Group gives approval to WDIC's plans

A group of almost 100 persons gave their support Tuesday night to a Strategic Plan for Economic Development (SPED) approved by the Waste Deposit Impact Committee.

During the next three months, over 200 county residents are expected to be called on to provide input and expertise in developing the plan and the roadmap for its implementation.

Phillip Niedzielski-Eichner, WDIC's executive director, walked the audience through the plan, detailing how economic interest groups, a 50-member advisory committee representing a variety of economic and political interests, WDIC staff, a 12-member strategy design team and the general public would help build a community consensus for the plan.

Final completion of the plan would be up to a 15-member Economic Development Strategy Council. That council would consist of the present WDIC board which includes one member from each taxing entity in Deaf Smith County and nine yet-to-be-named members.

To come up with a consensus,

Eichner said the community "must identify its strengths and its weaknesses" and said the plan "is not a scapegoating process."

"If kids do something wrong they point a finger somewhere," Eichner said. "To get into this process and look for someone to blame would be a mistake. The community needs to take responsibility for all the glory and all the negatives. If we get into finger-pointing the key organizations won't be as effective."

Eichner said SPED "is not just another study," pointing to studies in 1965 that compiled the county's vital statistics and a "Goals For Progress" study in 1975 that set goals for the upcoming 25-year period.

"We're halfway through that period now," Eichner said. "It would be appropriate to look at that study and measure what we've done against the goals that were established then."

Some of the negatives cited by Eichner included "a woeful self image for bad reasons."

"This community has many strengths," Eichner said. "We have some great people who have a lot of integrity, and we have an excellent

school system. In the short time I've been here I've found the community to actually be rather cosmopolitan and forward thinking.

"We must believe in ourselves in order to sell ourselves. We also need to know about ourselves. No one should know more about us than we know about us."

The negatives are major, including whether the residents want to give up their independence to have community-wide gain, the farmer vs. businessman battle, and relations between the Hispanic and Anglo groups.

"You don't have to talk to anyone to know there is a wide gap between Hispanics and Anglos," Eichner said. "We must make very special efforts to resolve all of these. If someone, whether it is a local person or an outsider, wants to invest \$20 million or any amount of money, they are going to take a long, hard look at these negatives."

"We want to see the community do something for itself. The community seems to be able to rally around the future," Eichner said the final result will be determined by community's willingness to invest time and money, including potential tax breaks and funding from taxing entities.

"If we do not intend to invest in this, let's not do it," Eichner said. "It will take tax dollars, and it may need personal dollars from residents."

