RUSSIA PLANS TO BUILD TWO HUGE FLEETS

LONDON, May 15.—Soviet Russia, already the world's greatest military power on land, disclosed today a determination to match Germany's naval strength in the Baltic and Japan's in the Far East. The disclosure of prime importance in the world naval situation, was made in a brief note which Nivan Maisky, Russian ambassador, handed to Sir Robert Van Sittart, permanent undersecretary for foreign affairs.

The note announced:

1. Russia reserves complete liberty of construction for its Far Eastern fleet.
2. The limitation of Russian fleets in European waters will be dependent on Germany's acceptance of identical restrictions.

The Russian note was the latest development on negotiations for a Russian-British naval treaty to complement the French-British-Russian naval treaty of March 25.

Russia officially accepted Britain's invitation to negotiate a Russian-British naval treaty on the lines of the March 25 treaty, including the full exchange of advance information on naval building programs.

The first agrees to negotiate with Britain and expresses readiness to assume naval obligations to the same extent as Germany.

API Condemns Discrimination In Tax Measures

TULSA, Okla., May 15.—Meeting in special closed session, today, the board of directors of the American Petroleum Institute adopted a resolution condemning passage of discriminatory taxation legislation.

The resolution asked that no tax or economic legislation be passed for the benefit of one industry at the expense of another.

While the A. P. I. directors mentioned no particular tax reform legislation in their resolution, it was known they had discussed a proposed tax on fuel oil designed to equalize competition with coal industry.

Dickens Exhibit Is Planned For Cleveland Fair

CLEVELAND, — A reproduction of the Old Curiosity Shop, immortalized by Dickens, will be one of the main attractions at the Great Lakes Exposition this summer.

It will be sponsored by the British Commonwealth Club as the English contribution to "The Streets of the World," which will have 30 national villages.

Visitors will have every detail of the Old Curiosity Shop carried out, from the lamps on the outside to the beams and rafters inside. There will be a duplicate collection of the pewter, old silver, glass and other curios, found in the original shop, now preserved by the British government as a museum.

In connection with this exhibit, the British Commonwealth Club will distribute silhouettes of such famous Dickens characters as Micawber, David Copperfield and Sidney Carton. The silhouettes mounted on heavy paper, will be imported from London.

Educator Fills Two Offices By Taking Ride of 200 Miles

LEESBURG, Pa.—College and university students can learn a lesson in ambition and progress from Arnold C. Marts, acting president of Bucknell University, who divides his week to hold down two full-time jobs.

The student who rises at dawn to stoke furnaces and wait on tables to get an education, hasn't a thing on Marts. He travels 200 miles each week from Bucknell to New York city, where he is president of Marts & Lundy, Inc. This firm has raised \$195,000,000 since 1926 for philanthropic and cultural organizations.

The college president-business executive takes a six-hour train ride between his busy Bucknell period and his New York affairs. Outside official working hours Marts is often host to student groups.

Chemists To Test A Mythical Love Plant From India

LONDON.—Science is to attempt to discover the secrets of an ancient love potion of Ceylon. Bulbs of the Naga Maru Ale, a plant which, according to tradition, has the magical powers of making one person fall in love with another, have been sent here for examination by chemists.

The plant is a small species of yam, with a flower like a lily, with five or six spreading purplish-blue petals.

He drove his sword into the ground and handed her some on the tip of it, for by strict tribal law no man could touch his sister. On eating it she immediately fell violently in love with him. Meerchaum Pipe Carving In Vienna Is A Dying Art

National Tomato Show Is Planned At Jacksonville

JACKSONVILLE, Tex.— Jacksonville is completing preparations for the National Tomato show which will be given here May 31 through June 6 in celebration of national tomato week.

The celebration will open Centennial Exposition week in Texas, preceding by six days the launching of the \$25,000,000 Centennial exposition in Dallas. Events of a Centennial nature will be featured on the program.

Show officials, encouraged last year by entries from as far away as Florida, are arranging to exhibit this year. The event will have even greater recognition in the Court of the National Tomato Queen with princesses present from all states which grow tomatoes in commercial quantities. Governors of 25 states have been invited to name princesses to the pageant.

