BRITISH DOWN 31 PLANES IN LAST 2 DAYS

The British defenses shot down more Nazi bombers over Britain today, making a total of 31 for the two days.

There were indications that casualties and damage from the German raids were mounting. Big German bombers were also reported attacking the Mediterranean area of British forces.

The Germans claimed that they had sunk five British merchant ships in the English channel yesterday, bringing the total tonnage lost of the war to 4,330,000 tons, which Britain said is "more than four times" higher than the actual losses sustained.

Several persons were killed in England by bombs today, and there were growing indications that the axis powers are intensifying their efforts to crush England.

Prime Minister Churchill's secretary denounced as "rubbish" a German report that Churchill had been wounded in an air raid yesterday.

Bankers Shaping Meeting Agenda

NEW YORK.—Plans have been completed for the 66th annual convention of the American Bankers Association, opening at Atlantic City, N. J., on Sept. 23, at which Sen. Carter Glass of Virginia will be honored "for his services to American banking."

Robert M. Hanes of Winston-Salem, N. C., president of the association, announced arrangements for the convention's closing session on Sept. 26.

Plans for round-table discussions as well as the series of sessions call for emphasis on enlarged services of the ABA as well as its expanded educational features," Hanes said.

Gov. Clyde R. Hoey of North Carolina will address the first general session of the convention Wednesday, Sept. 25. Other speakers at this meeting will include Hanes and E. S. Woolsey, president of the Louisville Trust Co.

The four general divisions of the association will hold their annual meetings the first day, Monday, Sept. 23. All of the following sessions will be devoted to round-table conferences and general discussions.

Subjects for discussion at these sessions include problems of new to Survey Your Trade; The Influence and Value of Bank Staff Contacts; "Liquid and Marketable Loans to Farmers."

The 40th anniversary of the American Institute of Banking will be observed at the first session on Wednesday, Sept. 23. William A. Irwin will be inducted as national educational director of the institute by the president of the AIB, H. R. Smith.

Newly-elected officers of the institute will be installed at inaugural ceremonies Thursday night, Sept. 24.

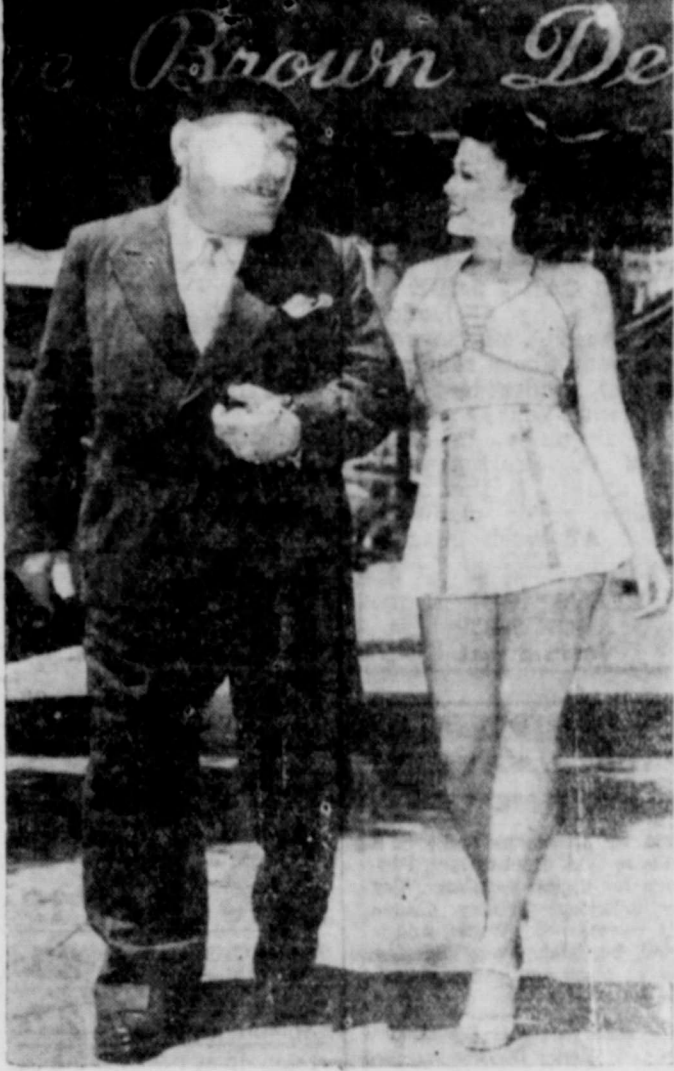
The son has several other compositions that have been used in stage productions, and one of them, "Safety Pin Soldier," won approval of Cantor.