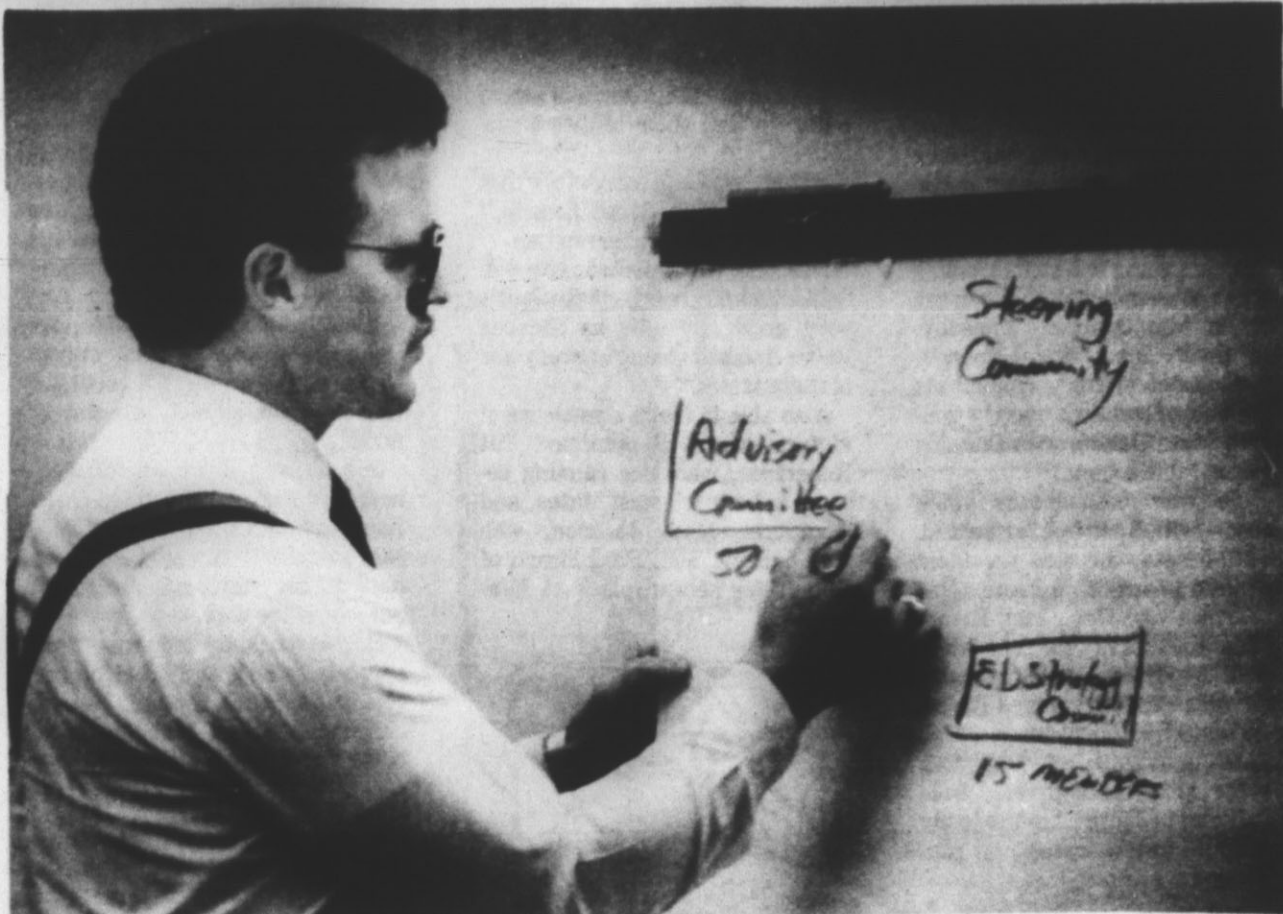
Work toward SPED's 13 objectives will begin immediately. Those objectives include:

-To define the community's economic development goals through the year 2000;

-To define and assess the baseline economic condition for the agricultural, industrial, commercial and retail sectors of the county;

-To establish a detailed demographic analysis of the population;

-To complete a detailed skills inventory of the labor force and analyze the institutional capacities to train for new skills or upgrade old

County hears weed beef

With the threat of weeds choking farm land, farmer Ernest Flood suggested the creation of a noxious weed district for Deaf Smith County at the county commission meeting Tuesday.

Backed by seven other farmers, Flood said bindweed and Canadian thistle are gaining ground on county right-of-ways or backyards, and a noxious weed district could better grab the farmers' and county's attention.

"I've been trying to control them (weeds) on the right-of-ways surrounding my land, but neither the state nor the county seems to want to get involved," said Flood. "Even some of the farmers don't try to get rid of the weeds in their own right-of-ways."

Flood explained that the idea of a noxious weed district was broached at the Farm Bureau county convention last fall.

"The district would act as a policing agency which would force the

mer, the railroad commission and the state to control the weeds," said Flood.

Randall County once incorporated a noxious weed district, said Flood, and budgeted \$16,000 per year to operate it. But Flood added that the proposed Deaf Smith County district would be able to charge only 3 cents per acre.

County Judge Tom Simons said the county has attempted to help in the battle of the weeds in the past by offering farmers chemicals to spray the weeds, but not many farmers have taken advantage of the offer.

"We don't necessarily want to set up a noxious weed district, but it will provide a solution if we can't get the farmers' cooperation in fighting the weeds," said Simons.

