"Facelifting" Is Now Underway At Local P.O.

A remodeling project is underway at the Santa Anna Post Office and expected to be completed this week. The old combination type boxes are being replaced by new lock boxes which require a key to open.

Work began Monday and the new boxes are expected to be ready for use by Thursday, according to Postmaster John Gregg.

Included in the renovation project will be the addition of a stamp vending machine and a new light fixture in the lobby.

While the project is being completed the post office lobby will be closed at 6:00 p.m. each afternoon and opened at 7:00 a.m.

Postmaster Gregg also asked that local postal patrons begin using box numbers for all local mail and to discontinue the use of "City" for local addresses. Some of the local mail will be processed in Brownwood and the city address is incomplete.

The remodeling program has been planned for some time to better serve the local patrons. There were not enough boxes to serve the town and the old boxes were obsolete and could not be repaired when broken or worn.

Postal patrons are asked to cooperate during the construction period and for the transition from combination boxes to the new lock type.

CASE OF RABIES IS CONFIRMED AT ROCKWOOD

A confirmed case of rabies was reported in the area last week after a red fox was killed at the A. D. Eppler place at Rockwood. The fox was killed Sunday, July 4, and the disease was confirmed after the animal's head was sent to the State Health Department lab at Austin.

The rabid animal was first seen at the Eppler home Saturday but left before it could be killed. It reappeared on Sunday and attacked the Eppler's dog, Dwight Eppler killed the animal. After the rabies was confirmed the Eppler's dog was killed as it had not been vaccinated for the disease.

A confirmed case of rabies was also reported in the Brooksmith area recently.

Wayne Wristen Is Recovering From Injuries

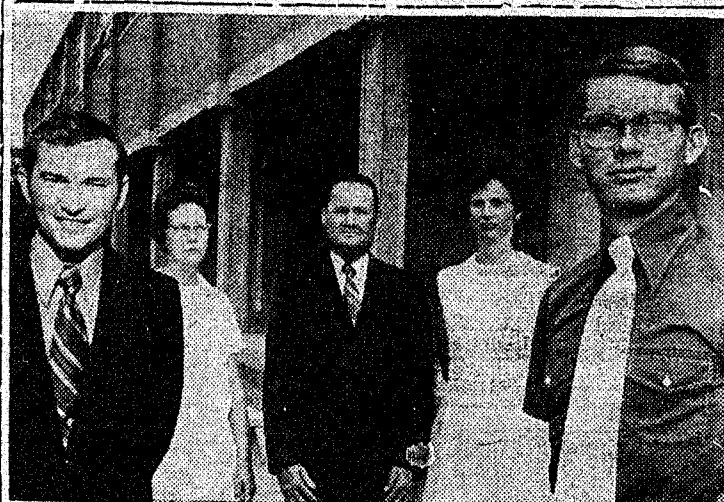

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In Our Opinion

THE DRUG CONTROVERSY seems to grow and grow and grow. It used to be a problem generally allocated to college age young people, but the age category has grown both directions to include junior high and sometimes elementary age children and in the other direction to older ones in the various branches of the military.

When we were growing up we were told 'an idle mind is the devil's workshop,' and that seems to be one of the problems with some military people stationed in Viet Nam. Fighting has slacked up and the men don't have enough to do to keep busy, so they look for some kind of diversion.

What the excuse for other people taking drugs is another matter. It could be idleness or one of many problems to cause them to want to "get away from it all" through the use of some narcotic.

Arguments that marijuana is harmless are beginning to be disproved by medical authorities. In some research done by Dr. Harold Kolansky and Dr. William T. Moore and reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association, they cited plenty of evidence that the weed is harmful and should be classed with narcotics. They conducted a study for a period of five years, from 1965 to 1970, and made their report in the April issue of the Journal.

A typical case was a 19-year-old college student who went to his college counselor complaining of a thinking problem. The boy said he felt it was because he was smoking marijuana, but his counselor assured him the drug was harmless.

