Great Plains Highway Convention May 29th Contract For Bridges On Federal No. 83 To Be Let Monday

ORTHUP AND WOLF CREEK GET BRIDGES

Bridges Will Be Let Under Contract by State Highway Department at Austin

Ft. Span On Wolf

Bridges on South Prong and Northup Branch 10 to 15 Miles South

Contracts will be let Monday, May 29, by the state highway department, Austin, for four bridges located on Federal No. 83, between 10 and 15 miles southwest of Perryton. The highway department is asking bids on a 270 ft. bridge across Wolf Creek, divided into nine 28% spans. On the south prong of Wolf Creek, a 145 ft. bridge, with five 28% ft. spans, will be built. On Northup Creek, a four 28% ft., 114 ft bridge will be constructed. On Northup Creek, the plans call for a four 8x8 bridge. Plans and specifications for these structures are on file in the office of A. E. Dyatt, resident engineer. Minimum wages to be paid by contractors for labor, both skilled and unskilled, will be found in the advertisement for bids which appears in this issue of the Herald.

Murderer Was Here

Higgins Left Here Saturday Morning; Killed Naval Officer in Kansas Same Day

Joe Higgins, age 27, a former Mississippi convict, has confessed to the killing of Lieutenant Commander S. J. Brownbridge, naval officer, near Greensburg, Kansas, last Saturday afternoon. After killing the officer, he put the body in a side ditch, and took the dead body to his car. He was arrested at Potts, Oklahoma, when suspicion officers were aroused over the stained car. Higgins was in Perryton for a week, leaving here Saturday morning, going to Shattuck, where he was picked up by the navy, who was on his way from Potts to Wisconsin to see his mother. A few days before he left Perryton, Higgins had operated the O. Service Station, located on the corner of Broadway St. While he stayed at the Drake Tourist Camp, Higgins had been coming to this section of the country since 1929, to work in the wheat field.

BABY DROWNS IN WATERING TANK

EIGHTEEN MONTHS OLD SON OF MR. AND MRS. SHELDON WILSON LOSES LIFE WEDNESDAY MORN

This entire community was saddened Wednesday when the word spread around that the eighteen months old son of Mr. and Mrs. Sheldon Wilson, residing 3 1/2 miles east of Perryton, had been drowned in a stock watering tank. Wendell Lee was born November 4, 1932. The little fellow was playing in the yard and his father and an employee were working nearby when the accident happened. About 10:30 in the morning, he was missed and an older brother, age 5, found his lifeless body floating in the 12 barrel water tank. He had not been in the water over fifteen minutes. Artificial respiration was applied and physicians were called but life could not be restored. Surviving relatives are the parents and three brothers: Dewitt, age 10; Sheldon Willard, age 5, and George William, age 3; and one sister, Lena Mae, age 8. Funeral services will be held at the Baptist church this afternoon, with Rev. J. M. Sibley officiating, assisted by Rev. W. B. Hicks.

CHANGE LIVE STOCK SALE DATE TO TUESDAY AND EVERY OTHER WEEK; GET GOOD PRICES

Turner & Van Guilder, owners of the Perryton Community Sales Yards, announced that the next public live stock auction will be held Tuesday, June 5. When the yard was opened the plan was to hold sales weekly on each Wednesday. The change is made to Tuesday on account of conflicts with other sale dates. They also announce that until after harvest, at least, the sales will be held every other week instead of weekly. The sale Wednesday was well attended and the prices were exceptionally high. About 75 head of live stock was sold and a big bunch of farm machinery and household goods.

