FOR AUTO PLANTS CLOSED A STRIKE

CHICAGO, June 4.—Two major automobile manufacturers, Ford and Packard, were forced to close their plants today because of new labor troubles. The Ford plant at Dearborn closed its Jefferson division plants to an estimated 1,100 workers after an estimated 150 workers had brought a sit-down to the body die shop where 2,500 workers are employed. The Ford plant later announced that it had been forced to close its Dearborn plant to 1,500 workers because of a shortage of motors and provided by the idle Chrysler plant. The plant will reopen Monday, of the company said.

Over 8 Inches of Rain This Year In Eastland-Beard

A total of 8.79 inches of rain has fallen in Eastland since January 1. Official Weather Observer J. A. Beard reported Friday. A rain measuring 1.75 inches Thursday night boosted the June total to 2.27 inches. Another rain in June was recorded at .52 inches. In May 1.52 inches rain was recorded and for April .52 inches fell. March precipitation was 4.48 inches. There were only traces of rain in January and February.

Safety Board to With With State

BRECKENRIDGE, June 4.—At a meeting held Wednesday at the Petroleum club representatives of the Oil Belt Safety Council planned to co-ordinate their work with that of the state in efforts to reduce accidents, and general educational work on safety. Benny Butler, Cisco, was elected general chairman of the move. Representatives were present from a number of Oil Belt towns. The object is to set up an organization within the Safety Council to work directly with the state officials, it was explained.

PARI MUTUEL RACING LAW IS REPEALED

AUSTIN, June 4.—The pari-mutuel racing law was repealed finally today in the Texas house of Representatives by a vote of 94 to 13. Final senate vote yesterday was 18 ayes to 13 noes. Repeal will take effect 90 days after the present session, or about Sept. 24. Gov. Allred cannot sign the bill until Monday. It must wait to be signed by Lt. Gov. Walter Woodul in the presence of the senate. The house, both in committee and on the floor, rejected an amendment to permit betting until October 10. This would have allowed a fall meet at Epsom Downs, Houston. A farewell meet at Arlington Downs is possible before repeal takes effect. Gov. Allred, sitting in the house, said, "Am I happy. This is the will of the people." The house adjourned until Monday, at which time the governor is expected to submit dog race and bookie shop legislation.

Lightning Hits a Small Cisco Pump

The Humble Pipe Line company at Cisco reported the destruction by lightning of its small Fleming pumping sub station about two miles north of Pioneer, Southwestern part of Eastland county, at 4:30 a. m. today. The station was a wood structure and burst into flames after lightning struck, officials at the company office in Cisco reported. They were unable to estimate the damage, stating the building was completely destroyed and equipment badly damaged. The plant was not in operation at the time of the accident nor were any employees in the building. Oil in storage tanks near the station was not damaged. The station pumped oil from the area surrounding it into a larger line going into Comyn.

DALLAS, June 4.—Sammy Baugh, All-American football star, has signed contract to play professional football with the Washington Redskins team, George Marshall, owner of the team, announced today. Baugh, head coach at TCU, said today that he was positive that Sam Baugh, All-American quarterback, would return to his alma mater next fall as freshman coach. "Sam told me before he left for Pampa, early in the week to play baseball, that he would be back as freshman coach this fall," said Meyer. "I knew that he had signed a contract to play professional football with the Washington club, but all that means is that if he decides to go into the professional football later he could only play with that team."

"Trick" Is Charged To Gas Company

FORT WORTH, June 4.—City officials branded as a "trick" today, the proposal of the Lone Star Gas Company to put a maledorant in the gas supplied to Fort Worth consumers. Floyd Carmichael, Fort Worth manager of the company, declared today that an oil, easy to detect by smell, would be put into the local gas supply because of the "abnormal and potentially hazardous situation" created by a strike of service employees. Mortimer Jones, city gas inspector, charged that the plan was a "trick to win the strike" and it might result in panic among consumers.

Lake Hagaman Rises 14 Inches

Rains of Wednesday and Thursday night had raised the water level in Lake Hagaman 14 inches, it was announced today by W. C. Blackmond, water superintendent. Blackmond stated that he believed another rain like the one of Thursday night would put water over the spillway of the lake, as the ground was now soaked and the ditches and creeks that run into the lake are full of water, so that most of the rain that fell on the watershed would go directly into the lake. The 14-inch rise in the lake level did not make the water muddy, Blackmond stated, but seemed to have a tendency to clear the lake, which has been murky for several weeks.

