The Melba Theatre has been thoroughly renovated and redecorated for the big gala opening on Friday night. Miss Annie Louise Coleman, manager, has been making preparations over a period of weeks and everything had been assembled so that only one night would be vacant on the show program and at that time a corps of workmen were in readiness so that the interior could be entirely redecorated and all be in readiness for the opening Friday night.

The foyer has been repainted and new velvet draperies hung. A Walker Silversheet Sound Screen, one of the finest of its kind, has been installed with speaker baffle and inter-booth phone system. Around the screen black velvet drapes give depth to the pictures.

On the floors new wool velvet carpets have been laid and a new lighting system of flashed opal glass, which was built by Buel Condon, will add beauty and the walls were repainted under the skillful direction of Luther Booker.

The show had recently been equipped with new picture machines, and with the new improvements made this week, including one of the finest cooling systems that can be bought will make the Melba one of the best equipped small town theatres in Texas.

Delinquent Taxes Make Huge Total

Delinquent state, county school and road district taxes in Mills county amount to \$53,521.98 for the years 1919 to 1935 inclusive, according to J. H. Frizzell, deputy tax assessor and collector.

The county has the largest share of this total, with \$20,515.14 being due it. If this amount could be collected, the county would be able to remit all taxes for a year and still pay all normal expenses. Delinquent school taxes amounting to \$16,432.57 do not include those due to independent school districts of the county, such as Goldthwaite.

As approximately one-fifth of the tax payers are delinquent for one or more years, this means that the other four-fifths of the tax payers are paying all of the expenses of state and county government.

A bill is before the legislature at this time which would require all tax collecting offices to publish the names of delinquent taxpayers with the amount of taxes owed by each. Sponsors of the bill state that if it were generally known which taxpayers were on a sit-down strike, payments would immediately increase.

L. Eddy and wife, Eva Eddy, October 19, 1936, by deed recorded in Volume 79, page 316, of the deed records of Mills County, Texas, and being the same land heretofore conveyed to W. L. Eddy in several tracts, viz: 140 acres of land by deed recorded in Volume 40, page 91, 20 acres and 76 1/3 acres of land by deed recorded in Volume 40, page 92, 295 acres of land by deed recorded in Volume 40, page 93, and 224 acres of land by deed recorded in Volume 57, page 102, of the Deed Records of Mills County, Texas to all of which reference is made.

That on said date said defendants entered upon said premises and ejected plaintiffs therefrom and are claiming and asserting some title thereto the nature of which is to plaintiffs unknown, and thus unlawfully withhold from plaintiffs the possession thereof to their damage in the sum of \$8500.00; and the reasonable rental value of said property is \$600.00 per year.

Plaintiffs further allege that they and those under whom they hold have had and held possession of said premises in such manner and under such conditions, as give them title thereto under the Statute of Limitation for 3 years, Article 5507 Revised Statutes of Texas; for 5 years, Article 5509, Revised Statutes of Texas; for 10 years, Article 5510 Revised Statutes of Texas; and for 25 years, Article 5519, Revised Statutes of Texas.

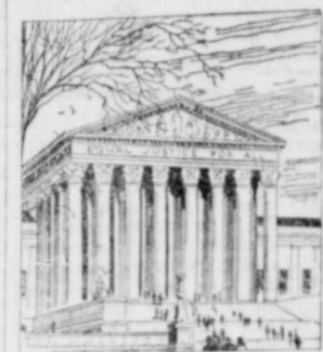
Lessons of History

What about our Constitution during emergencies?

The framers of our Constitution, said Chief Justice Chase in 1866, "foresew that troubles would arise, when rulers and people would become restive under restraint, and seek by sharp and decisive measures to accomplish ends deemed just and proper; and that the principles of constitutional liberty would be in peril, unless established by irrevocable law. The history of the world had taught them that what was done in the past might be attempted in the future."

"The Constitution of the United States is a law for rulers and people, equally in war and in peace, and covers with the shield of its protection all classes of men, at all times and under all circumstances. No doctrine, involving more pernicious consequences, was ever invented... than that any of its provisions can be suspended during any

of the great exigencies of government. Such a doctrine leads directly to anarchy or despotism, but the theory of necessity on which it is



based is false; and the government, within the Constitution, has all the powers granted to it, which are necessary to preserve its existence."

HE WILLED HIS DEBTS

In Goshen, N. Y., a man with a grim sense of humor has left a will bequeathing to his son and three grandchildren all his lawful debts, share and share alike.

It gives us something to think about. Before incurring obligations that we may not live to pay, it might be well to consider how we wish them shared by those who will inherit them. And this is good doctrine for cities, counties and states as well as individuals.

FARM PRICES STILL TOO LOW

Farm income from marketings in February was 12.2 per cent larger than in the same month last year, according to reliable sources. The increase for the first two months amounted to 14.3 per cent.