When he started smoking the weed, he was an "A" student but within two months became apathetic, disoriented and depressed, and by the end of the semester he was failing all courses and showed a lack of judgement in other matters.

During the five-year study the doctors treated a number of people who smoked marijuana, and their report was based on 38 of the group ranging in age 13 to 24. All of them smoked pot two or more times a week.

All showed adverse psychological effects, and some showed neurologic symptoms. Of the 20 male and 18 female individuals, there were eight psychoses, four of which attempted suicide; 13 unmarried female patients who became sexually promiscuous, and seven became pregnant.

All patients consistently showed very poor social judgement, the doctors reported, poor attention span, poor concentration, confusion, anxiety, depression, apathy, passivity, indifference and often, slowed or slurred speech, also a paranoid suspiciousness of others, and a regression to a more infantile state.

Those who were students showed a history of steadily declining academic ability and all felt isolated from others.

As to reasons for marijuana use, the psychiatrists suggested that one of the reasons was a lack of parental interest and guidance in their pre-adolescent years which caused the user to be more susceptible to drug use as a means of escape.

Whatever the reason for their susceptibility to drugs, the availability of a supply is bound to have an effect. If they were hard enough to get then their use would certainly be curtailed.

Arguments for legalization of marijuana just don't hold water. Such research as this should be proof enough that smoking pot is harmful and every means available should be used to stop it.

Their arguments coincide with those of alcoholic beverage supporters, that if it is readily available people will lose interest, but it just don't work that way. Making it available indicates approval, any way you look at it.

To us square old foggies the future looks anything but bright. We see an increase in permissiveness as a sign that this world is gradually becoming another Sodom and Gomorrah, and the only solution is the fate of that Biblical city.

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Capital NEWS

Austin — The 1972 political campaigns already are beginning to shape up — 11 months before primary election dates.

William P. Hobby, president and executive editor of the Houston Post, is the first announced candidate for lieutenant governor. State Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwell is expected to enter the race soon.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes is seeking advice of supporters on how he should run his race for governor. Barnes announced last month he will be a candidate, and has been busy traveling most of the time since.

Uvalde rancher-banker Dolph Briscoe moved quietly ahead with plans for a gubernatorial campaign in spite of Barnes early entry. Briscoe reportedly has a preliminary campaign event (a youth rally) scheduled for Uvalde July 23-24.

Gov. Preston Smith keeps hinting he may seek a third term, and a lot of folks are convinced he means it.

Former Sen. Ralph Yarborough says frankly he is considering running either for governor or the U. S. Senate. Republican Sen. John Tower has no hope of escaping Democratic opposition in a re-election campaign. Others mentioned as possible Democratic opponents for Tower include Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, State Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso and Houston attorney John L. Hill.

Top Democrats cite the need for a strong united party effort particularly for the November presidential campaign, convention nomination battles and the U. S. Senate race. That's why they are keeping a close eye on naming a successor to State Democratic Chairman Dr. Elmer C. Baum of Austin.

Baum denied a published report he already had resigned but didn't rule out the possibility he may step aside soon. Two aides to the Governor have been working on selection of a replacement chairman.

COURTS SPEAK — Texas Supreme Court overturned a lower court decision that a Tarrant County charitable institution (YMCA) is not liable for damages to a boy who lost an eye in a camp accident, and ordered a new trial.

In other recent actions, the High Court:

- Directed Austin trial court not to issue any more orders to prevent service by the new Southwest Airlines between San Antonio, Houston and Dallas.

- Held Fort Worth and Waco prosecutors must go ahead with pending cases involving Sunday closing laws before they file any more injunction suits.

- Sent back to intermediate court for further consideration a Zavala County widow's suit against a butane gas supplier as the result of the accidental death of her husband in an explosion and fire.

- Set a July 21 hearing in Humble Oil and Refining Company's appeal from lower court findings that it must pay to the state \$92,788 in axes on oil taken from lease on Corpus Christi Naval Air Station, federal property.

