TECH SHORT COURSE OPENS TODAY

CHIEF JUSTICE TAFT RESIGNS POST

ILL HEALTH IS BLAMED FOR ACTION

NATION LOSES GREAT LEADER; ACTIVE FOR 25 YEARS

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3. —William Howard Taft, broken in health by years of labor for the nation, has resigned the exalted post of Chief Justice of the United States.

Through his son, Robert A. Taft, he submitted his resignation today to President Hoover while he himself prepared to return to Washington from Asheville, N. C., where he went several weeks ago to recuperate from a near break-down.

Although the resignation came suddenly, so far as the public-at-large was concerned, those in the inner circle of the supreme court had been expecting for several days that the former president would be compelled to give up his exacting duties on the bench.

He had seemed worn and worried for weeks, and it appeared to be only a matter of time when a successor should be named. Who that successor will be remains to be seen, because President Hoover has not yet accepted Mr. Taft's resignation.

Successor Mentioned

Nevertheless, immediately upon announcement of the chief justice's resignation, names begin to crop up in profusion as to a successor.

Besides those already on the highest tribunal, including Justice Stone, there came into the picture Calvin Coolidge, another former president, and Charles Evans Hughes, who once served on that tribunal.

LEONARD WITHINGTON DIES TODAY IN FORT WORTH

(By Associated Press)

FORT WORTH, Feb. 3. —Leonard Withington, secretary of the republican party in Texas since 1924 and former editor of the old Fort Worth Record, died at his home today.

Withington had been seriously ill since November when he underwent a major operation. Although known as a newspaperman and an active American Legion worker, Withington was most prominent as a political leader. General arrangements are pending. He was a member of the University Club in Dallas and was one of the organizers of the University Club in Fort Worth. Withington is a member of Bothwell Kane of the American Legion here.

Wurzbach Gets Congress Post

YEAR-OLD ELECTION ROW ENDED TODAY WITH ACTION

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3. —Representative Augustus McGloskey today conceded the election in 1928 of Harry M. Wurzbach as representative from the 14th congressional district of Texas in a letter to the elections committee which is considering the long controverted contest.

Disclaiming any knowledge "of any wrong doing or any tampering with any returns of the election" the democrat who has held the seat by virtue of a certificate from the state canvassing board, said that Wurzbach should be declared elected. Chairman Sears, Nebraska, of the full committee, together with Representative Kerr, democrat, of North Carolina, was instructed by the committee at its executive meeting today to draft a report on the contest for submission to the house.

FORT WORTH BANK OFFICER SHOOTSELF

DEATH BRINGS TANGLE TO BANK AFFAIRS; DOORS ARE CLOSED

(By Associated Press)

FORT WORTH, Feb. 3. —Death today had added to the tangled affairs of the Texas National Bank of Fort Worth, which closed its doors Friday upon recommendation of the Fort Worth Clearing House association.

L. B. Ward, assistant cashier of the bank, shot and killed himself yesterday.

National bank examiners were investigating affairs of the bank after representatives of the clearing house banks of Fort Worth reported it would be impracticable for the clearing house association to take over the Texas National Bank and pay the depositors.

Fired One Shot

Ward walked inside the police department garage in the city hall yesterday and, placing a pistol to his temple, fired one shot. He died about 20 minutes later.

He left a note in which he ascribed loss of health and loss of his position as reasons for his act.

POSTAL RECEIPTS IN TAHOKA CLIMB

TAHOKA, Feb. 3 (Special).—The business conditions and prosperity in general in Tahoka and Lynn county is well reflected in the postal receipts for the past year. Postmaster Parkhurst reports that the postal receipts for Tahoka during 1929 exceeded the receipts of 1928 by \$1,001.24, or an increase of 15 per cent. The receipts for 1927 showed an increase of 3 percent over those of 1926.

During the year the Tahoka post-office has established its second sub-office, and has extended the rural routes some twenty miles. The fifth rural route is soon to be established out of Tahoka.

FARMERS GATHERING HERE FOR TECH SHORT COURSE; SPEAKERS ARE HEARD

sen the development of our transportation facilities.

Experiencing Trouble.

Mr. Tinsley touched lightly upon the Federal Farm Board and its proposed activities. "Several, I should say, many farmers believe that the Federal Farm Board is going to furnish money for production. That is one trouble we have experienced in the past. The farmers have always been able to get money but they have had a hard time paying this borrowed money back. That is the idea that must be worked out at this time. How are we going to pay back the money that we have borrowed? The Federal Farm Board is working on that one proposition which is almost exclusively with the marketing question. In order to pay the money we must have a market for the crops we produce. It is entirely up to the farmers as to the work the board will be able to accomplish."

Dr. J. O. Ellsworth, head of the department of agricultural economics and farm management, spoke at length on the morning program, explaining the "Regulation of Production by Studying Agricultural Forecasts of the United States Department of Agriculture."

