No Farm Acreage Allotments To Be Set For Sugarbeets

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced today that proportionate shares (farm acreage allotments) will not be established for the 1971 crop of sugarbeets.

Plantings in 1970 totalled about 1,445,000 acres. At average sugar yields per acre, sugar production would amount to about 3,300,000 tons, raw value—or about 300,000 tons less than this year's marketing quota. The effective inventory on Jan. 1, 1971 (sugar on hand plus 1970-crop beet sugar produced after that date) will likely be about 2,525,000

tons—a quantity well below the desirable level.

The 1967 thru 1969 crops were unrestricted. Proportionate shares were established for the 1970 crop, initially at 1,450,000 acres, and later increased to 1,550,000 acres. Restrictions were removed altogether in April 1970 because of lower than anticipated sugar recovery from the 1969 crop and indications that total plantings would be less than the acreage allotted for the 1970 crop.

At a public hearing in Boise,

Idaho July 29, 1970, spokesman for the large majority of growers and all of the beet sugar processors recommended that the 1971 crop of sugarbeets not be restricted.

The Secretary of Agriculture is required by the Sugar Act to establish proportionate shares in each domestic sugar producing area if he determines that, in the absence of such shares, the production of sugar from a crop would be greater than the quantity needed to enable the area to meet its quota and provide a normal carryover inventory of sugar for the calendar year during which the larger part of the sugar from such crop normally would be marketed. Most of the sugar from the 1971 crop will be marketed in 1972.

'Number 9' Motor Vehicles Due For Inspection Now

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 11 accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of August, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, two persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$11,329.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1970 shows a total of 77 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 30 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$64,379.00.

The sergeant reminded all Texas motorists that vehicles bearing red motor vehicle inspection stickers with the large black numeral "9" in the lower

left-hand corner of the windshield must be reinspected before midnight, September 30.

All motor vehicles and certain classes of trailers registered in Texas are subject to the mandatory inspection of certain equipment which includes brakes, lighting, horns and warning devices, mirrors,

windshield wipers, steering, wheels and rims, exhaust system, exhaust emission system, and front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the vehicle.

The inspection fee is \$2.00, with adjustments or repairs extra if needed.

Portable Steel Building Purchased For Classroom

Purchase of a portable steel classroom building was approved at the meeting Monday evening of the Hart School Board of Education.

Additional space, to be pro-

vided by the building, was made necessary because of increased enrollment in the fifth grade. The building will be purchased from South Plains Steel Company for \$9,880.

The new building will be used to house the special reading class and the room previously used for the reading program will be used for a third fifth grade classroom.

A budget of \$594,833 for the 1970-71 school year was accepted.

Hart Oil Company submitted the low bid of 21.05 cents per gallon for gasoline. The bid was accepted.

A record enrollment of 780 was reported Monday, with 470 students in elementary school, 118 in junior high and 192 in high school.

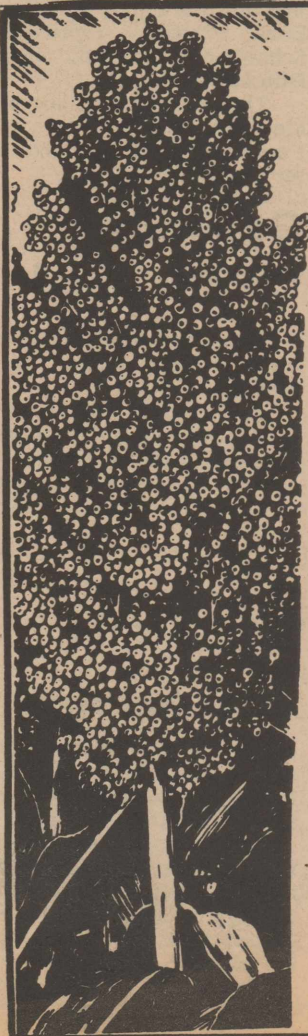

"TO THE OWNERS OF PROPERTY ABUTTING UPON THE HERINBELOW MENTIONED PORTION OF BROADWAY (HIGHWAY 168) IN THE CITY OF HART, TEXAS, AND TO ALL OTHERS AFFECTED:

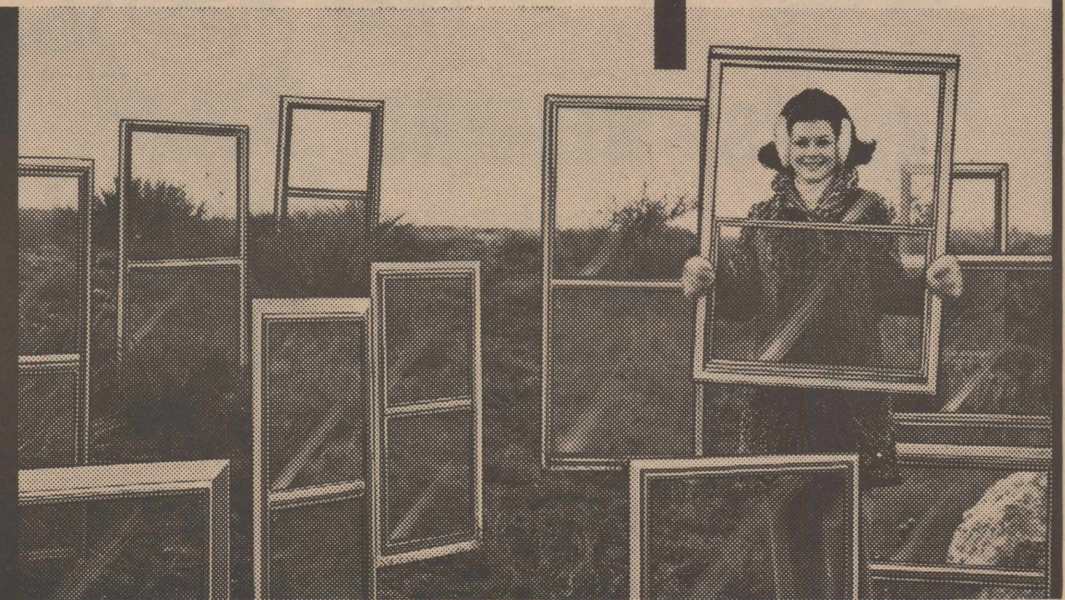
The governing body of the City of Hart, Texas, has heretofore ordered that the following described portion of Broadway (Highway 168) in and along the boundaries of the City of Hart, Texas, be improved by installing concrete curbs and gutters, and it is hereby found and determined that the cost of improvements is the amount hereinafter set forth covering the paving improvement unit herein described, and the amount per front foot in such unit proposed to be assessed for such improvements against the abutting property and the owners thereof shall not exceed \$2.50 per front foot; the properties and unit and the estimated cost of improvements being as follows, to-wit:

Unit No. 1: Broadway (Highway 168) from Railroad Avenue North to Avenue A, except property now curbed, total cost of improvements \$5552.80; and the arrangements for the making and construction of such curb and gutter improvements have been made and entered into by the City of Hart, Texas, and rolls and statements showing the proposed amounts to be assessed against abutting property and owners thereof have been filed with the City, such rolls and statements showing other matters and things, and have been approved and the City Commission of said City has fixed a time and place for hearing to the owners of property abutting upon said portions of streets, highways and avenues and to all other affected, at which hearing the amounts to be assessed against the respective parcels of abutting land and the owners thereof, for such curb and gutter improvements, the amounts of benefits to the respective parcels of property by means of improvements in the above described unit upon which the particular property abuts, the regularity of the proceedings with reference to such improvements, the apportionment of the cost of such improvements, and other matters and things will be determined. After such hearing, assessments will, by ordinance, be made and levied and such hearing will be had and held by and before the City Commission of the City of Hart, Texas, in the City Hall in said City on the 5th day of October, 1970, at 8:00 o'clock p. m. The rolls and statements showing the proposed amounts of such assessments are on file in the office of the City Secretary and open to inspection of any interested parties at any time. Of all said matters and things, all such owners of property, as well as any others in any wise affected or interested will take due notice, it being the plan, purpose and intent of the City of Hart to participate as fully as possible in the paving program of the State Highway Department of the State of Texas for Broadway (highway 168) and to secure the payment by the State of Texas of as much of the cost of said improvements as is possible under the law, but to provide a means of securing the City in obtaining from abutting property owners as much of the cost of such improvements as is possible under the law and as may not be paid by the State.

Financial Facts

Did you know that not too long ago we used postage stamps as money?

Enclosed in a round, brassy metal frame with a transparent mica front the Encased Postage Stamp was born of necessity. It was introduced, like Fractional Currency and Compound Interest Treasury Notes, to alleviate the coin and currency shortage of the Civil War.

The Encased Postage Stamp was the invention of J. Gault, who patented it in 1862. In denominations of 1, 2, 3, 5, 10, 12, 24, 30, 90 cents, the stamps were used for money as well as their normal function of postage. They became very popular because any type of small denominational currency was very welcome at the time.

The denominations and quantity of the Encased Postage Stamps were, of course, limited to the then current issues of the Post Office.

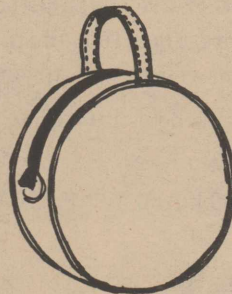

Talking it over

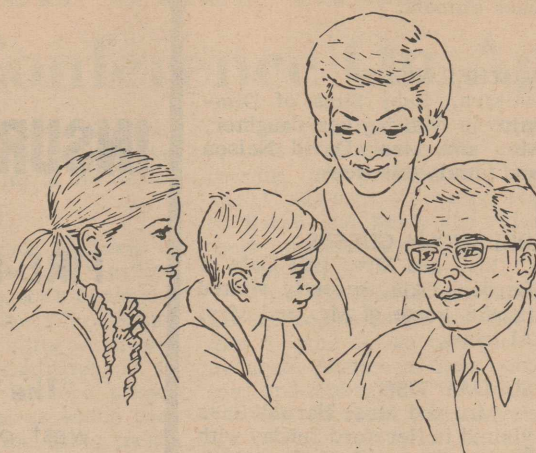
Some of the key moments in our education are those times when we discussed with someone older the interesting things we learn.