Saturday, May 26th, Is "Poppy Day"

Saturday will be "Poppy Day" throughout the United States. Millions of Americans will wear little red poppies in tribute to the men who gave their lives on the poppy fields of France and Belgium during the World War. An army of approximately 100,000 women will distribute the memorial flowers on the streets of practically every city and town in the country. Arrangements for observance of "Poppy Day" here have been completed by the women of the Perryton Legion Auxiliary Unit under the leadership of Mrs. Paul Ballew, poppy chairman. Auxiliary women will distribute poppies on the street throughout the day, and will receive contributions for the welfare of disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead. The poppies to be offered by the Auxiliary Saturday are paper replicas of the wild poppies of France which grew on the battle fields and war cemeteries. They have been made by disabled veterans working in 58 government hospitals and Auxiliary workrooms in 40 different states. TENTH ANNUAL MEET ON OLD CATTLE TRAIL

Delegates from Canada to Mexico Coming; Scott City, Kansas After Next Convention

Two Hundred Expected

J. V. Romigh, North Platte, Nebr., is President; R. T. Shindler is Vice President

Every citizen of Perryton will join with the Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club in entertaining the two hundred delegates from Canada to Mexico along the route of the Great Plains Highway who will assemble here Tuesday, May 29, for the 10th annual convention of the highway association.

President J. V. Romigh, North Platte, Nebraska, will arrive in Perryton early Monday to check over the convention details. Mr. Romigh has called a meeting of the leaders of the association to meet here Monday evening for a preliminary session. R. T. Shindler of this city is vice-president of the highway body, and W. B. LaMaster is vice-president for the Texas division. The 1933 convention was held at McCook, Nebraska. Scott City, Kansas is making a strong bid for the next meeting.

The Great Plains highway was started ten years ago at a meeting held in McCook. R. T. Shindler, Geo. M. Perry, Jas. W. Wilson and Chas. W. Callaway attended this first meeting. At this time it was decided that an International route from Canada to Mexico traversing the great plains along the "old cattle trails", was needed and plans were made for the designation, marking and logging of the route. At this time practically none of the entire route was hard surfaced or even a part of a state highway system. In this short ten years, the greater part of the route has been paved or hard surfaced, every foot of the highway is Federalized with the most of the road running over Federal 83.

Business sessions of the convention will be held on Tuesday morning and afternoon in the Ellis Theatre.

At noon Tuesday, the visiting delegates will be guests at an old fashioned dinner to be served at Jines Springs. It is hoped to make this affair a gigantic community dinner with every person in the county coming with a basket filled with sufficient food for their party and two or three guests. The convention will recess promptly at noon, drive to the Springs, have dinner and return in time for the afternoon session to start at two o'clock. C. E. Woods is chairman of the committee in charge of the basket dinner and entertainment. Miles Edwards and R. B. Orrill are members of Mr. Woods' committee.

The Lions Club will have charge of the banquet which will be served on Tuesday evening at the high school cafeteria. At least 250 reservations are expected. Jas. W. Wilson heads the committee in charge of advance registration of local citizens. Local citizens are urged to register for the convention, paying the registration fee of \$1.00. The registration fee will carry a banquet ticket and additional tickets for ladies to attend the banquet will be sold at 75c. An effort is being made to obtain at least 150 local registrations and have them attend the business sessions as well as the dinner at noon and the banquet in the evening. Jack R. 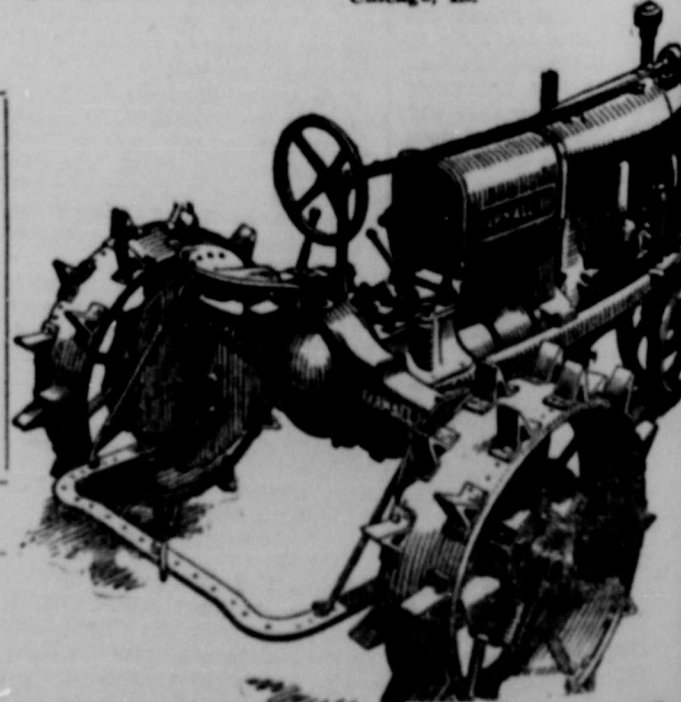

