CHRISTMAS SEASON TO OPEN IN LAMESA FRIDAY

Lamesa To Be American Legion Convention Host

ENTERTAINMENTS TO FEATURE PROGRAM

Dr. J. A. Hill To Make Address Sunday

The 19th district convention of the American Legion and Ladies Auxiliary will be held in Lamesa, December 4 and 5, with the Allen-Houston Post, No. 330, of Lamesa, as host to the convention. Delegates and visitors from 28 posts in the district are expected to attend, and a full program has been arranged for the two days.

J. M. Wilson of Floydada, executive committee member from District 19 will preside over the convention. Larry Daniel, commander of the Fifth Division will also attend and take part. Several ladies, noted in the ladies Auxiliary work, are expected to attend and take part in the program. Senator G. H. Nelson will address the convention at 2 p. m. Sunday.

Entertainment features of the program will consist of a dance at the Legion Hall Saturday night, breakfast for the ladies at the country club at nine o'clock Sunday morning and a luncheon for all visitors and Legionnaires at the Legion Hall Sunday noon.

Legion and Auxiliary members will register at the Dal-Paso hotel as soon as they arrive in town, and they will be told at that time of the plans for the business sessions of both organizations.

A special service is to be held Sunday morning at eleven o'clock at the First Methodist church, at which time Dr. J. A. Hill, president of West Texas State Teachers College at Canyon, will give the main address. The public in general as well as all the Legionnaires and Auxiliary members are invited to attend this service.

TORNADOES LOSE TO LITTLEFIELD IN LAST GAME OF SCHEDULE

Loss By Tornadoes Give Brownfield District Championship

The Littlefield High School Wildcats poured the cold water on the Lamesa High School Golden Tornadoes football championship hopes last Thursday when they handed them a stunning upset defeat by a score of 7-0 in a game played on the Littlefield gridiron.

Favored by the experts to win the game by a decisive margin, the Tornadoes raced impatiently up and down the field all afternoon, but were unable to score when the opportunity came. The Wildcats on the other hand made one gesture count for the kill, when a pass carried the ball to the 2-yard line and the ball was then plunged over for the score.

The loss by Lamesa gave the Brownfield High School Cubs a clear claim to the district championship and left the Tornadoes and Wildcats in a tie for second and third places.

The Tornadoes outgained the Wildcats 190 yards to 162 yards on running plays and made 11 first downs to Littlefield's 9.

A special train carried a large number of Lamesa fans to the game and many others went in their own automobiles, and it was estimated that fully a third of the 5,000 fans in attendance were from Lamesa and Dawson county.

This was the final game for the Tornado squad for this season, and already plans are being laid for a better and more profitable year next season.

CLOE JOHNSON CASE CONTINUED

On a motion of the counsel for Cloe Johnson, young Garza county widow charged with murder in connection with the death of her husband who was fatally burned in his shack residence near Post several months ago, her case was continued until the next term of the 106th district court of Judge Louis B. Reed.

The case was continued because of absence of two defense witnesses, said District Attorney Truett Smith of Tahoka, who is representing the state. Attorneys for Mrs. Johnson are the firm of Crenshaw and Dupree of Lubbock and T. L. Price of Post.

A charge by indictment of being an accomplice to murder against Wesley Northcutt, husband of a sister of Mrs. Johnson, was dismissed by the court this morning because of lack of sufficient evidence to prosecute when the defense moved for severance of the case.

RED CROSS ROLL CALL WAS GREAT SUCCESS

The Annual Red Cross Roll Call drive, sponsored by the Dawson County Chapter of the American Red Cross last week, was the most successful ever held in Dawson county. A total subscription of \$367.00 was obtained, with a membership of 275. No reports have yet been received from the rural sections of the county. However, several people in the rural communities subscribed to the drive here in Lamesa. The workers reported that everybody in Lamesa responded very graciously and seemed to be anxious to help out in the enterprise.

Fifty cents of each membership will be remitted to the National Headquarters and will become a part of the general National Fund, while the remainder will go into the local Chapter's Treasury and will be used for local relief and emergencies. The annual roll-call for the American Red Cross is held each year all over the nation some time between Armistice and Thanksgiving. The local drive was held this year from November 22 to Thanksgiving.

