Texas Electric Show To Open At Breckenridge On June 13

Clowns, a callopie, an old time brass band and a life-sized animated pigmy elephant that does every thing, except eat peanuts, will be among the unusual entertainment features of the Texas Electric Show of '50 that will open on the grounds of the Breckenridge High School Tuesday evening, June 13.

The entire show will carry out the circus theme, from the "big top" to the side-show stands, and even a circus "barker", according to J. E. Lewis, Texas Electric Service Company manager. The show is free and is being presented by the electric company in cooperation with electrical dealers and distributors. It will continue for three days, from 6 to 11 p. m. and close Thursday night, June 15.

The entire show will be on the school grounds with electrical equipment and appliances for the home and farm displayed in a large tent. Smaller tents and canopies will house the other attractions.

Among the interesting things to be seen at the Electric Show will be the largest lamp bulb in the world, big as a bushel basket. Beneath it will be the smallest lamp bulb in the world, the size of a grain of wheat. Other displays will include a presentation of mechan-

ized puppets to tell a modern version of the story of "Ten Little Indians," and a model power plant. Much of the electrical equipment will be in operation or be demonstrated at the show.

Varied entertainment features will be present, including musical program by Red (Asa) Woodward and his "Home Town Dandies", an old-fashioned type band with Gay Nineties costumes.

Reddy Kilowatt, more talkative than usual, will greet his little friends. Reddy will appear in his own private circus wagon.

Colored movies will be shown on the grounds after dark each evening during the show.

Two giant searchlights of 800 million candlepower each will be turned on each night during the show and sweep the skies for a radius of 30 miles. During previous Electric Shows, these lights have been seen as far as 60 miles away.

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Churches Will Study Morals Of Atom War

NEW YORK, June 3 (UP)—A commission to study the moral implications of the use of atom bombs and other weapons of mass destruction was set up today by the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America.

The Council announced appointment of 19 theologians, educators and laymen to the commission, known as the commission of Christian scholars.

It will be headed by Rev. Angus Dun, Protestant Episcopal bishop of Washington, D. C.

In a statement issued jointly with announcement of his appointment, bishop Dun said in part:

It will be our task to look with honest and open eyes at the powers of mass destruction now available or likely to be available to our nation and other nations, and make of them a more healthy city.

Sandy Farm Is Now \$10,000 A Year Dairy

An Eastland County man, L. R. Higginbotham of Kokomo Community has converted a sandy land farm into a \$10,000 a year pay-off.

He turned the trick by coordinating soil conservation with dairying and vocational agriculture work. His present dairy program was started in 1946 when he constructed a grade B Dairy barn. Money to purchase registered Jersey cows was obtained through loans A Comanche cheese plant agreed to buy all milk output for cheese processing.

Next came the job of changing part of the 166 acre farm into grazing land. The open pasture was sodded with bermuda and native grasses, but the pasture lacked in soil fertility, and 300 pounds per acre of 4-12-4 fertilizer were applied to part of the pasture and 300 pounds per acre of 0-20-0 to the rest. The land was then sowed in hairy vetch to supplant grass growth.

Higginbotham was elected secretary of the Eastland County Dairy Association, and district supervisor of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District. He now has constructed a grade A dairy barn and sells grade A milk.

Buyers Hunting Stockers For Grass Feeding

Buyers visited the Ranger Livestock commission sale from far and wide to buy \$63,471 worth of stock, Friday.

Orval Tackett, bookkeeper said that there was a good market on everything. Cows and calves sold from \$185 to \$235. Two loads of plain cows and calves went at \$195 a pair. W. A. Lerner of Morgan Mill was the purchaser.

George Harrison sold two or three loads of white face cows and calves at \$206.50. Perry Horton of Strawn bought one load.

Stocker steer calves sold from \$25 to \$29.50 a hundred. A carload of stocker heifers and yearlings sold at \$25 a hundred.

The Bluebonnet Packing Co., bought a load of fat dry cows and calves at prices from \$16.50 to \$19.50 a hundred. Some fat calves sold from \$24 to \$28 a hundred.

Fat yearlings sold from \$24 to \$28; top hogs brought \$18.50 up. Heavy sows sold for \$16.50 a hundred. A few feeder pigs sold from \$16.50 to \$17.50.

Buyers and ranchers indicated optimism towards future prices by concentrating their buying on stocker calves and cows to be fed on pastures.

Among the buyers at the sale were Wayne Lerner from Morgan Mill; C. A. Morris of Abilene, who bought heifers at 25 cents a pound; and Dizzy Dean of Eden.

