

TRLA Advises Farmworkers To File Workers' Lien For Unpaid Wages

Texas farmworkers who are not paid for their work have a powerful remedy under state law, explains staff attorney Kay Mares of Texas Rural Legal Aid. The workers can file workers' liens on the property of farmers, packing sheds, and contractors. The workers' lien give the workers a security interest in the crop

or other property connected to the work.

For example, a hoe hand who is not paid for her work hoeing a sugar beet crop can place a lien on that crop. Generally, she must act within 30 days of the work to place the lien. Then she has a security interest, or mortgage, on the crop for the next six months, or

longer if she files a foreclosure lawsuit. Her wages must be paid from the sale of the crop.

"Farmworkers in Texas should not give up if they do not get paid for all of their work," says Mares. "Under Texas law, they have powerful tools to collect their wages." Farmworkers who want to file liens on the

property of their employers are advised to contact their family lawyer or TRLA.

Mares also reminds all farmworkers that the minimum wage is now \$3.35

per hour under both state and federal law. All workers must be paid at least that amount, even if they are paid on a piece rate basis.

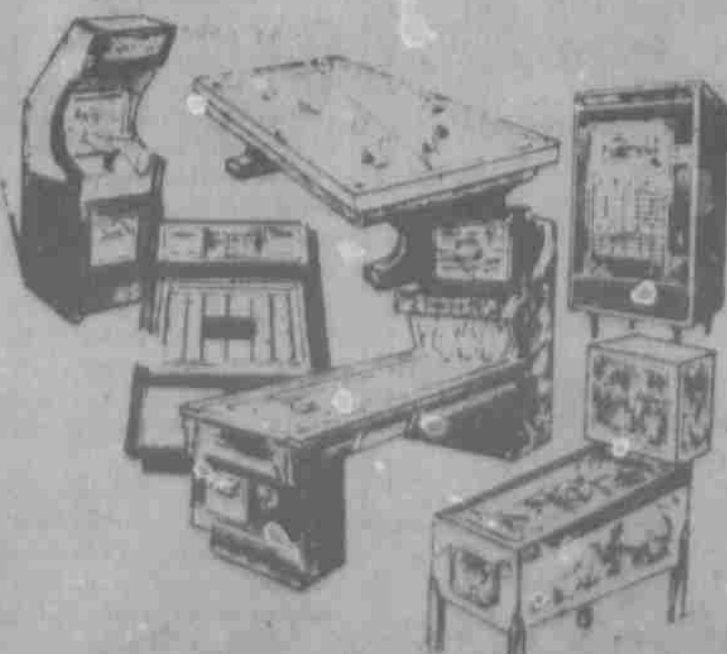

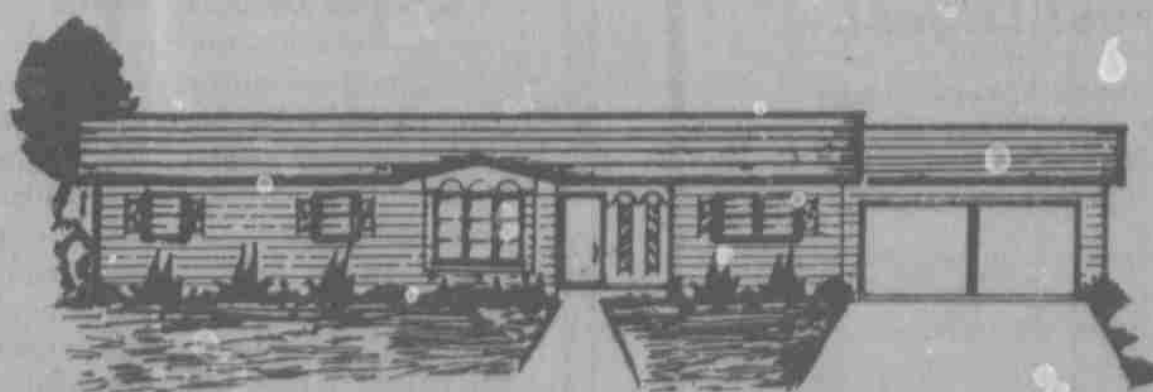

An accountant friend of mine once told me: "When adding a column of numbers, looking for a mistake, yet you can't find it, put it aside for a while, come back and start from the beginning." Maybe in the Luella Scott case, a fresh start may result in a different ending. Start from the time Ms. Scott was last seen alive, re-question everyone, re-examine every photo and piece of evidence. Then compare the old and new, maybe that one piece of evidence needed will be staring someone in the face.

One thing wrong with this investigation and almost all police investigation involving East Lubbock residences, that is, "the rapport between the police and East Lubbock." Black people, in the majority, will not tell the police everything unless specifically asked. In most instances, the police do not completely understand Black talk, especially old Blacks and young Blacks. And there are only a few Blacks that will volunteer information about a crime, even to Crime Line. And we can be assured that if any of the "East Lubbock street people" knew anything about Luella Scott's murder, someone would have "copied a plea" with it by now.