- Set a July 21 hearing in a case involving whether corporations can claim exemption from a penalty provision of state security law. Two Lubbock men brought the case.

- Held Exchange Bank and Trust Company of Dallas must pay to a construction concern \$25,725 on forged company checks which it cashed by mistake.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Smith named Secretary of State Martin Dies Jr. of Lubbock chief justice of the Ninth Court of Civil Appeals in Beaumont. Appointment removed Dies from speculation as a possible candidate for U. S. senator, lieutenant governor or congressman.

Smith appointed former State Rep. Jack Ray McLaughlin of Fort Worth as commissioner of labor statistics, succeeding Tommy V. Smith.

Other Smith appointees during the past week include Bowie County Criminal District Attorney Guy E. Jones of Texarkana as judge of the new 202nd district court; N. L. Cooksey of Texarkana as criminal district attorney succeeding Jones in Bowie County; Bell County Court-at-Law Judge Donald L. Busby of Belton as 146th district judge; Dr. William Kenneth Thurmond of Fort Worth and Dr. Charles Max Cole of Dallas (re-appointed) to State Board of Health.

Curtis C. Gunn of San Antonio and Jack C. McKenzie of Corpus Christi are chairman and vice-chairman of the new Texas Motor Vehicle Commission to police auto dealers. Other members are H. G. Andrews Jr. of Stamford, Dick McClain of Houston, Fenner Tubbs Sr. of Lubbock and W. O. Bankston of Dallas.

Richard Keahey, native of San Angelo, was appointed executive director of Texas Veterans Land Program succeeding W. W. Glass who held the job eight years.

Jack Banner of Wichita Falls, Robert L. Templeton of Amarillo and Morgan K. Talbot of McAllen are chairman, vice-chairman and secretary of Texas Bar Foundation.

BANK DEPOSITS, INTEREST UP — A recent statewide survey showed bank deposits steadily increasing — some to record levels at mid-year.

Mid-year records are considered unusual, and the boom is regarded as proof of the basic economic strength in spite of drought, unemployment and other problems.

At the same time, major Texas banks went along with eastern institutions and raised prime interest rates. Increase was from 5.5 per cent to six per cent for prime loans to quality borrowers.

Eastern banks also raised interest rates on time accounts which may attract even more deposits in savings account in the next quarter of 1971.

SAFETY PROGRAM STEP-PEDED UP — Governor Smith approved three Texas Alcohol Safety Action projects designed to control abusive drinker-drivers, regarded as the number one traffic safety menace in Texas.

in Texas.

Applications went to National Highway Traffic Safety Administration for federal approval.

Projects are in Harris County (\$311,200); Dallas (\$239,300) and Central Texas (Bell, Coryell, Hamilton, Lampasas, Milam, and Mills counties, \$300,700).

Aim is to identify problem drinker-drivers, apply a variety of possible solutions and evaluate results as to the overall effectiveness.

GAME FISH RULES CHANGED — Ten county commissioners courts have voted to amend 1971-72 game and fish regulations proposed by Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Legislature this year authorized five more counties to reject proclamations passed by PWC. Similar authority had been given 18 counties, subject to vote of commissioners court.

Ten counties which disapproved portions of proclamations are Edwards, Dimmit, Hays, Kendall, Kimble, Medina, Real, Robertson, Sutton and Uvalde. Bandera, Coke, Crockett, Frio, Kerr, Lampasas, Menard, Reagan, San Saba, Schleicher, Val Verde and Zavala counties approved laws as submitted.

BANKING BOARD TO MEET — State Banking Board scheduled a Thursday (July 15) meeting to consider dates for hearings on 56 new state bank charter applications.

Board also will consider new rules and regulations in accord with recent legislation, charter applications which may be ready for vote, and requests by banks for changes in business locations. Meeting will be the first since Dr. Elmer Baum resigned last May. James Lindsey of College Station was named to the Board to succeed Baum.