Ellsworth speaks clearly and in language easily understood. One of the price trends in recent years, of its effect on markets and the prices of commodities for future years. "The future will hold something new for farmers and for the markets," declared Dr. Ellsworth. "Nothing has ever been like it was in the past. There is no repetition. If we know of us or any one of us, just what the future holds, we would not be in our present positions."

From past experiences, if prices are up this year—they will go down next and vice versa. The outlook or conditions in 1930 does not exceed that of the past year. Crop yields may exceed those of 1929, but if they do then prices will tend to lower levels. Buyers will be less in 1930, according to all statistics available.

Young Man Handicapped.

"In recent years the tendency in this section of the country has been to larger farms which makes it imperative that a farmer must have a larger capital. This fact makes it exceedingly difficult for the young man to get into the farming business and will continue to do so for the next 10 years."

Dr. Ellsworth clearly explained and demonstrated the use of graphs in determining future prices and markets and revealed at length to the assembly the tendency of prices for the past 120 years through three wars, showing cause and effects of market declines and crashes. He demonstrated these with graphs of general U. S. prices, wheat, cotton, cattle, hogs and poultry.

Wilson Gives Talk.

Following in quick succession and keeping the schedule of the program to the minute, Mr. Bower introduced Roscoe Wilson, local attorney and a member of the Texas Tech board of regents, who spoke to the gathering regarding "The Relation of Texas Tech college to the development of the Panhandle Plains."

"I think that it is highly apparent to everyone just what our relation to the development of the plains is," he said. "We have here the greatest agricultural section in the entire country, and we also have one of the greatest and finest equipped schools in the country. One of the main things as I see it, is that Texas Tech is serving this great section from an educational standpoint. Hundreds of students are within driving distance of Lubbock and they do not have to leave their homes for an education. The school induces other settlers to move into the country and help in the colonization program that is underway."

Must Co-operate.

"Speaking as a member of the Board of Regents, I want to tell you that we are always trying to give you every cooperation, doing everything in our power to assist you. We know and realize that if you are to succeed that you must succeed. If all of us are to be prosperous then most surely our agricultural men must prosper. We have heard talk on all sides of oil development, of other development—but to my mind and to all of our minds the backbone of this country lies in agriculture—it is our industry, the one we rely on for a livelihood and for prosperity."

"Prosperity will come through the proper marketing facilities and I believe that the only way to get these facilities and prices is through cooperation. As I have said we are here to help you and want you to help us."

Have Problems.

"We have problems facing us, ones that at times seem very dark ahead but we will surmount them. This year we have more students than ever before and on top of that we have approximately \$7,000 less money on which to operate. We are to present appropriations before the coming special session of the legislature. We do not blame Governor Moody, we believe that he acted for what he believes to be best. But to be of the best possible service to you and to this entire area, we must have the facilities with which to work and progress."

The meeting was adjourned at noon to the livestock judging pavilion where a luncheon was prepared by the Lubbock chapter of commerce with serving by about twenty-five business men of the city.

The afternoon program started at 1:30 o'clock with an address by Dean A. H. Leidigh, of the school of agriculture, with the subject "Federal Farm Relief and the Program of the Federal Farm Board in Giving Agricultural Aid."

