## Cotton Picture Is Blooming For 1979

The 1977 bumper cotton crop produced in Mitchell County may well meet its match this year.

Subsoil moisture conditions are excellent in many parts of the county, due to the rains received recently.

According to Van Mills, Soil Conservation Service supervisor, when the 1977 bumper crop was produced, the

subsoil moisture condition was comparable to the condition now.

Mills noted that more moisture was needed for the surface soil before the farmers will plant.

"May 20 will be a good date to plant if the moisture conditions are right," said Mills. About 72,000 acres will be planted in Mitchell County.

If farmers plant ear-

lier, Mills said that boll weevils may cause more damage.

David Marion, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor, agreed that the 1979 cotton crop could meet or beat the 1977 crop which produced 71,421 bales.

"We need a little shower to plant on and a two inch rain in July," said Marion, in order for the county to produce a bumper crop. "We have the potential if we get the rain."

The severe winter Mitchell County experienced could have a favorable effect on this year's cotton crop, particularly in regard to the boll weevil population.

Marion noted that there was a "heavy winter kill and a low overwintering rate, percentage wise" concerning the boll weevils.

Don Stewart, Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Service executive director, noted that farmers will begin planting April 30 and will continue through May.

Stewart said that some farmers may plant earlier than April 30, but the chance of insect damage increases.

However, Benson noted that other crops have been planted across the county this week and that farmers would continue planting for the next couple of weeks.

"There is ample moisture in the soil to get the crops up," said Benson. Forage sorghum and grain sorghum have been planted.

"The wheat is starting to head out but it needs some more rain," said Benson.

Regarding rangeland, C. W. Cox of the SCS office noted that the grass would be slow in growing because the weeds are using the moisture.

"After the weeds die when the weather gets hot, the grass can come in," said Cox.

Because of the winter weeds, the livestock across the county are doing well, Cox noted.

"The southern and southwestern portions of the county need more rain for the stock tanks," Cox said.

In preparation for the anticipated prosperous cotton crop, the SCS

office has been busy planning and building terraces, waterways and farm tanks.

IVIAN BYRD of the SCS office said that some 100,000 feet of new terrace have been planned. See COTTON, Page 10

## Council Authorizes \$100,000 Bank Note

The City Council of Colorado City, meeting in special session Thursday night, passed a resolution authorizing Mayor Marion Bassham and City Secretary Brenda Tarter to ex-

ecute a short term \$60,000 loan with the City National Bank to put the city's general fund in the black at the end of the current fiscal year on April 30.

The resolution itself

states as follows, "Be it resolved that the City of Colorado City, Texas shall borrow the sum of \$60,000 for a period of 10 days from the city National Bank of Colorado City, Texas for the purpose of paying current operating expenses, to be repaid with interest out of anticipated current revenues from the city's delinquent tax account with the delinquent tax account pledged as security for said loan."

City Manager Ray Mason said that the loan will actually be handled in two parts. The \$60,000 note will be paid back on May 1 with a \$100,000 note which will be executed with the bank at

that time. The remaining \$40,000 out of that note will be used to meet the city's operating expenses.

Mason said that after studying several alternatives, this loan seemed to be the best way of assuring that the city's general fund would at least be at the breakeven point on April 30. See COUNCIL, Page 8

Smith Is New Bank Manager

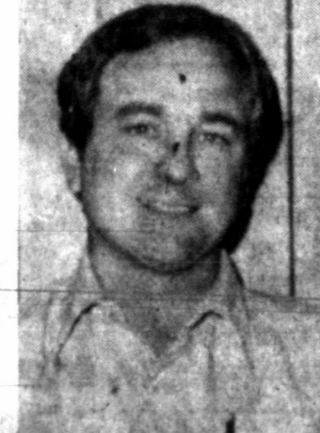
Mike Smith is the new manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Colorado City.

**Rules To Safety  
During Tornadoes**



Now that the tornado season is here, the National Weather Service in Fort Worth said there are lifesaving rules to remember if severe weather conditions develop.