SOME MEATS TO SERVE AT THE WEDDING FEAST

For the simple home wedding, with much of the preparation of refreshments in the hands of the family, it is well to choose a meat dish which may be prepared ahead of time and that is easy to serve. Of course, it must taste good and it must be beautiful to look at. Inez S. Willson, home economist, recommends the following recipe as being especially good.

Ham Mousse

Season 2 cups finely minced cooked ham with salt, pepper, bit of cayenne, and a pinch of dry mustard. Dissolve 1 tablespoon gelatin in 1-4 cup cold water and add to it 1-2 cup ham liquor from which all fat has been carefully skimmed. Add this to the ham. Then add 1 cup finely chopped pimiento and 1 cup chopper cooked asparagus tips. Fold in 1 cup stiffly beaten cream. Put in heart-shaped molds that have been dipped in ice water. Let chill overnight. When ready to serve turn onto a lettuce leaf. Do not remove from the refrigerator until needed. Garnish with sprigs of

watercress. This will fill about 18 small molds.

Creamed Meats Popular

Creamed sweetbreads and truffles served in crustades are nice for the wedding breakfast. The sweetbreads may be parboiled and balanced the day before, if necessary. The cream sauce should be a rich, well seasoned one and the addition of truffles to any dish puts it in the very special occasion class.

A patty case filled with creamed ham, tongue, mushrooms and truffles is featured on the menu for a wedding reception when it is served by a smart caterer, so it must be good, but this is a dish that could be prepared and served at the simple home wedding.

Children Aided

Needy Children To Benefit From Poppy Sale Sponsored by Auxiliary, Saturday, May 26

Children whose fathers were killed or disabled on the poppy-studded battle fields of France will be among those benefited by "Poppy Day", Saturday, May 26th, when replicas of the French poppies will be worn throughout the United States in tribute to the World War dead. Mrs. Jack Allen, chairman of the child welfare committee of the Pierce Johnson Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary, explained today in an appeal for a generous response to the Auxiliary's poppy activity.

The funds donated for the little red memorial flowers will go to sup-

port the work of the Legion and Auxiliary for the welfare of the disabled veterans and the children left fatherless by the war. The bulk of funds here will be used by the local Legion and Auxiliary organizations in meeting the needs of disabled veterans and needy children of veterans in this city during the coming year.

"The welfare of veterans' children is a constantly expanding responsibility of the American Legion Auxiliary", said Mrs. Allen. "Injuries and diseases of the war are taking a steady toll from the ranks of the veterans, and nearly every veteran now dying or becoming disabled has dependent children. My committee is at work continuously bringing aid and care to such children, and we must look to poppy contributions for the chief support of this work."

"Every penny of the dimes, quarters and dollars dropped into the contribution boxes of the poppy workers Saturday, above the bare cost of the materials in the flowers, will go to the disabled and the children. The poppies have been made by disabled veterans and the workers who will distribute them on the streets have volunteered their services. When the people of this community contribute for their poppies, they can be sure they are giving directly to the welfare of the war's living victims."

PAUL BALLEW IS CHAIRMAN FOR AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY POPPY SALE MAY 26

Saturday, May 26th, the people of Perryton and vicinity will be offered little red poppies to wear in memory of the World War dead. They will also be offered an opportunity to contribute to the welfare of the war's living victims. All are of the war's living victims. All are of the war's living victims.

The custom of wearing poppies in memory of the war dead is fitting. Every year old this year, and is generally observed throughout the English-speaking world. In the United States the women of the American Legion Auxiliary have developed it into a great national project for commemorating the service of those who died and for bringing aid to those who sacrificed health and strength in the nation's service. Explaining the program, Mrs. Paul Ballew, poppy chairman of the Perryton Unit of the Auxiliary, said:

Nearly ten million Americans wear the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary poppy each year on 'Poppy Day', the Saturday before Memorial Day, and contribute nearly one million dollars for the relief of the war disabled, the widows and fatherless children. All of the poppies are made by disabled veterans, as the label on each poppy shows.