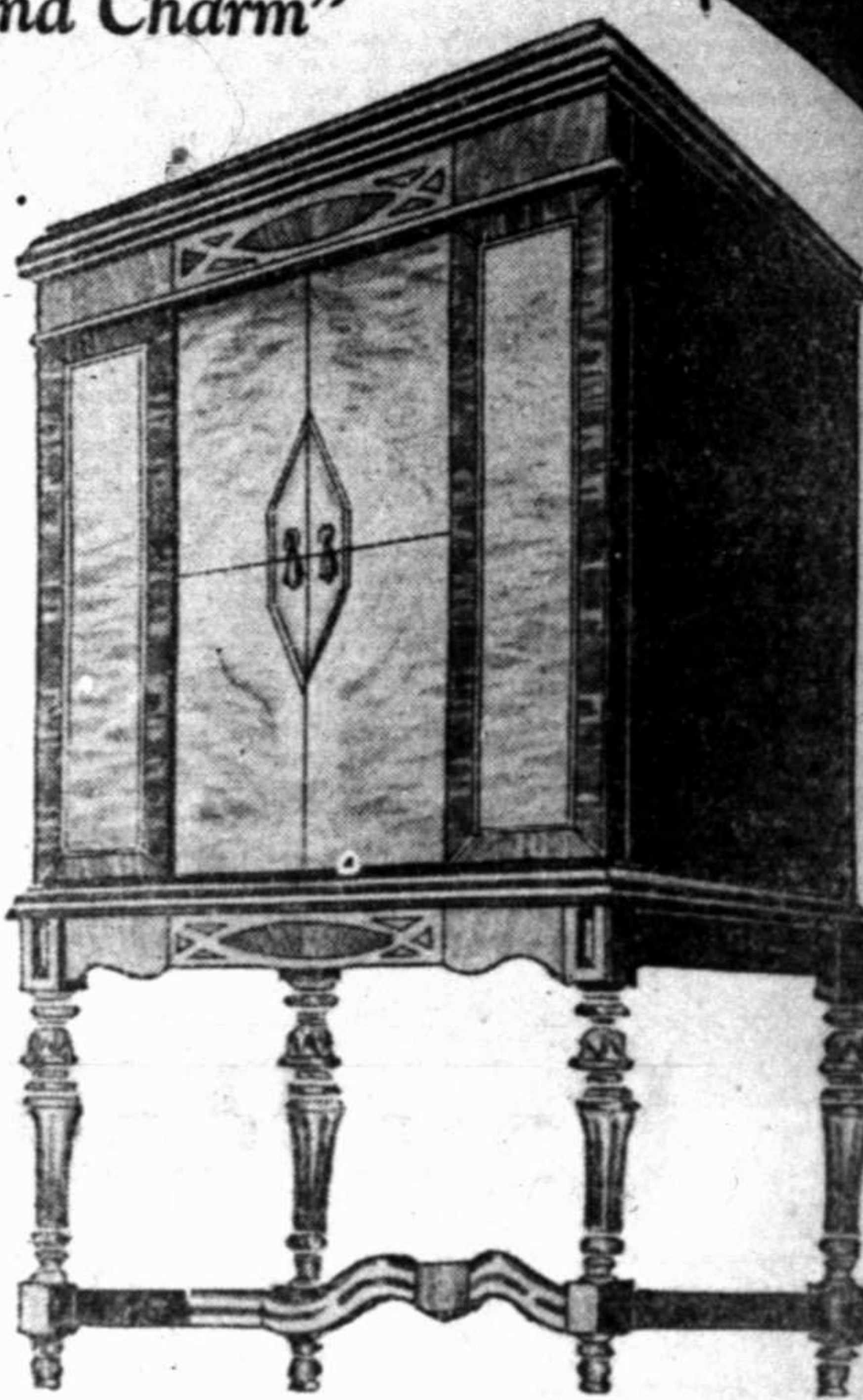

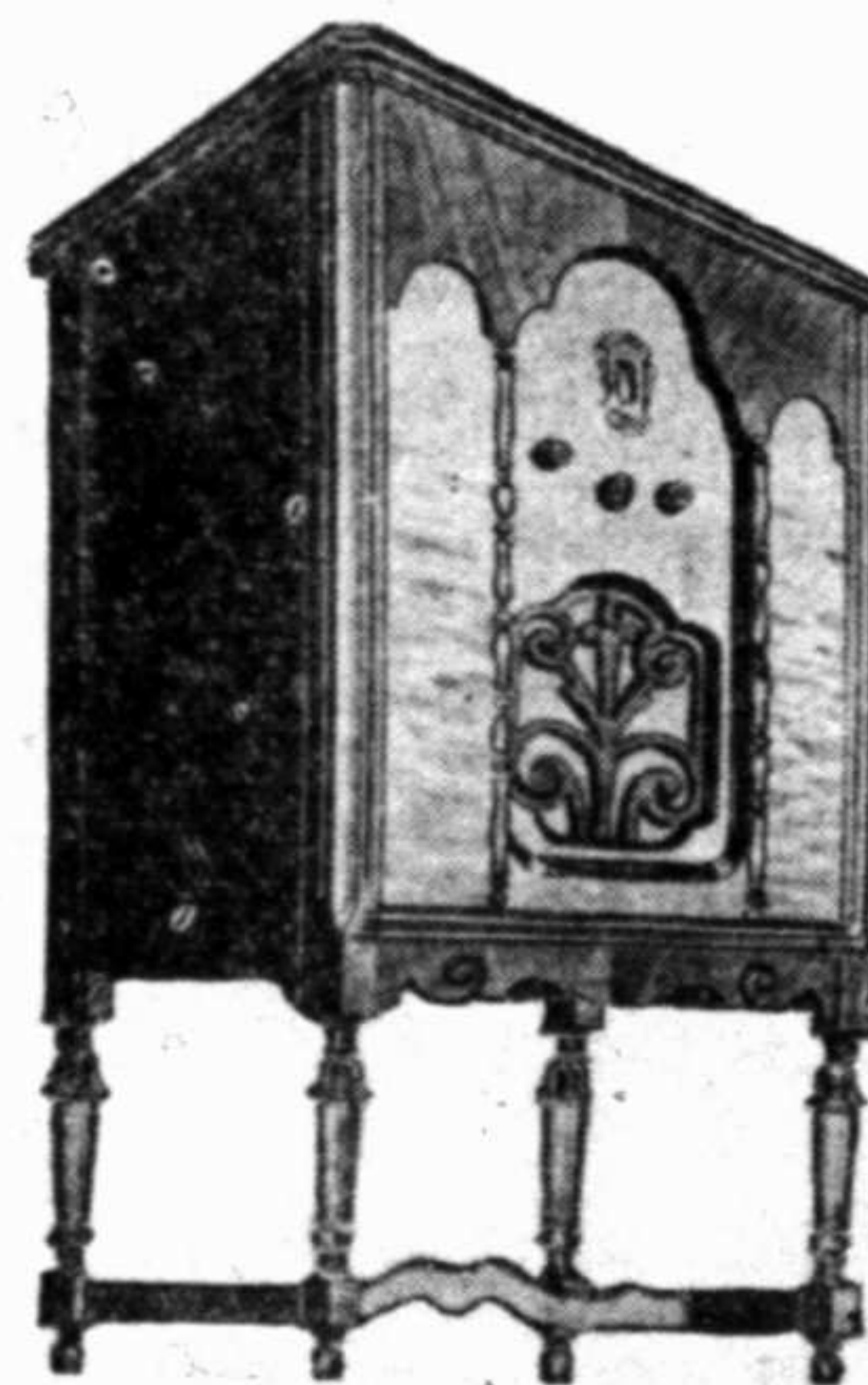

Opening Program Of Short Course Held This Morning

Miss Mamie Lee Hayden Lectures To Women On Home Marketing Problems

Seventy-five women attended the opening meeting of the Woman's program for the second annual Texas Tech Farmers and Homemakers Short Course, which was held in room 104 of the Home Economics building this morning at 10 o'clock.

This afternoon at 1:30 o'clock Mrs. Charles W. Sewell, director of Home Community department American Farm Bureau Federation Chicago, lectured on "The Nation's Debt to the Farm Home" and following her address two demonstrated lectures were given by Misses Mayme Twyford and Mabel Erwin professors in the school of home economics.

Miss Margaret Weeks, dean of the school, made an introductory telling of the purpose of the course and the name of the short course to include the women's interests and remarked that the program for the course had been made up of from replies to a questionnaire sent to delegates who attended last year's meetings.

Mrs. Hudson Speaks

The first lecture was made by Mrs. M. S. Hudson of Hale Center, who is the district representative to the Texas Farm Bureau.

Mrs. Hudson chose as the subject for her address "Our Opportunity" and urged the women to take advantage of their many conveniences.

A comparison was made of the tasks of early pioneers and the available equipment of the modern day to lighten those household tasks.

"The thing for the farm women of Texas to do" said the speaker, "is to organize themselves and through cooperation realize comforts and luxuries. The thinking is left largely to the women and they should work out their own salvation."

Mrs. Hudson said that one-half of the buying power is under economic handicap which destroys purchasing power, and quoted statistics from the year 1925 which showed that of \$21,000,000,000 realized through farming industries only \$7,000,000,000 went to the farmers while the other two-thirds went to the middleman.

"The great tragedy of it all as I see it," said Mrs. Hudson, "is that we are not thinking collectively."

On Marketing Problems

The main address was made by Miss Mamie Lee Hayden, extension specialist in home industry of A. and M. college and was on the subject of "Problems of Home Marketing."

