Gin operators expect to receive from 150 to 200 more bales that have been picked up by the Road machines and piled on turnrows. At least one farmer in the area had not finished stripping before the current bad weather started.

The total of 139,232 bales produced in 1965 is 11,887 bales more than was produced in the same territory from the 1964 cotton crop, when the report was a total of 127,345 bales.

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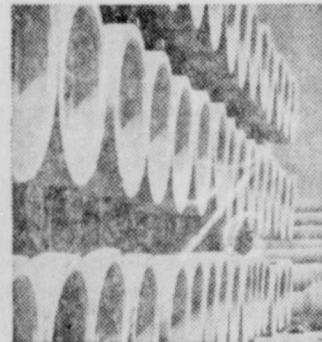

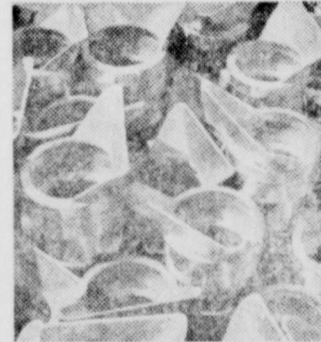

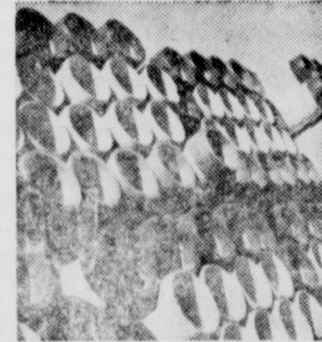
