APPEAL GOES TO HOUSEWIVES TO LEAD 'BUY NOW' CAMPAIGN

Washington, D. C., Oct. 9.—NRA's "Buy Now" campaign today was up to the American housewife.

To her, spender of 85 per cent of the family income, Hugh S. Johnson especially addressed his appeal to buy, "not only to save money but also because every dollar spent now is helping to keep the wage earner in her family on a payroll."

For her, too, as she made up Monday's shopping list, store windows were refurbished and advertising intensified in a joint effort with the government to stimulate consumer demand into a buying wave that will boost the entire recovery program.

Noting today's opening of the long-planned buying drive, Johnson asked the country's support.

"Industry and trade, cooperating with the government, under codes of fair competition or agreements with the president, have done and are doing their part. Hundreds of thousands of men, long idle, have gone back to work and millions of dollars have been added to payrolls."

"These payrolls cannot be maintained and new jobs for other hundreds of thousands of workers cannot be made unless every consumer in the land does his or her part now."

"For four years the American consumer has been skimping—putting off buying more than bare necessities until 'better times.' Better times are here. xxxBetter times always mean higher prices. Now is the time to buy for purely selfish reasons. Prices are going up. Buying now is an investment."

WEEKLY GRADE AND STAPLE REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING OCT. 5.

Austin, Texas
October 7, 1933

The outstanding feature of this week's report is the high per cent of spotted and yellow tinged cotton, 34 per cent being of these standards designations compared with approximately 13 per cent last week for the state. Possibly the next outstanding thing in this report is the amount of untenderable cotton. Approximately 15 per cent of the cotton classed this week for the State was untenderable compared with slightly over 4 per cent last week. The untenderability of the cotton classed this week was due primarily to staple. The greatest proportion of cotton shorter than 7-8 inch came from the following districts: approximately 37 per cent from No. 2, the High Plains; 32 per cent from No. 3, the Red Lands and Plains; 12 per cent from No. 5, the Cross Timbers; 12 per cent from No. 8, the Sandy Coastal Plains; 9 per cent from No. 4, the Edwards Plateau and Rio Grande Plains; 9 per cent from No. 10, the Mixed Black and Sandy Lands of South Texas; and the other three soil districts showed approximately 1 to 2 per cent untenderable.

In district No. 3, the Red Lands and Plains, this week 4 per cent of the ginnings was classed as equivalent to the Extra White Standards; while approximately 38 per cent was White Strict Middling and better as against approximately 50 per cent last week. More than 52 per cent of the cotton classed this week was 7-8 inch in staple length, and slightly more than 15 per cent was 15-16 inch and longer; whereas, the staple designations for last week showed 50 per cent 7-8 inch and 38 per cent 15-16 inch and longer.

NEGRO SLASHED IN NECK WITH RAZOR

A negro dance near Wastella last Saturday night ended with razors flashing, and Will Lewis, one of the party, sustained a badly gashed throat. The razor barely missed the jugular vein, and five stitches were required in sewing up the wound when Lewis was brought into Roscoe for treatment.

Lee Roy Davis, Colorado negro, said to have been the wielder of the razor, is being searched for by officers. Lewis is also from Colorado. —Roscoe Times.

Boys Outnumber Girls In School P. T. A. Starts Successful Year

As a usual thing more girls attend school than boys. Such is not the case in the Loraine high school this year, according to figures announced by Superintendent Clyde Bennett. There are 172 boys enrolled in the school and only 148 girls. Seven classes, including the senior class, have more boys than girls enrolled. Two classes have the same number, and two classes have more girls than boys. The senior class has 11 boys and 6 girls. The 2nd grade has 24 boys and 10 girls.

A total of 2780 bales of cotton had been ginned in Loraine to 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. The rain Tuesday afternoon and night will slow up ginning for a few days.

TEXAS RELIEF BONDS WOULD BE USED TO BUY FARMS FOR NEEDY

Austin, —A bill setting aside \$5,000,000 of the states \$20,000,000 bond issue as a fund to buy small farm homes for destitute families was introduced in the senate by Senator John S. Redditt, Lufkin lawyer.

The bill crystallized in legislative expression the newest angle in relief administration which the Senate has been investigating for eight days. It embodies a relief theory advocated by Lieut. Gov. Edgar E. Witt, Waco.

The \$5,000,000 fund would be the main spring to a back-to-the-farm movement. A commission of nine members would administer the money for the purchase of "subsistence homestead," or as loans to distressed and unemployed citizens for that purpose.

The amount that could be so extended to any individual is limited to \$1,000. The recipient would be required to cultivate the land. The bill prescribes a maximum interest rate of five per cent.

The commission also would be empowered to negotiate with the federal government for money to match the state's fund.

