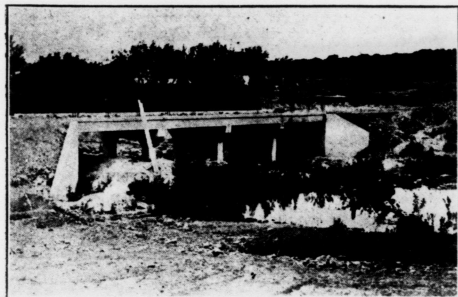

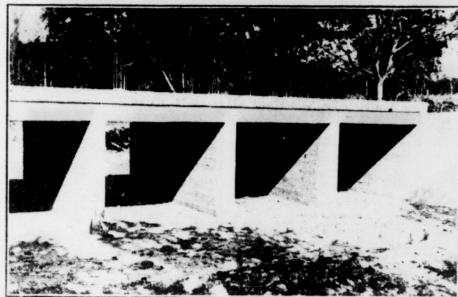

THE WHY OF THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

In Texas we need a highway system. Only the State can successfully build such a system.

We need connected highways. Only the State can successfully connect them and keep them connected.

We need permanent highways that are kept permanent. Only the State can provide successfully the constant maintenance which is necessary to permanence.

It is State traffic which makes State roads necessary, and such roads should be built and maintained by the State so that the traffic itself can be required to pay a just share of the cost of such roads and their maintenance.

Under the present system the roads being used by State traffic are roads built at an enormous cost to the counties and maintained by the counties to the neglect of the purely county roads. State highways should be built and maintained by the State, in co-operation with the Federal Government.

And such highways should be built in a system and should be connected. Under the present system we are building highways only in patches. Thousands of miles of highways have been built in Texas in co-operation with the Federal Government, but you can scarcely find one hundred miles of improved highways in one connected link. Our highways should go somewhere. Most of our fine roads now go from County seat to County line. One little patch of impassable road between two points wipes out the value of all the rest of the highway. Our highways become much more valuable when they are built in a system and are connected. Only the State can build a connected system and keep it connected.

We need highways that are not destroyed before they are paid for. We need permanent highways. The only permanent highways are highways that are permanently maintained. The old adage "A stitch in time save nine," can be applied to highways as to nothing else. A system of patrol and constant maintenance is absolutely essential to permanence and is much cheaper than a system of periodical repairs. We must maintain our roads, not merely "repair" them. Only the State can successfully provide this for our State roads.

There are about 180,000 miles of public roads in Texas. Most of the heavy traffic, however, uses only about 10 per cent of these roads—say 18,000 miles. But most of the money is being spent on these 18,000 miles of roads—and most of that money is County money.

That means that 162,000 miles of county and local roads are being neglected so that the counties may provide and main-

tain 18,000 miles of roads for State traffic.

State highways for State traffic at State and Federal expense will release county funds which can be devoted to rural roads for rural traffic.

Vote for the Highway Amendment on the 28th of July, fourth Saturday in July, so that the State may take over these State roads and thus make it possible for the counties to maintain the 162,000 miles of roads which the farmers use constantly. Then the State can provide Texas with a State System of Connected Permanent Highways Permanently Maintained.

We must have highways for modern traffic. We must get rid of the bad road tax in Texas. The bad road tax, which runs into millions annually, is what we are paying in damage to automobiles, wear and tear, destruction of tires, extra consumption of gasoline and loss of time due to bad roads.

The Federal Government will pay half the cost of building 12,000 miles of our highways—those over which there is the heaviest traffic and thus the most costly—if we will place those highways under State supervision and control.

If we don't do this, the Federal Government will not spend any more money in Texas.

That means that it will cost the people of Texas twice as much to build these 12,000 miles of highway if we don't place them under State supervision and control.

And if we don't build these highways at all it will cost us even more in the bad road tax.

It will be cheaper to build these highways than not to build them.

The course we should adopt is clear. We should place these highways under State supervision and control and build them with Federal aid.

