36 New Flags for Snyder Business Section Bought

Office of Price Administration officials at the regional office in Dallas declared Wednesday that a program of tracking down gasoline rationing violations would be extended to Snyder's general trade area in a few days—if conditions warrant such investigation.

While no details of the expected "crack down" are yet available, OPA investigators are expected to work through local boards in certain "trouble spots"—spots in which the agency knows there exists a considerable number of violations, and on highways in stopping cars and questioning motorists.

Special OPA investigators were understood to have been in Snyder Monday to question several local people, and others, in regard to use of war rationed gasoline. No information was available, however, as to necessity of revoking any gasoline coupons.

Remember those \$5 federal use car stamps for 1944 that Snyder Post Office officials have been urging you to buy the past two weeks?

A check-up Wednesday noon revealed that approximately 1,200 of the Interstate Revenue stamps—necessary for operation of all passenger vehicles from today (Thursday) through June of 1944—had been sold, with at least 800 left to be sold by Thursday night.

All passenger vehicle owners are warned to obtain the necessary orange stamps at once—if they haven't already made their purchases—since the Bureau of Internal Revenue says drastic measures will be taken this week to insure placement of an orange stamp on every vehicle rolling.

Inaugurated as a war-time measure at the instance of the U. S. Treasury Department, Washington circles hinted Wednesday that procurement of the stamps may turn into a permanent means of collecting revenue at an easy source.

RAINS EARLY THIS WEEK AID FEED IN AREA

Moisture Ranges from Nearly Inch
At Snyder to More Than Two
Inches Fall East of Town

An early feed life saver was marked up in Scurry County Monday night and early Tuesday morning, when rainfall, gauging 91 of an inch in Snyder, blanketed the county.

Rain recorded Tuesday morning brought the county's total for June to 2.69 inches. Stockmen expressed keen satisfaction over the addition to surface tank water, and moisture that will green grass in virtually all sections of the county.

Cotton fields were said to have benefited by several thousand dollars from the Tuesday morning rain. Cotton recently planted, especially, is now in excellent shape for rapid growth, it is reported.

Besides this week's moisture, only other rainfall recorded during June was on the 7, when 76 of an inch was received, and on June 20, when the county received 42 of an inch precipitation.

Intermittent showers late Wednesday afternoon gave promise of giving the county more rainfall by today (Thursday).

Spotlights of Tuesday morning's rain may be judged from the fact Hermleigh reported more than a full inch, a portion of The Midway-Camp Springs community 1.42 inches, and a tip of Western Fisher county received 2.28 inches precipitation.

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Here's How Pay- As-You-Go Tax to Affect Folks of US

Here's how the new Pay-as-You-Go Tax Law, as gleaned from U. S. Treasury sources, will affect you, Mr. Scurry Countyman:

Effective today (July 1), all employers starting with payroll periods beginning on or after July 1, must deduct a certain amount each pay day from each employee's pay.

This amount is to be about 20 per cent of the part each employee pays which exceeds the exemptions given in the law.

Purpose of the new law, called the "current tax payment act of 1943," is to put all taxpayers on a current basis so they will be paying taxes each year—instead of on income earned during the past year.

All Scurry County Home Demonstration Clubs are victory demonstration clubs in one way or another, Estella Kabel, county home demonstration agent, declared Tuesday.

To prove her point, Miss Kabel cites the following examples, which should prove an incentive for clubs planning activities for the remainder of 1943:

For a club report the China Grove group reported buying a \$25 bond by each member contributing five cents at each meeting. They took first aid and 12 received their certificates. They had a called meeting and placed a quilt top and donated it to the council auction.

Tri-Community Club raises their money by baking a cake and selling a slice for five cents. There's a button in the cake, and the one who gets the button bakes the next cake. They buy bonds.

Fluvanna Club sews for soldiers in the hospital and collects radios, rattlesnake rattlers, etc. for the sick soldiers at Camp Berkeley, Abilene.

Individual victory demonstrators are at work, too. Mrs. A. C. Rollins of the Turner Club has 114 containers of food canned, and as she says, "I've taught everyone how to can pineapple."

Mrs. Johnnie Langford of the same club has 120 containers of beets, carrots, pineapple and squash, and she has instructed and helped her mother, who lives in town.