Commissioner Austin Rose Jr., and Flood will speak with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation about forming the district.

Commissioners voted to advertise for the replacement of a jailer leaving March 31.

Jail administrator David Castillo said more than one jailer is needed, however, based on the inmate-jailer ratio and the architecture of the jail facility.

"We currently have 10 jailers excluding me," said Castillo, "and average 50 to 55 inmates every month. The Texas Commission on Jail Standards requires one jailer per 48 inmates. But the way the jail is set up, we need more than just 11 jailers."

Castillo said inmates should have a jailer present during classroom meetings, kitchen duty and inmate recreation.

"Plus, we have to do an hourly check, book for arrests and bailiff the district court, the county court and the grand jury. Doing all this with just two jailers per shift tends to spread us pretty thin," said Castillo.

Castillo said he wanted to inform the commissioners about the shortage of jailers because Joe Slater, an inspector from the jail commission, suggested that the jail hire four more

Boulter won't back trade amendments

(DIMMITT)—U.S. Rep. Beau Boulter (R-Amarillo) told members of the Texas Corn Growers Association Tuesday he would not support the Gephardt-Harkin Amendment in the trade bill currently in a House-Senate conference committee, but told members of the TCGA he would continue to fight for most of their efforts in the nation's capitol.

Also addressing the group was Deaf Smith County native John Ford, a former deputy secretary of agriculture now working as a Washington, D.C. lobbyist; Hereford attorney James Witherspoon; Frito-Lay Southwestern Division manager Jerry Walsh of Hereford; and deputy state agriculture commissioner Mike Moeller.

Appearing in place of Ag Commissioner Jim Hightower, Moeller said "I'm bringing a message from the Reagan administration. The farm crisis is over, they say. What is a little more believable is that some of our commodities are doing better, like cotton, sugar and beef cattle."

Moeller, in a short address to the 15th annual TCGA meeting, said TCGA's supply management program devised by President Carl King four years ago "is still a good program. I don't think we'll be able to do anything with it in 1988, but we could in 1989. We made a hard push with this in 1987, and we need to make another hard push in 1988."

"I'm still amazed at the licks we're taking in agriculture in this (See CORN, Page 2)

Dole riding high in Republican saddle

Dukakis first, Gephardt second in South Dakota

Republican presidential hopeful Bob Dole was riding high today after twin victories over George Bush in Midwestern prelude to next month's Super Tuesday showdowns. Democrats Richard Gephardt and Michael Dukakis swapped victories and said they were eager to carry their battle into the South.

"This is a marathon," Dukakis said. "It's going to be a long one." The Massachusetts governor won in Minnesota on Tuesday, and dealt Sen. Paul Simon a crushing defeat that crippled his candidacy. Gephardt was the winner in South Dakota with Dukakis a respectable second.

Dole won both states going away—with Bush far, far behind. In Minnesota, the vice president finished fourth behind Pat Robertson and Rep. Jack Kemp. In South Dakota, with Dole winning all 18 of the delegates at stake, Bush was narrowly edged for second place by Robertson.

Wasting no time before heading for the next battleground, Dole was flying to South Carolina today for four quick campaign appearances.

"I hope it can help me in the South," Dole said of his latest victories. "I've got a big hill to climb in the South."

Bush was buried in the Tuesday night returns, running third in South Dakota and fourth in Minnesota. After his embarrassing defeat two weeks ago in Iowa, Bush chose to head South rather than take on Dole again in the Midwest.

It was up one week and down the next in the GOP race. After

Dole's strong Iowa showing, Bush bounced back to win the New Hampshire primary a week ago. This was Dole's week again, but now the scene shifts to the South, where Bush is regarded as the front-runner.

Gephardt and Dukakis were quick to hail their Midwest victories.

"This...was a great victory that we have had in South Dakota," said the Missouri congressman.

Dukakis, who finished second in South Dakota, said, "I think it's very good news for us because we've finished strong in every one of these states."