That means protection for the taxpayer in two ways. It means that the people will have to spend less money and that they will get more value for the money they spend.

To insure all this, vote for the Highway Amendment on the 4th Saturday in July and thus obtain for Texas a State System of Connected Permanent Highways Permanently Maintained.

DISTRICT EXTENSION OFFERS SHORT COURSE

This Short Course and Club Encampment has been arranged by the Extension Service of the Texas A. & M. College, at the request of leading farmers and county agents in the southwest district. It is the first camp of its kind to be held in Texas. Its main purpose is to enable farmers and ranchers and their families to meet and study with the Extension specialists of the A. & M. College the problems of the farm, ranch, and the home, in the midst of pleasant and restful surroundings. Originally planned as an educational encampment for boy and girl club members, it has been enlarged so as to permit the attendance of fathers and mothers of club members, and in fact all farmers and farm women.

The Encampment will be held at the Montgomery-Mages ranch in a beautiful pecan grove on the Medina River, 16 miles west of San Antonio, just 2 miles south of the Castroville road, and will open on Tuesday, June 26th, at noon, and will close at noon on the 29th. This will give an opportunity for two full days program, two half day programs and three night programs.

Accommodations will be provided so that each family or group may do their own cooking. They may bring their provisions with them or purchase them at the commissary on the grounds. Wood and water will be furnished free and grates will be provided, on which they may do their cooking.

Those interested can get more details from County Agent McMillan.

THE ANGORA GOAT INDUSTRY IN TEXAS.

The following article in the last issue of the Angora Journal will doubtless prove interesting to our readers.—Editor's Note.

"Practically 77 per cent of the goats in Texas are in the south central district," says the May 1st report of the bureau of economies of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

This report is the first issued by the department dealing exclusively with goats, and is to be followed at intervals by others.

Recently Secretary of Agriculture Wallace was in Texas, and his attention was drawn to the extent and needs of the Angora industry. The report is by H. H. Schutz, livestock statistician (Houston, Tex) and shows that of the 3,459,000 goats in the United States, 1,753,000 are in Texas. Mohair production in Texas has reached the total annually of \$2,673,000.

The following is taken from the report, which includes a map

of Texas showing location of the goat country, the Edwards plateau:

"At the present time the Angora goat industry in Texas is centered in 24 counties in the south central portion of the State. Of the total of 1,665,900 head, these counties contain in the neighborhood of 77 per cent. While many pure-bred goats are to be found in other counties, most of the breeding herds are in this main district. A large number of goats are used for breeding down brush in the east half of the state and practically every county has from a few hundred to several thousand of these thrifty animals.

"Due to the heavy losses in goats and kids during the spring of 1922, the number on hand on Jan. 1, 1923, was almost 100,000 head less than on Jan. 1, 1920, the date of the last census. The results of the drought of last winter and early spring were so severe that in many cases no kids whatever were saved. This year, however, 83 per cent of the kids

were saved and the industry is again on a firm foundation. But for the cold rains during the last days of March following shearing and a hail storm which killed many kids, the losses would have been very slight."

Junction is a good place to live and it's going to be a better one. The progressiveness of the majority of the citizens is going to keep up and increase the effort to build a bigger and better town, and the disgruntled knockers, who do not like anything and will not help to build up anything, will leave and be replaced by others who are more interested in the community in which they live.

As usual, we have a splendid run of advertising this week. Look over the advertising of the Junction merchants. When you buy, give them the first chance. If you will be honest in your calculations, and take everything into consideration, you can buy as cheaply, or even cheaper, in Junction than you can in the cities. Only recently, one of the ladies who was here at the Goat and Sheep Raisers' meeting, bought a bill of dry goods at a local store, amounting to nearly a hundred dollars, and took the goods to a much larger city two hundred miles away, because she stated that dry goods were cheaper here than in her home town.