Salt Urged as Aid In Combatting Heat Cramps by Officer

To help prevent heat cramps, salt should be added to the drinking water of those persons whose work is such as to cause excessive perspiration, Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, advises in an attempt to forestall a possible increase in the number of heat victims as the Texas thermometer hits 90 degrees and above.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient, with resulting heat cramps or heat fatigue. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as 40 to 50 grams of salt during hot days. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

In industry, method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. However, salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared salt tablets are not available, a pinch of table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency caused by sweating. Alcoholic drinks should be avoided.

Heat cramp is characterized by pains in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate. Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp.

Pressure Cookers of County Being Tested For Needed Service

Total of 33 pressure cookers were tested during the month of June, and recommendations made for "keeping 'em running," Estella Rabel, county home demonstration agent, reported Wednesday.

Monday and Tuesday especially were set apart by the county home demonstration agent as dates for helping Snyder and Scurry County people care for the valuable cookers.

The county home demonstration agent and three appointed ladies meet each Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock to pass on pressure cookers. Total of 34 cookers have been allowed to date, but so far Snyder hasn't any of the household necessities.

Here's an excellent pointer Miss Rabel gives on need of checking gauges on all pressure cookers:

"If the maximum thermometer inside the cooker registers a higher temperature than the gauge registers, there is danger of overcooking, losing liquid breaking glass when jars are open or bulging seams when cans are used."

"In extreme cases," Miss Rabel declares, "the cooker may explode. If the temperature is lower inside the cooker than the gauge registers there is danger of underprocessing the food, which may cause spoilage."

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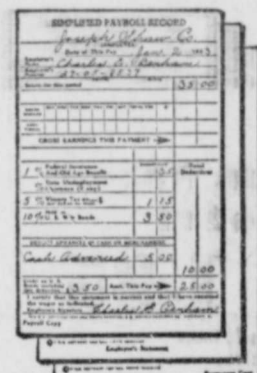

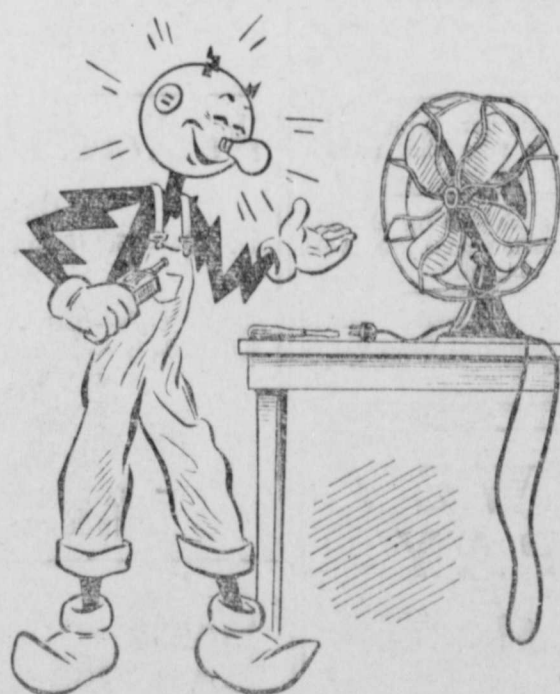

Citizens Receive New Food Ration No. 3 This Week

Scurry County residents are receiving their copies of the new war ration book No. 3. The book contains four pages of point stamps similar to those in War Ration Book No. 2, although slightly different in design and printed in brown ink. It also contains four pages of unit stamps for the type of rationing now used for sugar, coffee and shoes. Each page of 48 stamps bears design of a different war machine, including guns, tanks, aircraft carriers and planes.

Copies of War Ration Book No. 3 need not be taken to the county board to be validated, OPA offices in Lubbock have notified the county boards.

Assurance that service men would be issued War Ration Book No. 3 was made this week by Howard Gholson, district director of OPA with headquarters at Lubbock. Numerous service men from the air fields in West Texas have been appearing before local boards to find out why they are not to make out applications for the books at this time.

Applications of service men will be taken at a later date and final details for taking the applications are being worked out now, the OPA announced. Military personnel eating in their own homes were previously issued Book No. 1 and Book No. 2. Book No. 3 is merely a replacement book and probably will not be put into use until August.