Also able to claim a measure of victory were Republican Pat Robertson, who was running second in both Midwest states, and Democrat Jesse Jackson, who was battling Sen. Paul Simon of Illinois for second place in Minnesota.



Robertson proclaimed the Midwest results made it "a three-way race coming into the South—Robertson, Bush and Dole. But the vice president is definitely wounded."

"We showed that we are attractive to voters in every region," Jackson said. "In Minnesota we spent \$20,000 and made a strong showing. Our budget is low and we have to run a cost-efficient campaign and target our voters."

Rep. Jack Kemp of New York, third in Minnesota and a dismal

fourth in South Dakota, was facing a decision on how much longer he could continue his pursuit of the GOP nomination.

One-time Democratic front-runner Gary Hart also had a thumbs down for his lonely campaign to "let the people decide." Hart got 5 percent of the vote in South Dakota and 1 percent in Minnesota. Unable to get 10 percent of the vote in two consecutive primaries, Hart stands to lose his eligibility for federal matching funds.

Also teetering on the edge was Simon, who vowed Tuesday night that "there is no way I'll get out of the race tomorrow, absolutely none."

Sen. Albert Gore Jr. of Tennessee described his third-place finish in South Dakota as a "pleasant surprise," though he worked hard in the state and got just 8 percent of the vote.

Robertson said he was "absolutely delighted" with the results in South Dakota. But he conceded, "I had expected to do better in Minnesota."

In returns from all but one of South Dakota's 1,151 precincts, Dole had 51,529 or 55 percent of the vote compared to 18,275 or just under 20 percent for Robertson and 17,416 or 19 percent for Bush. Kemp trailed with 5 percent.

That meant Dole led for all of the state's 18 delegates to the Republican National Convention in New Orleans next summer. Robertson was just short of qualifying for delegates with one precinct's votes uncoun-

None of the other three contests was directly allocating delegates, although each of the winners was getting an edge in the process.

country. Japan has a stronger farm support program than the U.S.," Moeller said. "Their attitude toward farming was forged in starvation after World War II." Pointing out that the United States imported more foodstuffs than it exported during one month in 1986 and pointing to a near-even import-export level, Moeller said farmers needed "a level playing field."

"Protectionism is a dirty word now," Moeller said. "We just need a level playing field for farmers so we can protect the nation's food supply."

Boulter, a candidate for U.S. Senate in the GOP primary on March 8, said he didn't agree with TCGA 100 percent of the time, but said "we must have a strong supply management program."

"The farm crisis is not over," Boulter said, "but I honestly believe the situation is improving."

Boulter said he voted against the Budget Reconciliation Act of 1987 "because the process is absurd." Boulter said the bill "picks

on farmers," pointing out that there was a decrease in target prices and an adjustment in loan levels that will lead to lower deficiency payments.

Boulter said the trade bill currently in conference "hits hard at the farmer" and the Gephardt Amendment "will probably be done away with in committee. It builds a wall that will be devastating for exporters. What I want is fair and mutual trade."

Ford, who left his deputy secretary post after a tiff with the Reagan administration, said things are about to shake in the corn industry when the American Corn Growers Association, an effort to take TCGA's policies nationwide, gets off the ground in April.

"A raucous good time is about to happen when TCGA takes on the big leagues and the big bucks," Ford said. "The bigs have screwed the little guys for long enough."

"We need to establish priorities for the producers, not the corporations. Our piece of the pie has been too thin for too long. We need to increase the size of our slice."

"We must take control of our own destiny. Cargill is not the anti-Christ, but Cargill and other multi-national groups has tremendous influence with the Congress and USDA. It is up to us to take back control. Losing control is not their fault, it's our fault. It's going to be a bitter fight, though—a fight for \$45 billion to \$50 billion, and people are going to fight very, very hard."

Walsh praised the quality of corn raised by area farmers, saying his division continues to lead Frito-Lay in corn quality.

"Sydney, Illinois beat us in quality in 1985," Walsh said. "We put in programs to improve the quality in our facility and worked with TCGA to beat Illinois. We beat them in 1987, and we're ahead of them this year. I don't think they'll beat us in the future."