Another Trades Day To Be Held Tuesday

One of Last of the Old Stagecoaches To Be at Ft. Worth

FORT WORTH.—Visitors to Fort Worth's Frontier Centennial this summer will see one of the last of America's real stage coaches.

The coach will be loaned by the King Ranch, owned by A. J. Kleberg. It is believed to be 100 years old and used for transportation over the 1,250,000-acre King ranch before it was subdivided.

It will provide part of the atmosphere for the three shows provided by Billy Rose, Broadway's "Little Barum," Rose is supervising the "Frontier Follies," his own "Jumbo," and a musical rodeo—all of which will be provided for Fort Worth Centennial visitors in July.

Failures In Texas Decrease In April

AUSTIN.—The number of commercial failures in Texas during April decreased substantially from both the preceding month and the corresponding month last year but the liabilities of the bankrupt firms increased sharply, the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas reports. This latter fact, however, is attributable to the failure of one large firm. Excluding this firm, total liabilities in April also declined sharply from the two comparable periods.

According to reports from Dun and Bradstreet, Inc., there were only 14 failures in April, against 21 the month before and 23 in April last year. Total liabilities, \$463,000, declined 42 per cent from March and 48 per cent from April last year if the large firm mentioned above is excluded; but including this firm total liabilities increased 106 per cent over March and 86 per cent over April last year.

HEINWEHR HAS HOPE IL DUCE WILL LEND AID

VIENNA, May 15.—Heimwehr leaders hope Premier Mussolini will act to save Prince Ernst von Starhemberg, ousted from the Austrian dictatorship by a political coup, it was learned today.

Any intervention by Mussolini would be a counter-move to French-British negotiations, based on a telegram in which Starhemberg congratulated Mussolini on the conquest of Ethiopia.

The United Press learned the British-French representations precipitated the downfall of Starhemberg after long differences between him and the Schuschnigg element in politics.

Members of the Heimwehr, Starhemberg's private army, believe, after he sees Mussolini, Il Duce may decide to launch a counter-action against the French-British representatives on the ground that they constitute an interference with Austria's internal affairs.

The Heimwehr men disclosed they will accept Starhemberg alone as leader and will not recognize any order from Schuschnigg, which Starhemberg does not approve.

Roundup Law of Old West Revived

MEDFORD, Ore.—Wild West days are being re-lived here.

An outlaw band of 100 wild horses has been ordered rounded up by the Jackson County court on the complaint of 19 stockmen, acting under a state law that has been invoked for years.

The horses, which have the freedom of the range near the Oregon-California state line, are "abandoned, starving and neglected, constituting a range nuisance," according to the court.

The band has trampled grazing land, raided alfalfa fields, broken down fences and killed young livestock to death with their flashing hoofs, stock ranchers say.

The roundup will be made in April when the horses will still be weak from scant winter forage. Forest rangers will build a corral, and the sheriff will enlist 200 CCC recruits and cowboys for the drive. The horses will be held in the corral for 10 days so owners of branded animals that have turned wild may claim them. State law requires the rest of the horses be sold to the highest bidder at auction. Some will go to rodeos.

Special Rackets Prosecutor Thomas Dewey charged that he was the dictator who pulled the strings from his suite in the fashionable Waldorf-Astoria Hotel. One by one all of his nine associates, also charged with compulsory prostitution, have been named in damaging testimony.

AL SMITH, JR. WAS SUBJECT OF BLACKMAIL

NEW YORK, May 15.—The district attorney's office today investigated a complaint by Alfred E. Smith, Jr., son of the former governor, that three men and a young woman had blackmailed him for \$10,000 in cash and \$10,000 in promissory notes.

Assistant District Attorney John Sullivan was understood to have questioned several persons in the last week and the facts will be placed before the grand jury Monday.

Smith, a lawyer, was reported to have complained the blackmailing followed charges by the young woman that he had been intimate with her in the summer of 1935. The story, as told to the district attorney, alleges one of the men approached young Smith and told him he would have to provide \$11,000 to the woman for an illegal operation and that additional demands would be made upon him "to keep the girl quiet and prevent this matter from getting into the newspapers."