ROOSEVELT IS SURE COURT PLAN TO PASS

WASHINGTON, June 4.—President Roosevelt declared flatly today he believes his court program is going through congress, perhaps at this session. At the same time he revealed that his legislative request for this session had been completed. While Mr. Roosevelt did not cite the measures on which he considered action most desirable, Senate Majority Leader Joseph Robinson listed these as slum clearance, farm tenancy, extension of nuisance taxes and closing tax evasion loopholes, executive and judicial reorganization and the wages and hours bill. Speaking at his regular press conference Mr. Roosevelt declined to discuss compromise suggestions voiced last night by Sen. Robinson, after a white house conference. Instead he reiterated his determination to fight for his court program and declared his belief the country was behind him.

Lone Star Foremen Hold Conference at Plant Near Ranger

Topographical Work Begins On Project

A topographical survey on the Leon river flood control district was begun Thursday by engineers and rod carriers from the State Reclamation Department, Frank Sparks, chairman of the board of directors, announced on Friday. Maps of the terrain in the district, composed of Callahan and Eastland counties, will be made following completion of the survey, made possible by authorization recently of the legislature, said Sparks. The survey is forwarding the plan of the district directors that the project be submitted to the federal government for inclusion in their list of water conservation and irrigation plans. Plans of the district directors propose construction of a dam near Mangum. Engineers arriving for the work were Herman U. Von Rosenberg and Jack Caldwell. Rod carriers for the engineers are Leon Upshaw and L. Z. Simco. Upshaw, the past season was a member of the freshman football team at the University of Texas. Simco is a student at the university also and is a former student of the naval academy at Annapolis, Md. The work started Thursday, is expected to take two months.

Dizzy Dean Given His Reinstatement

NEW YORK, June 4.—Dizzy Dean, ace pitcher of the St. Louis Cardinals, was ordered reinstated in 24 hours today by President Ford Frick of the National League. Dean was suspended after being charged with making statements about Frick and Umpire George Barr. In conferences yesterday and today he was offered reinstatement if he would refute or deny the statements. Dean refused to sign any documents. His reinstatement came after he went through a set of questions and answers with Frick. Newspaper men signed the report. Frick also signed. Dean refused to do so. "Well, I won my point," Dean said. "I said I wouldn't sign anything and I didn't."

HEAVY RAINS AND TORNADO DO DAMAGE

One death from lightning and several persons injured resulted Friday from rains, a tornado and hail storms in Texas. Shirlene Hayes, 15, was killed and her brother-in-law, G. O. Langston was injured when lightning struck them as they stood in a farm yard 25 miles northwest of Big Spring. Others in the group were knocked down. Four persons were injured and damage amounted to \$100,000 as a tornado struck McCamey. Heavy rains ranging from 1.18 at San Angelo and 1.3 at Ozona to four inches at McCamey, drenched the area. Severe electrical storms accompanied the rain as it raged north and east with 63 of an inch at Amarillo, 1.08 at Wichita Falls, 1.1 at Lubbock, .9 at Abilene, 1.28 at Dallas, .5 at Palestine, 1.26 at Austin, .75 at San Antonio and heavy rain continuing at .28 at Del Rio. Dallas had 1.28 inches. At Austin the rain totaled 1.26 at 7 a. m., and precipitation continued. The weather bureau said rains were general over Central Texas. Rains over western, eastern and southern sections of the state followed cloudbursts in the Panhandle "dust bowl" which resulted in flood damage amounting to more than \$250,000. Numerous derricks in the McCamey oil field, brought in 12 years ago, were toppled by the wind and several hundred oilfield workers were forced to seek emergency living quarters as their homes were splintered.

