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Southwestern Public Service Requests Rate Increase

Southwestern Public Service Company announced today that it will seek a general rate increase for Texas customers in 1974.

The proposal requests an increase of 10 percent to be effective with the start of the summer season in September of this year. The request is addressed to municipal governments in the communities served by the company, those being the regulatory authority in Texas.

Southwestern has had only one rate increase in 17 years ago, respectively, in 1957. The 1967 increase was 6.2 percent. There have been rate reductions since 1942. The company took its rate down to 1.4 cents per kilowatt hour.

Increased costs of labor, materials, money and taxes are cited by the company as major reasons for the rate increase request. Spoke-

the company offers electric heating rates during the winter season. This type of rate structure benefits all residential customers, whether they heat electrically or not, because it brings in more revenue dollars, which helps keep all rates lower, than would be the case without the incentive for those customers preferring electric heat.

The new general service rate that applies to most commercial customers is as follows: 7.1 CENTS per kWh for the first 100 kWh used each month; 4.6 CENTS per kWh for the next 900 kWh used each month; 2.4 CENTS per kWh for the next 6,000 kWh used each month; 1.4 CENTS per kWh for the next 6,000 kWh used each month; .9 CENTS per kWh for all additional kWh used each month.

(When the commercial customers' demand - the number of kilowatts the company must have to serve his load - exceeds 10 kw, the 4.6 cents block of the rate is extended 38 kw for each kw of demand above 10 kw. This demand feature affects only the larger customers.)

The company projects that the rate increase will produce annual revenues in Texas, where it serves the great majority of its customers, of \$6,161,000.00. Of this amount, \$3,021,000.00 will go for additional taxes.

In the face of high interest costs that now range from 9 to 11 percent, the company's rate of return on its investment is 5.87 percent. If the proposed new rate had been in effect during 1973, it would have yielded a rate of return of 6.61 percent. Texas law allows as much as 8 percent rate of return for utility companies.

May is Texas High Blood Pressure Month, as proclaimed by Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

In addition, he expressed hope that all Texans will cooperate in educational and detection programs concerning high blood pressure. High blood pressure or hypertension affects nearly 1.5 million Texans - although half of these are unaware they have it.

Of those who know they have it, only one-fourth are receiving proper medical care.

Easy and painless to detect, nearly all high blood pressure cases are controllable with proper medication.

If untreated, it can lead to strokes, heart attacks and kidney failures.

Tossing out leftover bits of cheese is like feeding your garbage can money. Instead, grate cheese shavings and dried uneven pieces - then store in a glass jar, use for flavoring sauce, sprinkling over salads or for topping casseroles, suggests Mrs. Gwendolyn Clig-

att, consumer marketing information specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Spices and herbs add taste delights to vegetables without extra calories. As a rule of thumb, 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon of most dried spices and herbs seasons two cups of vegetable, says Sally Springer, food and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Did you know that whether it's built or remodeled, the bathroom is usually the second most costly room in a house?

Copper cookware represents a special gift for a very special person. Whether for Mother's Day, graduation or a bridal shower, always include a card giving complete use and care instructions.

Buying utensils at least 10-12 gauge, about 1/16 inch thick - those you can lift without wrist strain.

Also choose only balanced

utensils to avoid kitchen accidents. Since certain acids react with copper - resulting in unpleasant odors, tastes and verdigris (free "rust" - most interiors are plated or lined with tin, nickel, stainless steel or silver.

Silver plating increases a utensil's heat-conducting qualities, although it tarnishes easily, and nickel adds sturdiness.

Most new copper utensils come with a protective lacquer or plastic coating. If copperware will be used over heat or for food preparation it is advised that you remove the coating.

To do so, first fill a large container with water. Add one tablespoon washing soda for each quart of water used then add one more tablespoon soda. Bring liquid to a rolling boil and immerse copper utensil for at least 15 minutes - the coating will peel off easily. Finally rinse and dry the utensil thoroughly.

To remove coating from a large item, apply acetone - available at any drugstore.

Turning to proper care and maintenance, use only wood, hard rubber or plastic tools in the cookware to maintain its beauty. To prolong life of the lining, don't sear or rapidly brown meat in copper cookware. This can cause the lining to blister.

Also don't place an empty pan over heat, and avoid high heat altogether - copper conducts heat very efficiently, so it's not needed.