G.O.P. 'Platform's' Under Way



Political oratory soon will resound through Cleveland's Public Hall, but just now the huge auditorium echoes to the beat of hammers. These carpenters busily tear up planks preparatory to laying 30,000 square feet of new maple flooring for the Republican National Convention opening June 9. To complete the task swiftly, two shifts of carpenters, 50 to a shift, are employed. The scene above pictures the rear of the main arena of the huge hall, expected to seat 15,000 at the conclave. Preparation of the auditorium is a WPA project.

Many Farmers Are Ashamed of Going On Direct Relief

DALLAS.—Hundreds of letters are coming to the Resettlement Administration from farmers who have been put on their feet by rehabilitation loans, such as have been made this year to 27,000 Texas farm families. Most of these letters are bare records of hardships suffered before the loan, and of achievement since the loan was received. But sometimes a borrower, more articulate than the others, digs out of his inmost soul the story of his shame at having to accept direct relief, and the making of his whole life now that he has been helped to independence.

Such a story is told in this letter.

"We waited until we had about enough flour for a day or two. I know that there would have to be something done, oh how bad I hated to go an ask for something to eat. I got up there we had to get in line to be question about what we had an how much grocers on hand. I lined up their waiting for my turn I thought we was disgrace for every. As would study about getting relief, tears would come to my eyes and face flush so red sum of the boys would laugh at me it made it harder to hold up my head than every. I got a bill of grocers and then a work card. An then went to work it didn't seem quit so bad as getting grocers an clothes without working for them.

"I was thankful when the rehabilitation plan started an I could borrow money an I could get of the relief. How glad I would say when inbody would say are you still on the relief I would proudly say no I can borrow money now."

Another borrower, who says, "I had rather work my life away than have my food and clothes doled out to me," tells the graphic story of "a few things I am trying this year that I wouldn't never have thought of before if the R. A. wasn't urging us to live at home."

"The 'more abundant life' is an actuality for this man, who writes: 'I wonder if anyone has gone through the woods and really watched for things that would help them, the beautiful flowers and shrubs you can easily transplant to your own yard. There's bees to capture and put in your own hives and grape vines to prune so they will bear better grapes. There's dyes in bark and buttons in small cedar limbs. There's wild berries and nuts. I never new what the woods could furnish for you till the home supervisor was telling me of how buckbrush could be used as a foundation planting. I have the west side of my house planted in them. Upon the east side I plan to set out wild plum and keep them trimmed so they will be even with the window sills. We are taking grass out of the garden and setting it out in our front yard so we can have a nice grassy lawn

in our out doors living room. We have two old willow chairs we made out of willows in the front yard and a machine table it is the frame of an old sewing machine we raved made into a table.

"My wife has made six new quilts and recovered three others. She plans to make a mattress and more quilts this fall. I have made a heating stove this last winter out of an old oil drum. I cut a hole for the stovepipe in one end and cut a door in the other the only cost was for hinges, bolts, and stove pipe.

"I am reading all farm new and improvements out of the county library. It has some very good farm magazines and books. You can get all kinds of ideas from them.

"I think the R. A. is the best kind of relief the government has put out. It has put more confidence in the ones that is sincere. We plan to improve the place as if it belongs to us. Of course we will have to move on but we hope it will be a long time yet."

Vegetable, Fruit Growers Included In Soil Program

COLEGE STATION.—"Texas fruit growers, truck farmers and other vegetable growers will be able to earn payments under the Soil Conservation program," A. L. Smith, state agent assigned to conservation work in Texas, announced.

Smith pointed out that land that has been in vegetable crops will be counted in acreage used in determining the soil-building allowance if planted to winter cover and green manure crops, provided that such crops are turned under as green manure. However, the crops must have been growing at least two months, before being turned under.

"This classification of acreage," Smith said, "will be used only for the purpose of determining soil-building allowances. The number of dollars for soil-building payments cannot exceed the number of acres in soil-conserving crops on the farm in 1936.

"In regard to fruit growers," Smith said, "land devoted to orchards, vineyards, small fruits and nut trees is included as crop land under the program."

If such land is clean cultivated, it is classified as neutral. If it was used in 1935 to produce an interplanted soil-depleting crop, the actual acreage so used is classified as soil-depleting. If it is interplanted with a soil-conserving crop the actual acreage is classified as soil-conserving.