LOYALISTS IN CELEBRATION OF MOLA'S DEATH

HENDAYE, Spain, June 4.—Basque loyalists, jubilant at the death of General Emilio Mola, opened a general offensive in the Bilbao area today in hopes of smashing the nationalist siege. Basques celebrated the death of a man they hated. Gen. Francisco Franco, nationalist commander, named Gen. Jose Fidel Davila to succeed Mola, and nationalist asserted they would continue the drive on Bilbao without interruption. BARCELONA, June 4.—The Spanish steamer, Campero, en route to Barcelona, was torpedoed and badly damaged by a submarine today. The vessel made port, listing heavily. MADRID, June 4.—Artillery shells crashed into the center of Madrid at one-minute intervals today in a terrific nationalist bombardment. It was the second bombardment in 24 hours. Ten were reported killed and 20 wounded last night. ON HONEYMOON VENICE, June 4.—The Duke and Duchess of Windsor, smiling and happy, arrived at this famous city of canals today, en route to their scheduled honeymoon retreat in Austria.

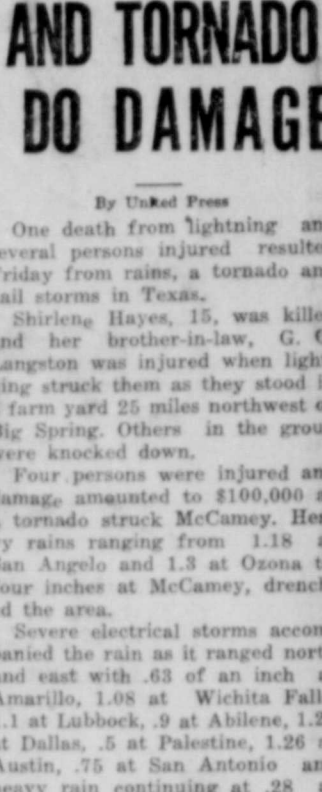

Denny Shute Writes Daily Golf Column

Beginning in Sunday's issue of the Ranger Times, Denny Shute, national professional golf champion and member of this year's Ryder Cup team, will write a series of six articles, titled "Golf Psychology." These lessons in the psychology of golf, written especially for the Ranger Times, will appear daily.

The author of the articles attacks the problem of "how to play golf" from an angle which is unique and seldom discussed, yet of fundamental importance. Golf, according to Shute, is largely a matter of correct thinking as the player approaches the problem presented by each hole.

Beginning with the observation that strategy on all regulation golf courses is actually very similar, Shute proceeds to discuss all types of holes, from the par threes or "one shotters" to the long par fives or, as he calls them, the "big uns." In the final article he discusses "the strange case of Mr. Brown, the iron man," by which he points out a valuable lesson to all golfers.

Has Outstanding Record
 Shute's selection for the Ryder Cup team for 1937 came as a result of his brilliant performances last year. His national professional golf championship of the United States came to him last November when he defeated Jimmy Thompson, the runner-up, and a field of leading American golfers for the national professional title.

Shute, who designs his own personal model golf clubs exclusively for Montgomery Ward, attributed his success in the P. G. A. competition and in other important matches in large part to these clubs which he has developed as the result of knowledge gained throughout his golfing career.

Fame first came to Shute as an amateur and has continued to follow him since he turned professional in 1928. Since turning professional his tournament winnings have totaled more than \$30,000. His scoring average for 1935 was 72.96 strokes. For 1936 it was 72.58. He is 32 years old and the son of Herman Shute, English born professional.

Firing the Rebellion on Cream-Puff Foods

A Michigan newspaper recently opened, a prize contest for housewives, asking them to submit old-fashioned recipes for old-fashioned foods; and no mortal who has plodded gamely through the whipped-cream-and-cracker-crumbs output of modern cookery can do less than hope that the ladies of Michigan rally 'round and make a great occasion out of it.

We might just as well face the fact that some strange fads and fancies have been flourishing in the American kitchen of late. Our forefathers waxed great and strong on solid fodder that would nestle up to a man's breastbone and stay there, letting him know that he had eaten something; we, their unworthy descendants, are facing a world in which the kitchen has become an experimental laboratory for a ladies' bridge club, so that a plateful of orange-colored fluff on a dewy lettuce leaf is actually held to be suitable nourishment for hard-working adult human beings.

It started, probably, when people began to find out about things like vitamins. Now vitamins are all very well in their way, and a steady diet of salt pork and boiled potatoes is probably a trifle heavy for city folk.