If the increase in farm income over a year ago which occurred during the first two months is to be maintained throughout the year, prices of farm products must show a further substantial rise. At February's price level, income from marketings for the full year would be smaller than a year ago because of the prospective curtailment of shipments as a result of last year's drought. A further price rise will depend upon a sharp extension of the inflationary movement especially since the present outlook is that larger crops this year will have a depressing effect on prices. It is possible that inflation will continue to develop although this cannot be forecasted with certainty since the movement seems to be due at any time now for at least a temporary set-back.

FINGER PRINTING IS WISE

When the Second District, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs went on record as favoring the finger printing of every child attending school, a forward step was taken to what is destined to be a universal practice.

The old prejudice against finger printing is wearing thin. This objection arose from the practice of finger-printing criminals, but the custom has grown to include all soldiers and sailors, most government employees and even depositors in certain banks.

Far from it being a disgrace to be finger-printed, it is now something of a distinction, a recognition of the practice as a wise precaution to which no honest person can reasonably object.

The explosion in the New London school was doubtless the primary reason for the endorsement of finger printing of school children, but almost every day the news carries stories about unidentified persons, who if their finger prints were on file, could be easily and speedily identified.

Aside from the protection it would afford in the matter of identification, finger printing would undoubtedly be a protection to society in that many first crimes would not be committed if the possible criminal knew that he could be traced by his finger prints.

At least ten per cent of the nation's population is already in the finger printed class. The sooner the records are completed for the remainder of the nation's population, the better.

GOVERNMENT RETRENCHMENT

President Roosevelt has served notice on Congress that the time for an about-face on government spending is at hand. He has said that returning prosperity has reduced the need for pump priming, and he feels that government subsidies should now be pared down.

Coincident with this comes the cheering news that for the month of March government receipts were 22.4 per cent greater than in March, 1936, passing this year the stupendous total of more than one billion dollars. Expenditures in March also rose, but only 16.5 per cent so that for the first time in many months the receipts actually exceeded expenditures.

On the other hand we find that in the state of Illinois there are more persons on the relief rolls than at any previous time—far more than when the depression was at its worst. In Congress there are several strong blocs which are demanding increased expenditures for this and that worthy measure.

It is perfectly clear that unless the nation calls a halt on constantly increased spending, it will, just the same as an individual, go bankrupt. It is obvious that taxes cannot be increased continually. It is also unquestionable that the country as a whole has reached a fair measure of prosperity and can stand the withdrawal of government aid in many lines without material damage.

If Congress stands by the President in retrenchment as it has in recovery, it will accelerate the nation's rise to a prosperous self-sufficiency.

Q. How was the first money obtained for the Texas Confederate Home?

A. Some \$3,000.00 was raised by private subscription and paid on the \$4,000.00 purchase price for some 17 acres of the present site on Feb. 19, 1886, and a Grand Gift Concert and Lottery was held Dec. 27-29 that netted the camp \$10,851.67. After a struggling support, the legislature took over the institution March 6, 1891.

Q. What Texas woman was first to be appointed to an office left vacant by the death of her husband?

A. Mrs. Emma L. Wooten, appointed district and county clerk of Chambers county, succeeding her husband, John Wooten, at his death. She was afterward elected and held the office until succeeded by her son.

Q. Who were the commissioners appointed in 1839 by the congress of the Republic of Texas to locate the capital?

A. A. C. Horton of Matagorda and I. W. Burton of Nacogdoches, from the senate; William Menefee of Colorado, Isaac Campbell of San Augustine and Louis P. Cooke of Brazoria, from the house of representatives were named as the locating commission by an act signed Jan. 14, 1839.

Q. When and by whom was the

first settlement made in what is now Dallas.

A. By John Neely Bryan, on the bank of the Trinity, near the close of 1841, Bryan's home at that time being in Nacogdoches county. The Bryans were joined by the John Beaman and Captain Gilbert families in 1842.

Q. Who was the first to discover the ruins of Fort Saint Luis?

A. Governor Alonso de Leon of Coahuila, who made three expeditions to find La Salle's colony and at last in 1689, discovered the ruins a few weeks after the Indians had plundered and destroyed the place and massacred the Frenchmen who had been left there.

Q. Why was the founding and retention of Fort Saint Luis an important matter?

A. Though the landing of La Salle was due to accident, it gave France a pretext for claiming the country between the Spanish settlements in Florida and Mexico.

Q. How many and what main groups of Indians were in Texas when the white men came into the country?

A. There were five main groups in the province of Texas: the Carancawas and related tribes, strong in physique, lowest in intelligence and morals; the Apaches, in the southwest, fierce, nomadic warriors and robbers, around Goliad and Bexar; the Tonkawas and related tribes, raiders, but amenable to civil-