According to Jeter A. Pruett, meteorologist in charge of the National Weather Service forecast office, the tornado season begins in March and ends in May. And although area residents are protected by an efficient warning system, they should also know tornado safety rules, weathermen said.

If a person is in an office building when a tornado strikes, he should go to an interior hallway on the lower floor or to a designated shelter area. In a factory, a worker should move quickly to the section of the plant offering the greatest protection. If in a shopping center one should go to the designated shelter area, but not to a parked car.

According to Pruett, a home basement offers greatest safety in a storm, but in homes without basements residents should take cover in the center part of the house - under sturdy furniture, if possible, on the lowest floor - or in a small room such as a closet or bathroom. Windows should be kept open, but avoided.

The NWS said mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to destructive winds and should be properly tied down. There should be a designated community shelter where mobile home residents can assemble during a tornado warning, and a warden should be appointed in mobile home parks to scan the skies and listen to radio and television for warnings. If a resident can't find a place of shelter, he should not stay in a mobile home during tornado warning, instead he should seek shelter in a sturdy building, a ditch, culvert or ravine.

Other Safety Tips Include:

\*School students should follow advance plan to an interior hallway on the lowest floor, avoiding auditoriums and gymnasiums or structures with wide, freespan roofs.

\*If a person is in open country and there is no time to find suitable shelter, he should lie flat in a ravine or open ditch.

\*Residents should stay informed of changing weather conditions via radio or television.

Colorado City Police Fred McWhorter said if a funnel is sighted, the closest civil defense siren will sound of 3 to 5-minute warning to residents to take protective measures.

Miss Smith had a leap of 36'8" in the finals to give her the win and earn a spot in the girls state meet in Austin in two weeks.

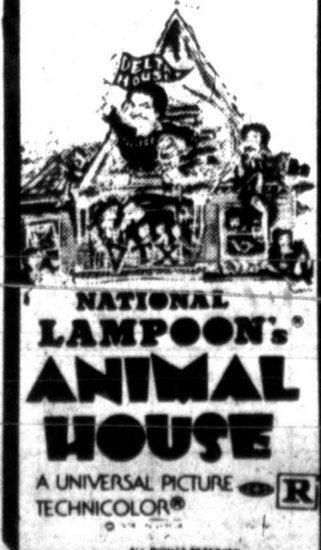

which it must be, according to the city charter.

The city manager stated that he and City Attorney R. L. McKinney had discussed the

matter with attorneys connected with the Texas Municipal League in Austin and they had agreed that this was the best alternative the city had available.

The interest rate on the loan will be eight per cent.

City Councilman Ray Dillard made the motion that the resolution be adopted, Jessie Munoz made the second and it was passed unanimously.

In another item on the meeting agenda, Mason stated that he had been approached by city officials from Loraine about the possibility of negotiating a contract for city workers from Colorado City to pick up trash in Loraine.

Mason stated that at present Loraine has no sanitary landfill. They only have a dump-ground and this is illegal. He stated that the Loraine officials told him they had been given notice by the state that the matter of their trash disposal was going to have to be corrected.

The city manager made a suggestion to the council which he said he would discuss further with the Loraine officials if the council agreed.

He said that after making a tour of the Loraine trash route, he believed that Colorado

City workers could make it once a week in about two hours. He added that he had considered charging Loraine for the pickup at the rate of \$4 per meter.

Loraine has 370 meter customers and this would mean that they would be paying Colorado City \$1,480 monthly for the service. The annual payment would be \$17,760.

Mason added that, according to his figures, the last amount which Colorado City could charge Loraine for the service and still break even would be \$3.28 per meter customer. He stated that he would insist as part of any contract between the two cities that Loraine citizens leave their trash in plastic bags in their front yards so that the pickup could be made as easily as possible.

The councilmembers had some questions concerning the matter and Macca Findley asked if the city's insurance would cover the workers while on the Loraine route.

Mason said that the insurance would cover the workers.

