City's Modern Steam Laundry Provides Big Weekly Payroll

A business firm that offers considerable to Cisco in the way of activity and weekly payroll is the Cisco Steam Laundry — where 35 persons are regularly employed. The payroll runs in excess of \$1,000 a week.

The Cisco Steam Laundry is a steam laundry in every sense of the word. Its 55x110 building at 103 West 9th Street is completely equipped with modern machinery, and a 50 horsepower boiler provides the steam. Equipment includes two double shirt units, six wearing apparel press units, six wash wheels, four extractors, three tumblers, six roll flat ironers and other items.

The plant can put out 4,000 lb. of commercial and family work and 650 shirts a day, which is a lot of washing and ironing. The facilities of the Cisco plant serve the people of Cisco, Breckenridge, Eastland and Baird, offering them complete laundry service and linen supply.

Owners of the plant are Lewis Lee, retired groceryman, who resides at 1413 Avenue D; Mrs. Lilly Harrington of Carlsbad, N. Mex.; and O. L. (Bill) Lee, 400 Ave. I, Cisco. Bill Lee is the general manager. Lewis Lee, his father, assists with the management.

The Lees and Mrs. Harrington, Bill's aunt, bought the Cisco Steam Laundry on May 15, 1948. The plant superintendent is J. C. Preslar, who came here July 1, 1948, after being in the laundry and dry cleaning business at Pecos for 12 years and in New Mexico for five years.

MAIL THEFT CHARGES ARE FILED AGAINST RAIL WORKER HERE

Charles Earl Owens, 29-year-old extra employee of the Texas & Pacific Railroad here, was named in an indictment filed Saturday morning in Federal District Court in Abilene, charging him with the theft of registered mail.

The charges were filed by Postal Inspector G. W. Morrow of Abilene, and U. S. Commissioner, Ida M. James ordered a hearing for Tuesday, July 18, in the case. A U. S. Marshall came here Saturday morning and took custody of Owens. He was to be held in the Abilene jail until the hearing.

Owens, a resident of Cisco for several years, was arrested at 11:50 a. m. Friday as he was loading mail on a passenger train at the Union Station here. Postal Inspector J. L. Pearce of Dallas and Inspector Morrow made the arrest.

Pearce said that Owens was arrested and charged in connection with the disappearance of \$2,200 in currency from a registered mail pouch. The money was being sent from the Federal Reserve Bank in Dallas to the

BILL DILL NAMED GOLF PRO AT CISCO COUNTRY CLUB COURSE

The Cisco Country Club will have a golf professional on August 1 for the first time since about 1941, President W. C. Hogue announced Saturday.

Mr. Hogue reported that the club has signed a contract with Bill Dill, Cisco city champion golfer, to take over the duties of club custodian and golf professional with the termination of Ervin Prange's contract on August 1.

Mr. Prange recently submitted his resignation effective at the end of this month.

Dill, 25, has been a resident of Cisco for 23 years, and was born at Pioneer, in Eastland County. He is regarded as one of this West Texas region's outstanding young golfers. He has been an employee of the Humble Pipe Line Company here for more than four years.

When he takes over the professional's job, Dill will be starting a career in golf on the same course where he once was a caddy and where he learned to play the game. He has been playing golf since 1937.

During the years, he was Cisco junior champion for two years. In addition to being city champion, which he won last spring, Dill won the Cisco Invitation tourney in 1948, and he won a county tourney here in 1947. He won the state junior college title at College Station in 1949.

Dill has played in the championship flight of most of this section's invitation tournaments during the past three years. He was runner-up at Ranger in 1947.

During World War II, he spent some 30 months in the Air Force and saw service in the European theater. He took part in 42 missions over Germany and holds some seven decorations. He is married and the father of two daughters. Mrs. Dill is the daughter of Mrs. L. M. Surles.

Prange, who has been with the country club for the past year, has not announced his future plans other than that he plans further education. His work with the club was highly praised by the board of directors.