The provisions governing rates of payments and qualifications are the same on the interplanted part of all land devoted to orchards, small fruits and nut trees as on other crop land.

Sacrifice, Not Profit,
Is Patriotic Duty

The thing to remember about the final report of the Senate munitions committee is not so much the fact that it urged nationalization of the industry, as that it spread on the record its final, damning indictment of the way the lust for profits can get in the way of patriotism.

Patriotism is one of the noblest emotions that can possess a man. It lifts him out of himself, nerves him for sacrifices that he would not otherwise dream of making, enables him to identify himself with something so great and lofty that he will serve it gladly without counting the cost.

But it is also a great shield for the selfish. For when men are caught up in this tremendous emotions, they cannot take the time to bargain and haggle as they ordinarily do. The very fact that they do not count patriotism's cost opens a wide, dark alley for the schemers and the phenaglers.

Listen to the committee's finding:

"During the World War the munitions companies insisted, throughout on their pound of flesh in the form of high profits for their production, and did not let their patriotism stand in the way of their 'duty as trustees' to the stockholders."

You may object that business is business, even when a war is on, and that it is asking too much to expect a munitions maker to bridle the mainspring of his corporate existence—the desire for profits.

But that motive, powerful as it is, is not as old or as compelling as the universal animal instinct of self-protection; and young men by the million found it possible to override that instinct between 1914 and 1918.

They conquered the oldest and strongest law of nature, did it without thinking twice about it, and faced death in the most horrible forms that inventive man can devise.

In the face of that, is it asking too much to expect corporation presidents to exercise just a little restraint on their selfishness?

The Senate committee majority recommends government ownership of the munitions industry; the minority recommends strict regulation. It is highly doubtful that the country as a whole is prepared to take the former step; but, by the same token it is certain that the vast majority of plain Americans would like to have the munitions magnates shown just who is boss in this country.

Patriotism is a thing that calls for sacrifices. It summons our finest young men to give the most that young men can give.

Are we going to put up with a situation under which sacrifice is expected from everyone except the men who make the guns and the shells?

No Preference to Be Given New Truck On WPA Projects

ABILENE—The man with the 1934 truck is to have just as good opportunity for a job on the WPA project as the man with the 1936 model.

Under the new regulation, trucks on federal projects must be operated by owners. Teams also must be driven by owners.

Purpose of the new order is to spread and rotate the work among as many as possible and do away with the practice of competitive bidding.

The new method will be for all truck and team owners in District No. 13 to fill out a certificate with the WPA offices here.

