PERYTON WINS FIRST GAME OF SEASON

Perryton won their first ball game on Sunday afternoon when they defeated the strong Boyd, Oklahoma, by a score of 13-8 on Perrydiamond. The newly organized team played errorless ball and their performance it looks like winning season for them. Caylor, heavy hitting fielder won the game by knocking the first home run, stealing the first base. Chase, third, played big league ball. by innings as follows:

MARY E. NORWOOD

The body of Mrs. Mary E. Norwood was laid to rest beside the body of her husband, J. E. Norwood, in the cemetery at Ochiltree on last Saturday afternoon. Mrs. Norwood died at the home of her daughter in Morris, Oklahoma on May 20, 1925. Her maiden name was Mary E. McKinzie and she was born in Macon county, Georgia on Aug. 31, 1838. At the time of death, she was eighty-seven years, nine months and nineteen days of age. At the age of eleven the deceased moved with her parents to Arkansas where she was united in marriage in 1857 to J. E. Norwood. To this union was born eight children, five of whom are still living. They are C. H. Norwood and Mrs. Mattie Akers of Tampa, Arizona, B. F. Norwood of Halbert, Oklahoma, Mrs. Lillie Gettis of Morris, Oklahoma and our fellow citizen, J. H. Norwood of west of Perryton. Besides the children, Mrs. Norwood is survived by forty-nine grandchildren, eighty-seven great grandchildren and four great great grandchildren. The deceased professed faith in Christ in 1869. She was a devout Christian and had always lived in accordance with her faith. Mrs. Norwood's death caused much sadness in this community for she was well known and liked here, having made her home for a number of years with her son here. The funeral services were in charge of Rev. W. C. Bryan of Gray. The Herald tenders their heart felt sympathy to the loved ones left behind in this sad hour of death.

Leidigh will represent the college, H. M. Bainer, the Wheat association, and Mr. Tinsley the Railway company. The date for the Perryton meeting has been set for 2:00 P. M. on Saturday, June 13th. This meeting should be attended by every person in this trade territory who is interested directly or indirectly in the production of wheat. These gentlemen are experts in their profession and they will have a message for us that will be of untold benefit. RABBIT BOUNTY EXTENDED ANOTHER MONTH

In view of the fact that such a considerable number of rabbits are being killed, thus ridding the country of a very undesirable pest, the county commissioners at their last meeting decided to pay the 5c bounty on rabbit ears for another month, extending the time to the next meeting of the court, which will be on Monday, June 8th. At the last meeting bounty was paid on 10,000 pairs of ears.

SOROSIS CLUB OPENS PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Sorosis Club of Perryton has opened a public library on the front balcony at the Perryton Mercantile Company, and any one desiring books are welcome to use them. At present the assortment of books is rather limited, but the club is adding new books all the time and will, before long, have a large collection. Following are the rules governing the loan of books: "1. All books shall be rented for two weeks for 10 cents. If the books is not then returned, a fine of two cents per day shall be imposed. 2. Any damage to a book shall require a fine sufficient to cover the damage, to be estimated by the librarian. 3. Only one book may be drawn at a time. 4. No book shall be issued to any persons, who have not paid all fines which may be due from them." The small fee for the use of the books was made to help take care of the expenses for the upkeep of the library, and add new books. In addition to the books to be loaned, the Club has fitted up a reading room in connection and any person is welcome to go there and read and enjoy the use of all the magazines and papers that the club has in this reading room. The people from the country are extended a special invitation to make use of this reading room.

A good library is something that every town needs, and the Sorosis Club hope to add books until they have a library that any town of this size would be proud. This is a worthy cause and everyone in Perryton and vicinity are urged to help make this a success, and if you have any good books that you would donate to this library, they will go to a good cause. The Club is trying to get the children and young people interested, as well as the older people.

