Mr. Cain selected him from among about 200 other boys. Jesse Young and Elmer Grounds helped move a piano onto the stage before an audience of about 450 people.

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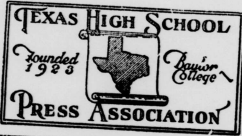

This Week's Biography

George Washington

"A great soldier and statesman." That was George Washington, first president of the United States. Washington descended from the Washingtons of Sulgrave Manor in Northamptonshire, a family running back to a Norman knight, Sir William de Hertburn. Sir William became lord of a manor in England about 1150. In 1558, Washington, as it was called, was

West of the county, Virginia. John was elected to the House of Burgesses and was colonel of the Virginia militia. John, at his death, left his estate to Lawrence, his eldest son. Lawrence's second son, Augustine, married Jane Butler. Three sons and one daughter were born to Jane. At Jane's death, Lawrence married Mary Ball, the mother of four sons and two daughters. The eldest son of the second marriage, George Washington, was born Feb. 22, 1732, near Pope Creek in Westmoreland. Three years later the family moved to Stafford county to an estate on the Rappahannock, opposite Fredericksburg, Va. Augustine Washington died in 1743 at 43 years of age. George was put under the charge of a pa-

lance of the chemistry laboratory. During the past week the Chemistry class has been studying the halogen family. This family of elements is from the most active to the least active; fluorine, bromine, chlorine and iodine.

To prepare these elements a mixture of a compound containing the element wanted, manganese dioxide, and concentrated sulfuric acid are used.

Flourine is a pale greenish-yellow gas and because of its great reactivity it has to be prepared in a dissolve glass and is used principally for etching glass. Wax bottles are used to store flourine in.

Chlorine is a greenish-yellow gas. It is used in bleaching agents as a disinfectant, a deodorant and during the World War. Its most abundant compound in nature is sodium chloride or common table salt.

Bromine is a deep reddish-brown liquid and one of the two very pungent odor and is very dangerous to inhale which is a characteristic of all the halogen family. Bromine compounds are used in medicine, photography, and in the making of dyes.

Iodine is a purplish-black solid and is not so active as the other halogens. Iodine does not occur free in nature. Its compounds are widely distributed, though in small amounts. Iodine or its compounds are used in medicines, photography, and in dyes.