SHORT SNORTS

Air Force planes began spraying last week to halt the spread of Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, a mosquito-spread disease.

Texas received one of eight major grants in the nation (\$370,122) for an area-wide model project on aging, to be located in Houston.

Texas disabled veterans will receive free 1972 auto license

plates under a new program. Properties of Copperas Cove Industrial Foundation Inc., non-profit corporation to promote industrial development are not exempt from ad valorem taxes, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

Board of Mental Health-Mental Retardation has approved selection of architects for new MH-MR facilities at Vernon, Dallas and Kerrville.

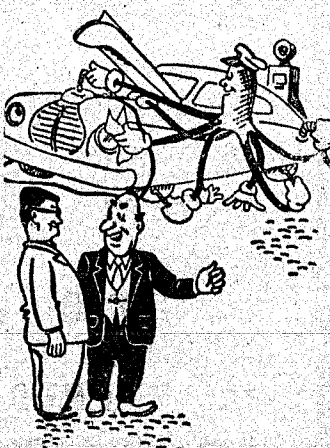

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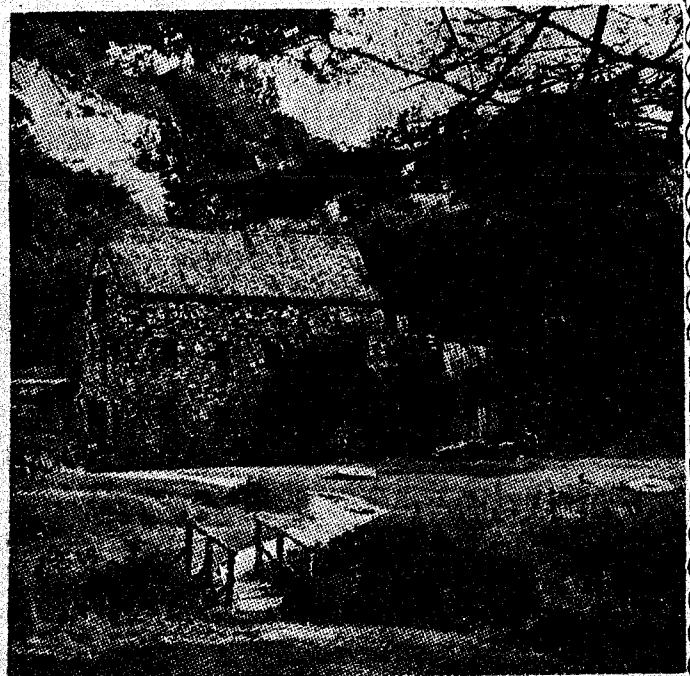
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ADVENTIST MISSIONARIES SURVIVE ALASKAN CRASH

Report of a mission plane crash in Alaska was received at Seventh-day Adventist world headquarters in Washington, D.C. just recently.

Ronald Breingan of Dillingham, Alaska, and Joe Chythlook, an eskimo pastor, survived the crash and exposure to severe weather in Aniak Pass for two days and two nights. The only injuries suffered other than exposure was a wound on Chythlook's forehead and a torn triceps muscle in Breingan's right arm.

Breingan's wife, who reported the accident to the church's world headquarters, was at their home in Dillingham at the time of the crash. She stated that over Aniak Pass the plane, which was a Cessna 180, encountered severe winds. Pilot Chythlook attempted to turn the plane and return to Anchorage, their take-off point. But the plane was caught in a down-draft and thrown to the ground.

On hitting the ground the windshield broke off, the doors blew off, and the right wing was torn loose. Breingan got out to survey damages and the wind picked the plane up, turned it over, and slid downhill with Chythlook still in it. The FAA station that day clocked winds blowing at 100 mph or more.

The men took their sleeping bags in the plane for a time for shelter but had to abandon the plane since it kept rolling. They moved a

short distance away, thus were left without a shelter.