The only way we can hope to maintain our highways is to pass the Constitutional Amendment next month. Give a little time to studying this amendment and you will see that it is what we need. Don't neglect this and then vote against it because you are constitutionally "agin" amendments, for after it's all over, and the amendment

is lost, you will regret your action, but it will be too late then. Counties like this, which are getting so much aid from State and Federal sources, should give a big majority to this measure. We will have the same amount of money left, that we now have for all the roads in the county, and this money can be used for building and maintaining the lateral or country roads in the county.

Tourists are coming in now, and are seeking good camping places. Occasionally we hear of some one charging exorbitant prices for camping privileges. Those who do this are hurting both themselves and the county. No respectable tourist will object to paying a reasonable price for a camping place, and where some conveniences have been arranged for campers, they are willing to pay more than for a camp site where no conveniences are to be had. It is very unfair to charge a party of campers a price that presupposes reasonable conveniences. Those taking campers and charging them, should not look at it in a narrow light, for when a man is "held up" he will not return either to your place or to the county. He becomes a knocker, and he has good reason for such action. Let's treat the visiting public fair. They are coming in larger numbers every year and their coming means money to every man, woman and child in Kimble County. Be reasonable. It will pay you. We merely mention this in passing, as some might take the wrong view of the camping situation. We are glad that the vast majority of the farmers and ranchmen are very courteous to visitors and where any charge is made, it is a very fair and reasonable one. Many do not charge for camping rights where they have not built some conveniences; others do, and the practice is all right, if kept at a reasonable figure.

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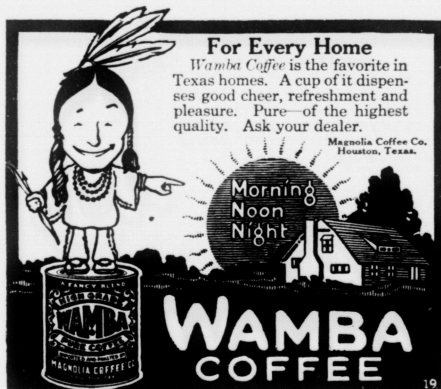

America's Marvels NATURAL AND OTHERWISE

By T. T. Maxey

WYANDOTTE CAVE

The demand for gunpowder during the war of 1812 was so pressing that large quantities of the nitrous earth in the caverns of the bluffs along the Ohio river in Indiana and Ohio were used for manufacturing saltpeter.

One cave was so productive that it fell heir to the name Indiana Saltpeter Cave. Later this was changed to Wyandotte Cave. After the war the manufacture of saltpeter became unprofitable. Little attention was paid to this cave until it was noted that cattle were fond of licking the walls and floor. Investigation showed that a frosting of natural gypsum salts covered extensive areas in this underground wonderland. Also, that when removed, this frosting rapidly reappeared. Sulphate of lime plaster of Paris, and later also were found here. Subsequent explorations brought to light the astonishing fact that in size this cave all but rivaled the Mammoth Cave of Kentucky.

The outstanding characteristics of Wyandotte Cave, in which it is said to excel all other American caves, are the unusual brightness of its corridors and vaulted chambers, unbelievable quantities of fallen rock, and the massiveness of its stone columns.

The "Pillar," upwards of a mile from the entrance, a magnificent column 25 feet tall and 15 feet through, is one of the show places. Another spectacular formation, Columbian Arch, is an almost perfect tunnel, half circle in shape, and 75 feet long. Near one end is a "chunk" of limestone, estimated to weigh more than 500 tons, which loosened and dropped from overhead no one knows how long ago.

The Senate Chamber measures 150 by 200 feet, its terraced sides of limestone culminating in a great dome. From the center of this room there rises a great pile of rock. From the top of this rock pile an enormous fluted column of satin spar extends to the roof above. Almost a perfect circle in shape, 71 feet around, this fantastic pillar is said to exceed in size any like formation in any cave in the world.