Cotton Products Return Proteins To Soil in Manure

"When you feed, you fertilize." long the slogan of many farmers who have recognized the value of manure from livestock fed protein-rich rations, will be adopted by many other Cotton Belt farmers and ranchers in 1943. Many Scurry County stock raisers have noted the richness returned to soil from manure as a result of such feeding.

These farmers can obtain much of the nitrogen they need by efficient use of manure from livestock fed cottonseed meal and other protein concentrates.

As the amount of concentrate increases in livestock rations, the fertilizing value of the manure also increases, authorities point out; and from 50 to 75 per cent of the nitrogen in such protein concentrates as cottonseed meal and peanut meal can be available through the use of the manure if it is properly handled and applied to the land. Because of increased production of protein concentrates during the 1942-1943 season, larger supplies of organic nitrogen of this type will be available to help offset sharp decreases in inorganic nitrogen.

South Atlantic and South Central states which normally use about two-thirds of all of the commercial fertilizer used in the United States, will face the greatest need for nitrogen. Fortunately, however, this area produces much of the nation's supply of protein concentrates and has hundreds of farms where cattle feeding and other livestock production could be practiced on a large scale.

While direct use of cottonseed meal and other protein feeds as fertilizer also has increased in 1943, and should be increased where it is practical to do so, greatest value from these Cotton Belt products can be obtained by using them first as livestock feeds to meet the acute need for more livestock production. Then, the major part of their fertilizer value can be obtained by applying the manure to the land.

Cotton Is Filling Numerous Needs Of Armed Forces

Scurry County's cotton production, along with that of other sections of the country, remains in the limelight as demands for cotton products increase.

America's armed forces march off to fight virtually surrounded by cotton. Each soldier entering service is equipped with approximately 40 items of cotton clothing within a few days after induction, and he uses cotton in one form or another in almost every piece of equipment he touches.

Among cotton's latest contributions to the care and comfort of Uncle Sam's soldiers are mosquito-proof gloves with which sentries in tropical climates now are being equipped. Close-fitting at the wrists, the gloves are easy to wear and easy to wash. They protect the sentries from the poison-laden bites of the insects. Mosquito-proof nets, also made of cotton and arranged so that they can be attached to helmets and tucked into the top of uniforms, have been part of equipment issued to soldiers in tropical climates for some time.

The Quartermaster Corps also has developed supply parachutes of 100 per cent cotton which now are being used to drop supplies, ammunition and fighting equipment to paratroopers and soldiers in advance bases. Also, the webbing which supports the paratrooper themselves as they float to earth is made of sturdy, long staple cotton.

The corps also is experimenting with a cotton rope which may replace hemp even after the war. Likewise, new army troop-carrying gliders are covered with cotton cloth to give greater lifting power to the broad wings.

Typical purchases of cotton for the various branches of the service and for war aid include:

Army—18,000,000 pairs of tan cotton socks; 1,805,000 herringbone cotton twill jackets; 12,500,000 yards of 36-inch olive drab cotton twill; 3,250,000 cotton caps.

Navy—5,000,000 yards of cotton cloth for handkerchiefs.

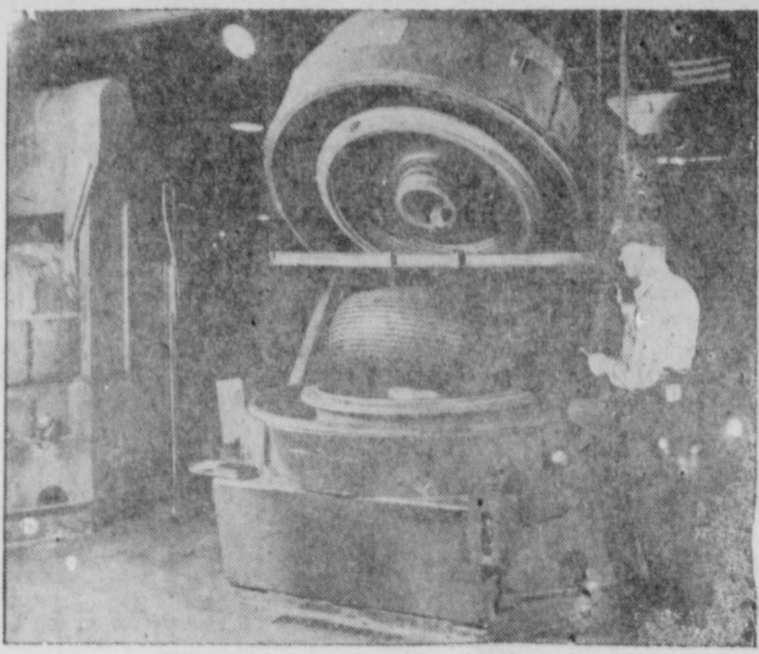

"In cases where the grades of a scholastic are not taught in the home community, the student should, by all means, be transferred to another school on the earliest date humanly possible," the county superintendent's office declares.