COUNTY SHOWS SLIGHT POPULATION DECLINE; FARMS ARE INCREASED

With the three major cities in Eastland County, Eastland, Ranger and Cisco, showing a total population decline of nearly 3500 during the past 10 years, the county as a whole showed a decline of only 3,784, according to census figures and showed an increase of 355 farms put into cultivation during that period.

The increase in the number of farms was the largest in the Abilene district, with most counties showing a decline in farms. Taylor county showed the largest increase in population, 3,170, but had the second largest decrease in number of farms in cultivation, 605. Jones county led in the farm decrease, with 631 farms being taken out of production.

Counties which showed an increase in population, of the 12 reported from the Abilene office, include Comanche, 814; Palo Pinto, 841 and Taylor 3,170. Decreases were shown, with the amount of decline, as follows: Callahan, 1,234; Eastland, 3,743; Erath, 367; Fisher, 738; Hamilton, 206; Jones, 705; Nolan, 1,971; Shackelford, 461 and Stephens 4,225.

Totals for the 12 counties for 1940 show Callahan 11,555; Comanche, 19,244; Eastland 30,408; Erath, 20,768; Fisher, 12,825; Hamilton, 13,317; Jones, 23,528; Nolan, 17,351; Palo Pinto 18,417; Shackelford, 6,234; Stephens 12,335 and Taylor, 44,195.

Number of farms in each county in 1940 was listed as Callahan, 1,441; Comanche, 2,942; Eastland, 2,345; Erath, 2,801; Fisher, 1,483; Hamilton, 1,889; Jones, 2,173; Nolan, 954; Palo Pinto, 1,338; Shackelford, 810; Stephens, 810 and Taylor 1,885.

Three Officials Are Built Up for Big Letdown Later On

FOOD SHORTAGE OVER ALL EUROPE MAY BE A DECIDING WAR FACTOR

Preparations for continuing the war into next winter are indicated by arrangements for placing all of France's forthcoming harvest of food supplies under control of the German government. No private distribution of the harvest is to be allowed, and all food is to be allotted at the source by the Hitler conquerors of France.

Rationing of food among the French people is reported to be strictly enforced with large supplies already being sent into Germany. If a quick conquest of France is achieved, as certain by Hitler, arrangements to place French farms under complete military control would be unnecessary.

It seems apparent that the Germans realize they must guard in advance against semi-famine conditions on the continent of Europe next winter as the result of the British blockade. Famine is Britain's ultimate instrument for bringing the war to an end favorable to the British Empire. If the German plans to invade England and cut off British food supplies end in failure, there is little doubt that the war will last into next year, with winter becoming a formidable ally of the British fleet.

France normally is within 10 per cent of being self-supporting in foodstuffs, but war conditions have lessened this proportion. The entire European continent foresees poor harvesting results not only because so many farm laborers are in military service but also because of bad weather conditions.

The continent will require at least 150,000,000 bushels of wheat importations this winter to prevent hunger preying on the people. Most of the grain must come via trade routes controlled by the British Navy. Hitler, as the

conqueror of the continent, will seize all food he can as tribute from conquered territory, to try to prevent disintegration within Germany. That will mean partial starvation for the victims of France's surrender, unless there is relief through the Red Cross.