"The only thing now is the price."

Walsh said other facilities are wanting Texas corn, which leads to higher grinds for millers

because of its harder endosperm, much harder than corn from the traditional Midwestern Corn Belt. "That is the biggest selling point we have."

Walsh said Frito-Lay had "many of the same interests you have. We are a firm believer in the use of Azodrin, and we're glad we don't have the nuclear waste problem hanging over our heads."

Witherspoon detailed how TCGA has helped to lead the fight for lower gas prices for irrigators, and Sunnyside farmer Ray Joe Riley said farmers in southern Castro County are building their own pipeline to bring gas they bought on the open market straight to the irrigation well.

"El Paso Natural Gas is shipping that gas for us, and we're laying pipe from their line to us," Riley explained.

Department of Public Safety plans talks in March to end racial discrimination

AUSTIN (AP) — More talks are scheduled for March after initial negotiations aimed at ending alleged racial discrimination in the Texas Department of Public Safety were called positive by participants.

"We made substantial progress," said Gary Bledsoe, president of the Austin branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. "There were no thumbs down to any of the demands placed on the table."

Bledsoe said a report on Monday's discussions would be given to the state Public Safety Commission on

provides a check and balance between her office and the auditor's office. I can't imagine what I, as a commissioner, would do without Vesta Mae."

Nunley added that a public hearing will be held at College Station in April concerning the abolishment.

In discussing the preliminary budget for 1988-1989, the budget will probably be \$200,000 higher than this year's budget, said Simons.

"This doesn't even include any salary increases for our present employees," said Simons. "But the budget does include requested added salaries from the treasurer's office, the auditor's office and the clerk's office."

Simons also noted that the county could experience an increase in legal fees of \$40,000 to \$50,000.

"Hiring a public defender (versus hiring court-appointed lawyers) might delete some of the cost, but you have to consider that if we hire a public defender, that person will probably have to hire a secretary and then an assistant," said Simons.

Simons said another pay increase should go to Ray Quillen, court reporter, who "has been working for half price. It's nice for us, but it isn't fair for him."

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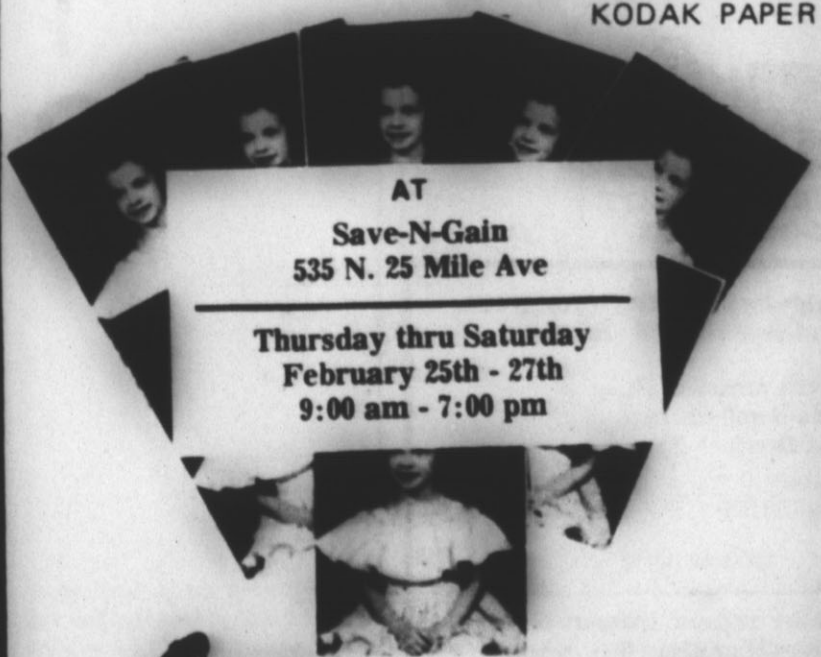

The Hereford Whitefaces found themselves down 9-0 to the Amarillo Sandies Tuesday in the varsity baseball season opener, but put together an outstanding come-from-behind victory, 16-10.