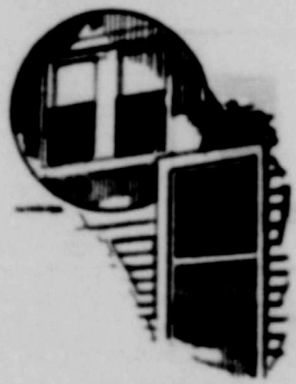

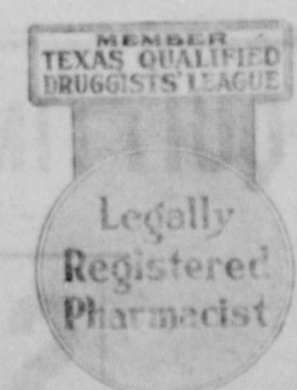

FLOOD CONTROL

The first plans as submitted for flood control along the Beaver or North Canadian river calls for a storage basin in Beaver county, one in Harper county, two in Woodward county and several others on down the line as far as Oklahoma City, the stored water to be used for irrigation purposes. The proposed reservoir in Beaver county, if the plans work is to have a capacity of about 70,000 acre feet and will make a lake three by five miles and be 40 feet deep in places. Generally every year enough flood water goes down the Beaver to fill several large reservoirs and they will be a big help in the way of irrigation and in preventing damage by flood if the plans can be worked out in a practical way as easily as they are figured out on paper. The Beaver river is known by that name as far down as the mouth of Wolf Creek, which joins the Beaver at the location of old Ft. Supply. After Wolf Creek merges with the Beaver it is known as the North Canadian.—Geymon Tribune.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To clean light colored rugs, mix one cup of prepared chalk with five cups of corn starch. Sprinkle mixture on rug and allow to remain several hours. Shake the rug out doors and hang on line right side up, brush carefully, with the nap, using the Fuller Stove Brush.

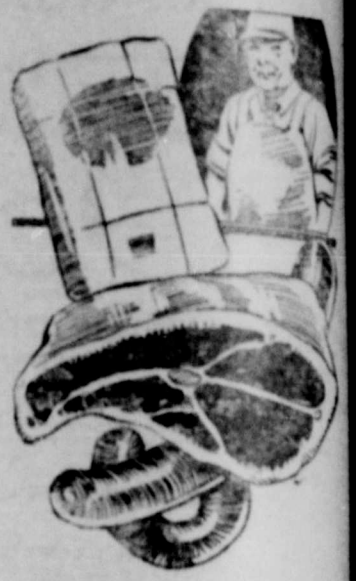

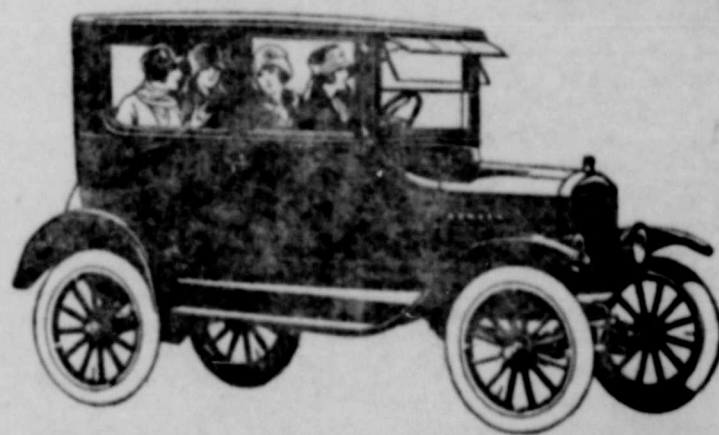

It is the order of the court that the resignation of H. C. Coffee as Justice of the peace, Prec. No. 2, be and is hereby accepted.

All members concurring, it is the order of the court that Dewey R. Allen be appointed Justice of the Peace for Prec. 2 of Ochiltree County, and Dewey R. Allen's official bond for \$1000.00 is approved by the court.

It is the order of the court that two wooden culverts on the State Highway south of Perryton be and the same are hereby sold to Sam McLain for \$5.00.