Bulls brought from \$20 to \$22.50. Lighter and plainer bulls sold for \$17.50 to \$20.

72 County Boys Enter Contest

Seventy-two, Eastland County boys are participating in the 1950 Texas Electric Award Contest, according to J. M. Cooper, county agriculture agent.

The National 4-H Club Garden contest has the second largest number of entries with 54.

A total of 36 boys have enrolled in the poultry production contest, and 30 boys are signed up in field crops with 20 each in dairy production and farm and home safety contests, Cooper stated.

Several boys are entered in more than one contest.

Eastland county has 364 club boys enrolled in 12 different clubs over the county. The 4-H Clubs located at Hodges, Oak Park, Young School, Ranger Junior High at Ranger, Eastland Junior High, Carbon, Gorman, Desdemona High School, Desdemona Grammar, Cisco Junior High, Scranton, Pioneer and Rising Star.

Police Working On Third Year's Bomb Throwing

DALLAS, June 3 (UP)—Police department investigators today worked on the third bombing of the year in a South Dallas area where whites and negroes live in the same block.

A frame house was slightly damaged last night when dynamite apparently placed alongside the unoccupied structure exploded. The house had been bought yesterday by a negro family.

Windows were smashed in a house next door, also unoccupied. No one was injured.

The blast was heard three miles away.

"For Sale" signs on both empty houses were removed yesterday, a few hours before the explosion. Four negro families occupy houses in the same block.

No arrests have followed similar bombings in the vicinity earlier this year.

SIX NATIONS THUMB NOSE AT BRITAIN

Europe Musters To Pool Coal, Iron Industries

PARIS, June 3 (UP)—Talks between Britain and France on a scheme to pool the coal and steel industries of Western Europe collapsed today. Six countries announced they would go ahead with the plan without Britain.

France, Belgium, The Netherlands, Western Germany, Luxembourg and Italy announced their agreement on an "immediate objective." It was the pooling of coal and steel production, and creation of a new high authority whose decisions would be binding.

A conference of the nations to draft a treaty aimed at putting into effect the plan proposed by Foreign Minister Robert Schuman of France will be called for Paris about June 15.

The British government, trying hard up to the last minute to avoid being left out, announced it could not agree to such an advance commitment. It proposed instead a preliminary meeting of ministers to discuss procedure, rather than plunging into a full dress conference.

The London government announced it could not accept the French conditions for the conference. It added that it wanted neither to accept nor reject the basis of the French plan.

A French foreign office spokesman said the Western European countries were seeking to create "a community of interests hitherto divided and create a new authority in which the nations will pool a fraction of their sovereignty for the common good."

"It is the first time in the history of the world," the spokesman said, "that countries whose divisions have caused so many bloody wars have joined together to create amongst them this community of interests that will eliminate the cause of wars and create the conditions indispensable for production and the raising of the standard of living of the people of Europe."

RJC Announces Courses Open This Summer

Ranger Junior College announces that the following courses will be available in the school of music for the summer term.

The methods course for the teaching of music for Elementary school, which is designed to fill three hours of the required six hours of music for the state Elementary Teaching Certificate will be offered. Courses for college credit in instrumental technique, brasses or woodwinds, lessons in applied music for piano, organ, voice, violin and other instruments will be given.

In addition to these hours in the music school, the college will offer affiliated academic courses. All hours in the summer school are fully accredited with the standard college association and are accepted when transferring to another college. The school of music has been accepted as an associate member in the Texas Association of Music Schools which assures music students that the hours from Ranger Junior College will be transferable.

Classes are scheduled to begin June 5.