Already Red Cross food supplies are beginning to be distributed in France from abroad, raising a difficult problem for Great Britain. France has been declared hostile territory by the British government, since Germany is using French territory and French supplies as aids in efforts to compel British capitulation. Food reaching France through any agency whatsoever is of important assistance to Germany, since it allows the Germans to seize that much more of France's domestic crops for the use of the German people.

Medical supplies are not in the same category as foodstuffs, which are baby foods which are not usable by adults. But, since the Germans have declared for "total war" and since France is "German territory" for the time being, it would seem legitimate for the British blockade to put upon Germany full responsibility for taking care of the food issue in France.

To what extent Germany and Italy can survive a bitter winter of food shortage will become the major problem of the war in the event of failure to subdue Great Britain. In the last war it was the blockade that brought the issue to its final decision. So important is the issue of winter's approach that it would seem as if Hitler will have to make a stupendous effort to end the war before then. Meanwhile, British food ships arrive in port with regularity and Hitler's plans to stop them and to land a conquering army in Britain still remain in abeyance.

Even Old Timers Can't Remember It But Texas Once Had Refugee Problem But Battle of San Jacinto Ended It

AUSTIN, Tex.—You can't find any old-timers who'll remember it, but Texas—little more than a century ago—had its own small-scale version of the war-refugee horror Europe is now experiencing.

Historians refer to it as the "Runaway Scrape," a pell-mell flight of Texas settlers that began in early March, 1836, with the Alamo's fall, and didn't stop until Houston's retreating army—barely a day's march behind the refugees—turned and defeated Santa Anna at San Jacinto in late April.

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Nine Texas Boys Go To NYA Center Colorado Springs

AUSTIN, Texas.—Nine Texas boys have been sent to the Pikes Peak NYA Work Experience Center near Colorado Springs, Colo., since May 1, according to J. C. Kellam, State NYA Administrator. Youth sent include five from Sanatorium, one from Forest, two from Waco, and one from Denison.

Kellam said the Pikes Peak Work Experience Center is an NYA Project sponsored by the Colorado State Department of Vocational Education with the aid of various cooperating agencies such as the Cragmor Foundation, a non-profit organization for the purpose of giving medical care to patients with tuberculosis; the Tuberculosis Section of the Colorado State Welfare Board; and the Colorado State Tuberculosis Association.

In setting up this Project in cooperation with these agencies, the National Youth Administration in Colorado is not departing from its fundamental policy of extending useful work experience to employable young people, for it is seeking to achieve in this Project a work and training situation in which young people who have arrested cases of tuberculosis may have a greater opportunity for occupational adjustment. Special consideration is being given to occupational guidance, correlated with medical advice and individualized work and training assignments.

"A great many youth in the NYA age group have been occupationally handicapped because of some physical defect or because they have had tuberculosis during the time in which they would normally have gained occupational maturity," Kellam pointed out. "Through this Resident Center the National Youth Administration is giving these young people an opportunity to orient themselves among a considerable number of definite crafts and skills of immediate practical value."

Sweaters Needed to Finish Quota for Red Cross Station

Mrs. L. H. Flewellen, chairman of the knitting division of the Ranger Red Cross station, stated today that the Red Cross was no longer furnishing yarn with which to knit children's sweaters, and that the sweaters or the yarn, would have to be furnished by the local station.

Anyone having good sweaters suitable for children has been urged to call Mrs. Flewellen, and notify her, and they will be used as a part of the Ranger quota. It was stressed that good sweaters were needed.

If enough sweaters cannot be obtained in this manner, Mrs. Flewellen stated, arrangements will have to be made whereby the yarn can be purchased locally and used in making these garments.

NYA Boys Elect A Group Of Officers

New officers of the NYA boys barracks were elected at a meeting of NYA enrollees Thursday evening, it was announced today. Officials elected, and who will govern activities at the barracks for the next few months, were Marvin G. Hall, mayor; Delbert Adams, O. T. Raglin, Sam Bachus, Bernie Milmo, Melvin E. Daniels and James W. Norris, councilmen.