On this day came on to be considered the matter of issuance of time warrants. It appearing to the court that time warrants have been issued in excess of the amount warranted by good and fair business judgment for road work done in Prec. No. 1, and far in excess of the amount of taxes collected for road purposes for the current year in said district I. It is moved by Comr. Fuller and seconded by Comr. Lott that this court issue no more time warrants for road work done in any district for an amount in excess current year's taxes that may be left after all outstanding obligations for such districts for road and bridge purposes shall be deducted. That is, that no warrant shall be issued due longer than 12 months from its date for road and bridge purposes, and unless the taxes collected for the district shall be sufficient to pay such warrants when due. The term "time warrant" shall be construed a warrant issued by order of this court and marked on its face to be due and payable at some future date according to the provisions thereon.

All members concurring, Frank Shockley is appointed Constable of Prec. No. 2, of Ochiltree County.

Dr. J. W. Brewer is authorized to provide food and raiment for Mrs. Morgan and son Paul, who are sick and in destitute circumstances, at the expense of the county.

All members of the court deeming it to be the best interests of the county that the County Health Officer be paid a regular salary, it is decided by the court that said officer be paid \$200.00 annually, and the clerk is ordered to draw a warrant each month for amount due officer.

It is the decision of the court that all orders allowing bounties on coyotes be repealed indefinitely.

It is the order of the court that bounty on rabbits be extended to and including the next term of this court.

Court adjourned until 9:00 A. M., Tuesday May 12th.

Court met pursuant to adjournment on the 12th day of May with the same officers and members present as on the preceding day, and

the following proceedings were had to wit:

On this day came on to considered the levying of taxes for county purposes for the current year and after due consideration of the matter the court made the following levies, to-wit:

The General Fund levy shall be 25 cents on the \$100.00 valuation.

The Road & Bridge Fund levy shall be 15 cents on the \$100.00 valuation.

The Court House & Jail Fund levy shall be 15 cents on the \$100.00 valuation.

The Court House & Jail Special Fund levy shall be 10 cents on the \$100.00 valuation.

The General Poll Fund levy shall be 25 cents each.

The Special R. & B. F. levy (No. 2) shall be 15 cents on the \$100.00 valuation.

The Special R. & B. F. No. 3, levy shall be 15 cents on the \$100.00 valuation.

The Occupation shall be 1/2 that levied by the State of Texas.

The levies made for school purposes in the various school districts are as follows:

83 cents on the \$100.00 valuation is the amount of taxes levied in Dist. No. 1.

50 cents on the \$100.00 valuation in Dist. No. 2.

75 cents on the \$100.00 valuation in Dist. No. 3.

\$1.00 on the \$100.00 valuation in Dist. No. 4.

50 cents on the \$100.00 valuation in Dist. No. 5.

\$1.16 on the \$100.00 valuation in Dist. No. 10.

\$1.00 on the \$100.00 valuation in Dist. No. 12.

\$1.00 on the \$100.00 valuation in Dist. No. 14.

70 cents on the \$100.00 valuation in Dist. No. 15.

50 cents on the \$100.00 valuation in Dist. No. 19.

50 cents on the \$100.00 valuation in Dist. No. 20.

The foregoing order was favored by all members except as to the court house and jail levy, Comrs. Lance and Lott favoring the 15 cent C. H. & J. Levy and Comrs. Bruner and Fuller opposing it. Judge Grigsby voted off the tie in favor of the levy. The 10 cents Special C. H. & J. Fund was favored by Lance and Lott and opposed by Fuller, Bruner refused to vote.

Ordered that all cement on hand for Ochiltree County be sold to F. P. Rogers at 85¢ per sack of 100 lbs.

Court adjourned until Saturday, May 16th.

On Saturday May 16th, Court met pursuant to adjournment, with all officers present as on the preceding day, except R. A. Fuller, who was absent, and the following proceedings were had:

Treasurer's quarterly report is approved.