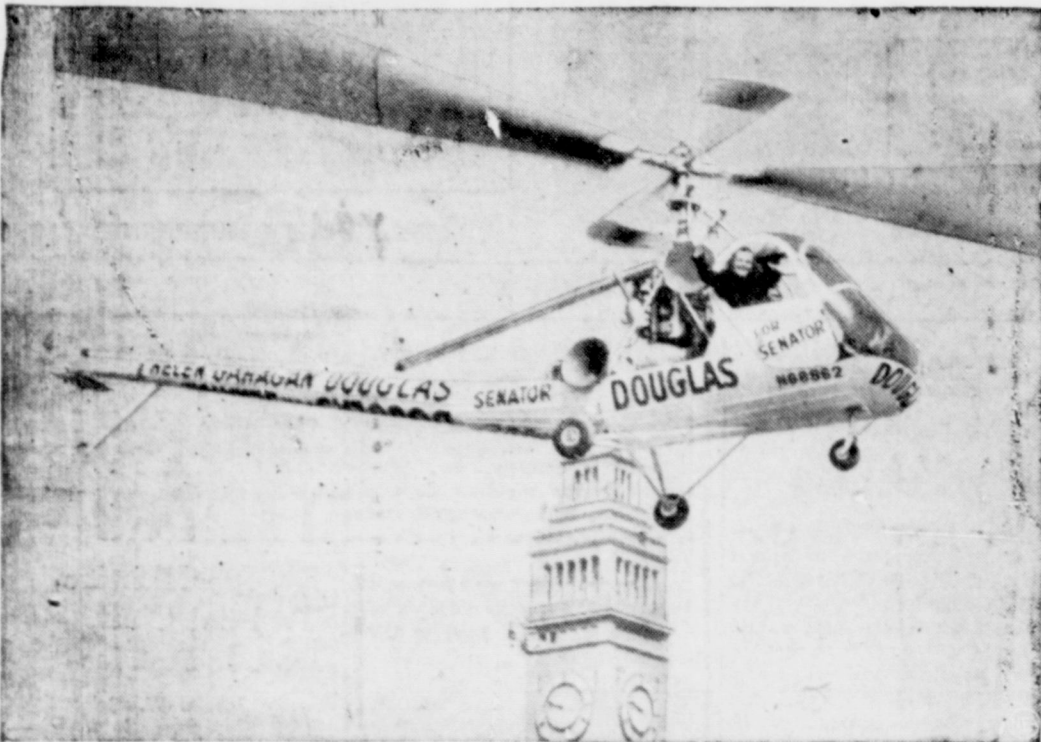
Local Bond Goal Smaller; Most Are In Series E

Jumping to conclusions can be very dangerous business.

If you don't believe this statement, just ask someone who has shoved his neck out and had it

chopped off for his trouble, if he is still able to talk.

Despite dire warnings, however, we persist in going out on a limb from time to time.

That is just what we are about to do right now.

Having been in Eastland only a couple of days we have come to the hasty conclusion that it is a downright swell town, with downright swell people. This is one time we don't believe a hasty conclusion is dangerous.

We can't recall a town which has left so favorable an impression upon us in such a short time. We have received the kindest of treatment and we are very grateful. We count it a privilege to live in a city such as Eastland, and will not refer to it as your town, but as our town.

One can tell a great deal about a city by the comment of those who have been there or lived there at some time. All such persons we contacted before coming here were very free with compliments. Such a reputation makes us proud of our town.

You no doubt noticed that this column is titled, You Name It. That is not intended to be the permanent title. We have mullied over the situation for some time, but could come to no conclusion as

to what the strip should be called, so we are calling on you to help us out.

You name the column. Send in suggestions for the name, and we will look them over. We thought that you might enjoy naming it, but of course we won't hold you responsible for what goes into it. That would be asking too much. So, we will write and you name it.

A lot of commotion arose early in the week when the 1950 preliminary census count was received. The count showed Eastland to be about 20 short of 1940's fig-

ures. The worst part of it to most people was that they are positive that there are more people around town and more business going on than ten years ago.

Thus we have a situation which is hard to explain. One thing is that families are not as big as they once were. Another is that the suburbs of Eastland have grown vastly, and these people are not counted in the city population.

Our conclusion is that citizens are correct when they say that there are more people in Eastland now than in 1940, but that all of those people are not citizens of the town. That is, they don't live inside the city limits and cannot be counted in the city population.

Business Looks Good; Farming Scene Not Rosy

DALLAS, June 3 (UP)—Business, industrial and financial picture for the eleventh Federal Reserve District look good, the reserve's monthly business review said but the agricultural scene is not so rosy.

The monthly report noted that wheat production in the district would be "very small." Total production in Texas, it said, was forecast at only 24 per cent of last year's harvest.

Conditions in the agricultural and livestock industries were reported very spotty, reflecting chiefly the continuance of a severe drought in much of the Western portion of the district. However, other phases of the economy looked good, the report said.

Consumer buying at department stores in the district during April continued at a higher level than in most other federal reserve districts—or the country as a whole. And during the first half of May the report said sales of weekly reporting stores were six per cent larger than in the corresponding period in 1949.

The economic position of the petroleum industry also had "improved substantially" during recent months, the business review noted, on the basis of allowables that have been established, it said.