The only hit by either team in the first three innings was a single by McCracken for the Herd.

Amarillo High began its nine-run third inning with a single, double, and single. The second run was scored on an error. An Amarillo player stole second base, and a runner at third base scored on an error in the play.

With one out, Amarillo hit three straight RBI singles for a 5-0 lead. Collier then replaced Hereford starting pitcher James Hernandez in the lineup. Three runners on base when Hernandez left the game eventually scored, on a two-run single and an RBI single.

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Numb fingers, carrying .22-caliber rifle

Welcome to Nordic skiing at Olympics

CANMORE, Alberta (AP) — First your toes tingle. Then your fingers grow numb. Then your nose turns rosy red and a handkerchief becomes survival equipment. Welcome to Nordic skiing at the Winter Olympics.

Think you're uncomfortable? Try strapping a .22-caliber rifle to your back, a pair of cross country skis on your feet, and take a spin over the biathlon course. Now that's uncomfortable.

The idea is to ski, stop, fire at a

target, then ski again, stop again, and fire at a target again. This is not easy; the skiing part increases your heart rate to about 170 beats per minute, making the shooting part — first prone, then standing, with your pumping heart jarring your entire body — exceedingly difficult.

Miss a target on the 10-kilometer race, as you undoubtedly will, and you get to ski a penalty lap in a fenced-in side course, like a bad little boy being punished for robbing the cookie jar. In the 20K race, you can skip the penalty lap. They just add a minute per miss to your total time.

This activity has roots in Scandinavia, where it began as a way of life with natives who hunted game, first for food and clothing, and later for sport.

Because Americans rely on department stores and supermarkets for their basic needs, and baseball and football for their spare time fun, Main Street, USA, hasn't exactly been big on the biathlon.

Then along came Josh Thompson.

The son of two forest rangers, Thompson grew up in the great outdoors. There is no 7-Eleven in Yellowstone National Park, no A&P on Mount Rainier, no McDonald's in the Grand Canyon. So shooting and skiing, basics of the biathlon, came naturally to him.

The community of European military men who dominate the sport paid little attention to Thompson when he finished a typically American 40th in the 10K race at the 1984 Olympics in Yugoslavia. But he had made a commitment to this obscure, somewhat strange activity, applying himself to it ceaselessly.

Then last February at Lake Placid, N.Y., Thompson won a silver medal at the world championships. For the first time, America had a legitimate biathlon medal hope for the Olympics. Predictably, it celebrated his potential loudly and perhaps prematurely.

"All of a sudden, I was on a pedestal," he said. "It was a lot of pressure. Nobody in this sport in this country ever knew that kind of pressure."

Biathletes ordinarily operate in privacy. They have no television exposure, no million-dollar contracts, no daily standings in your morning newspaper. You don't see them on Carson or Letterman.

Success changed that for Thompson. Instead of living in the shadows, he suddenly became a marquee Olympian, right up there with Brian Boitano, Bonnie Blair and America's other medal hopes. That status did not exactly suit him and his performance did not exactly suit it.

In Saturday's 20-kilometer race, he missed five of 20 targets and finished

a dismal 25th. On Tuesday, he had six hits, four misses and a 27th place finish. He won no Olympic medals, not even a stuffed bear — carnival customers have shot better at sitting ducks than Josh Thompson did at these Olympics.

"I'm not happy at all," he said. "I can't remember two races I've had so bad back to back. I don't remember the last time I've missed so many targets and I don't want to, either."

Don't expect Thompson to slink off into the woods and sulk, though. That's not his style. He will return to training and figure out where it all went wrong. And he will be back in 1992.

"I bought myself another four years with these two bad races," he said. Another four years of cold toes and a red nose.

Connection between diet, health observed

American women are missing key "how to" information when it comes to their diets, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

"The good news is that a majority of American women have identified the relationship between health and nutrition," says Mary Kinney Sweeten.