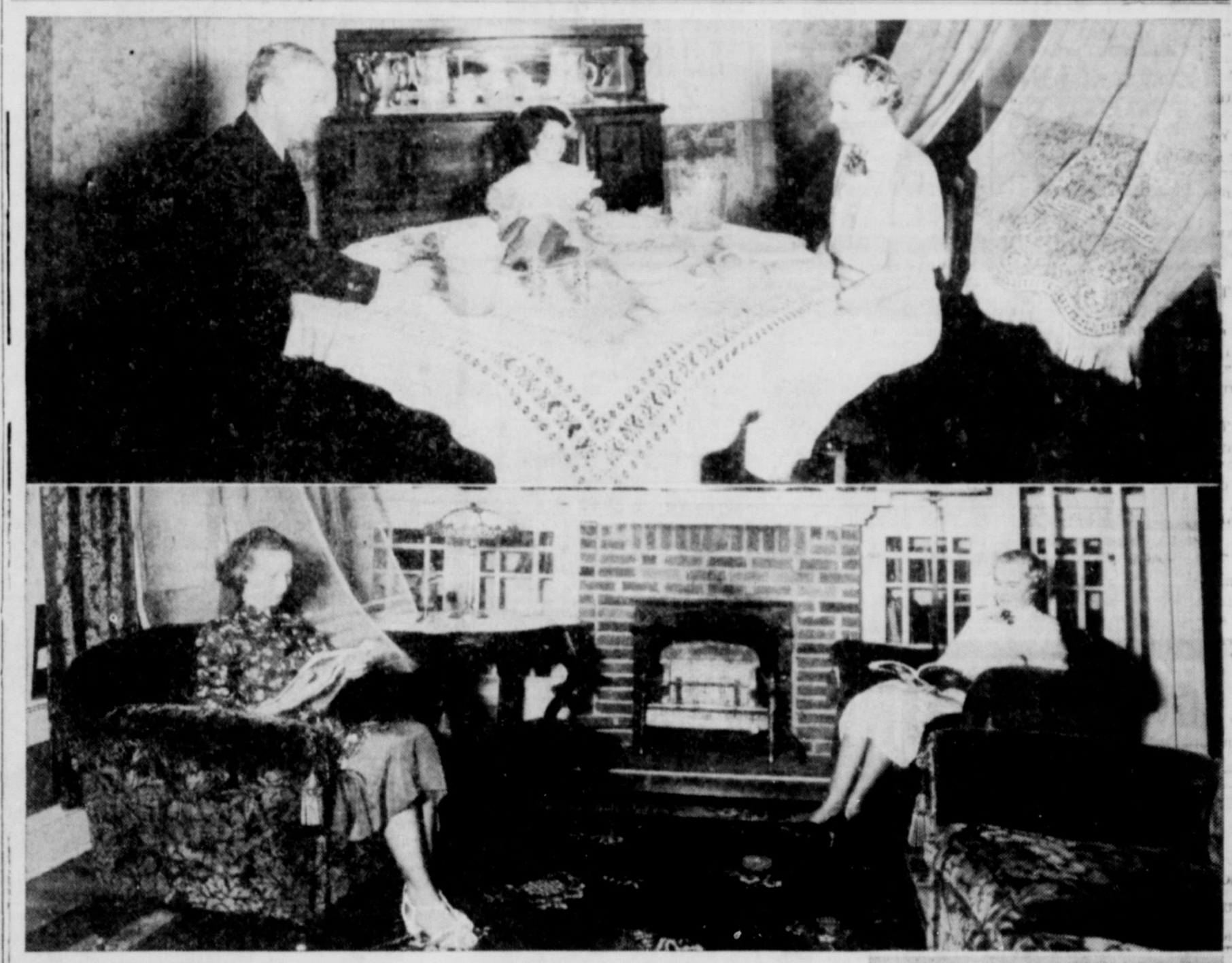
A card file of those registered will be established and work allotted in rotation. Owner-operators will be allowed a maximum of 160 hours per month at the prevailing rate for the district.

"This throws the field open to everybody with a truck or team so long as they drive themselves," said R. G. Hoppe, in charge of operations for WPA, and explained that the ruling does not apply primarily to persons on the relief roll.

It is also pointed out that the new rule will prevent all work being given to those who have new trucks. All eligible and interested in District No. 13 are requested to register at once.

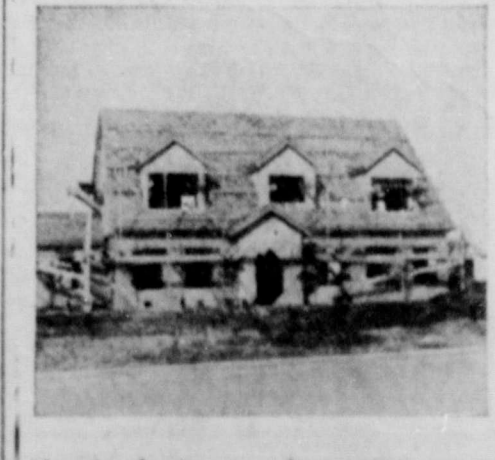

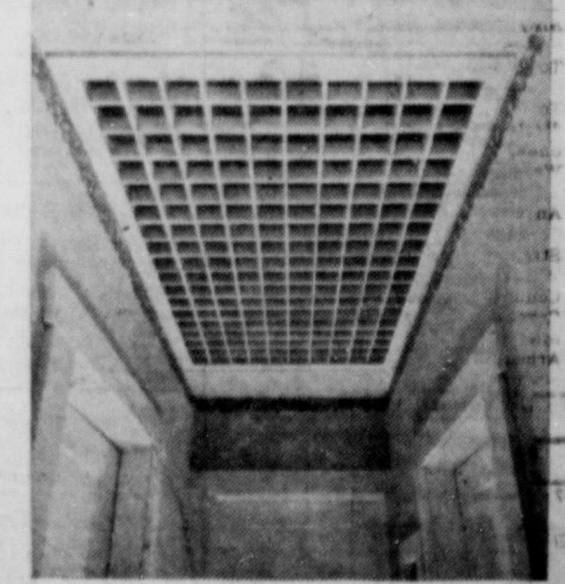

Judges and Mayors Endorse State WPA Projects On Streets

SAN ANTONIO.—County judges and mayors of Texas overwhelmingly endorse a work program in preference to relief and idleness, according to a poll recently reported to State Works Progress Administrator H. P. Drought.