In addition, remove foods immediately after cooking - and don't store foods in these utensils, even for quick freezing.

When linings become heavily scratched or worn, get them replated. It is recommended that you clean cookware interiors with soap or detergent. If scrubbing proves necessary, use only a nylon pad, brush or sponge.

To restore shine to copper exteriors, rub the entire surface with half a lemon rind dipped in table salt, leave this on for a few minutes, then wash in hot, sudsy water. Rinse thoroughly and wipe dry immediately.

If preferred, dip a sponge or soft cloth in a strong solution of salt and vinegar instead of using the lemon.

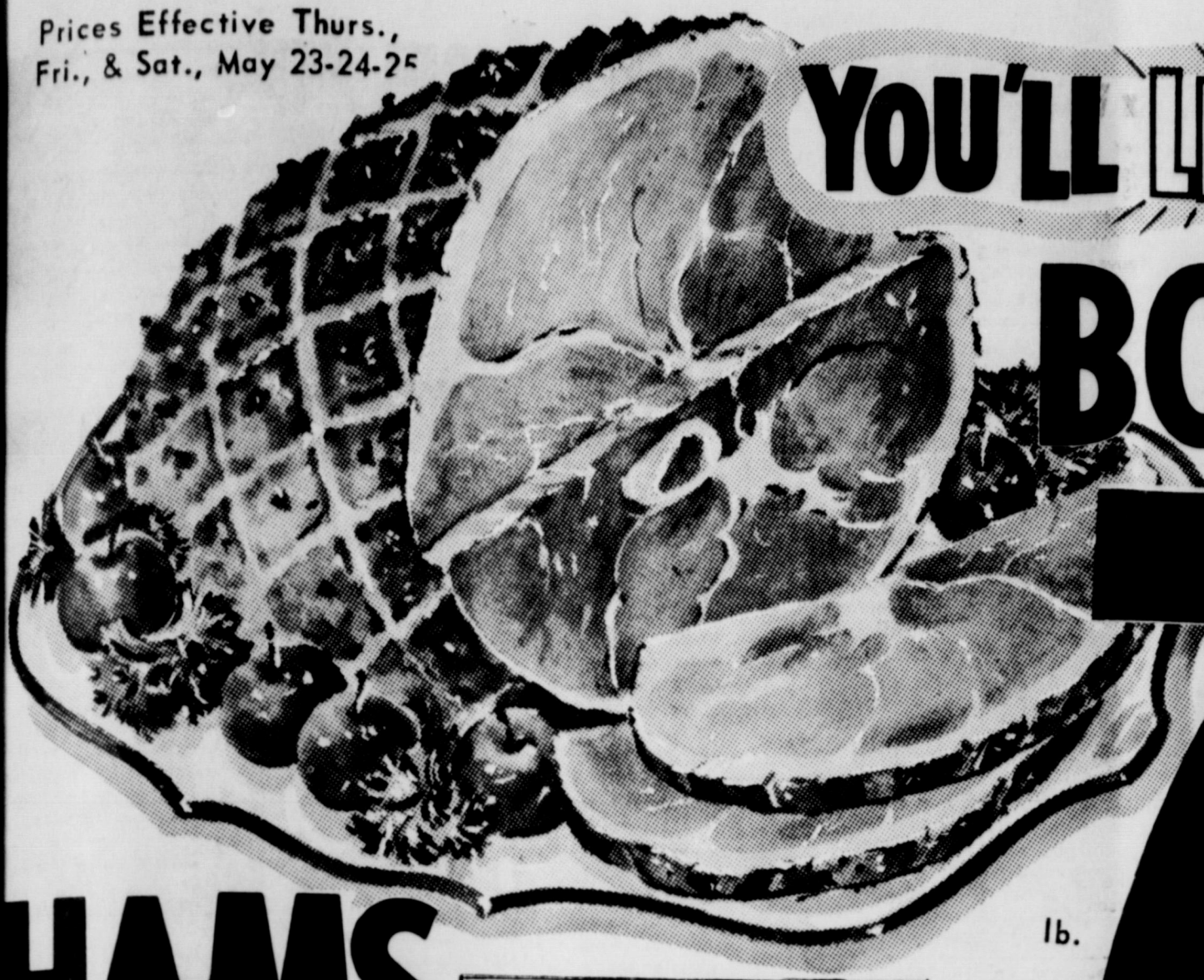