Mrs. Breingan states that after two days the men were convulsing with cold and having much difficulty breathing normally. For warmth they burned two gas cases and other burnable items from the plane, including the plastic windshield. And they prayed, as also did Mrs. Breingan back in Dillingham. And the Air Force was searching when weather permitted.

On Friday the Air Force found them. At first the helicopter was unable to land because of the fierce winds, but dropped two para-medics. About two hours later the helicopter landed and picked them up. They were taken to Bethel for first aid.

Pator and Mrs. Breingan, in spite of this experience, say that in Alaska "flying is not a dangerous thing. It is the only thing. It is by flying here that the gospel is going to reach the many Eskimo people in Alaska."

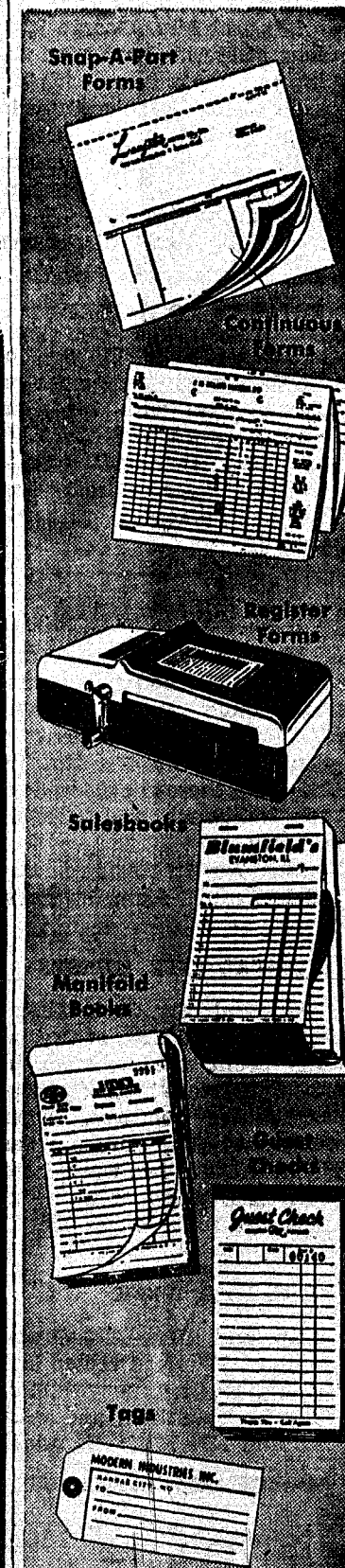

Accent On Health

The Texas meat inspection program, operated by the Texas State Department of Health, is less than two years old, but has been appraised as equal to federal inspection procedures and given full endorsement by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The State Health Department in 1969 opened a school at Yoakum to train meat inspectors, a move required by a new Texas Meat and Poultry Act. Faced with the choice of letting the federal government take over all inspection or providing adequate state inspection, the Texas Legislature decided in favor of state controls. The federal government still inspects all red meat and poultry processed for interstate (across state lines) shipments.

The amount of red meat and poultry inspected is staggering. In 1970, more than 306

million pounds of red meat — beef and pork — came under the critical eyes of State Health Department inspectors. In addition, 63½ million pounds of poultry was inspected.

State meat inspectors are keeping close tabs on all meat processed at the 646 slaughterhouse and processing plants now under state inspection. Meat animals are carefully checked before slaughter, after slaughter, and through every stage of the packing process.

The objective of the Texas meat inspection program is to insure better meat products for all Texans. Inspection is essential to make certain that only wholesome meat and meat products reach the tables of consumers. The program will also upgrade the meat industry and encourage it to provide better products.

Texas meat inspectors have been placed throughout the

state, from Amarillo to Brownsville and from El Paso to Texarkana. Every packing plant in the state has a carefully trained inspector on duty at all times.