Of 402 answers to questionnaires distributed to every county judge and mayor in Texas, only two expressed opposition toward work relief. Commented Drought: "The surprising similarity of

answers from these local officials who have been closely in touch with our projects offers vast encouragement to Works Progress officials. Almost without exception, mayors and county judges from every section of Texas have emphatically declared that our policy of public works to care for the unemployed of this state is far superior to any system of doling out the necessities of life.

"The theme of work, not charity," runs through the entire list of answers to the questionnaire. A predominant majority of the answers indicate that workers on WPA projects are more content, their physical well-being improved, and their morale much higher than was that displayed by the same people when they were receiving direct relief."

Questionnaires to determine the attitude of sponsors toward the program were distributed by WPA officials. In addition to the question concerning the value of work relief as opposed to the dole, city and county officials were requested to evaluate the type of work being done and were asked if additional work needed in their communities would justify an extension of the WPA program.

"Most gratifying to us is the wholehearted appreciation expressed for the hundreds of permanent, worthwhile projects operated in the state by WPA workers," said Drought. "Without qualification, 384 of the 402 replies indicated that sponsors are thoroughly satisfied with the type of work being accomplished under this program. Partial satisfaction was indicated

"THANK GOODNESS, the cult of salad-making is advancing. One was when people did dread. All things to the noble green, but no more.

To be quite perfect, salad greens should be thoroughly chilled and crushed and served without trace of water clinging to the surface. A watery salad is an abomination. Therefore allow plenty of time to take care of the business properly. The wire salad baskets make for quick work but if you fix the greens loosely in a big square of cheesecloth and swing vigorously you will accomplish the same result.

Place on Menu Varies
In some parts of the country hostesses like to serve the salad immediately following the soup course, in some as a first course. In this case the salad acts as an appetizer and whets the appetite. Naturally, this type of salad must be piquant and not substantial. However, authorities on just how to do this seem to be agreed that the best place for the salad course is following the meat course in the dinner menu.

Hearty salads are welcome for Sunday night suppers and noon luncheons. The combination of meat and vegetables is excellent and the following salads are nourishing and economical examples of this type of salad.

Serve ham salad with rye bread and butter and a fruit dessert.

Ham Salad
One and one-half cups diced cold boiled ham, 1 1/2 cups diced cold boiled potatoes, 1 cup diced celery, 1 hard cooked egg, mayonnaise. Combine ham, potatoes and celery, tossing lightly with a fork. Add mayonnaise to make moist and serve on crisp lettuce. Garnish with slices of hard cooked egg.

Potato Salad a la Russe
Two cups diced potatoes, 1-2 teaspoon grated onion, 1-2 cup diced pickled beets, 4 sardines, 4 hard cooked eggs, mayonnaise, lettuce.

Use small new potatoes. Scrub and boil in salted water until tender. Peel as soon as cool enough to handle. Cut into neat dice and chill. Remove skin and bones from sardines and separate into flakes. Cut eggs in slices. Combine materials lightly with mayonnaise and serve on crisp lettuce.

Some other good combinations for inexpensive salads are the following:

Tuna fish, celery, hard cooked eggs, mayonnaise and lettuce. Salmon and peas combined with shredded lettuce and served on a bed of romaine with mayonnaise.

Boiled veal, diced carrots, celery and diced pineapple combined with mayonnaise and served on a bed of endive.

Equal parts of diced ham, shredded cabbage and pineapple combined with mayonnaise.

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Steel Taxes in 1935 Equivalent to Pay for 57,360 Workers

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The tax on the American steel industry in 1935 was equivalent to a year's pay for 57,360 employees, was equal to \$133, or over 100 percent of the average pay, for each of the 547,112 employees on the industry's payrolls last year.