FORMER LAMESA RESIDENT KILLED IN PLANE CRASH

James Culver, 36, former Lamesa resident, and G. R. (Jimmy) McGlathery, production foreman of the Ohio Oil Company, both of Hobbs, N. M., were killed when their airplane crashed between Eunice and Monument, N. M. last Wednesday afternoon.

The accident happened when the two men, both experienced pilots went into the air to practice spins. McGlathery was at the controls. Testimony at the justice of the peace inquiry into the accident was that the ship went into a spin at an altitude of about 3000 feet and never came out of it. Those first to reach the scene stated that the plane was at a 45 degree angle, with the nose in the ground and the propellers off. The motor had been driven into the plane. Culver's body was against the dash, indicating that he had seen the crash coming. It was testified. The bodies were badly broken, almost all head bones were broken as well as the legs and arms and both bodies were badly crushed doctors who examined the bodies stated.

Funeral services for Culver were held at Hobbs, at 11 o'clock Friday morning and brought here for burial in the local cemetery Friday afternoon. Mr. Culver was born on July 23, 1901 in Grayson county, he came to Lamesa 13 years ago with his twin brother Charles, staying here for several years then going to Kilgore and lately moving to Hobbs.

He was a landowner of this county and was connected with his brother Charles, in the American Steam Laundry at Hobbs, and the Culver Bros. Inc. Laundry at Kilgore. The Culver brothers were also engaged in selling planes at Hobbs.

Survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. L. Culver of Carlsbad, N. M., and the following brothers and sisters: Mrs. T. V. Butts, Lamesa; T. R. Culver, Abilene, Herman Culver, Kilgore; Sam Culver, Charles Culver, Hobbs; W. C. Culver, Dallas, Gaylord Culver, Hobbs; and Mrs. Chadd Culver, Dallas.

COUNTY GINNINGS REACH 90,000 BALES

An unofficial census of the cotton gins of Lamesa Wednesday at noon showed that approximately 40,497 bales of cotton of the 1937 crop had been ginned in Lamesa at that time. It is estimated that the rural gins of the county had ginned at that time around 50,000 bales of cotton, giving the county a grand total of almost 90,000 bales.

The last government census taken as of November 14 had the county ginnings listed at 67,919 bales as compared with 36,129 bales at the same date last year. The Courier report showed that the county had ginned 68,479 bales on November 18, proving that the Courier estimates have not been wrong.

Were it possible to secure the number of Dawson bales that have been carried out of the county for ginning it is calculated that the total would be well over 100,000 bales produced in this county.

Estimates by leading cotton men are that this years crop is between 80 and 90 per cent harvested.

HYDRAULIC OIL MILL IS BEING BUILT HERE

To Have Most Modern Equipment

E. R. Tinsley, A. E. Jacobs and other associates have started construction of a hydraulic cotton oil mill on a ten-acre block located just southeast of the compress in Lamesa.

Foundations for the plant have already been poured and the steel work on several of the buildings have been started. The entire plant will be of steel and concrete construction and as fireproof as is possible to make them.

The latest and most modern machinery and equipment will be installed and it is thought that the work will be finished by early spring at the latest.

The hydraulic process of cotton seed milling is the one where by the hull is separated from the kernel of the seed thereby allowing for the manufacture of a number of commodities, notably cottonseed meal and cake free from the hulls. This will be of great benefit to residents of the territory who feed out cattle each winter, and the new mill management hopes to make Lamesa the cattle feeding center of the South Plains.

Those connected with the management of this new Dawson county industry have had many years of experience in the cotton oil mill line, and their intentions are to make this the best mill possible.