Therefore, to crack this case, it will take a Black or a seasoned White officer, well versed and comfortable in the Black community doing some old fashioned police work. The modern police questioning techniques have not produced the desired results and mostly likely won't with the people you need to work on. To some extent, the police must provide some information they have in order for the right person's mind to click. Ask the right questions, at the right time, in the right place and the chances are great, you will get the right answer.

Since August, 1983, this murder has been the topic of many conversations. Speculations have ranged from a professional "hit" to a State School person. Bring the

subject up and you can hear it all, but since they are speculations, we the Black public, takes it as just another opinion and we all know we regard one another's opinion. However, to the police, our opinions or speculations just may be the missing piece. To Officer Price who has been

placed on the spot, talk with the people, without flashing your badge first. It may take time, but if you work hard and listen to the speculations, the rumors and "you didn't hear this from me," you just might be in a much better position to ask the right questions with the right suspect.

A complete high fiber, low fat diet has been proven to help reduce colorectal cancer, but not other types of cancer.

Another deceptive ad may link the low fat, low cholesterol content of a food with a reduced risk of some forms of heart disease, but fail to disclose that the food is high in sodium which may increase the risk of heart disease.

Get Reliable Nutritional Information
Advertising is used to sell a product or service and is not always a reliable source of nutritional information. Consult independent sources, such as health care providers, nutritionists, or consumer publications and books.

Read The Labels
On most food labels, the major ingredient is required to be listed first, followed by the second most prominent ingredient, and so on. If the first ingredient is sugar, for example, you know that there is more sugar than anything else in the food.

Know What It Means
Low calorie means there should be no more than 40 calories in each serving.

Reduced calorie foods must contain at least one-third fewer calories than similar foods in which the calories are not reduced.

Imitation must be indicated if some part of the nutrition is artificially replaced. For example, some cheese products are not 100 percent cheese.

Sugarless can be very deceptive because it only refers to table sugar, or sucrose. The product may contain corn syrup, honey, or some other sweetener which has as many calories as sucrose.

Organic describes food produced using non-chemical methods. To be marketed in Texas, organic products must carry a certified label from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Low cholesterol does not necessarily mean a food is low in saturated fat.

AN EDUCATOR'S OPINION

Educating for Democracy

The United States of America just elected its 41st President. We should be proud of our nation's democratic heritage. Yet, as patriotic Americans, we must not overlook the fact that in 1988, less than half of our eligible citizens voted.

That poor turnout was no fluke. It is part of an ominous trend that has now lasted for more than a generation. In 1960, the year John F. Kennedy was elected President, 62.8 percent of the American electorate voted. And the percentage of voting citizens has dropped virtually every quadrennium since: 61.9 percent in 1964; 60.6 percent in 1968; 55.2 percent in 1972; 53.5 percent in 1976; 52.6 percent in 1980; 53.3 percent in 1984; and only 49 percent in 1988.

Researchers predict that this voting trend, which is most acute among 18- to 24-year-olds, will continue. What a travesty. What a mockery of America's democratic ideals.

The Greek word *demokratia* means "government by the people." In a democracy, effective government requires involvement by the people. The difference between freedom and tyranny is precisely the difference between citizen participation and apathy.

No democracy can long endure if it rests on the loose sands of voter indifference. As People for the American Way Chairman John Buchanan has noted: "Democracy is not a spectator sport."

I believe that all concerned citizens must work to reverse this voter apathy and revitalize participation in our democratic process. Here are a few suggestions or places to begin:

Eliminate any remaining hurdles to voter registration. Election day registration or registration by mail should be the practice in every state.

Make voter registration part of civics education for high school seniors. Most states already allow registration of 17-year-olds who will be 18 by the next election. This practice should be adopted by all the states. Our high school students should graduate with a diploma in one hand and a voter registration card in the other.

Revitalize civics curricula. Democracy and civic responsibility should be an integral part of our schools' curricula starting in the primary grades. The study of civics must have continuity—and it must involve students in the political life of their communities and our nation.

Finally, learning about civic responsibility begins at home. Parents should unabashedly champion American democracy and demonstrate that advocacy to their children by voting.

Of the 133 million Americans eligible to vote on November 8, fewer than 89 million did. We must reverse that trend—and we must start now.

Don't Bite on Advertised Claims

Consumers rightfully expect accurate information about the nutritional value of the foods they buy. Unfortunately, some advertised nutri-

tion claims are misleading and deceptive.

For example, the Attorney General's Office alleged that a recent national soup company advertisement misrepresented the fiber content of some products by including high and low fiber soups in the same ad. Another ad claim that certain soups contained "10 percent of your daily requirement" of calcium when, without adding milk, the soups contain two percent or less of the recommended daily allowance for calcium.

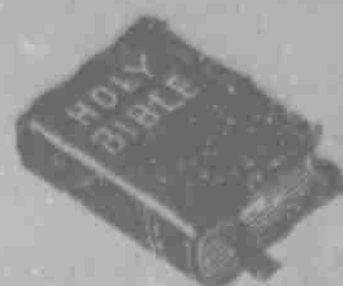