Certain sightless animals make their home in this cave. Thousands of bats which may be observed hanging head down from the rock, make their winter homes in Owl Follies Hall. This great chamber is 90 feet wide, 210 feet long, and 65 feet high.

Wyandotte Cave, formed among the rugged hills in Crawford county, is near the point where the Blue river flows into the Ohio.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 16.

Proposing an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, which relates to taxation and revenues, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 5a, directing the Legislature to provide for the construction, operation and maintenance, under State control, of a State system of public highways, providing for an election for the ratification or rejection of the amendment, and in order that the Legislature may provide to defray the expenses of said election.

It is resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That there be submitted to the people of Texas, for ratification or rejection at a special election provided for herein, an amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending said Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 5a, which shall read as follows:

Section 5a. The Legislature is authorized, and directed to provide for the creation, establishment, construction, maintenance and repair of a system of improved highways throughout the State to be under the control of the State, and in order that the State may provide the means, revenues and instrumentalities the establishment and maintenance of such system of highways, the Legislature is empowered to levy and cause to be collected specific excise and ad valorem taxes, in addition to those permitted for other purposes in the Constitution, but such an ad valorem tax shall be imposed only for the purpose of retiring the bonds authorized by vote of the people of this State as provided for hereinafter in this Section.

Votes and system shall have been assigned and tendered for the State as provided in Section A hereof, the Legislature is authorized to make a provision for the equitable compensation to such counties for the value of such improvements as have been therefrom constructed by the State.

Provided, also that save for the State highway system in all other respects, Counties shall have the right to build, construct, and maintain roads, turnpikes and bridges within their respective boundaries, and the Constitutional provisions relating thereto are not qualified or repealed by reason hereof.

The Legislature, at any Regular or Special Session, is authorized and directed to pass and enact all appropriate legislation necessary to carry out and effectuate the purpose and intent of these Articles.

Section 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1923, at which election this amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State, in addition to or separate from any other election required by the Constitution and laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the general election laws of the State, and the ballot for said election shall be printed and written thereon in plain letters the following:

"OFFICIAL BALLOT." "For the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways." "Against the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways."

Those electors who favor such amendment shall vote by marking a line through the word, "Against the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways." Those electors who oppose such amendment shall vote by marking a line through the word, "For the amendment to Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for a State system of highways." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election.

Section 3. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the printing and publication of this amendment and the election to be held hereunder.

GOOD SHOWING OF GAS NORTH OF THE CITY.

The cleaning out of the well on the G. W. Schafer place, 12 miles north of Brady, on the Brownwood road, was completed last Saturday and many were out Sunday to look the well over. Those who have had experience with gas wells estimate the gas flow to be 500,000 or 600,000 cubic

feet and the flow is apparently increasing. The well was shot at 519 feet and it is believed that the flow could have been strengthened by drilling deeper.

It will be remembered that a gas well was struck on the Stapleton farm nearly last fall and after testing the well out Mr. Stapleton connected it up and piped it to his place where the gas is being used for fuel and also for lighting his house, barn, and other buildings on the farm and the flow has not diminished a particle according to those who have visited the farm.—Grady Sentinel.

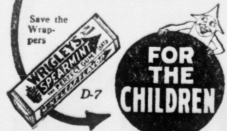

They married the sons and the daughters of heroes who had won the independence of Texas and there were many more cabins on the prairies of Texas, and another generation was born, whose vigor and strength has given increased power to this mighty commonwealth.

MIDLAND Buries FAMOUS PONY EXPRESS RIDER.

Midland, June—John S. Hyatt one of the last pony express riders of pioneer days was buried

here Thursday. He died Wednesday, 84 years of age.

Hyatt was born in Asheville, N. C., August 28, 1839 and came to Texas in 1859, locating on the Loving ranch near Weatherford. The country was then inhabited chiefly by Indians. He became a pony express rider and was one of the most noted and daring riders in the west. He carried mail to Fort Balknap and Fort Griffin.
