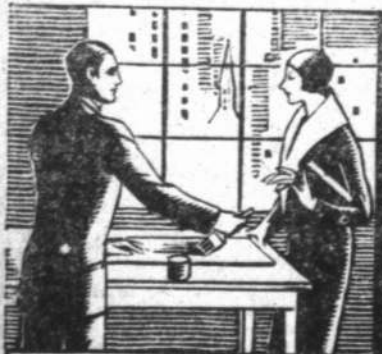

MOTOR TRUCK LAW

In answer to many inquiries regarding the new Motor Truck Law I have decided to make a statement concerning it, which, it is hoped, will be of service to those people interested in this law. As to the wisdom of the law, I have no argument to make since it is already a law.

The law defines "Persons" to include an individual, a firm, co-partnership, corporation, company and association or a joint association. The term "Public Highway" is defined to mean every street, road or highway in this state and the term "Motor Carrier" is defined to mean any person, firm, corporation, company, co-partnership, association or joint stock association and their lessee, receiver or trustee who may own, control, manage, operate or cause to be operated any motor propelled vehicle used in transporting property for compensation or hire over any public highway in this State, where in the course of such transportation, a highway between two or more cities, towns or villages is traversed and this class of carrier is also classed as a common carrier.

A "Contract Carrier" means any motor carrier who transports property for compensation or hire over any highway in this State other than as a common carrier. This law provides that before any person, as defined above, to operate as a common carrier, he must, on application, receive a certificate of public convenience and necessity from the Railroad Commission of Texas. Before any person, as defined above, can operate as a contract carrier he must obtain a permit from the Railroad Commission of Texas on application therefor.

As there are sixteen printed pages in this act it would be impossible in an article of this nature to give all of its provisions as to requirements in the operation of trucks coming under the law. It might be well to state that a violation of this act is punishable by fine not to exceed two hundred dollars.

This law does not apply to persons hauling their own goods or property but it must be borne in mind that this truck law is entirely a different law from the new peddler law, concerning which

an article was printed in local papers some weeks ago.

I am not informed as to what provisions have been made by the Railroad Commission to enforce this law. It must be admitted by all who were acquainted with the situation, that the Railroad Commission made a feeble effort to enforce the former law on this part as to Contract Carriers, then called Class B Carriers. I may also take the liberty to add that unless the Railroad Commission enforces this new law as to "Contract Carriers" better than it did the old law, it is going to be unjust and will be of no value whatever to any one. It is a matter of common knowledge, in this Co. that many truck operators obtain permits to do a class B Trucking business, which corresponds in the new act to "Contract Carrier" business and the Railroad Commission made no effort to protect these persons against the operation of trucks on which no permit had been obtained. If the Railroad Commission does not show an inclination to enforce this law fairly and impartially, as to all persons coming under its terms, or at least make an honest effort to do so, many citizens' money will be taken as in the past and no protection will be afforded them. The person desiring to do the right thing and comply with the law will be the goat.