Daily average production in the district during June should be about 425,000 barrels over the rate in March this year, and only about 200,000 barrels under the all-time peak rate attained in November, 1948.

The banking scene looked superior, too. It was attributed to "favorable business and industrial developments."

The Federal Reserve noted that individual accounts at banks in 24 principle cities in the district were 7 per cent higher in April of this year than in the same month of 1949. And during a four week period ending May 10, selected member banks in leading cities of the district increased their loans by \$2,320,000.

Construction activity in the district continued at a high level in April for the eleventh consecutive month, the report said.

Although the value of construction contracts awarded during April was 12 per cent below the

Your Health

How many people do you know that still cling to the old-fashioned idea that the sooner children catch the so-called diseases of childhood, the better off they'll be?

Take whooping cough, for example. Isn't it ridiculous for children to have to suffer with it when it may be prevented by simple vaccination?

Whooping cough goes by the scientific name of pertussis. Regardless of what you call it, it still means violent, painful wracking coughing that takes the breath and tears at the chest and throat walls.

Pertussis is prevalent among children everywhere. About 15 out of every 100 cases are in children under two. North America, from time to time, seems to have more than its fair share of cases.

Sometimes it's fatal, especially to very small children. About 85 out of every 100 whooping cough deaths are among two-year-olds

and less. And, strangely enough, most deaths are among girls. In 1949 Texas had 46 whooping cough deaths. So far in 1950, and average of 323 cases have been reported every week.

Whooping cough is spread through droplet infection—that is, by breathing air contaminated by a sneeze or cough of an infected person, too. It is communicable from about 7 days after exposure until three weeks after the coughing starts.

The important thing about whooping cough is that vaccination may protect against it. It's the only thing that will. If an unvaccinated child gets the disease, he will thereafter have what it called a "definite and prolonged immunity." But the fact of the matter is that second attacks have been known to occur.

Vaccination of all preschool children is the answer to control. "Booster shots may be advisable within a year after the initial vaccination. Your family doctor will make that decision.

Prison Rodeo Has Opening

The Texas Prison Rodeo had its "Coming-Out Party" in Dallas Saturday.

Dallas has already been convinced that it will have one of the roughest, toughest shows on earth on its hands till June 10. A herd of the vicious Brahman bulls to be used in the rodeo broke out of their corral early one morning this week and led 16 Dallas

police cars on a merry chase before they were rounded up.

There has been more interest shown in the prison rodeo than in any event held at State Fair Park in many, many years, said James H. Stewart, executive vice-president and general manager of the State Fair of Texas.

Huge crowds are expected to attend the State Fair has anticipated the heavy demand for tickets and has added 5,000 seats to the grandstand. The additional seats will give a total of 88,000 people an opportunity to see the big show, Stewart said. Plenty of good seats are still available for all eight performances.

The 200 inmates of the Texas Prison system taking part in the rodeo were transported to Dallas from the Huntsville prison Friday. The caravan of prison trucks were

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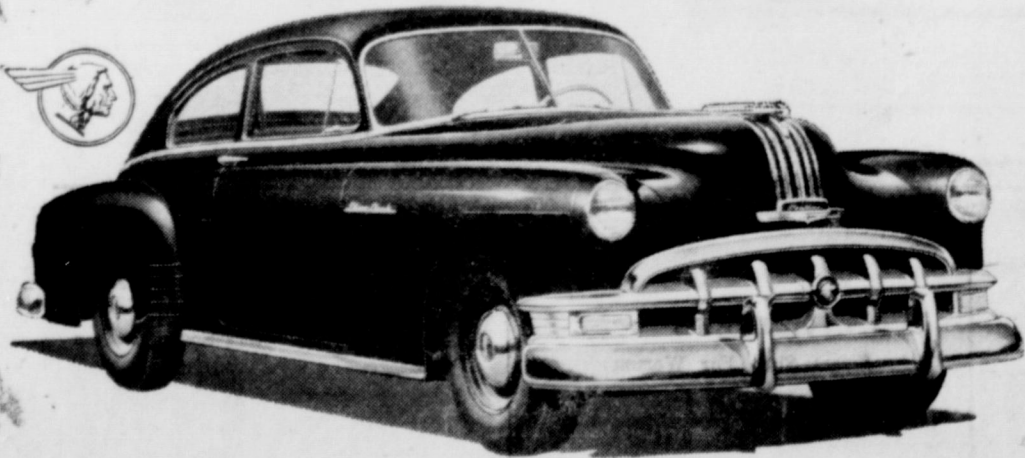
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