She reports that in a 1985 nationwide survey of women sponsored by the Hearst Corporation and conducted by Research and Forecasts, Inc., 84% of the respondents knew that a high-salt diet may be related to high blood pressure, 78% knew that high-fiber foods may lower the risk of colon cancer and 60% knew about osteoporosis.

"But it's possible to be aware of the diet-health connection, and still not know how to eat better," cautions

the specialist.

"For example, U.S. Department of Agriculture surveys which show what people actually eat indicate that women's mean intake of several nutrients, including iron, calcium, vitamin B-6 and zinc are below recommended levels and their fat intakes are above the 30 to 35 percent recommended by health authorities."

Here are three questions Sweeten recommends as a quick self-test of your nutrition knowledge:

What foods contain vitamin C and how much vitamin C is required? In the Hearst survey, 92% of the participants could identify the sources of vitamin C, such as citrus fruits and dark green or yellow vegetables. But 91% could not say how much orange juice a person must drink to meet the Recommended Daily Allowance

(RDA) for vitamin C.

"The answer is one-half cup daily, says Sweeten. "Since vitamin C is water soluble, it isn't stored in the body, so you need to eat some vitamin-C rich food each day."

What foods provide calcium and how much calcium is required? The same survey showed 90% of the women know the sources of calcium, such as dairy products. But 55% didn't know how much milk is required to meet the RDA for calcium.

The nutritionist says the answer to this question depends on your age. Adults and children need 2 cups daily; teenagers and pregnant or lactating women require 3-4 cups.

How do you get iron? While 79% of the women surveyed knew that iron is important to prevent anemia, 70% did not know how to get the RDA for iron.

"Getting enough iron is mostly a matter of eating a balanced diet, which contains 2 servings of iron-rich protein foods, such as lean meats, poultry, fish or protein substitutes such as legumes, each day. Iron is more readily absorbable from animal products, but vegetable sources of iron, such as dark green leafy vegetables, should also be a regular part of the diet," explains Sweeten.

To obtain some easy-to-read publications on eating a balanced diet or to find out about local nutrition education programs, she suggests contacting the county Extension office.

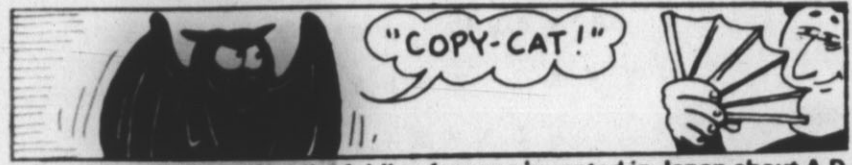

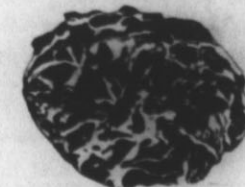

The weekly 30-minute program beginning April 2 will feature music stars from the 1950s and 1960s, including the Coasters, the Shirelles, Del Shannon, the Diamonds, Paul Revere, Bobby Vee, the Comets, and Joey Dee and the Starliners, TNN announced Tuesday.
Wolfman Jack was host of the "Midnight Special" show on NBC-TV for nine years and now has various radio programs. He played himself in the movie "American Graffiti."
His new show will be taped at Little Darlin's Rock 'n' Roll Palace in Kissimmee, Fla.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Basketball star Earvin "Magic" Johnson told 1,200 teen-agers that he never should have dropped out of college and still intends to get his degree.
Johnson, who led the Los Angeles Lakers to four National Basketball Association championships in his eight years with the club, spoke to a cheering throng Monday at Westchester High School, which has a 30 percent dropout rate.
"I am 40 hours short of my degree in telecommunications, but I intend to get it," he said.
"My first year of high school, I was hoopin' good," recalled Johnson of his childhood in Lansing, Mich. "But my grades were real low. My counselor pulled on my coat tails and told me, 'You are getting Ds and Cs and Es. You won't go to college and play ball if you don't pull 'em up.'"
"If she didn't get to me I might not be standing here rapping to you. I might be somewhere else. It's never too late to get yourself together."

