M. A. FLOW WRITES ABOUT COTTON SEED

The following letter was received by this paper from M. A. Flow who is putting in the new cotton gin here at Perryton. There is some good wholesome advice in this letter from Mr. Flow. He is a man that has put many years in the cotton game and we believe that this experience makes him an authority on the cotton question.

Dear Sir: I visited your city and county a few weeks ago and after having studied conditions I find that you have the greatest opportunities that exist in the world. You have the richest and the best tillable soil that can be obtained, which means that you can grow the most valuable product that is marketed; which is cotton. I have had twenty years of experience in this business, and my connections and experience in handling this product teaches me that we should be able to obtain high prices for this product, on account of the Boll Weevil in the old cotton belts, which is growing stronger each year and our conditions here proves that we will have no Boll Weevil to contend with, and as our previous production has proven to be one-half a bale and more per acre I believe this to be the greatest opportunity ever presented to the farmers of this County.

I see this opportunity and am planting 600 acres in cotton, and am building for the convenience of the farmers of this county a gin, and am installing the best machinery obtainable. Mr. J. L. Hart, Jr., with The Hart Bolley Machine Co., of Chickasha Oklahoma was in your City last week for the purpose of installing our machinery. Mr. Hart, seeing conditions as I see them on this high priced product obtained 500 acres to plant in cotton.

Your Banks see this wonderful opportunity that exists for the farmers and to that end, are securing Planting Seed for every farmer that desires of plant cotton. These seed will arrive in Perryton, at an early date and have been selected so as to be suitable for growing in this climate and are about 88 per cent. germination. Your Banker or Myself will be glad to talk this matter over with any farmer who feels that he would be interested in planting some cotton this year.

At a meeting of the business men of Perryton a few nights ago, I was appointed as a member of a committee to make an investigation regarding the purchase of cotton seed for the farmers, and after visiting several points just south of here I find that we are going to be able to furnish cotton seed that will germinate to the extent of about 88 per cent., which I consider to be very good. These seed being grown in the northern part of the Panhandle make them desirable for this part of the Country.

I want to co-operate with the farmers in this section of the Country in every way possible and for your information will state that when our Gin is complete it will mean an outlay of about \$19,000.00 and will be one of the best equipped gins in northern Texas.

MORE AND BETTER WHEAT

"There is no other area that is more famous for its winter wheat than the Southwest," says H. M. Bainer, Director of the Southwestern Wheat Improvement Association. Continuing he says, "This is a natural tendency towards lower yields and poorer quality, all of which is due to declining soil fertility. Every bushel of wheat and every ton of straw or any other grain or forage crop, removed from the land without provision for returning the fertility represented in them, means just that much loss to the soil. It is an alarming condition, when we stop to consider that fully one-third of the original nitrogen and organic matter of our best wheat lands has already been lost. There is no wonder that the average yield of wheat per acre often does not pay the cost of production. While it is true that the cost of growing wheat is high and the selling price is low, yet when we stop to consider our wheat growing in competition with Canada, Argentine and other wheat growing countries, our prospects for higher prices do not look encouraging."

"Wheat farming is going to be less and less profitable under the old system which is now in use. A better system is necessary and when this has been adopted, the wheat farmer will have for his motto,—"Less land to wheat, more wheat per acre, better quality and higher profits," and this must come through diversified farming, better tillage methods, better seed, rotation of crops, more legumes and more livestock."

SNAKE IS TAKEN FROM THE STOMACH OF A GIRL

A few months ago newspapers all over the country told of physicians finding a long snake in the stomach of a 15 year old girl, an account of which appeared in the News-Democrat several weeks ago. Presumably she had swallowed the snake when it was very small as she was drinking water.

Specialists had been summoned to devise a method of removing the reptile without antagonizing it to the point that it might bite the walls of the stomach.

Now reports come that the snake has been removed, the story being as follows:

The patient, a girl of 15 years, was said to be at Highland sanitarium, Shreveport, La, where the doctors were figuring on some plan to remove the reptile.

Dr. C. S. Cornell read that story and submits the following account of a similar instance: The doctors' story American Medical association reproduced from Norton, Kans., Telegram follows:

The young girl was first placed under an anesthetic and then a small ball of raw meat tied to a string was forced down her throat and gullet to her stomach, where the moccasin was lying in wait for something to eat. The snake had been starving for three days and it immediately grabbed the ball of meat and the surgeons then slowly began to pull the string. Rather than let go of the meat the hungry snake permitted itself to be hoisted, up the gullet and throat and out.

TO HELP STUDENTS GET AN EDUCATION

That a larger number of those young men and young women of Texas who are really capable of taking a higher education may be sure of the opportunity, Secretary R. T. Ellis of the Texas State Teachers' Association has begun a survey to see how many of this group are willing to really work for an education. He stated today that if the number found is large that a group of Texas men and women will open the way for them.

The proposal is to establish factories and farms and shops near a highly developed State school and to give the student employment at a salary large enough to meet all school and living expenses. It is further proposed to make the factory and farm profit-sharing institutions, and to give the student his part of the profits, divided after the development fund is set aside.

Parent-Teachers Clubs in several Clubs in several schools have assured Mr. Ellis that their memberships will buy the products of such institutions, and that they will in every way encourage the development of the enterprises. They point out that whatever will help the Texas youth to a full realization of his dreams for higher education would meet with a quick and hearty response on the part of every parent.

Ellis bases his plan on the present economic demand of the people of the State, who are seeing as never before that the college trained young person has a much greater earning power than that of the untrained. He has pointed out that many of the serious financial problems of the State would be wiped out by training a greater number of economic leaders in the colleges and universities.

Survey made in a small territory indicates that the proposed plan will meet with a large response, in which case the details of the plan will be announced and immediate action taken to give the young people the chance. It is the hope of the group behind the plan to waste no time, so that no one need feel that he will have to wait longer for the opportunity.

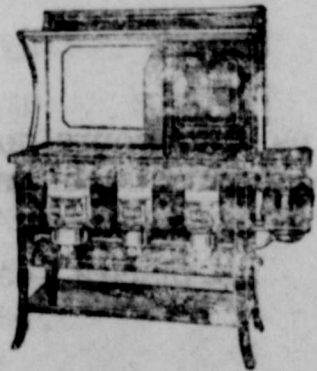