"When a girl or woman decides to market products in her own home the first thing for her to do is to make up her mind as to what particular line she wants to follow," said Miss Hayden in opening her talk.

"There are innumerable things to be made and some people may excel in one thing such as making cottage cheese, brown bread or cakes, while others may be adept at needlework. It is best to specialize. I have found in observing work throughout various points."

"Do not be satisfied with your own knowledge but consult individuals and magazines and strive to make your products better each season."

"The problem of finding local markets was referred to and the speaker said after once the goods were standardized a ready sale would result."

Illustrates Lecture

Illustrating her lecture with canners and jars of fruit, vegetable preserves, conserves, and juices, all with the 4-H emblem, Miss Hayden spoke at length of the success which numbers of Texas women have met with in their home industries.

Among the products demonstrated were citrus fruits from the Valley, grape juice made from wild grapes found in Brazos country, pecans which were sugar coated and put up in attractive boxes for gifts, and beans and peas and okra from various points.

On display were hooked rugs and mats of varied designs and sizes and the speaker spent the latter part of her talk telling of the growing demand for such accessories.

Round Table Discussion

A round table discussion was held and Miss Hayden answered questions on technical matters concerning 4-H products. Announcement was made that every housewife in Lubbock and the surrounding territory is invited to attend the lectures and demonstrations.

Outstanding Figure
The resignation of Taft removes from official life one of the outstanding figures of the present time. As president of the United States, secretary of war, governor general of the Philippines, and later as Chief Justice of the United States, he has been more than any other man, has been a part of the American government for a quarter of a century.

Chief Justice Taft was a sick man recently when he went to Cincinnati to attend the funeral of his brother, Charles P. Taft, the publisher.