There being no further business to it is the order of the court that each of the commissioners, except R. A. Fuller, be allowed \$20.00 for their services both as Comrs. and Board of Equalization for this term. Also the county judge be allowed \$20.00, R. A. Fuller being allowed \$15.00 for this term of the court.

in open court and found in all things correct are in all things approved this the 16th day of May, 1925.

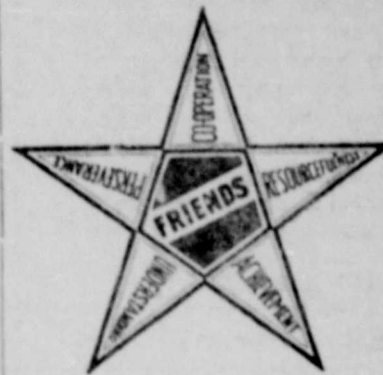

ORDINANCE NO. 71.

Ordinance relating to the parking of Automobiles, Motor Cycles and other vehicles on Main Street in the City of Perryton, and repealing all laws or parts of laws conflicting with this act.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Perryton, Texas.

Sec. 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to stop or park any Automobile, Motor Cycle or other vehicle on Main Street in the City of Perryton, Texas, for more than five minutes at any one place other than is hereinafter provided.

Section 2. Automobiles, Motor Cycles and other vehicles shall be parked at the curb on either side of Main Street at an angle of Forty-five degrees facing the direction which said vehicle may be driving.

Sec. 3. No Automobile, Motor Cycle or other vehicle shall be parked less than twelve feet of any corner or Fire Plug on Main Street in the City of Perryton, Texas.

Sec. 4. No Automobile, Motor Cycle or other vehicle shall be parked in front of the United States Post Office in the City of Perryton, Texas.

Sec. 5. Any person violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in the sum of not less than One Dollar, nor more than Twenty-Five Dollars.

All ordinances and parts of Ordinances of the City of Perryton, Texas, in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

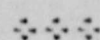

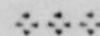

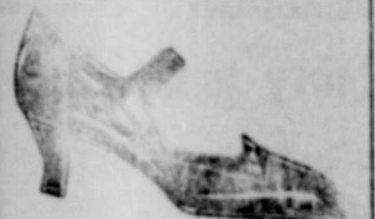

EMERGENCY GRAIN CROP 1925 TO COMPENSATE FOR TERRIBLE DROUTH PREVAILING IN TEXAS

E. A. Miller, Agronomist of the Extension Service, A. and M. College, Advises Planting of Grain Sorghums to Provide Feed and Partially Make up for Apparent Corn Crop Shortage.

During the present severe and prolonged drought the farmers of a large part of Texas, especially Central Texas, where they have been depending on their corn for their grain crop, are at a loss to know what to plant to take the place of corn. On account of the lateness of the season, and lack of moisture in the ground, it is not advisable to attempt to grow corn. The only kind of corn that would be at all advisable to plant are the early maturing types such as "June corn" and "Surecrops."

As an emergency crop to take the place of corn, the grain sorghums such as kafir, milo and feterita may be substituted. It should be remembered however, that the Extension Service is suggesting these crops for the corn growing sections of Texas only during the present emergency. They are better adapted to the western and southwestern parts of Texas, under ordinary conditions because the heads are more subject to blast in the central and eastern sections of the state. The blasting, that is, the heads falling to fill out, is due to small insects which seem to do their greatest damage when wet weather prevails during or just before the blooming period.

Types of Grain Sorghums

Some of the best types of grain sorghums are, Standard Black Hull Kafir, Dwarf Yellow Milo, and Spur Feterita. The milo and feterita mature in 90 to 110 days, which adapts them to short seasons and low rainfall. Kafir requires about 120 days to mature. Kafir and feterita make more desirable forage than does milo on account of having a more juicy stalk. However, all of them may be used for forage in case they do or do not mature seed.