School student transfers during the month of July are not only necessary to keep the schools of the county operating on a par basis, but will insure children of completing grades not taught in the community of their residence.

New Mulch Provided By Cottonseed Hulls

Developed by the National Cotton Council, King Cotton mulch is solving the problem of many amateur and professional gardeners. Made entirely of cottonseed hulls, the mulch can be used to loosen and aerate heavy soil around almost any plant. It also acts as a storage reservoir for moisture, retarding evaporation when applied one to three inches deep.

Described as "the South's answer to German peat moss," the mulch also smother the growth of weeds, resulting in healthier plants. Peat moss has been used extensively by gardeners seeking to grow better plants and flowers.

Grain Shortages

Say what you will, but West Texas will not have to worry for some time about grain alcohol plants to help in the synthetic rubber program—in view of the rapidly developing grain shortage. This section of Texas received a serious set-back last year when such regulations were formulated that no West Texas city would be eligible for a synthetic rubber plant—of the alcohol variety—and is receiving another set-back with the turn-out of 1943 grain crops.

The nation, as for that matter, is awakening to the fact we're going mighty short on grains, and may have to pull up our belts several notches—if the U. S. tries to fulfill lend-lease promises made early in January and February.

Granary Boost

Farmers and ranchers of Scurry, Borden, Fisher, Garza and other counties in this area are being urged by governmental agencies to take advantage of small, pre-fabricated granaries as a means of saving war-vital feeds this year from damage by the elements and rodents.

Scurry County, for example, boasts a number of circular tin granaries, but so far as was ascertained this week, only a few of the frame, pre-fabricated structures—available at low cost—have been put up in this immediate vicinity. The buildings have proven their worth many times on the South Plains in protecting harvested feeds from damage. Too, farmers cannot carry government insurance on certain grain crops unless they have granaries of approved and accepted design.

Crop Saving Now

People of this trade area who haven't inspected cotton crops within the past few days may not think the "Save-the-Crop-Now" battle cry has too much appeal for them, but a first hand look at growing crops, being choked out by weeds, will convince folks that our crops must be saved now—if Scurry and neighboring counties are to harvest anything like a normal crop in 1943.

We not only as a county need to save our cotton and feed crops, and in the resultant clean-up save farmers from severe set-backs because of insect damage later in the summer, but we need to expand such a drive to include saving of every pound of food produced in county victory gardens. Saving of beans, peas, okra, squash, cucumbers and other maturing vegetables will fit in mighty well with efforts to make our home front invincible—come what may in the form of rationed groceries for the war's remainder.

Editorial of the Week

INCREASING JUVENILE DELINQUENCY

While we hold elaborate forms to discuss ways and means of "re-educating the youth" of Axis nations after the war is over, our own houses apparently need a great deal of putting in order.

In a recent issue of Texas Department of Public Safety News an article by Colonel Homer Garrison has appalling significance:

"The moral standards of today are taking a worse beating than the Germans are taking in Russia. I shudder to think of the number of girls 14, 15 and 16 years old who are missing from their homes in Texas. I shudder to think that there was a 22 per cent increase last year in the number of women arrested for crimes in the United States.

Females arrested for prostitution under 21 years last year increased 65 per cent; for other sex offenses it was 105 per cent; for vagrancy 124 per cent; for disorderly conduct 70 per cent; and for drunkenness 40 per cent.

"One can only wonder how vast is the number of 'victory girls' who are sacrificing their morals out of a distorted sense of 'patriotic duty.' The number of statutory rapes and illegitimate births already has reached an appalling figure and is climbing every day.

"During 1942 age 18 predominated in the frequency of arrests. This is the first year since the examination of fingerprint records was first begun in 1932 by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, whose statistics I am quoting you, that such a low age group has predominated.