On his return to Washington it was apparent to both his friends and to his physicians that he must have a period of complete relaxation, and he was persuaded to go to Asheville for a rest. He seemed to recuperate there, but his sudden decision to return to Washington was a signal to those who knew him that he had made an important decision.

LEADER HAS SERVED COLORFUL CAREER

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3. (AP)—Here are the milestones in the life of William Howard Taft:
Born at Cincinnati, Ohio, September 15, 1857. Graduated from Yale, June 27, 1879. Admitted to Ohio bar, May 5, 1880. Appointed Judge of Superior Court at Cincinnati, March 7, 1887. Appointed Solicitor General of United States February 4, 1890. Appointed Federal Circuit Judge for sixth judicial circuit March 17, 1892. Named President United States Philippine commission, March 12, 1900. Appointed first Civil Governor Philippines, July 4, 1901. Selected as Secretary of War in President Roosevelt's cabinet, February 1, 1904. Nominated for president by Republican national convention in June, 1908. Elected President, Nov. 3, 1908. Inaugurated March 4, 1909. Deceased for reelection by Woodrow Wilson, November 4, 1912. Retired from President, March 4, 1913. Appointed Chief Justice of United States by President Harding, June 30, 1921. Resigned Feb. 3, 1930.

Big Crowd Gathers
Despite the dismal nature of the weather and the meagre sensations in prospect, a big crowd was here an hour before the opening of court at 10 a. m.

A few minutes later, court was adjourned until 2 p. m. and the spectators were told there would be nothing this morning to see or hear. Some left, but many hung grimly on, because they wanted seats when the arguments started, probably sometime this afternoon.

The jury will deliberate Brady's case under the "new" Texas murder law which provides penalties ranging from two years imprisonment to electrocution. If a defendant is found to have committed murder without malice, his sentence cannot be greater than five years.

LAREDO, Feb. 3. (AP)—Despite the fact that much winter vegetation was badly damaged by the severe cold of January 23, following numerous subsequent days on which the mercury registered below freezing in the Laredo district, some spinach and carrots are moving to market. It is said, until a second crop is made.

A total of 251 carloads of spinach and 92 carloads of broccoli moved to market before the severe freezes. Ed. M. Matson, chief freight clerk of the Missouri Pacific lines, reported that up to January 27 a total of 524 carloads of winter vegetables had been shipped from Laredo, these shipments being as follows in carload lots:

Beets, 10; carrots, 15; broccoli, 92; cabbage, 18; cucumbers, 3; eggplants, 1; miscellaneous, 78; mustard greens, 7; spinach, 251; tomatoes 30; turnips, 13; turnip greens, 1.