Early in the winter the making of the poppies which will be worn the following May, begins in government hospitals and in special workrooms maintained by the Auxiliary throughout the country. Hands of disabled veterans, weary of idleness, are given employment, shaping the little paper flowers. Discouraged men whose spirits have sunk to despair from months and years of unemployment are given the reviving experience of again earning money.

A penny apiece is paid for each poppy made. A veteran, if he is not too badly disabled, can easily turn out 300 of the flowers in a short working day. This is usually the maximum number the disabled men are permitted to make in a day to prevent them from overtaxing their strength, and means earnings of three dollars a day.

For men having laid in hospitals for months feeling that they were useless incumbrances on the earth, three one-dollar bills actually earned are worth a fortune. or the families of these men—the poppy makers are all men who receive little or no government compensation—the money earned often means food, shelter and fuel for the winter. For the men without families the poppy earnings provide a 'stake' for the day when they must go out and attempt to re-establish themselves in life against the handicap of their disabilities.

Veterans too badly disabled to make complete flowers sometimes form what they call 'Poppy Corporations'. Several of them work together on the same flower, each performing the operation which he can do and passing the flower on to the others to be completed. Even blind veterans can take part in the work under this arrangement.

Manufacturing the poppies involves large problems of financing, management and distribution for the Auxiliary women directing the project. This year wages paid to the disabled veterans will total

nearly \$100,000. Employment has been given to many hundreds in 58 different hospitals and workrooms in 40 states.

"The funds derived from the poppies are used by the Auxiliary and the American Legion in giving aid to disabled veterans, their families and families of the dead for whom no other aid available. Groceries for the family of a veteran too sick to work—shoes for the children of a veteran lying ill in a distant government hospital—a loan to convalescent veteran struggling to get back on his feet—these are typical of the purposes for which the poppy contributions are used. The money is expended largely in the community in which it is raised under the direction of the rehabilitation and child welfare committees of the local Auxiliary and Legion Post.

"The wearing of the poppy draws its wide appeal from its dual purpose of honoring the dead and serving the living. Every red flower on a lapel on 'Poppy Day' means that the wearer has thought of the men who lie beneath the poppies in France, and has contributed something to the relief and rehabilitation of the men, women and children who are still fighting the long battle against physical and financial handicaps resulting from war service."

Championship Fight

Pampa Daily News is Promoting Championship Boxing Match in Pampa on May 31

PAMPA, May 21—A championship fight will be staged in Pampa May 31 as part of the Pre-Centennial celebration and Pioneer round-up being sponsored by the Pampa Junior chamber of commerce May 31 and June 1. The Pampa Daily News, working with promoters and commissioners, has secured Duke Trammell, Fort Worth, and Ralph Chong, Houston, for a 10-round bout with Trammell's Texas middleweight championship crown at stake.

The 32 rounds of boxing will be staged May 31 at Roadrunner park. Tickets will go on sale May 21 at Borger, Skellytown, White Deer, LeFors, Panhandle, Shamrock, McLean, Miami, Canadian, Wheeler, and Amarillo. Admission will be \$1.65 for ringside seats, \$1.35 for box seats and \$1.10 for general admission, tax paid.

Duke Trammell, the veteran, is at the top of the ring. He is not as young as he used to be, but he has made a remarkable come-back since boxing was legalized in Texas. In earlier years, Trammell had to roam far and wide for good opponents, but now Texas has become a mecca of good boxers and Trammell can stay in his home state and meet the best in his class.

Ralph Chong, whose home town is Shanghai, China, came to this country a few months ago an unknown fighter. He has moved up near the head of the class. He has discarded his primer and is busily engaged in advanced fistic knowledge. Chong started his career in China. He heard about America and decided to try his luck in a foreign country. He has been successful beyond his fondest dreams.

The Fort Worth veteran, to prove that he is perched securely on top of the ladder, stepped into Brownwood and defeated Johnny Farrell in a great battle last month. Later he kayoed Debs Dalby, one of the toughest middleweights in the state. Trammell is pointing for his fight in Pampa and will not box again until he meets Chong here.