The year 1935 was the first since 1929 when the total of all federal, state and local taxes paid by the industry.

The figures are based upon a report to the American Iron and Steel Institute by companies which in 1935 produced more than 90 per cent of the total output of finished steel in the country. The figures indicate that the industry's tax bill in 1935 was approximately 16 per cent greater than that for 1934.

Reflecting increased pay of federal income taxes in 1935, the report says that the tax on the 127 companies was by a substantial margin their earnings which were \$2,961,961. Moreover, taxes nearly double the total of \$6,401 paid by those companies in dividends to their stockholders.

The year's tax total was equivalent to \$132 for each of the 547,112 stockholders. Dividends paid last year averaged \$71 per stockholder. Though tax payments are not made for all of the 127 companies prior to 1935, figures for the companies, representing or part of the total output, have been compiled for the period 1929 through 1935 aggregating \$455,718,339. This figure is 16 per cent of the total income during these years for the taxes and for return on stockholders' investment.

In 1931 and 1934 the tax bills were the income available, with the result that a portion of the tax was paid from surplus, while in 1932 and 1933, the companies had an aggregate deficit even providing for taxes.

Approximately 4.6 per cent of companies' gross sales and profits, which have aggregated \$1,000,000 since 1929, has been paid out in taxes over the year period. Taxes per ton of finished steel produced have averaged \$3.38 over the period.

States and municipalities in the properties of the companies are located were by far the beneficiaries of the tax payments, receiving 81 cents out of every dollar of taxes paid. Over the seven-year period, tax payments to state and local governments amounted to \$371,158,376, federal taxes aggregated \$83,560,963.

Federal income taxes, which represent the earnings of the steel industry, almost disappeared from the industry's earnings. In 1935, for the first time since 1930, the industry showed a profit, a net of \$15,387,089 was paid in to the federal government.

This was about 57 per cent below the federal taxes of \$36,162,299 in 1935 net earnings were 57 per cent under those for 1929.

PERSON CITY, Mo.—Missouri Motorists are making highways better, pay dividends to motorists \$50,000,000 or more.

A yearly saving of \$50 is the average Missouri motorist and above what he pays in motor taxes, declares the report of the traffic survey made by the Missouri State Highway Commission.

Net savings in car driving by motorists in 1934 was \$1,000. This saving, based on 1934 data, was determined by comparing car driving costs on the types of improved roads with the cost of driving on poor roads.

The net savings, \$59,973,000, or 57 per cent, was derived from the concrete pavement on the state's 3,433 concrete highways 30 per cent of the main state highways total 12,492 miles.

Missouri has taken a "Show Me" in regard to diversion of tax revenues to non-highway purposes. During the early depression some states using sizeable portions of taxes for almost any purpose bobbled up. But Missouri, with keen foresight had foreseen the need for highway funds in her original tax laws, stood steadfast.

Wisdom of this is shown by the fact that the state highway fund has not been interrupted. In 1923 saving per motorist was \$1.00. Today the net an-

nuual dividend is more than 560 times greater.

Missouri, however, recognizes that the road job is still far from complete, particularly from the standpoint of safety. Right now the state is conducting road condition and economic surveys in cooperation with the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads. These surveys will make possible rational highway planning so that a long term program may be set up and motor tax and other highway revenues may be spent to still better advantage for the state as a whole.

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Black Widows Bite When Disturbed

AUSTIN.—The "Black Widow" spider continues to be a menace even though a number of persons bitten is comparatively small, according to morbidity reports received by the State Department of Health. The habit of this spider in building its web in dimly lighted places makes it difficult to establish any effective method of control.

Though the "Black Widow" is frequently found in basements, wood sheds, and other places which have dark corners or recesses, more cases of spider poisoning that have been reported in past years have occurred in old toilets in the rural districts. The spraying of creosote in cracks and crevices, particularly around the seats of old toilets, is an invaluable procedure, but precautions must be taken against fire. The egg cocoon may also be crushed.

The adult female spider is about half an inch long and has a shiny black body with a brilliant scarlet hourglass marking on the under surface. The name, "Black Widow" is derived from the fact that the female kills and eats the male after mating.