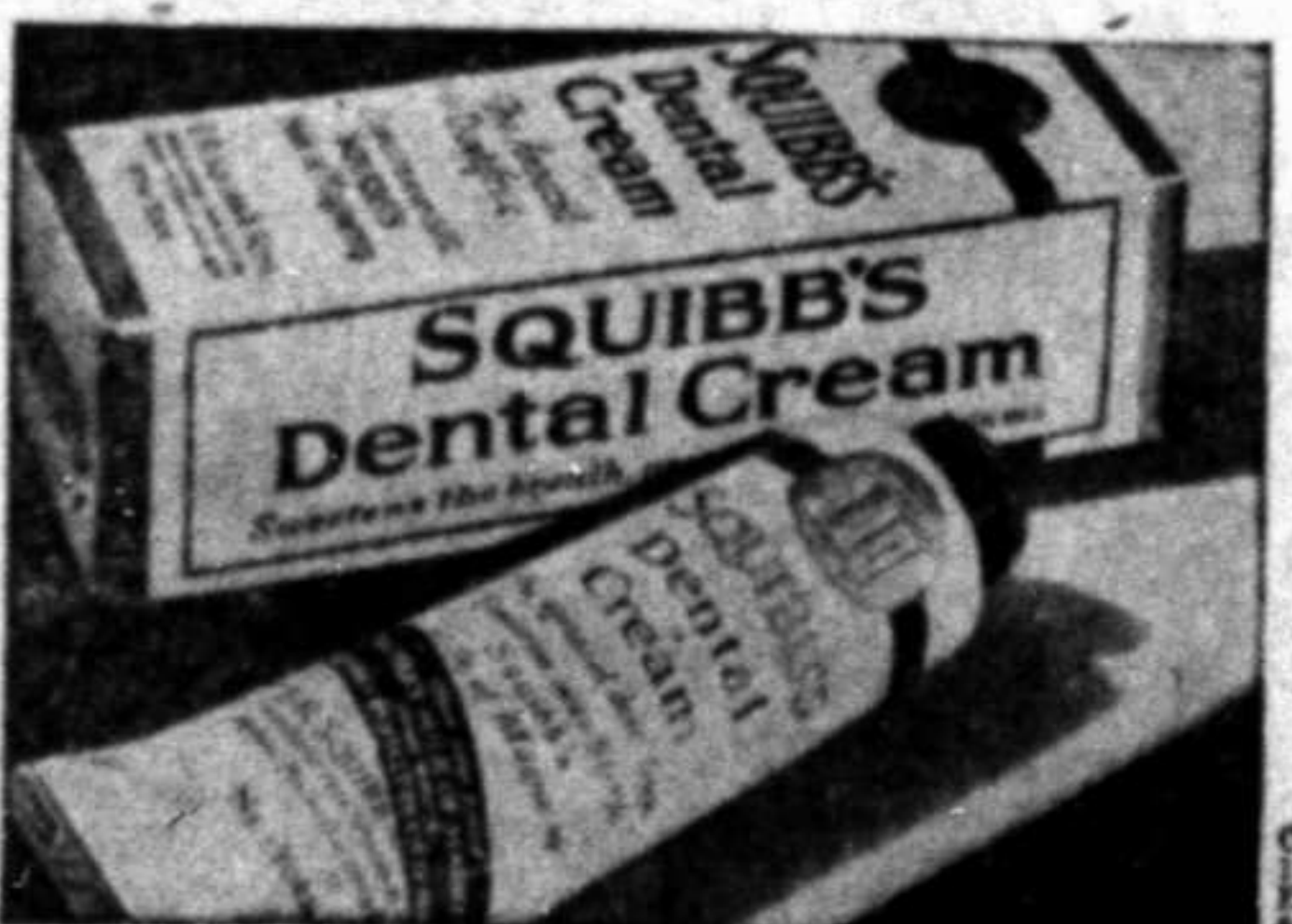

REBEL GENERAL MOVES TO U. S.

NOGALES, Ariz., Feb. 3.—(P)—General Roberto Cruz, one of the leaders in the recent revolution in Mexico, entered the United States from Nogales, here today as a post-quota alien.

Cruz disappeared into the mountains of Sinaloa following collapse of the revolt last spring. He told the United States consul in Nogales, Sonora, upon applying for a passport. He had hidden on a ranch thirty miles from Puerto, Sinaloa, until recently, when he became tired of his status of a fugitive and surrendered to Mexican civil authorities.

Between the time of his surrender and the disposal of his case by the Mexican federal government, Cruz said he was allowed his freedom, but ordered to remain in Puerto. Mexican federal authorities eventually gave him permission to emigrate to the United States. He said he and his wife, who was with him, would live in Tucson, Ariz.