Findley then added that he would be in favor of charging the Loraine customers \$4.50 each for the service. "We're going out of our way to do this," he noted.

Dillard agreed with the \$4.50 figure and he also suggested the Colorado City sell the Loraine customers the plastic bags at cost.

Mason said that he would discuss the matter further with the Loraine officials and put it on the agenda for the next council meeting.

In his city manager's report, Mason brought up the matter of the water which the city is pumping every month which is not being billed. He had earlier stated that Colorado City was losing about 20 million gallons per month or about 44 per cent which is much higher than the 20 per cent which is about the normal amount of loss.

Mason said that the meter at the water plant had been checked out and it had only a one per cent variation which was acceptable, this eliminated the possibility of this meter being dead.

The city manager went on to state that he had further checked the compound meters which are used by city's larger users such as the hospital and the schools.

These compound meters have two registers, one which meters for low volume and for high volume.

The low volume registers meter water used for drinking fountains and water faucets and the high volume registers meters the water used through the sprinkler system.

Mason said that at least at one of the schools, the low volume register wasn't working properly and that if this was true for all these meters, this would account for much of the water loss.

The city manager said that he intended to have a systematic check made on all of the meters in town.

He added, however, that this was going to be a job which was going to take a while.

Mason finally added that there had possibly been some instances where local citizens had tampered with their water meters and he suggested that the council consider passing an ordinance which would include a fine for anyone caught doing this.

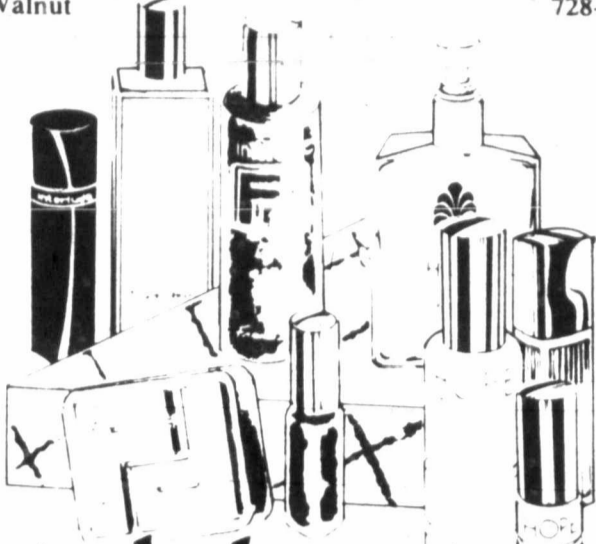

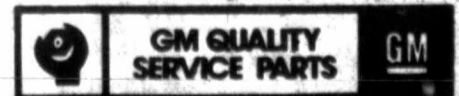



★ **COTTON**, from page 1 - races have been built in Mitchell County during this terracing season. Planned and in the process of being built are 20 acres of waterways and 10,000 feet of diversion. In addition, six farm tanks will be built.

Although farmers across the county have begun to work on the 1979 cotton crop, some farm officials are still concentrating on the 1978 crop which produced about 37,944 bales. There are only six working day remaining for producers to sign up for ASCS program. "The producers must file an intention to participate by April 30 or he will miss out on program benefits such as voluntary diversion payments, commodity loan programs, target price payments and disaster payment," said Stewart.

Some 500 farmers have already signed up for the 1979 program, but Stewart said there are still about 100 county farmers who have not filed intentions to participate.

Concerning small grain certification for 1979, Stewart said that acres must be certified by May 1. Set-aside is required for participation in the program. The FmHA office is still accepting emergency loan applications for losses sustained in 1978.

Mrs. Willingham noted at the workshop that the horticulture division of the flower show which shows examples of identified plant life grown here by club members, should be of interest to anyone in this area.

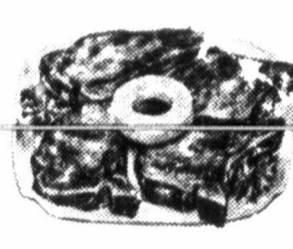