NEW YORK (AP) — Jazz pianist-composer Billy Taylor says money spent sending American artists to festivals abroad is money well spent.
"In traveling to places like a jazz festival in India, I've seen Russia, Japan, France, Australia, sent their

best," Taylor said Tuesday. Other nations know about American music through records, but "that knowledge is flawed if they don't get some of our very best. We have to find measures to at least be competitive in this way."
Taylor was attending an announcement by the Rockefeller Foundation, U.S. Information Agency and National Endowment for the Arts of a fund to support the sending of U.S. artists to international festivals and exhibitions.

LONDON (AP) — Aston Martin, the U.S.-owned purveyor of expensive sports cars, kept up its ties with the British royal family by giving scaled-down cars to the young sons of Prince Charles and Princess Diana.
Company chairman and chief executive Victor Gauntlett made the presentation Tuesday. But 5-year-old Prince William and 3-year-old Prince Harry may have to wait a while before getting behind the wheels. Asked if his children are ready to drive, the Prince of Wales said, "Gracious, no."
The 8.5-foot-long, 4-7-scale Aston Martins each cost about \$17,500. They are equipped with stereo radios and cassette players, electrically powered aerials, five-speed gearboxes, leather upholstery, headlights and turn signals.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo. (AP) — Norman Loyd, who plays the grandfatherly Dr. Auschlander in television's "St. Elsewhere," has joined a hospital's drive to recruit nurses.
"I must say this is a little nicer than St. Elsewhere," the fictional inner-city Boston hospital featured in the NBC-TV series, Loyd observed Tuesday as he walked down the corridor at Heartland Hospital East.
Loyd will star in a 10-minute video to be distributed nationwide in Heartland's search for nursing personnel.

NEW YORK (AP) — Robert Redford says Paul Newman is probably his best friend, and he'd like to do another movie with the blue-eyed actor.

"He's the greatest," Redford said in an interview with Esquire magazine. "Not much I wouldn't do for him."
The actor said he's awed by his co-star in "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid" and "The Sting."
After a recent evening with Newman, he said, he found himself thinking, "God, here's old Paul. ... He looks great, feels great, has lots of money, gives to great causes, he's in love with his wife, he races his cars when he wants to, makes a movie when he wants to, he's incredibly happy and still has that face that looks the way it did when he was 20."
"God, by the time we got home, I wanted to shoot myself."
"I'd love to make one more movie with him," Redford added. "Just one more. The two of us."

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Country music singer Lee Greenwood turned the state Senate chamber into a concert hall when he sang the national anthem and his hit, "God Bless the USA," in a special ceremony.
Greenwood's performance won a standing ovation from senators during Monday's ceremony celebrating Presidents' Day.
"It gives me great honor to be here on the floor and to be able to sing this humble song that I wrote in 1983, which was more or less representative of my feelings about how I feel about all of us who call ourselves Americans," Greenwood said.
The Senate unanimously adopted a resolution to honor Greenwood and his career in country music.

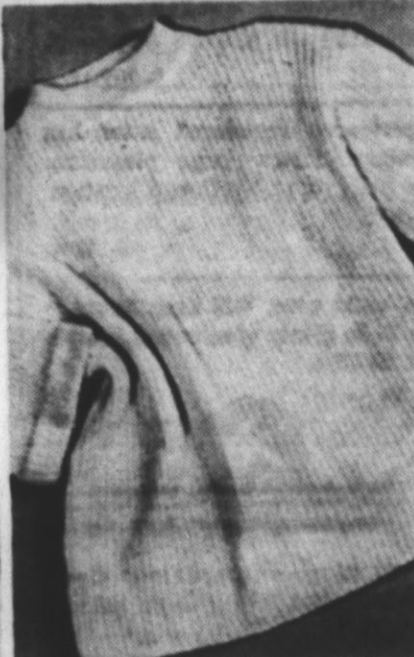