Walter D. Cline, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, a witness in the senatorial investigation administration, declared the proposal a good experiment. Senator Redditt's bill, however, places the life of the act at 20 years.

LICENSE PLATES REACH COUNTY

The annual assignment of motor car registration plates for Mitchell County was received recently by J. B. Holt, tax collector. There are 2,399 of the number plates assigned the county for automobile registrations and 499 plates for truck and commercial car registrations, making a total of 2,899.

License number plates to be used next year on both commercial vehicles and automobiles are different in color scheme from those issued for the current year. The new automobile plates are of orange color with blue figures. The commercial license plates are the reverse—blue background with orange figures.

NEW FIRMS GRANTED CHARTERS INCREASE 39 %

Austin, Texas, —An increase of 39.8 per cent in capitalization was registered for new firms granted charters during September to do business in Texas, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. The average capitalization for the entire third quarter of the year was 8.8 per cent above the average for the corresponding period last year.

One hundred and thirty-eight firms capitalized at \$3,166,000 were granted charters in September, as compared with 141 capitalized at \$2,265,000 in August and 148 capitalized at \$2,015,000 in September, 1932. For the entire third quarter the 413 charters represented a decline of 4.2 per cent from the 431 granted in the corresponding period last year.

Declines in number of charters granted occurred in the oil, manufacturing and banking groups, while increases occurred in merchandising, real estate, building and transportation.

Twenty-one out of state corporations were granted charters to do business in Texas, against 20 in August and 24 in September, 1932.

SPLENDID RAIN FELL TUESDAY

A splendid rain fell in the Loraine territory Tuesday afternoon and night. About an inch fell in town while a section north of town reported considerable more than that. Some hail was reported in that section but little damage was done.

The rain, though it will slow up cotton picking for a day or two, will be of much benefit to farmers who wish to sow wheat for winter pasture. It will probably help late feed also.

District Zone Meeting Of W. M. S. Held Here

Cotton Estimate 12,885,000 Bales

Washington, Oct. 9.—Cotton production this year was forecast Monday by the department of agriculture at 12,885,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight, compared with 12,414,000 bales indicated a month ago and 13,002,000 bales produced last year.

The condition of the crop on October 1 was 66.7 per cent of a normal, compared with 67.5 a month ago, 54.2 on October 1 last year and 57.1, the ten-year average on October 1.

The indicated yield per acre was announced as 205.3 pounds, compared with 197.8 pounds indicated a month ago, 173.3 pounds produced last year, and 167.4 pounds, the 10-year average.

The production forecast was based on the preliminary acreage statistics which placed the area remaining October 1 for harvest at 30,036,000 acres, allowing deduction for the probable removal of acreage reported to the agricultural adjustment administration, less abandonment on area not under contract. The area in cultivation July 1 this year was 40,798,000 acres.

The condition of the Texas crop on October 1, was 70 per cent of normal, and indicated a production of 4,190,000 bales.

Cotton of this year's crop ginned prior to October 1 was reported Monday by the census bureau to have totaled 5,851,415 running bales, counting 195,128 round bales as half bales, and including 616 bales of American-Egyptian.

Ginnings to October 1 last year totaled 4,835,990 bales.

Ginnings in Texas to October 1, this year totaled 2,281,057 bales.

VALUE OF PUBLIC HEALTH WORK SHOWN IN VALLEY

Austin, Texas, October 3.—The value of disease prevention or public health work has been clearly demonstrated in the storm stricken area of the Rio Grande Valley where state, county, and city health officers have pooled their abilities and resources to the end that there has not been any outbreak of communicable diseases following that disaster. Private interests have also assisted by supplying materials that could not be purchased by the officials on account of a lack of available funds.

There was great danger immediately following the storm that typhoid fever might become epidemic due to contamination of water supplies. Chlorine, in proper amounts, was put in these supplies and an extensive campaign of immunization against typhoid fever was started, which up to this time has reached over sixty thousand persons. The proper disposal of sewage was another problem that had to be attended to immediately.

Much of the land was covered with water and this created a wonderful chance for the multiplication of mosquitoes and the attendant danger of malaria. These places were drained where possible, and if impossible, they were oiled. The mosquito eradication work being done in the Valley is one of the largest ever attempted in the United States.

Exactly how much sickness and suffering has been prevented cannot be accurately estimated, but, from past experiences, it is safe to say that the actual saving in money is many times more than the amount which has been spent for prevention.

The Sunday school class composed of 12-year old children at the Baptist Church won the highest honors last Sunday. They have challenged Rev. Hardin's class, which was second last Sunday.