The NYA boys elect their own officers, form their own rules and regulations and see to it that all live up to their rules.

Oil Men Put Old Field Back Into Big Production

WALTERS, Okla.—Folks who fear exhaustion of this country's oil supply because it might mean confining the family car to the garage on week-ends for lack of gasoline would find relief from worries if they could take a look at what some oil men are doing with an old oil field near Walters, Okla.

The field, discovered in 1917, produced heavily for several years. Eventually the wells were put on the pump and production gradually declined. Six years ago an oil company decided to apply a method of resuscitation known to the petroleum industry as repressuring. Some 450 acres were taken over, and 20 key wells were cleaned. Electrically-driven compressors were installed, and gas was pumped into the wells.

According to theory the gas would penetrate the sands, strip them of oil, and permit oil to be produced at a declining rate. It was estimated that the output might go as high as 250 barrels a day, then drop below 200.

Production has averaged 500 barrels a day for six years. While one barrel of oil has been produced for every 769 cubic feet of gas injected, 858 feet of gas have been recovered for every barrel of oil produced. In one month of 1939 the wells, on theory, should have produced only 5,550 barrels of oil. Actual production was nearly 10,000 barrels greater.

The field is only one of many in the United States which are being repressured and in which production has been restored. Indications now are that even if no new oil fields were discovered, the industry would obtain large production by such secondary recovery methods.

Funeral services for Mrs. Minnie Duncan, 51, of Olden, who died yesterday at Ranger, conducted from the tabernacle at Olden by Elder A. F. Thurman of the Eastland Church of Christ this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Burial followed in the Eastland cemetery.

Mrs. Duncan was born Minnie Wright on May 15, 1889, and was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. P. G. Martin, who resided 6 miles east of Eastland.

The deceased is survived by her husband, her stepmother, four sons, J. P. Ike, Harry Lee and Walter; four daughters, Jessie, Bessie, Lorene and Corlene; and the following brothers and sisters: P. G. Wright, Jr., Mrs. R. J. Fox, Mrs. Jess Duncan, Mrs. S. P. Newcomb, Mrs. W. C. Garvin, Mrs. G. V. Cobb, Miss Rebecca Wright and Miss Beulah Wright.

Detroit Learns Fuehrer Has Not Telephone Book

DETROIT.—The Michigan Bell Telephone company, after long and patient research, has tracked down and killed a rumor that intrigued Detroiters for several days.

Report said that Adolf Hitler had requested and been sent a copy of the Detroit telephone directory, which alarmists firmly believed would provide him with vital information.

Several people were envisioning the arrival of spies and attendant sabotage when the telephone company cleared the mystery. Careful check, an official said, showed that the Deutsche Reichpost always receives a copy of the directory, as do similar companies in 72 other nations.

Deutsche Reichpost altered its address, however, and the last volume was sent to 40 Adolf Hitler Strasse in Dusseldorf, Germany. That's how the rumor started, the company said, and now couldn't it just quietly die?

Man Is Arrested On Desertion Charge

Members of the Eastland county sheriff's office, according to Deputy Sheriff "Tug" Underwood, Thursday arrested a man employed in Eastland for Palo Pinto county authorities who advised that he was wanted on a wife desertion charge.

ROOSEVELT TO CALL GUARDS FOR TRAINING

WASHINGTON, July 12.—President Roosevelt said today at his regular weekly press conference that he is considering calling up the National Guard for intensive training to strengthen the United States defenses.

The president said that the plan had not yet been completed, but that he was discussing it with Secretary of War Stimson, who was present at the conference, and who was introduced to the 290 reporters by the president.

Simultaneously Gen. George Marshall, chief of staff, recommended that the National Guard be mobilized and that such mobilization be compulsory military training, if the bill is enacted.