The Chinese wonder has yet to lose a fight in the United States. He had been gradually climbing to the peak of the middleweight class, and to show that he is the logical

contender for a chance at Trammell's crown, Chong last week defeated Don La Rue, the fighter every promoter in the state has been hoping to match against Trammell. La Rue defeated Babe Kiser twice, kayoed Ace King and fought a draw with Al Salbano. Then came Chong and La Rue has to start over again.

A supporting card of well known fighters is being arranged and the full card will be announced soon.

ADMINISTRATION AIDING IN "BACK TO THE FARM"

Hundreds of thousands of rural families in the Nation who are on relief rolls are without a cow, and that is one of the reasons, authorities say that they are "on relief". Although the Federal Emergency Relief Administration is moving to make cows available to these families, probably half of them are not now in position to receive a cow, because they have no pasture or tillable land on which to raise feed.

Yet cotton, wheat, and tobacco growers have much more land lying idle than is necessary to supply land to these landless relief families. Many of these growers would allow relief families to use the acres they have taken out of cash crops under Government contract. But acreage rented to the Government may be used only by the landlord or tenant and none other.

In decisions announced this week by the FERA, a way out has been pointed, which will give these destitute acres great usefulness in solving the problem of the landless relief family. The landlord or tenant has been growing food or feed crops on some other portion of his land, and not on the land rented to the government, which has been in cash crops. If he now shifts his food and feed crops to the acres rented to the Government, he will have room for a relief family or families crops from the rented acres.

The relief family that uses these non-rented acres from which the landlord or tenant has shifted crops will be allowed to grow only food or feed and may not sell that. The landlord may not charge them rent. These regulations are made to save the purpose of the acreage-control, which is aimed to prevent sale of crops from the rented acres.

Relief For Farmers

Federal Administration Announces Plans for Providing Work for Rural Destitute

Indianapolis, Ind. May 21—"If the destitute rural family needs a house, a cow, work implements, or what not—just go and do it," Harry L. Hopkins, Federal Emergency Relief Administrator, told State relief directors from the Mid-west in conference here.

"We get all balled up because we're too formal about it," said Mr. Hopkins. "In fact, it is fairly simple."

These destitute families must have some land, or some new land. You rent land, you buy land, you get land a hundred and one different way. You digger for land, and I can see that going on now, especially down South. All over the South.

"Another thing that we will get too formal about, and get to scaring people to death," said the Administrator, "is building a new house for a man, just a simple house. It is amazing how many of these people will build their own houses if they have half a chance. They can repair houses, they can put new roofs on."

"As for tools and equipment and livestock, the North Carolina Relief Administration bought a thousand mules last winter. They buy chickens, cows, and farm equipment that the family may need and they give it or lend it to the family, depending on what seems best."

Six hundred thousand farm families are on the relief rolls, and Mr. Hopkins said it is not likely they will acquire an "independent economy" merely by work on the land.

"I believe that along with that there has got to be an opportunity to earn cash income," he declared, "and that means planned public works."

"A lot of people don't like the work planned, they are afraid of it, timid. Well, we are coming to it, sure as you are born. In my opinion, we are coming to a point where every State highways in America from coast to coast is going to be deliberately planned for and given to people on the basis of their own particular needs. We are going to stop this politicalization of the highway departments of America. We are not going to get home with this relief unless we can tie up a proper share of whatever public works are going to be done in America with farm families, and I believe there will be great public works done within the next twenty years."

Mr. Hopkins' experience in relief work, he said, has been that some of the best things have been done when the relief administration took the families' own programs and helped them to carry them out, ridiculing the thought that "we can simply project our ideas on six hundred thousand farm families."

The rural relief activities will provide projects to furnish parttime employment, and the administrator urged that this work be to the interest of the rural communities. "Don't let these fellows," he said, "get away with murder any more, such as town supervisors dragging people from rural areas into the towns, fixing up the little roads in the towns; that is something that the town and city folks ought to do. Farm-to-market roads, rural school buildings, consolidated school buildings—I can't think of anything that would be better to do as a work program than really to build decent consolidated schools where they are

needed. But work should be given to these families only if it is leading them home to self support."