ADVISED TO ADVERTISE

The director of the NRA advises industry to advertise. First, give the public honest products at honest prices and then promote your sales through the advertising columns. This is the suggestion of General Johnson, who premises his statement on his assumption that the American public "looks to advertising for news of good merchandise and good values." Thus the administration acknowledges as a policy a thing that has been coming slowly into the realization of the public mind for a quarter of a century, namely, that advertising is an essential and highly important part of our economic system. Advertising is as necessary in our present day system as is modern transportation. Without the one the other would not be needed. Eliminate advertising and our whole system would collapse.

General Johnson is right in urging the present as a good time specifically for advertising. It may be argued that the increased pay rolls under the NRA have not had sufficient time to build up among the recently employed a new cash reserve, a buying capacity at which the advertising may be directed. There is something in this argument itself, but the market today is not with the newly employed man. It is with that large majority that have remained employed, or maintained themselves in business during the depression. The resources of this class have decreased, of course, but the fact remains that the total of demand and time deposits in the banks of the country have declined less than the general price level. This is especially true in Texas. The potential demand for consumer's goods is greater to day than at any time in recent years and there is money behind the demand, but there is also caution born of four years of fear. The prompting to activity of this potential demand, backed by billions in bank deposits, is the way out of the depression—the normal sure way along the path to permanent economic recovery. In advertising there is the power to bring it about.—Dallas News.

Current Comment From Washington

In some quarters, there seems to be a decline in the reaction to the NRA program. In this connection, note that emphasis is laid on the work "program", and not on the movement itself. The NRA entered the field as a broadly new thing, and prodigious efforts have been made to popularize it, to explain it, and to

educate the public up to it. Those efforts appear to have been successful, but they are no longer attractive. It will be recalled that it was supposed at first that the Civil War would be over in ninety day or something like that but four bloody years preceded peace. Napoleon was thought to be a man who held the destiny of France in his hand, for early termination, but destiny turned out to be a far-distant milestone. Every movement has to pass through a period which Kipling calls the tumult and the shouting. The NRA is moving through, or perhaps has passed that stage. It is been "put over" so far as popularization is concerned. Now comes the long and more trying time of trial, experiment, alteration and adaption. Having set our hand to the plow, it is not likely that we shall turn back, but insofar as both Federal Administration and the public are concerned, the day of speech-making and parade belongs to the past.

That the public is turned its eye to the actual economic work-

ing of the Act in practical operation, is evident from the newspaper reports of a speech delivered by a high official in the American Federation of Labor. He sees, as beneficial results of the measure, a large number of men re-employed, an increase in buying power, and the abolition of child labor. On the other hand, he warns that when the prices of commodities rise, wages often remain at a stand-still. Into every branch and phase of hiring or service, coordinate problems will inject themselves as time passes. The satisfactory and complete solution of those problems will be the real test of the NRA, and that solution lies almost completely in the future.

Out in Oklahoma, an alleged kidnaper flies to the place of his trial. This undoubtedly promotes the speedy administration of justice, but if he had cut up his hide in the days of the vigilance committee, his feet would have been clear of the ground by this time in a different and more uncomfortable way.

Wilma Althof of Brownlee Club Making Enviably Record in Demonstration Work

Reaching the good in food preservation was not the end of canning for Wilma Althof, who is a member of the Brownlee Home Demonstration Club. As a cooperator in food preservation her goal was to can at least 25 containers of products this year, but she has canned over 280 containers and will put up more from her fall garden. Her products include 10 quarts beans, 112 quarts peas, 70 quarts tomatoes, 7 quarts beets and 15 quarts jam and jellies which she values at approximately \$35.

As a garden co-operator, Wilma has made a splendid record. Her net profit on her garden up to September 15, was \$22. Her spring garden contained more

than 15 varieties of vegetable and in her fall garden she has 18 varieties including cucumbers, squash, peas, beans, cauliflower, tomatoes, turnips, kohlrabi, lettuce, beets, okra, spinach, pimientos, pepper, cabbage, radishes, onions and asparagus.

As bedroom demonstrator of her club this year Wilma has made a large number of improvements in her room. Before it was improved it was rather dark, with green shades and dark draperies hung in the door. This condition was taken care of by the addition of new tan shades and French doors which were varnished dark oak. The room was thoroughly cleaned and then woodwork and all furniture re-varnished in dark oak. A reading table was brought in to take the place of the old organ which crowded the room. A green bedspread and ceru curtains with green dots brightened the room. The closet was rearranged and made convenient by the addition of a rod for hangers and by arranging shelves for hats, linens and underwear. The bedroom linens she made include a sheet, pillow slips, two scarfs and a quilt.

She has served very efficiently as president of her club this year and as a result of her fine record she has been selected as one of the six to represent Nolan County at the Girl's Encampment at the State Fair October 17 to 19.
