

One day when David was playing his harp in Saul's presence, a terrible mood came upon the king, and he heaved a javelin at David. Fortunately, David escaped.

Saul even consulted a witch—the Witch of Endor—to see what his future might be, and Samuel who had died in the meantime, was brought (by Jehovah) to him, to wait for him to come to

Gilgal to offer sacrifice to the Lord before a battle. Saul waited seven days, then as his people were frightened and began to desert him, he decided not to wait for Samuel. He offered the sacrifice, and then Samuel appeared.

Samuel was shocked that Saul had disobeyed the command and said to Saul, "Thou hast done foolishly; thou hast not kept the commandment of Jehovah thy God, which He commanded thee, for now would Jehovah have established thy kingdom upon Israel for ever."

"But now thy kingdom shall not continue: the Lord hath sought Him a man after His own heart."

The next act of disobedience was when Saul was commanded to smite the Amalekites and utterly destroy them, and all their possessions. This nomadic tribe which had been of great annoyance to the Israelites, was defeated utterly in battle, and the people were slaughtered, but Saul's thrifty followers could not bear to kill the livestock, so took them with them.

When Samuel came to see if Jehovah's word had been obeyed, Saul assured him that all had been done as commanded. Samuel, however, asked what the meaning was of the bleating he heard. Saul answered that he had taken the king of the Amalekites captive, but the people had taken the sheep and oxen to make sacrifices to the Lord.

Samuel's answer was: "Hath

and the seer said to Saul, "Wherefore then dost thou ask of me, seeing the Lord is departed from thee, and is become thine enemy?" Poor Saul must have been assured then that his career, probably his life, was drawing to a close.

Another great battle with the Philistines brought about the final defeat. "And the battle went sore against Saul, and the archers overtook him; and he was greatly distressed by reason of the archers."

Then said Saul to his armor-bearer, Draw thy sword, and thrust me therewith; lest these uncircumcised come and thrust me through and abuse me. But his armor-bearer would not; for he was sore afraid. Therefore, Saul took his sword, and fell upon it."

Jonathan and Saul's other sons were also killed in the same battle. The enemy fastened Saul's body to the wall of Bethshan, but some of the men over whom Saul had ruled must have loved him, for "all the valiant men arose, and went all night, and took the body of Saul and the bodies of his sons from the wall of Bethshan, and came to Jabesh, and burnt them there."

"And they took their bones, and buried them under a tree at Jabesh, and fasted seven days."

So in deep tragedy ended the life of Israel's first king, because he disobeyed Jehovah and the Lord deserted him.