NEW YORK BANKS MAY MOVE CASH BY AIR TUBES TO FOIL HOLDUPS; SYSTEM OF PNEUMATIC CARRIERS MAY REPLACE ARMORED TRUCKS IN FINANCIAL AREA

NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—New York banks may find a way to thwart holdups of their bullion-carrying trucks and messengers by the use of a city-wide pneumatic tube system, similar to that used by the post-office department for the delivery of mail to its various branches.

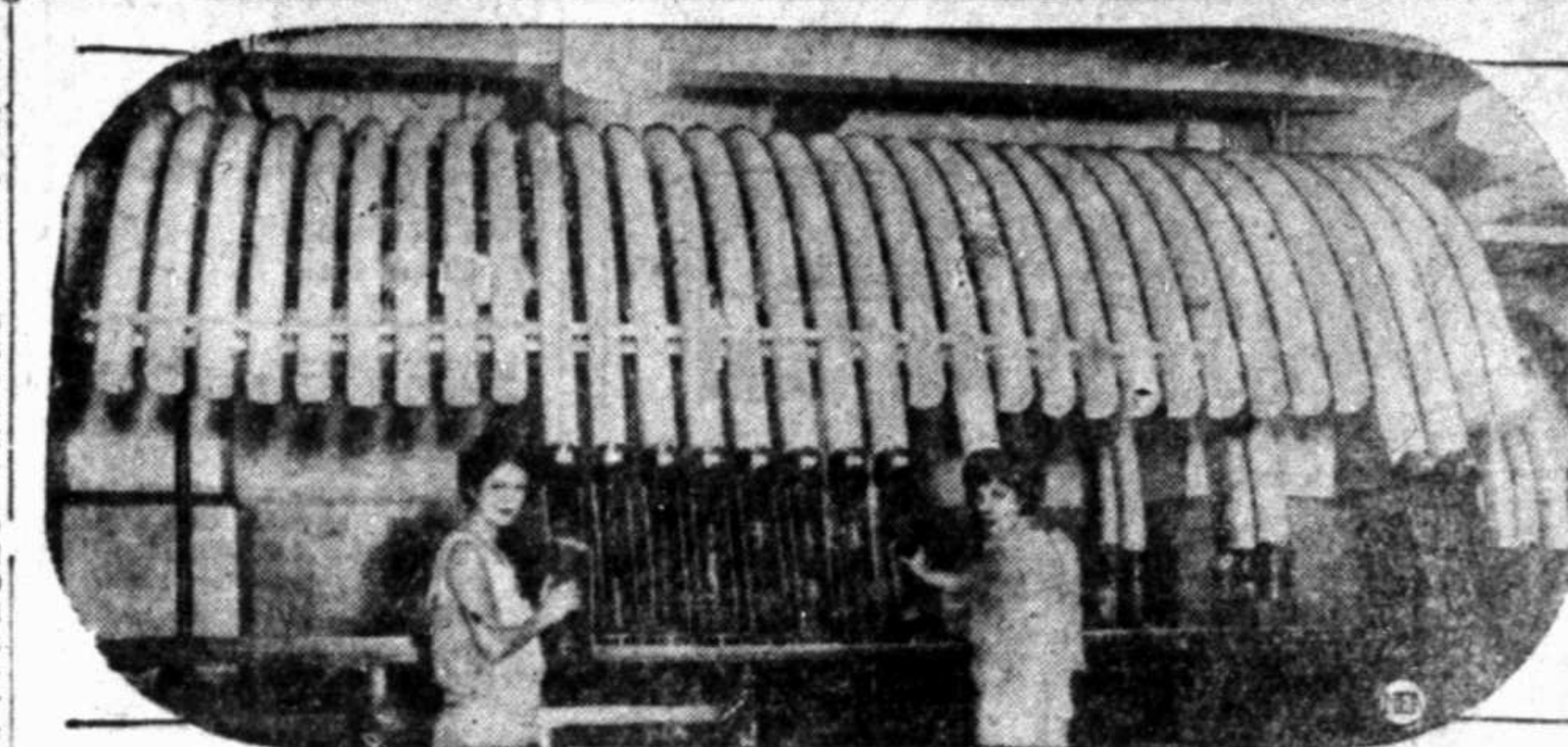
With pneumatic tubes running underground from the large banks in Wall Street to their distant branches, it is declared that there would be no more need of armored trucks with their accompanying police and guards for the transportation of money and securities.