"Criminals under 21, both male and female, last year committed 19.2 per cent of all our crimes. These youths committed 15 per cent of our murders; 35 per cent of our robberies; 50 per cent of our burglaries; 35 per cent of our thefts of property other than automobiles; and 58 per cent of our automobile thefts."

A problem to think about.—Wink Bulletin.

Current Comment

Inside Nazi Germany, reliable reports received the past few days indicate, all Germans are not Nazis and thousands of all classes in the gangster-dominated nation are joining a vast underground movement. . . . From inside the gray walls of German concentration camps, "corrective" prisons and local prisons—which dot the map of Germany like bleeding sores—one learns the German underground is exceptionally clever and well disciplined, an underground which does work with arson, sabotage and terror.

Members of the German underground network, praying for the day when the shackles of Nazi-ism can be broken, know how closely they are being "watched" and know, by painful experience, that plain murder of one or more high Nazi officials will not solve their problem and will not hasten the date when the Allied Nations are able to make a full-blown invasion of the continent. . . . Underground leaders have considered murdering Adolf Hitler many times, but have for good reasons decided to let him fall with the army he has built up and share the common fate of other war criminals. . . . Through the underground network, the German people are beginning to learn the truth about the current war, and are better informed than most observers think on tides of day-by-day war developments.

Incidentally, the day of reckoning that is ahead for members of the Nazi regime will be filled with so many unpardonable crimes that the human indignation will be unable to grasp the viciousness and degradation to which the human mind, stripped of all principles and moral tenets, can stoop to in times like today. . . . In occupied France, for example, an estimated 47,000 French women—pick of the entire nation—have been sent to Nazi army brothels and both body and soul wrecked for the rest of their natural lives. . . . French women who find themselves enslaved by Nazi overlords dare not protest because reprisals and torture would wipe out entire families and result in revocation of precious rationing cards for whole communities. . . . Captured Russian women and girls also have been herded into Nazi houses of sin by the thousand, and for these unfortunate victims there will be no road to happiness and wholesome living again, no matter how the tides of war turn. . . . Nazis have recently been making a sport of finishing off wounded and captured Russian prisoners by shooting them in the back, and when Russia does get a knock-out blow in against the Germans, evening the score will surprise most of the civilized world.

If Soviet Russia can hold out against Germany the remainder of the summer, which seems quite possible, plans for a gigantic American army, Washington hinted this week, can be revised downward and induction of fathers into military service can be slowed down. . . . As pointed out by Navy Secretary Franklin Knox, we can expect a renewal of U-boat warfare in the Atlantic, and shipping losses for the next three months are expected to surpass losses for any period of the war. . . . Sinking of American merchant ships carrying lend-lease supplies to our Allies not only involves loss of precious lives and vast sums of money, but lengthens the war and greatly slows down time tables for ending of the blood-spilling conflict. . . . Rumblings are already going the rounds in military circles that we are going to have to double delivery of supplies to our armed forces across the seas.

Probably full details will never be known until the war ends, but a major scandal has developed the past few days involving U. S. lend-lease goods—not military equipment—in North Africa. . . . The scandal originated from Washington's political expedient of selling civilian supplies to French civil administrations for cash. . . . Recently \$25,000,000 down was paid for \$40,000,000 worth of goods. . . . Hitch came about when the civil administrations diverted to speculators, political favorites and others, textiles, coffee, tea and sugar intended by the U. S. for needy Arabs and Berbers. . . . The shipments were planned to create good will toward the U. S., but quite the contrary has resulted.

You can bet your best pair of pre-war socks—if you happen to have a pair on hand—that transportation will tighten drastically as the war steps up in tempo. . . . Routes, for example, to the West Coast will be pushed hard, and the East Coast is already beginning to suffer from restricted travel in almost every form. . . . We will, as a nation, get around again to an acute gasoline shortage on the West Coast—a developing factor that will bring increased pressure on OPA officials to further cut gasoline allowances for Texas and other states in this section of the nation. . . . Passenger traffic is expected to hit a peak during the next 60 days because of war-time vacations and shifting of essential workers to areas needing harvest hands the worst.