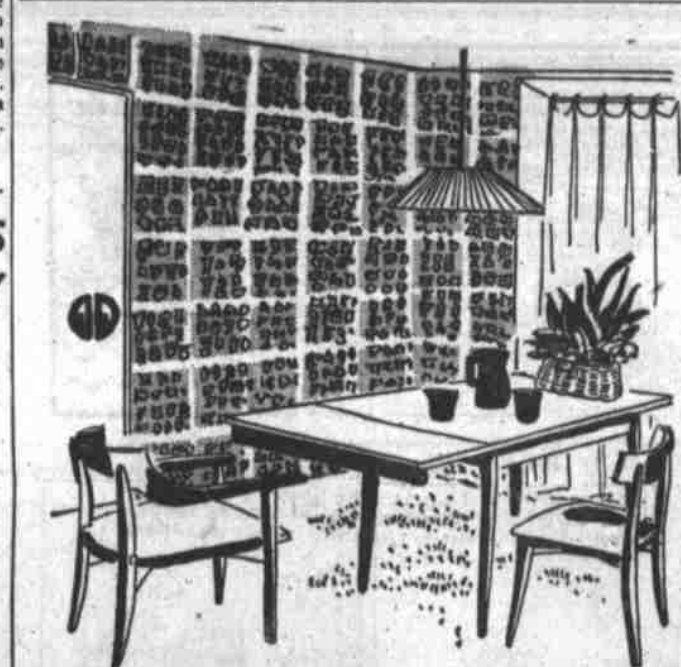

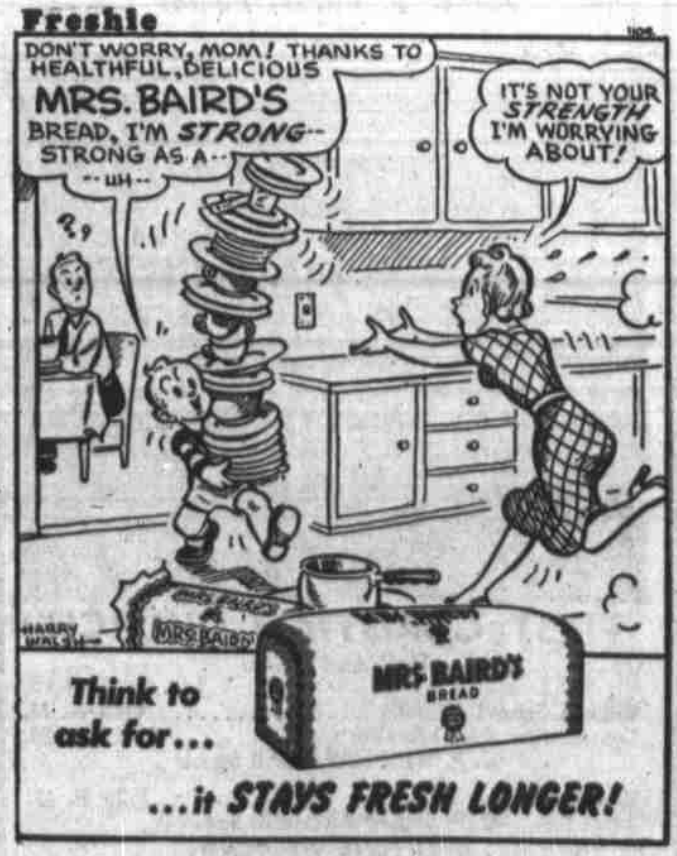

Johnny Schmitz is the latest senior circuit discard to find life with Casey Stengel extremely pleasant.

Stengel, who grew old before his time while managing weak teams at Boston and Brooklyn in the National League, gave Schmitz his first start in the "new land" yesterday. The one-time Chicago and Brooklyn lefthander responded with a 7-2 victory over Washington.

The victory boosted the Yankees' margin over the second place Cleveland Indians to three games. The Indians and St. Louis Browns were idle.

Hard-working Al Corwin turned in a fine relief job to enable the Giants to shade the Dodgers. Corwin allowed only two hits in the last four innings to protect Sal Maglie's 12th victory.

Maglie, making his first appearance since July 16th, when he injured his back in a game against St. Louis, blanked the Dodgers until the sixth when he aggravated the injury.

**AFL Is Winding Up**  
**Five-Day Meeting**

**By JOHN BAUSMAN**  
**ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (U) —** The  
American Federation of Labor's  
top men wind up a five-day meet-  
ing today which has planned tradi-  
tion-shattering events for the AFL's  
71st annual convention.  
Ever before has the AFL asked  
candidates for president to speak  
at its national meeting. Yesterday,  
however, invitations were wired to  
Republican Dwight D. Eisenhower  
and Democrat Adlai E. Stevenson.  
This might lead the federation,  
which for many years has shunned  
taking sides in presidential cam-  
paigns, to break another tradition  
and name a favorite nominee.  
Another new event was added to  
the convention program when the  
AFL Executive Council yesterday  
decided to invite a fraternal dele-  
gate from the International Con-  
ederation of Free Trade Unions.  
He will be asked to address the  
approximately 700 to 800 delegates  
to the convention which opens Sept.  
15 in New York.  
AFL President William Green  
said the decision to put an ICFU  
delegate on the program was based  
on advice of the AFL International  
Relations Committee. The AFL had  
a falling out with the ICFU over  
a year ago. It opposed certain  
other members who wanted to ad-  
mit Yugoslav labor unions. There  
were other points of disagreement  
on the organizational level.  
However, after a recent confer-  
ence with the international group's  
top officers, the committee decided  
the AFL should consider resum-  
ing an active role in the ICFU.  
The AFL was one of the founders  
of the ICFU in 1945, along with  
the CIO and other free trade  
unions which were unable to get  
along with the Communists in the  
World Federation of Trade Unions.  
The AFL has maintained its  
membership despite the disagree-  
ments.

## Freak Torrid Zone Endures

A freak north-south torrid zone bisected the nation Thursday.

A belt of 100+ degree heat stretched almost from Mexico to Canada through parts of Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska and North and South Dakota.

A fresh surge of cool Canadian air spread into the Northern Rockies and northwest sections of the Midwest today, but forecasters said it probably would not move very deep into the South.

The cooler air was expected to reach the Chicago area by late Friday or early Saturday and then work south and eastward to Oklahoma, Arkansas, Tennessee and Virginia.

Midday temperatures Thursday included: Ft. Worth, Tex., 105; the 13th consecutive day of 100-degree or more heat; Tulsa, Okla., 100; Chadron, Neb., 100; and Aberdeen, S. D., 104.

Numerous thunderstorms, with some rather heavy squalls, boiled up from the Rockies and Northern Plains eastward into Minnesota and Iowa.

Fair and pleasant weather prevailed in the Northeast and along the Pacific Coast.

## TUNE IS CHANGED

### Russia's Hate Hymn Against US Suddenly Hits Sour Note

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER

WASHINGTON (U-P) — State Department officials believe that the Russians, in their hymn of hate against the United States, have hit a sour note which their propaganda directors are suddenly trying to soft pedal.