Wesley Methodists To Complete Drive

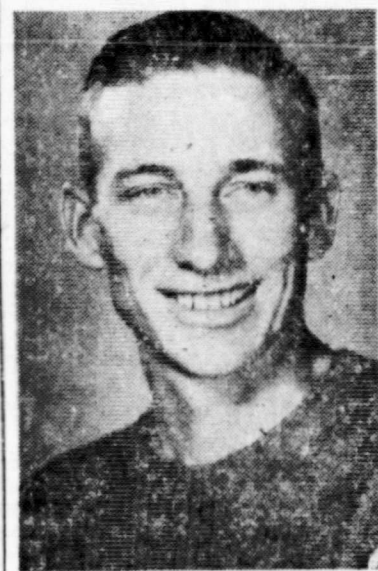

Six Counties To Send Club Boys

More than 200 4-H Club boys from six West Texas counties will hold their annual encampment at Lake Cisco Park Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. County Agent J. M. Cooper reported Saturday. County Agents and 4-H Club boys from Eastland, Palo Pinto, Stevens, Callahan, Shackelford and Jones counties will be here for the 2-day event.

The boys will begin arriving at 10 a. m. Tuesday. They are to bring their own camp equipment and most of their food, including staple items. Each boy will pay an enrollment fee of \$1 to cover the cost of perishable food items to be bought during the camp.

The program will be largely recreational in nature, Mr. Cooper said. A feature will be a track meet. Other plans include swimming twice a day, boxing and various games.

The boys will build their own camp in the park and will do most of the work. A couple will be here from Mingus to be in charge of cooking.

Ralph Lindsey, county agent for Palo Pinto County, will be in charge of Tuesday night's program, which will be staged by his 4-H Club boys.

There was a possibility that D. W. Williams of College Station, might be here Tuesday night. If his schedule permits, he plans to fly here for the camp.

The encampment for the 4-H Club boys is held at Lake Cisco Park annually, Mr. Cooper said, because of its varied recreational facilities available.

Man Wanted In Swindle Case Held In Stephens

Charges of theft by false pretext were filed in Eastland County Friday against a man who was being held in the Stephens County jail on similar charges.

The charges resulted from a scheme the man allegedly worked on some ten local businesses who entered into a plan to finance a weekly drawing. Each merchant was charged the sum of \$60 as his part of the program. Those participating were to give out tickets for awards in the plan.

EASTLAND YOUTH IS HELD IN CHECK CASE

An 18 year old Eastland youth was free on bail Saturday after being charged with attempted passing of a forged instrument. He was charged with attempting to pass a forged check for \$3,000 in Cisco and in Eastland.

The check was drawn on the First National Bank, Cisco, and signed "Harry Johnson." The bank at Eastland checked with the local bank and found that the check was no good. The youth stated that he had obtained the check in a grain sale transaction and asked Sheriff Williams to assist him in finding the man who allegedly had swindled him.

After investigation showed no results, he was carried to Eastland where Sheriff Williams questioned him at length and obtained the confession.

Local business men aided in the questioning of the youth, who said that he raised the grain on a farm near here.

T-MAN SYSTEM GETS SALUTE

Dallas T-Men are responsible for making Dallas the fourth safest city in the country, the safest in Texas and the most traffic-conscious city in the world. That's how Pageant Magazine pays tribute to the Dallas Safety Program in an article in the current August issue, entitled "In Dallas Everyone's a Traffic Cop."

In 1937, before the T-Men, there were more than 111 traffic fatalities for every 10,000 cars registered in the city of Dallas. Today,

says Pageant, there are less than five deaths to the same number of registrations. And because of the decrease in traffic accidents of all kinds, Dallas residents now enjoy lower automobile insurance than any other city of comparable size in the entire United States.

The Pageant article gives an example of how the T-Man system works: "Although the traffic light had already changed to amber, the driver of the sleek black convertible did not bring his car to a stop. Instead, he crossed on the red light and proceeded on his way."

"Several days later the driver—a prominent Dallas business man—received a courteous letter saying that a car bearing his license number had been reported by a Dallas T-Man as running a red light at the corner of Lamar and Elm Streets on November 11, 1949, at approximately 5 p. m. The letter, signed by the Dallas Chief of Police, C. F. Hanson, concluded

with a request for the owner's cooperation in observing safe driving rules.

The business man read the letter through, flushed, laughed a little self-consciously—but he did not get angry. He did, instead, what was typical of many of the 16,000 persons who received similar letters last year. He sat down and wrote a letter to Chief Hanson thanking him for the letter and pledging his support in the T-Man program.