But once science reared its ugly head in the kitchen, it opened the way for all manner of abuses, and the volunteer dietary advisers lost no time in taking advantage of it.

They began with desserts, and the way their minds work can be gauged by the fact that they actually tacked a dressmaker's word like "chiffon" onto a sturdy thing like pie. They debased ice cream by discarding the freezer and chilling into solidity a series of weird mixtures of tints and flavors in the ice tray—each mixture guaranteed to provide at least one lump of pure ice to the spoonful.

From desserts they moved on to salads. They took to grating carrots and chopping nuts, to launching bananas in oceans of mayonnaise, to throwing at homo sapiens whole platefuls of raw vegetables as if he were no better than a rabbit. They erected faery concoctions of gelatin, tomato juice and whipped cream—fair to look at, but passing strange to the palate.

They put whipped cream into soups and breakfast foods into custards. They turned puddings from honest affairs to solid crusts and firm interiors into quavery, watery confections that will collapse at a touch. They sinned against the potato, by slicing and perforating it into unearthly shapes and then frying it to brittle tastelessness; against the egg, by forgetting that the egg was designed by Providence to nestle, sputterin, against slices of fried ham; against bacon, by slicing it thin as tissue paper and broiling it within an inch of its life.

But enough has been said. The Michigan editor has the right idea: old-fashioned recipes for old-fashioned foods. Cannot something be done to make this a great, nationwide campaign?

Electric Consumption Is Above Last Year

AUSTIN, Texas — Electrical power consumption in Texas during April maintained a wide margin of gain over the corresponding month last year and was also up considerably from the preceding month, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Reports from eighteen largest power companies of the State show total production of over 189,000,000 kilowatt hours of electricity during the month, an increase of 14.8 per cent over April last year and of 7.2 per cent over March.

Consumption for commercial purposes was up 17.6 per cent and 3.5 per cent from April last year and March, 1937, respectively; for industrial purposes 15.7 per cent and 9.7 per cent; and for residential purposes 17.2 per cent and 4 per cent. Miscellaneous consumption increased 4.7 per cent over April last year and 7.2 per cent over March.

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

A LITTLE round of pineapple can do wonders with a plain slice of meat.

Veal and Ham With Pineapple Rings
(4 to 6 servings)

Two pounds veal cutlet, 6 thin slices ham, 6 rounds canned pineapple, 2 tablespoons butter, salt, pepper, paprika, flour.

Cut veal cutlet into six pieces for serving. Dust lightly with seasoning and flour. Heat butter in frying pan. Brown veal on both sides. Arrange in heat-resistant glass baking dish. On top of each piece of veal arrange a piece of ham and over the ham place a round of canned pineapple. Cover bottom of dish with clear stock or hot water. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F) for half an hour. Serve from same dish. Taste occasionally while cooking. Garnish with parsley or watercress.

Of course, there's nothing better than fresh pineapple ice cream.

Fresh Pineapple Ice Cream
(2 quarts)

Two cups milk, 3 egg yolks, 1-2 cup sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 fresh pineapple, 2 tablespoons water, 1-4 cup sugar, 1 pint heavy cream.

Beat yolks, add sugar and salt and beat again. Scald milk and slowly add to egg mixture. Cook in double boiler until a custard is formed. Add vanilla and chill.

Two cups fresh pineapple, 1-2 cup sugar, 1-2 cup juice of lemon, 1-2 cup water, 1-4 cup sugar, 1 pint heavy cream.

Combine fresh pineapple, sugar, juice and water. Boil 5 minutes. Dissolve gelatin in water, then add to pineapple mixture. Add lemon juice and freeze in automatic refrigerator for 1 hour. Turn out into mold. Add unbeaten egg whites and until light. Return and garnish until firm.