He urged that the guard be enlarged to 400,000 men and that it undergo one year of intensive training.

Gen. Marshall appeared before the senate committee, in behalf of a bill to register all men between the ages of 18 and 65 for defense training. Those between the ages of 21 and 45, according to the bill being proposed, would be given military training and those falling in the age groups from 18 to 21 and from 45 to 65 would be trained for home defenses and for industries closely allied with national defense.

A Concrete Block Making Machine Is Built In NYA Shop

A concrete block making machine, which was built in the NYA metal shop in Ranger, was today being shipped to Texas Technological College at Lubbock, where it is to be used in making concrete blocks for building construction.

The machine was made in its entirety from materials salvaged by the machine shop workers, and does the work that a machine costing several hundred dollars would do.

The machine was crated at the NYA wood shop for shipment.

Twice Burned—
At Least Once Shy

During and after the World War, the United States
 sent a vast volume of goods to Europe. It got nothing in
 return.

What happened was that great sums of money were
 lent. Our goods were bought with the money. When the
 time came to pay back, Europe had no money to pay, and
 no goods which the United States wanted.

Whatever part of our production was sent to Europe
 during and after the World War turned out to have been
 really a gift to Europe, whatever we expected at the time.

So, thought the United States, we will be smarter next
 time. Investment in Europe since the World War prevail-
 ingly took the form of the building of American plants
 there to produce goods on the spot within the economies
 of the various countries where the enterprises were set up.

Now that has gone the same way. The German Nazis
 having overrun country after country, American losses
 in those countries will reach \$500,000,000, the Depart-
 ment of Commerce estimates.

The attitude which will be taken by the German govern-
 ment in its conquered territories is well forecast by
 what happened in Germany itself. American plants there
 during recent years simply failed to yield any return to
 American owners because the Nazi system of exchange
 control permits almost no money to be paid out to foreigners.
 In a sense, the building of such plants was simply a
 gift to Germany.

Such, it is reasonable to expect, will be the fate of Am-
 erican enterprises in Belgium, Denmark, Holland and
 France, Poland, Czechoslovakia, and Austria.

Since scarcely anybody would advocate sending an ex-
 peditionary force to recapture the General Motors plant
 in Germany or the Standard Oil refinery in Holland, the
 United States is now squarely up against the question, can
 anything be done at all?

Probably not, though a study is now being made of
 foreign assets in the United States owned by nationals of
 the countries which have confiscated our own. Possibly a
 little confiscating might be done here in partial compen-
 sation.

 deputies said the wheel apparently

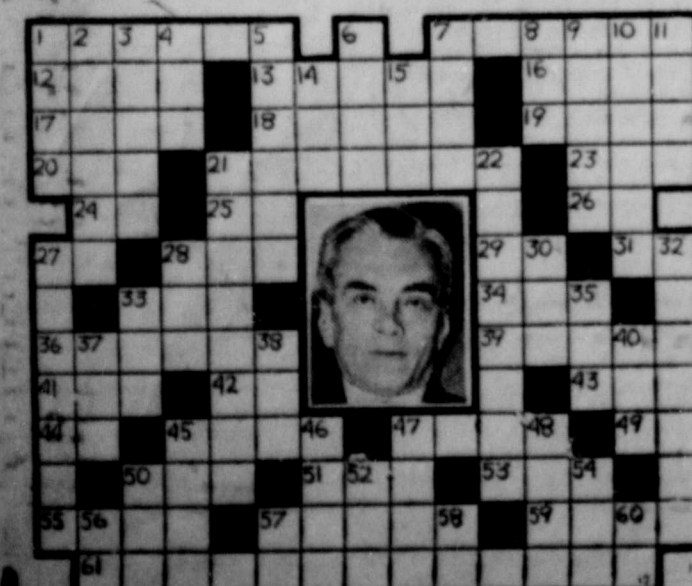
was part of a dual set of a truck