The web of the "Black Widow" is characterized by the fact that the strands are tough. If a straw is applied to the web of an ordinary house spider, the web will immediately break, but if a straw

is stroked through a "Black Widow" web, the strands will be found to be so tough that the straw will bend or even break. The female spider stays close to her web but will rush out and attack violently any object disturbing this web.

The "Black Widow" is not an aggressive spider, and rarely bites unless disturbed. Acute pain develops in the region of the surface bitten, spreading to other parts of the body. There is a general muscle contraction, difficult breathing, cold perspiration, nausea and an extreme rigidity of the abdomen.

The general public should be taught to recognize the "Black Widow," to take the necessary precautions, and to consult a physician immediately, if bitten.

Texas Health Units Win Merit Awards

AUSTIN.—Texas local and county health departments are rapidly gaining recognition over the United States, according to results of city health conservation and rural health contests recently conducted jointly by the United States Chamber of Commerce and the American Public Health Association.

Dr. Watson S. Rankin, Chairman of the committee on awards, has announced that in the south central division of the rural health contest first place was won by the El Paso city-county health department, with honorable mention going to Dallas, Nolan, and

Potter counties' health departments, and in the inter-chamber city health conservation contest Dallas was given honorable mention in the class of cities between 250,000 and 500,000 population.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON.—One of the yarns you don't hear any more in the gossip trading posts of the capital is the one about Joe Kennedy, ex-chairman of SEC, being made secretary of the treasury.

Tubs of butter have been spread on Mr. Kennedy by writers who dwell on the allegations that Kennedy made a personal sacrifice by accepting the SEC job. They said that it was a fine thing to have such an able, sound, two-fisted millionaire in the government and that it would be good for the country if Roosevelt could recruit more such high-minded and sane conservatives, filled with zeal for the public service.

Of course this didn't quite square with the conception of certain cynical insiders.

Kennedy, a Wall Street man who had participated in one of the stock market pools exposed by Ferdinand Pecora, was one of the four men who had originally tossed in \$10,000 apiece for Roosevelt's pre-convention expenses. Hence these cynics held, he could demand any job he wanted, even in the face of general opposition, and they felt that he came to make the SEC safe for Wall Street.

BE that as it may, if Kennedy made a personal sacrifice, he certainly has been making up for lost time.

He has gone into the corporate reorganization business on a large scale. Prospectus for new securities in such reorganizations must be approved by the SEC, which is loaded with Kennedy's friends, many of them brought here by

Kennedy himself. (It is also being remarked in Washington that the Democratic National Committee owes Kennedy money, which gives him access to Jim Farley and the White House.) Chairman James M. Landis was Kennedy's choice as his successor.

Possibly because of his SEC prestige—certainly not in spite of it—bankers chose Kennedy to prepare the new recapitalization scheme of Radio Corporation of America.

Critics suggest that he did little more than "front" for the bankers' plan, but Kennedy, remarking at a stockholders' meeting that "I guess some of you will get a shock," announced his fee as \$150,000.

Now he has taken over responsibility for reorganization of the Paramount movie concern and his SEC pals anticipate further fat plums will fall into his lap.

THE Italian embassy, where social activity has been at a minimum during the Ethiopian war, is expected soon to blossom out with a series of parties.

Italy, following her military triumph, will need capital for development of Ethiopia. And she is expected, as is customary in such cases, to seek it in the U. S.

Thanks to J. P. Morgan & Co. American citizens hold about \$100,000,000 in Italian government bonds, now selling at around 72. This loan was floated after 8 per cent of the Italian war debt to this country had been canceled.

Experts say the Italian budget hasn't actually been balanced for 15 years and that Mussolini's financial troubles are likely to increase. But the ballyhoo for a new private loan is likely to be along any day now.

"Had the owners of the original Pony Express used pure-bred saddle mules instead of cow ponies on the run from St. Joseph, Mo., to Sacramento, Cal., the time could have been cut by at least a day," Jones said.

"A good saddle mule can instinctively judge just the right pace to set in a cross-country race."

Jones will attempt to prove his point on the Pony Express race which will precede the final jumps for the frog championship of the world.