Pineapple Rhubarb Shakes
(4 to 6 servings)

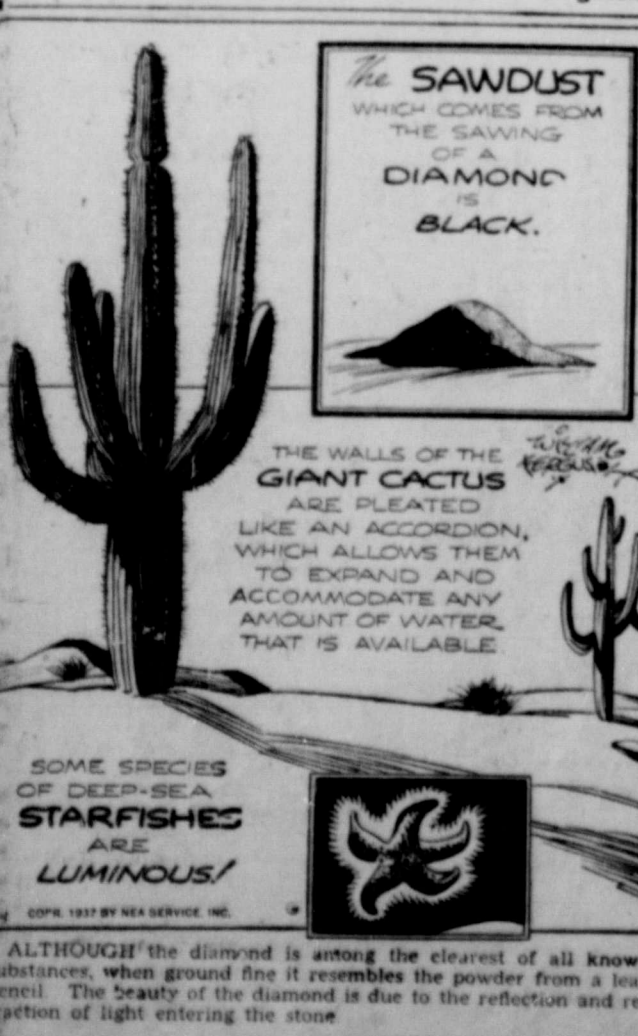

Rockefeller Gave \$120,000 to H-SU

ABILENE. — Rockefeller generosity has meant \$120,000 to Hardin-Simmons university, Dr. J. D. Sandefer, president, announced this week at the death of the philanthropist.

Revealing facts that few H-SU students know, Dr. Sandefer recalls that the Rockefeller foundation added \$100,000 to the university endowment on Sept. 18, 1922 and several years later gave \$20,000 as a gift to be applied on the teachers' salaries.

Dr. James B. Simmons, founder, was an intimate friend of John D. Rockefeller and received 92 letters written in longhand from the financier. The letters are on display in Hardin-Simmons museum cases. Contents of the letters concern Dr. Simmons' missionary work and Mr. Rockefeller's encouragement that accompanied his checks. The money given Dr. Simmons was not for Hardin-Simmons, but rather for missionary work throughout the South and East, Dr. Sandefer explains.

FROM RAGS TO RICHES

Rags improve the bedroom when made into beautiful rugs in the spare time of the home maker, says Miss Ruth Ramey at meeting of the Bass Lake, New Hope, Home Demonstration club, at a joint meeting Thursday, May 27, 2:30 p. m. at the Bass Lake clubhouse.

Rugs can be made on burlap, sugar or salt sacks. We see patterns that will make lovely rugs, from rug patterns, wall paper, or any patterns of autumn leaves and flowers.

Be sure to lap sacks well over and sew, to keep from pulling out. Then lengthen stitch on machine and sew around pattern or mark with crayon and iron, before beginning work. Woolen material is best, although you can cut and dye old strings, burlap yarn or silk and rayon.

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON—Present indications are that President Roosevelt will continue to fight for the essentials of his Supreme Court plan and refuse to accept any major compromise, that Senator Joe Robinson of Arkansas will be appointed to the Supreme Court and that Senator Alben Barkley of Kentucky will succeed Robinson as administration leader in the Senate.

The probable Robinson appointment is likely to be delayed until after the present session of Congress, whenever that may be.

Roosevelt thinks he can win sooner or later if he keeps the issue open. Most of his closest advisers, including congressional leaders, profess to believe the same thing, despite a chorus of pleas and demands from Capitol Hill that the issue be dropped.

THERE is as yet no administration retreat in the compromise proposed by Senator Logan of Kentucky, which would maintain a weak court of nine men but provide that when justices failed to retire at 75 the President might appoint additional justices—in such cases—at the rate of one a year. At this writing the administration crowd says Roosevelt won't stand for the one-year limit. If such a provision is the best he can get in the Senate he will try to get a much better break in the House—that is, according to present plans.