The grain sorghums differ from the sweet sorghums mainly by having larger heads of grain, the stalks not being as sweet and juicy and not growing as tall. The grain sorghums are grown largely for the grain whereas the sweet sorghums are grown for forage.

Growing the Crop

Time of Planting: There is no particular planting date for grain sorghums as all that is necessary is to plant them in time so that they can mature before frost. They have been planted as late as July and August with good results.

Sowing the seed: The grain sorghums are grown very similar to corn in rows spaced about three and a half feet apart, with plants from ten to twelve inches apart in the row. If the weather continues very dry, the rows may be spaced even further apart as better yields have been made during very dry seasons with rows as far apart as seven feet and

es. It may be necessary to close some of the holes in the sorghum plates in order to get the desired amount per acre. Blank plates may also be used by drilling three-sixteenths inch holes in them.

Cultivation: Cultivation is also similar to that of corn. It should be often enough to destroy weeds and to keep a mulch on the surface. Grain sorghums grow slowly when young and are easily injured by weeds. The spike tooth harrow is a good implement to use for the first and often for the second cultivation. If the soil crusts or bakes so that it is hard for the young plants to come through or weed seeds are germinating it is well to break the crust and kill the young weeds with a harrow, and then follow with a second harrowing before the plants are large enough to be worked with a cultivator. The harrow teeth should be set slanting so that they will not pull out the young plants.

Insect Control: Some of the best things to do to prevent damage from blasting of the heads by the sorghum midge, are (1) the use of pure type seed from which the stalks all head out about the same time; (2) cutting out the early formed heads in case some of them have formed before the main crop, as they would make breeding places for the midge; (3) planting grain sorghums at least 300 yards away from the sweet sorghums; (4) keeping down Johnson grass.

Pure type seed on account of uniformity of heading, should be used by all means to guard against insect attacks, as well as to increase the yield especially since it requires only two to three pounds of seed per acre. Planting grain sorghums on a uniform type of soil, is also important for the control of the midge, because on that type the heads would act more uniformly.

Sources of Seed Supply: In order to get in touch with sources of pure seed it is suggested that the farmers take the matter up with their county agent. It is also best for the farmers of one community to pool their order as by doing so, they should be able to obtain at a less cost and also save in the freight rate.

Harvesting: The crop may be harvested (1) Heading by hand; (2) Heading with a grain header; (3)

Harvesting the whole plant. By first method the stalks are left in field where they may be used as pasture or turned under. With third method the whole stalks including the grain may be fed or the heads removed from the stalks, and forage and grain fed separately. The heads may be stored like corn when well matured or if the stalks be cut by hand, they can be cured and stacked like sorghum hay.

Other Dry Weather Forage: Red Top sorghum when broadcast at the rate of from 50 to 60 pounds per acre and Sudan grass grown in three-foot rows at the rate of 15 pounds per acre make excellent forage or hay crops. Both of these are very dependable crops in dry seasons as well as in normal seasons.

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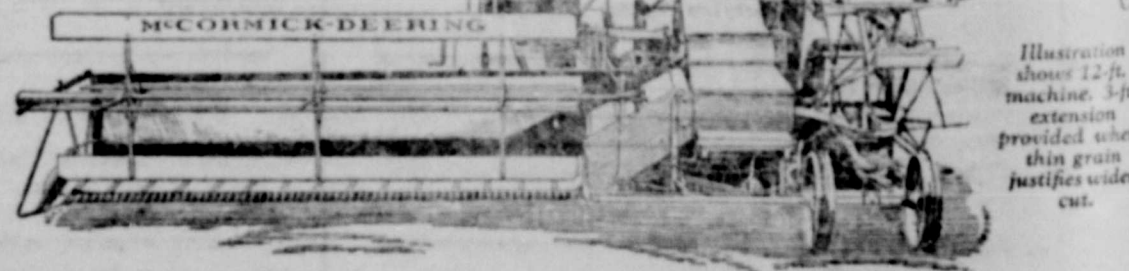
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