Records show that there are very few repeaters. After receiving one T-Man letter, according to Pageant, a motorist rarely receives another. No punches are pulled,

or exceptions made, when it comes to mailing out T-Man letters. Although the Chief of Police has never received a letter, the wife of a former mayor did. R. W. Thompson, present chairman of the T-Man committee, was also once tripped up on a violation.

T-Men have been organized in two other Texas cities, Fort Worth and Tyler. Wherever it is tried, there never seems to be any dearth of T-Man recruits. Apparently, says Pageant, there breathe few men—motorist or pedestrian—with soul so dead that they have not had the urge to report traffic violations they have witnessed.

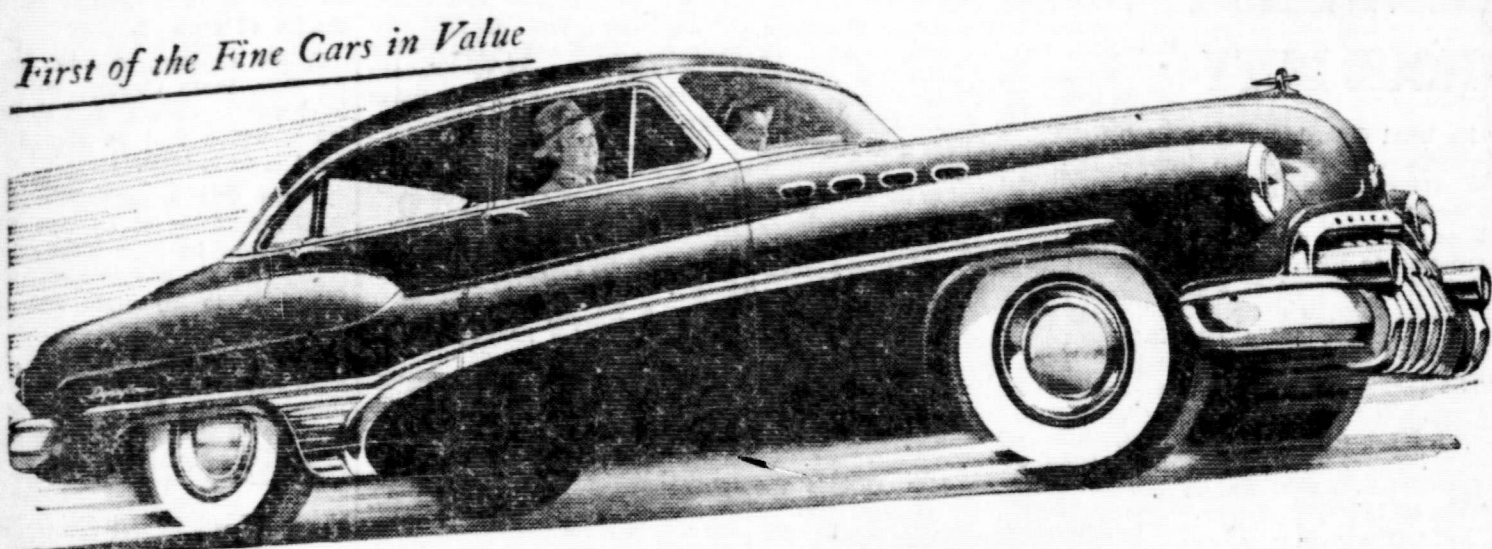

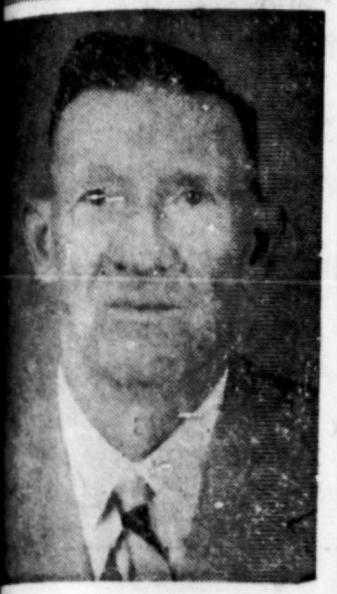