Proposes Drive on Feathered "Gangsters"

WITH government waging an intensive drive against kidnapers, hi-jackers and other lawless elements, it is high time we as individuals took steps to combat the feathered racketeers endangering the existence of our wild birds," believes Mrs. Olive Benedict Comins, Lake Keuka, N. Y., bird enthusiast.

"The best way to protect and attract wild birds," Mrs. Comins suggests, "is to provide them with nesting places which cannot be invaded by sparrows and other larger pirates who make a practice of 'moulted in' on the homes of their rightful owners. Unless assisted by human friends, scientists agree that our wrens, chickadees, and small songsters are likely to be crowded entirely out of the more desirable communities by the encroaching 'gangsters'."

A new type of birdhouse recommended by Mrs. Comins can be made in a few minutes by any boy or girl with only a jackknife and an empty log cabin shaped syringe. There are 15 of these rustic bird cabins about Mrs. Comins' Lake Keuka cottage, and every year they are all occupied by cheerful families of wrens and songbirds. Here are her directions for making the protective birdhouses which have been found so successful:

"After cleaning an empty tin with hot water, make a hole an inch in diameter, with a jackknife, just above the center of one of the end panels. This entrance will be large enough to admit wrens and smaller birds, but will keep out noisy sparrows. Cut downward, and when the hole is almost complete, bend out the flap of metal to form a porch. Smooth the sharp corners with a file or a pair of

pliers or with a hammer.

"After punching a few nail-holes in sides and bottom for ventilation, plug up the chimney and fasten the cabin with a wooden bracket, or a piece of wire or stout cord to a tree or building. All birdhouses should be placed in the shade to protect nestlings from summer sun.

"In a few minutes, and at no expense," declares Mrs. Comins, "anyone can have a practical cabin for small birds, which will protect these valuable neighbors from being crowded out by sparrows, other feathered hooligans, or cats. Not only will you obtain free insect insurance by giving birds this protection, but you will attract to your yard a family of delightful neighbors, who will provide interest and amusement this summer and many summers to come. Remember, the early birdhouse catches the early bird!"

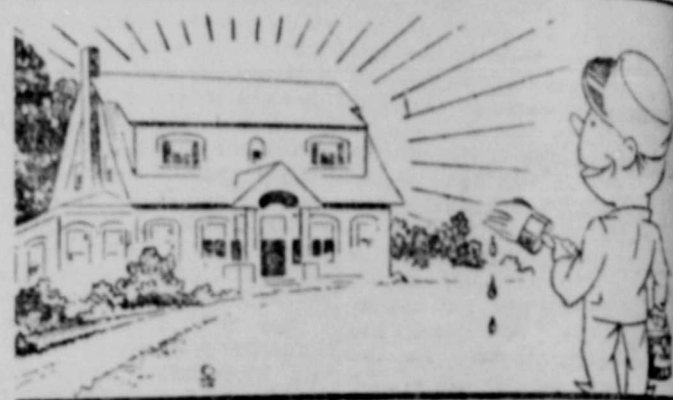

TEXAS' FIRST PRE-CENTENNIAL AND PIONEERS ROUND-UP AT PAMPA MAY 31-JUNE 1

Pampa, May 22—Hundreds of West Texas pioneers are accepting invitations to be present May 31 and June 1 at Texas' First Pre-Centennial and Pioneers Roundup held here under the auspices of the Junior chamber of commerce.

The quiet and roomy high school gymnasium has been set aside as registration and rest headquarters for the oldtimers. The huge floor

will be furnished with lounges and chairs. Oldtime and modern music will be furnished at intervals and refreshments will be available.

Registration of these honored guests will be in charge of Mrs. De-Lea Vicars and a large committee. Mrs. E. A. Shackleton will preside at an information booth. Bill Bourn, in charge of the oldtimers program, has the cooperation of a large number of Pampa pioneers. There will be a square dance and oldtime fiddling. Cash prizes will be given the winners. Mrs. W. R. Ewing, wife of the district judge, will be official hostess.