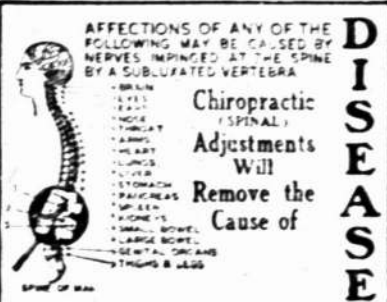

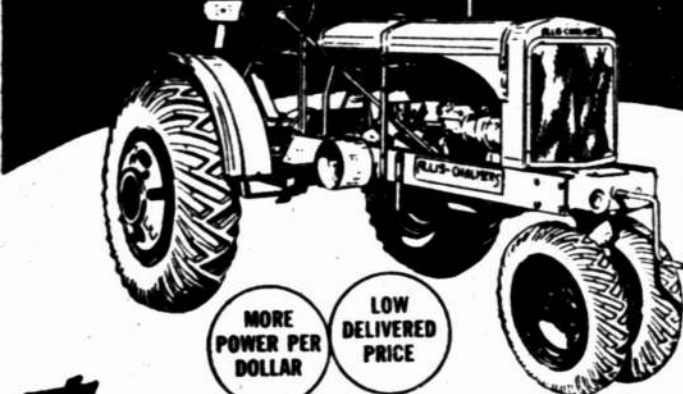

Now Is The Time To Make Fruit Cake

By GLADYS WRIGHT, Farm Security Administration CHRISTMAS FRUIT CAKE

Dark Fruit Cake:
5 cups sifted Swans Down cake flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon cinnamon
2 teaspoons cloves
2 teaspoons nutmeg
2 cups sugar
2 cups butter or other shortening
8 egg yolks well beaten
8 egg whites stiffly beaten
tablespoon molasses
1 cup sour milk
1 cup grape juice
6 cups raisins
1-2 cups currants
1-2 cups figs, chopped
1-2 cups citron, finely cut
3 cups apple, chopped
4 cups nut meats, chopped
Sift flour once measure, add baking powder, soda and spices and sift together 3 times. Cream butter thoroughly, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add egg yolks, mixing well, then add remaining flour, mixed with fruit and nuts. Fold in egg whites. Bake in 2 well-greased loaf pans, 8x4x3 inches lined with wrapping paper in slow oven (300 degrees Fahrenheit) 4 hours.

White Fruit Cake:
4 cups sifted Swans Down cake flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1-2 teaspoon soda
1-2 teaspoon salt
1 pound sultana raisins
1-2 pound citron, finely cut
1-2 pound each crystallized orange peel, lemon peel, pineapple and red cherries, finely cut
1 pound blanched almonds, finely cut
1 cup butter or other shortening
1-2 cups sugar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
10 egg whites stiffly beaten
Sift flour once measure, add baking powder, soda and salt, and sift together 3 times. Sift 1 cup of flour mixture over fruit and nuts, mix thoroughly. Cream shortening thoroughly, add sugar gradually, and cream together until light and fluffy. Add remaining flour mixture to creamed mixture a small amount at a time. Beat after each addition until smooth. Add lemon juice, fruit, and nuts. Fold in egg whites, pour into paper lined tube pan or small bread pans, 2x2 3-4 x4 1-2 inches. Bake in slow oven (250 degrees Fahrenheit) 2 1-2 hours, then increase to 300 degrees for 15 minutes. Bake 6 pounds fruit cake.

Dawson County Teachers In Favor Of Retirement Plan

In making her report to the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, county superintendent, states that almost half of the teachers of the county have availed themselves of the benefits of the Teacher Retirement plan. Many beginning teachers who had nothing to lose by waiting another year to enter did not elect to stay in the system this year. All beginning teachers next year become a part of the Retirement System as a condition of their employment. Teachers remaining in the system have five per cent of their salaries deducted each month, which is sent to the State Teacher Retirement Fund where savings draw interest at 3 1-2 per cent, compounded annually. It is estimated that final membership figures will exceed 35,000 in Texas.

CAR WRECKS SHOW INCREASE IN COUNTY

The City Traffic authorities and highway officials are calling attention of our local citizens to the fact that automobile wrecks and accidents have shown considerable increase in Lamesa and on the highways in the county during the last month. An official check up shows that there were ten major wrecks in Dawson county during the month of November. None were fatal but at least 15 people were injured in the wrecks. During the summer the child was taken to Dallas for medical treatment. This trip was sponsored by money secured from the local funds. The medical treatment proper was furnished by the Department of Education, Vocational Rehabilitation Division. In order that the child have the proper treatment, which comes through exercise, the necessary equipment for this was again furnished by the Paralysis Fund.