Of course, if more justices resign the situation will be altered.

To understand Roosevelt's stubborn attitude it is necessary to know that one of his paramount ambitions is to establish the Democratic party as a definitely liberal, progressive party, and that he expects to name his own successor in 1940.

He believes that these ambitions are to a considerable degree at stake in this court fight. And so, you may be sure, do many of his Democratic opponents—including some presidential aspirants in the Senate.

Also the President feels he can afford a long campaign on the court issue. He takes the seirious attitude that he is the representative of the people and that if he sticks to his guns the people will win in the end. To many conservatives this suggests a dangerous form of egomania. But it's Roosevelt.

ATTITUDES of opposition senators to the President's viewpoint are expressed in varied terms of bitterness, sorrow, worry and contempt. It is complained that Roosevelt regards the Democratic party organization over the country much as he regards Tammany Hall in his own state of New York.

But countless other attitudes are revealed in talks with individual senators. There are those who dislike Roosevelt because they are conservatives and he is liberal. And those who believe he is dangerous and wants to be a dictator. And those who believe he is ordinarily not so bad, but has gone too far in this Supreme Court matter. And those who believe that he has treated them shabbily. And those who believe he is just simply wonderful.

Not the least confusing angle of it all is the fact that some perfectly sincere senators trust that a vote for the court plan is political suicide, and that other perfectly sincere senators insist a vote against the court plan is political suicide.

Projects Inspected At Kokomo 4-H Meet

Most of Big Bank's Employees Take Part In Insurance Plan

NEW YORK—More than 95 per cent of the eligible officers

Perkins, chairman of the bank's board of directors. Because of the National City's international character—with seventy-one branch banks in twenty-three foreign countries, in addition to its seventy-two branches in New York City—the plan of group protection is one of the most far reaching ever written.

The insurance program is on a contributory basis, with the cost shared by the National City Bank and the insured employees. The total number of insured employees is believed to exceed the number subscribing for group coverage in any other bank. The aggregate amount of group life protection is estimated at approximately \$24,000,000.

In announcing the adoption of the plan, Mr. Perkins said: "The management of the bank believes that the adoption of this group insurance plan for its officers and employees represents a genuine contribution to their welfare. I am delighted that the plan has been adopted and believe that the protection thus afforded will give the employee a greater feeling of security."

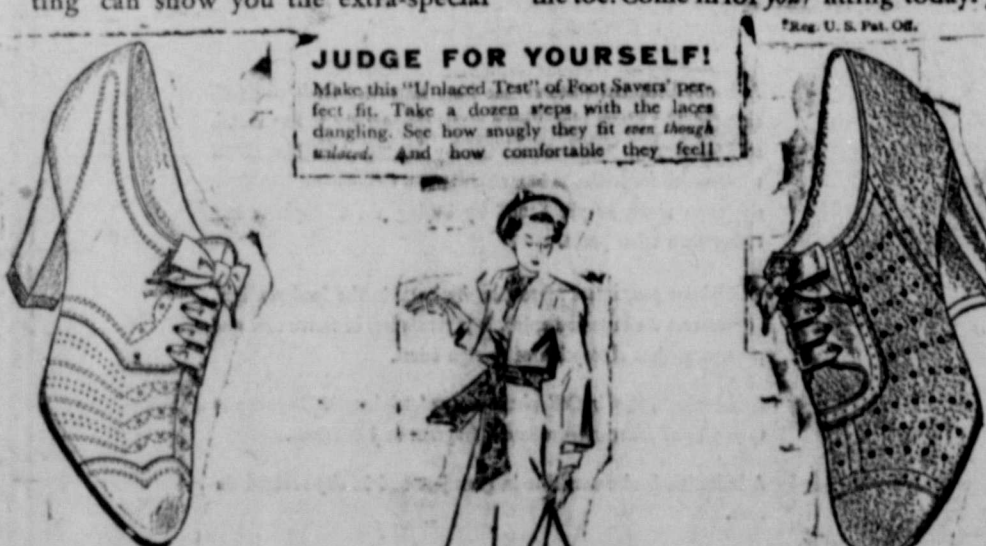
