Detroit Church Of Christ Open House

The new building of the Detroit Church of Christ was formally opened Sunday afternoon with an open house for the public. Construction of the building was done by Hays Construction Co. of Fort Worth with Jacky and Billy Robertson doing the brick work. The new auditorium has a seating capacity of 180. There are six class rooms, nursery, pastor's study, rest rooms and storage room.

Interior is pine paneling and sheet rock, with matching pine pews and pulpit. Pews are cushioned in wine colored fabric matching the carpeting. Cost of the building was \$25,000. Furnishings were not included in this cost price.

Two hundred and sixty were present for the open house. Benny Cogburn of Detroit is pastor of the church, not Jacky Robertson as stated in last week's edition. Robertson is song leader and teacher in the church. Also held in connection with the opening was a four day Gospel meeting with Dave Hearn of Madison, Tenn., doing the preaching. His sermon for the Sunday service was "Two Temples."

Mail To Be Airlifted To Armed Forces Serving Overseas

Postmaster Westbrook of the Talco Postoffice today announced that heretofore all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters), and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, under Public Law 89-72, "The Dulski Military Mail Act," which was signed by President Johnson on November 2, 1966, second class publications such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

The Postmaster explained that parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

To speed up separation and delivery of these smaller parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien directed that all parcels be clearly marked upon acceptance at the post office with the letters SAM (surface airtail mail).

This will eliminate the task of reweighing and measuring the parcels at the San Francisco Concentration Center prior to dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas military post offices.

The Postmaster also reminded mailers that Christmas parcels weighing 5 pounds and under, though they are given airtail priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than December 1. Airmail, he said, should be sent no later than December 10.

To Distribute Survey Cards

Rural mail carriers from the local Post Office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning November 20.

"In formation reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," the Postmaster explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes. "This means that not every box will get a card," the Postmaster said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

PETITION ASKS ELECTION PROPOSING SCHOOL MERGE WILKINSON-RIVERCREST

At the regular meeting of the Titus County Commissioners Court Monday morning, an election proposing to merge the Wilkinson School District with the Talco-Bogata (Rivercrest) School District.



Austin. — School teachers are moving boldly forward with their drive for an \$85,000,000 a year pay raise. This, despite the fact that they don't have the support of the governor's committee on education needs.

Texas State Teachers Association seeks salary increases ranging from \$61 to \$100 a month. This would cost the state \$68,000,000 and local school districts \$17,000,000 annually.

TSTA says it has rounded up considerable support in the Legislature and among education-support groups.

But the governor's committee voted not to make any reports on any phase of its far-reaching study until it has completed research in all areas of public schools.

Chairman Leon Jaworski expressed confidence that Gov. John Connally will call a special session of the Legislature in 1968 to consider the committee's final recommendations.

A committee resolution recognized that salaries are important to staffing schools but added that other factors are just as vital in determining the effectiveness of teachers and administrators.

Without a committee recommendation, there will be sentiment among lawmakers to tell teachers they will have to wait another year for pay adjustment. Teachers will bring pressure on legislators to act immediately. This will be one of the toughest problems legislators will face during the 1967 session.

Decision is all the more difficult in view of an anticipated tax bill of well over \$100,000,000 that is exclusive of the teacher pay question.

COLLEGE LOANS APPROVED — A total of \$9,535,000 in federal loans has been approved for Texas colleges and universities under federal higher education facilities. They will help finance \$23,000,000 worth of buildings.

Dr. J. K. Williams, commissioner of Texas Public Higher Education, announced that the following loans have been cleared:

AIR STANDARDS HEARING SET — Air Control Board set Jan. 5 for public hearing on proposed regulations to control pollution from smoke and particulate matter.

Tentative regulations would outlaw burning of burrs, trash, lint and other wastes from cotton gins and regulate mechanical dust collectors for asphalt portable plants. They cover flues, grading of smoke density, combustion units and distances of pollution sources from neighboring property.

TEXTBOOKS ADOPTED — State Board of Education has adopted \$6,400,000 worth of new textbooks for 11 subjects.

Board also authorized development of state plan to support \$2,500,000 federal loan application for educational services to children of migrant agricultural workers.

In other action, it reviewed appeal from ruling of Commissioner J. W. Edgar concerning transfer of pupils from Neches school district to adjoining Frankston and Palestine ISDs.

FEDERAL LANDS — Texas Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has gone on record as favoring a plan to give to the individual states control of the revenue from federally owned lands within the states.

Sadler said he will make that recommendation to the federal Land Law Review Commission, of which he is a member.

His plan would give to the state in which the land is located 40 per cent of the revenue from that land. Other 60 per cent would be divided among the other 49 states. Texas has no federal lands.

Texas Liquor Control Board warned licensees may be suspended for night clubs featuring "topless" dancers.

Interscholastic League has voted a committee study of the controversial rule which forces high school athletes to lose a year of sports eligibility if they change schools.

Arkla Net Income Rises In 1966

Arkansas Louisiana Gas Co. had consolidated net income of \$21,803,377 for the first nine months of 1966, an increase of \$1,618,857 over the same period in 1965, the company said in a report today to its 36,000 stockholders.

Net income per common share for the first nine months, after dividends on preference stock, was \$2.15 compared to \$1.98 for the first nine months for last year, an increase of 17 cents per share, or 8.6 per cent.

Consolidated gross revenues and sales for the first nine months were \$125,331,127, up \$5,874,149, the company reported.

For the 12 months ending Sept. 30, net income of \$27,801,547 was up 9 per cent over the previous 12 months, while for the same period net income per common share was \$2.74, an increase of 23 cents over the previous 12 months period.

Five area gins have turned out 8120 bales this season. A total of 5085 bales have been handled by Deport's three gins with Blackland Prairie ginning 3380; Deport Co-Operative 1005, and Home Gin 700 bales.

Cunningham Gin has ginned 1885 bales and Fulbright Gin 1150 for the season.

Seed price is quoted at \$67 per ton.

Fire Burns Over 1100 Acres Grass

Referendum Dec. 5-9 Cotton Quotas

The upcoming referendum on marketing quotas for the 1967 crop of upland cotton will be conducted by mail during the period Dec. 5 thru 9, 1966. This is the first time that growers have voted on marketing quotas by mail. It is hoped that this more convenient method will encourage a larger vote.

Growers eligible to cast ballots in the referendum are all those who engaged in the production of the 1966 crop of upland cotton. Ballots will be sent to all growers who are on record in this ASCS office.

The quotas will become effective and the broad upland cotton diversion program will be available next year if at least two-thirds of the growers voting approve the quotas. This upland program would provide price-support and diversion payments as well as loans. If more than a third of the growers who vote disapprove quotas, price support at 50 per cent of parity will be available to growers who keep their 1967-crop cotton acreage within their farm allotments.