The Federal Reserve Bank alone requires between 50 and 75 armored trucks to transport more than 40 tons of currency daily to the local banks. This means the employment of hundreds of special officers, drivers and guards, while the danger still exists of being stopped by some ingenious holdup.

Pneumatic tube experts say that there is no possibility of robbery from the pneumatic tube system, because the entire line is hidden underground. If a tube were

penetrated by a drill, the escaping compressed air would suffocate the culprits.

That a pneumatic tube system for the banks of New York would be particularly feasible and profitable is shown by the fact that there are 90 banks and 45 trust companies in the Wall Street area which keep up a constant flow of armored trucks and messengers with their 298 branches uptown. Ten thousand special messengers and guards are employed to handle the currency and bullion in New York.

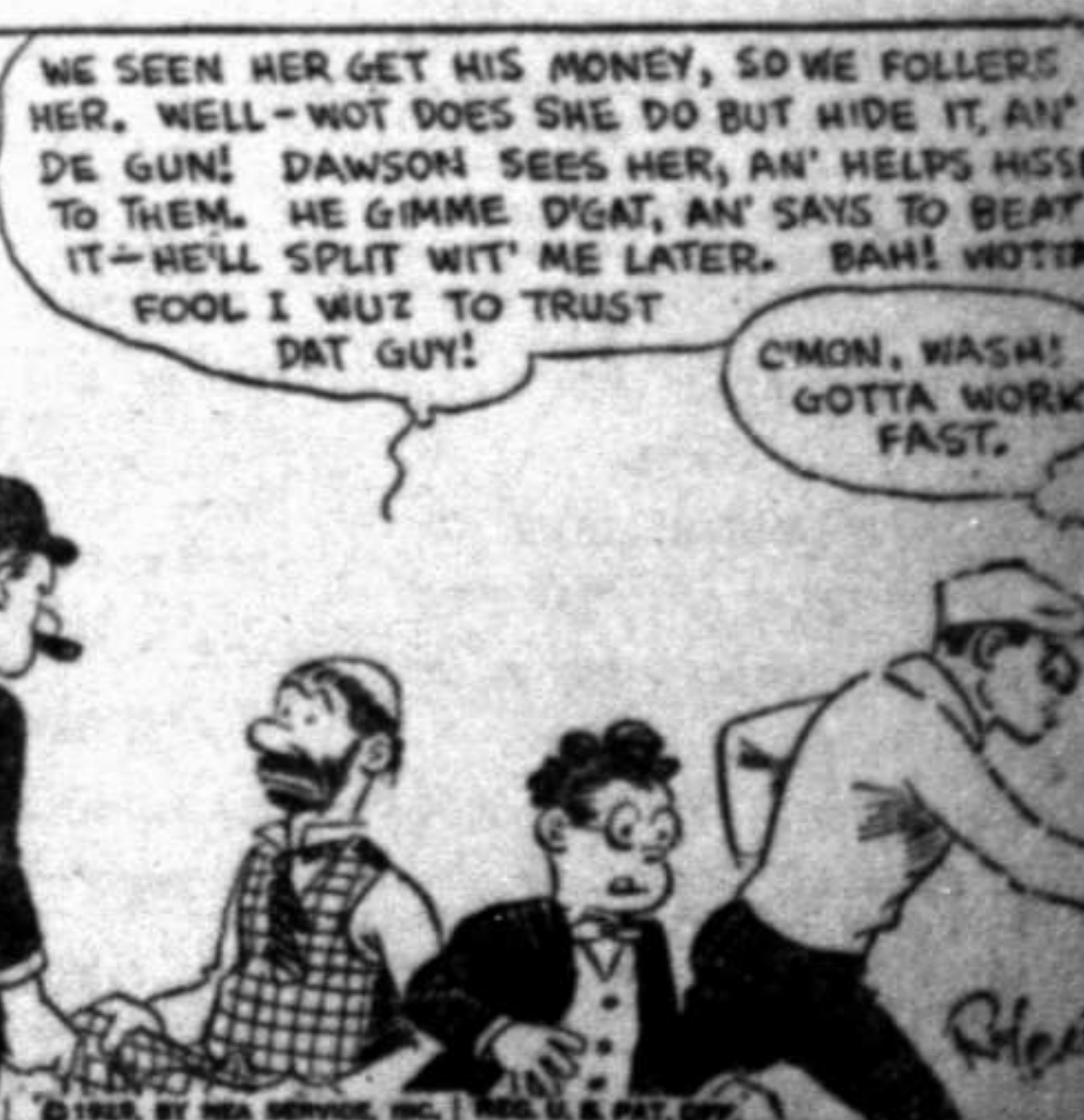

ATTITUDE OF SOLONS SHOWS EARNESTNESS

REPORTS THAT GROUP WOULD LOAF GIVEN SERIOUS BLOW

AUSTIN, Feb. 3 (AP)—The vim with which the special session of the legislature has taken hold of the problem is the outstanding feature of the controversy.

While there are almost as many ideas of how the penitentiary system should be set up and operated as there are members of the legislature, there is a disposition to tackle the task wholeheartedly, if not tenaciously.

Before the session convened there was a general feeling that the legislature might be in the frame of mind to loaf, having already put in one regular and three special sessions making laws.

There cannot be any doubt about the wisdom of Governor Moody's suggestion, which was readily adopted, to make an inspection of penitentiary properties en masse, because since the excursion was taken the legislators have talked and thought little else.

The earnestness with which both houses have tackled the prison measures, with the thorough hearings they have accorded all factions, indicates that the legislators are sincerely making an effort to do something about existing conditions.

Moody is busy. Governor Moody also has been hitting the iron while hot, with his timely, convincing and vivid word-pictures so aptly painted in public appearances before the law-makers. With the legislature in session less than 10 days he had preached three penitentiary sermons, once when he delivered his message before a joint meeting of the two houses and again when he appeared before the Senate and House, respectively. LYNN FARMER HAS POULTRY PROFITS

TAHOKA, Feb. 3 (Special)—Claude Thomas, living 14 miles east of this place states that his flock of hens have paid him even during the recent cold spell. Thomas is conducting a poultry demonstration under the direction of county agent Ray Shaver, and states that he cleared \$63.90 from a flock of 180 hens during the month of December.

January 1, Thomas culled twenty hens from his flock and during the month of January has averaged 50 eggs per day, or a 33 1-3 percent production, in the face of the sub-zero weather most of the time. The secret of his success, Mr. Thomas states is the fact that he feeds a dry poultry ration, furnished his hens with warm drinking water and by having artificial light in his hen house.

Mr. Thomas has a Delco light plant and has an alarm clock so wired that at 4:00 in the morning the lights turn on in his hen house and feed is automatically put into his feeders.

IOWA TO LOSE STAR PLAYERS

ELEVEN ATHLETES ARE TO GO IF SCHOOL IS TO RETURN

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Feb. 3.—The University of Iowa's pleasure at having regained its place in the Western conference today was mixed with disappointment caused by the final disqualification of 11 star athletes.

After nearly four and one-half hours of deliberation Saturday, the conference faculty committee on athletics, in special session, voted to reinstate Iowa, but warned that Iowa still has some house-cleaning to do. A supplemental resolution advised Iowa authorities it would not be wise to request that any of the 27 athletes disqualified last December be declared eligible for further competition. Eleven of the latter still are in school, including Mike Farroh, co-captain elect of the 1930 Haweye football squad, Dole Plunkitt, basketball star, Irving Nelson, drop-kick artist, and Theron Boyer, track man.

In its resolution inviting Iowa to resume athletic relations with the other nine members of the conference, the committee stated it had reason to suspect that outside forces still were working improperly to aid Iowa athletes, but expressed confidence in the ability of Iowa athletic authorities to detect and halt the practice.