The situation created an opening for a U. S. propaganda counter-attack which the Voice of America has been pressing for some weeks. Russian reaction indicates, officials say, that the counterattack is worrying the Kremlin.

Here is what happened: The Soviet Union has always tried to present itself to the world as a friend of all peoples and an enemy only of small groups of "warmongers," "enemies of peace," "Wall Street imperialists" and the like.

For many months and particularly since the beginning of their charges that American forces were using germ warfare in Korea, however, the Soviet propagandists have attacked the whole American Army as an army of "monsters"

and "cannibals" guilty of committing the most violent atrocities.

They also have assailed many aspects of American life such as sports, politics, business and social activities.

Taking all these elements together, the Voice of America began telling the world that the Soviet Union was conducting a "hate America" campaign, blackening the reputation of a whole people for the first time in Soviet history.

In recent days two Soviet publications, "News" and "New Times," have carried articles disavowing any such campaign, and re-stating the familiar line that the Russians love everybody.

Similar denials and protests have been voiced by Russian radio commentators usually in English or some other non-Russian language.

One of the interesting things about the denials, authorities said today, is that they have been directed toward the world outside of Russia while the hate campaign has been heaviest in publications and radio broadcasts in the Russian language, directed to the Russian people.

Why the Soviets should have stepped up their propaganda against the United States has been a subject of intensive discussion in the State Department and other interested government agencies.

One obvious conclusion is that since the United States is the leading power in the Western defense alliance it is the logical target for Soviet vituperation.

Another idea advanced by the experts is that the Russian rulers may be whipping up their propaganda to try to overcome the weariness and indifference of the people they control.

Still another speculation has been that they might be trying to create a war psychology in Russia. But the experts generally discount this on the ground that there are no other signs that the Russians are deliberately preparing for war in the predictable future.

## Officers Search For Nude Recluse

SILSBEE, Aug. 15 (U-P) — Folks in these parts are on the alert for "the nude man of the Big Thicket."

Sheriff A. D. (Red) Lindsey says he's going after the elusive character with blood hounds.

Will Kelley, who lives in Honey Island, got the first glimpse of the nude man.

Kelley saw a large, deeply tanned hairy man while returning on horseback from his farm northwest of Honey Island. Kelley said the man wore only a huge board.

Sheriff Lindsey hurried to the scene and traced barefoot tracks into a thicket.

Dan Sutton, who lives northwest of Honey Island, said he met the nude once on a back woods road and walked with him about 100 yards. Sutton then told the man he was going to "call the law."

The man replied: "I've been out here three years, and if the law comes out they'll have to shoot it out with me." Sutton said the man had a gun in each hand.

Sheriff Lindsey said blood hounds will be used to track down the elusive nude.

## San Antonio Getting Slum Clearance Funds

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (U-P) — A preliminary advance of \$70,500 has been approved to help San Antonio, Tex., plan a slum clearance project.

The Housing and Home Finance Agency said the money will finance studies and surveys of proposed redevelopment of 425 acres in three sections. They are the Laredo Street warehouse, Civic Center and Edgewood areas.

The agency in June, 1950, reserved federal funds totaling \$1,970,360 for aiding the project when it is finally undertaken.

## Two Boys Drown In Atlanta Lake

ATLANTA, Tex., Aug. 15 (U-P) — Two boys drowned in a lake near here yesterday while the parents of one attended the funeral of another drowning victim.

The bodies of Charles Alan Rutland, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Rutland, and Jimmie Allen Thomas, 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Thomas, were taken from six feet of water by a neighbor.

The Thomas boy's parents left him and a brother, nine-year old J. W. Thomas, with the Rutlands while they attended services for Donald Golden, 4, who drowned Tuesday.

The two Thomas boys and the Rutland lad slipped away to a nearby lake for a "swim." Actually none could swim. And a short time later, the younger Thomas boy ran to the Rutland home screaming that he thought the other two boys were drowning.

The Golden child drowned in the Cypress River near Jefferson. He was a grand-nephew of the Thomases.

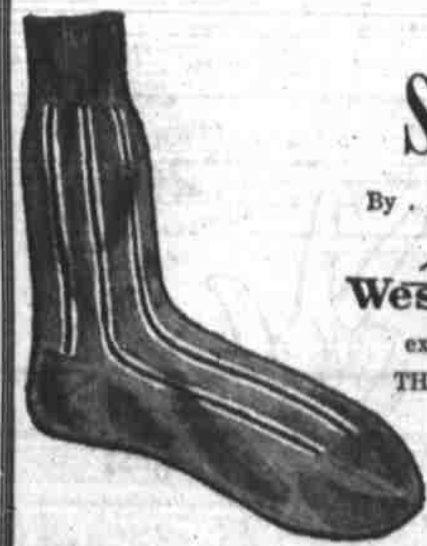