Now that Scurry County poultry owners have approximately 300,000 head of chickens on hand, Edward S. Hyman, county agricultural agent, urges that they take adequate steps to insure raising of chickens and keeping them in full-time production, once they reach maturity. . . . Doing the job efficiently means better brooding, ranging pullets on ground free from visible parasite eggs and placing them early in clean houses with deep litter, sufficient feed, water, space, light, nests, ventilation, grit and oyster shell.

Rodeo to Feature Ability of Cutting Horse in Contest

Entries from West Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma began to come in this week in increasing volume for the cutting horse contest that is expected to prove a feature attraction of Scurry County's Seventh Annual Rodeo here July 15-18.

J. C. Dorward, president of the Scurry County Rodeo Association, and other officials announce prize lists for the cutting horse contest as follows:

First prize, \$50 U. S. war bond; second prize, \$25 war bond; third prize, \$10 in war savings stamps; fourth prize, \$5 in stamps, as will be fifth and sixth prizes, respectively; and seventh prize, \$4 in war savings stamps.

Entrance fee for the cutting horse contest was set this week at \$8, association officers report.

Rules and regulations governing the cutting horse contest, as announced by officials, follow:

Each rider will cut cattle according to the following rules and regulations:

1.—Rider will go through herd to somewhere near center of herd to select animal to be cut in order that judges can see how horse behaves in herd.

2.—The first line to be crossed is for the purpose of cutting the cattle by rider. When rider and cow both cross line, and cow gets back across line rider will stop and cut next cow.

3.—The cow will be scared back at gate, so rider can show what horse can do. Three cows will be cut—first cow for practice, second and third will be for judging. Rider is requested to observe that after first line has been crossed by both rider and cow, and cow gets back across line, he shall let cow go.

4.—Ninety seconds will be the time limited to cut one cow. Time will start when rider crosses first line at herd.

Horses will be judged by the following points:

1.—In herd horse should be quiet enough to avoid unnecessary disturbance of cattle, and at the same time be always alert and ready to move quickly into right position.

2.—Preference will be given where horse at all times and at any speed keeps the advantage of his cow, such position as will not let cow have advantage that results in unnecessary running.

3.—Preference will be given where horse works free without any rider's control.

4.—Rider shall not in any way use any means of scaring cow.

Ready Market for Vital Peanut Crop Assured to Farmers

A ready market for peanuts when they are harvested was this week assured Scurry County farmers, who have planted 3,500 acres of the war vital crop, by the state United States Department of Agriculture War Board.

Facilities of peanut shellers and crushers throughout the state will be utilized; the state office informs Scurry County farmers, from the very beginning of the marketing season in order to move the maximum quantity of the crop directly into food and feed channels.

Purchases on this year's peanut crop will be made from producers at uniform prices averaging \$140 per ton for Spanish No. 1 peanuts—with appropriate differentials for grades. This price is 75 per cent above value of the peanut when sold for crushing for oil and meal.

Restrictions on purchases, sales and deliveries, the state war board informs the Scurry County USDA War Board, will not apply to farmers' stock peanuts which county AAA committees certify are to be used solely for planting in 1944. Restrictions will not apply either to sales of peanuts which have been processed by the grower on the farm where produced.

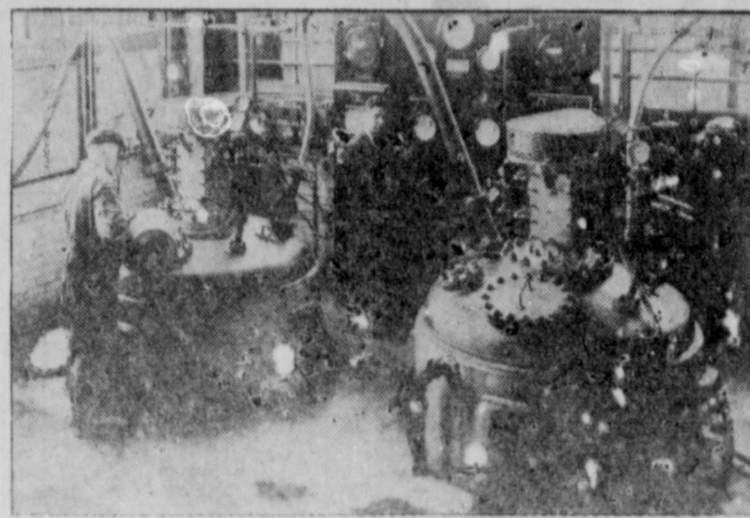