The symbol of the Texas meat inspection program is a purple Texas-shaped stamp. If you begin to notice the Texas stamp on the beef or poultry you buy at the supermarket, you know that meat is safe and wholesome. It has been inspected and certified by inspectors trained by the Texas State Department of Health.

Test Tube Democracy

Think of television networks and jet transportation, and the United States will appear to be one vast, interconnected unit.

But think of traffic laws and fishing regulations and the real estate taxes and grounds for divorce, and the United States will appear to be a jumble of diversities.

Such diversities can be confusing. But they are also rewarding in a way that is too often overlooked. Supreme Court Justice Louis Brandeis once put the matter as follows:

"It is one of the happy incidents of the federal system that a single courageous state, may, if its citizens choose, serve as a laboratory; and try novel social and economic experiments without risk to the rest of the country."

This advantage of diversity is not the least bit theoretical. On the contrary, there are countless examples of one state leading the way, trying out a new idea, while other states wait and see how it works — very much like a scientist watching an experiment in a test tube.

For instance: is it a good idea to give the customers of door-to-door salesman a "cooling-off period," during which they may reconsider and cancel the order?

Some say this would protect the gullible buyer from high-pressure salesmanship. Others say it would put an unfair burden on the legitimate firms engaged in this field. A number of states are now putting the idea to a test.

Or: is it a good idea for the state to pay compensation to the victims of violent crime?

Some say this would be fulfilling a moral obligation of the state. Others say it would be just another costly boon-

doggle. Several states are now trying it out.

Of course, no two states are exactly alike. Lawmakers, considering a new program, will weigh local conditions and consult local opinion. Yet they will also be influenced by finding out what actually happened when the idea was tried in a sister state.

"The science of government," said an earlier Supreme Court, "is the science of experiment."

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Disabled Vets Vehicle Tags Will Be Free

Details of a new program, which will provide free 1972 automobile license plates to some disabled veterans have been revealed by the Texas Highway Department.

The program was set up by an act of the 62nd Legislature.

To qualify, an applicant must:

- Be a Texas resident;
- Be a veteran of the armed forces of the United States;
- Have a disability rating of 70 per cent or more;
- Be drawing compensation from the federal government as the result of service-connected disability.

A qualified veteran is entitled to register one passenger car or light commercial vehicle with a manufacturer's rated carrying capacity of one ton or less for his own use without paying the prescribed registration fee. There is a statutory fee of \$1 which must accompany each application.

Specially designed license plates will be issued with the letters "DV" appearing as either a prefix or suffix to the license number. The words "Disabled Vet" also will appear on the plates.

Vehicles with Disabled Vet plates will be exempt from paying parking fees charged by any governmental authority other than the federal government. This includes parking meters.

The license plates will not be available until the beginning of the 1972 registration year. The law provides that the disabled veteran must make application by October 1 preceding the registration year for which the plates are requested.

All Disabled Vet plates will be issued directly from the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

As a prerequisite, the veteran's disability rating must be verified by the Veteran's Administration or the branch of the armed forces from which he draws his disability compensation.

Also, the Texas title to the vehicle must be issued in the name of the veteran.

Application forms and instructions may be secured from the Texas Highway Department, Motor Vehicle Division, 40th and Jackson Avenue, Austin, Texas 78703.

The forms also will be available from Motor Vehicle Division district offices in many major cities as well as county tax offices; county veteran service officers; American Legion headquarters in Austin and Veterans of Foreign Wars headquarters in Austin.

OLD BUILDINGS STILL STANDING USED BY EARLY-DAY MERCHANTS

The three old rock buildings on the 700 block of Wallis Avenue and corner of North Third St. are of unusual interest because of the carved rock coigns around half of the top. We wonder if they were originally around the complete front and side; there is a lone one at the northwest corner. The stones are carved on a base, with a large round ball with a smaller one on top.

The three buildings are each of different rock; only the east one is occupied at this time by the Domino Hall.

The block is owned by Mr. Tom Hays and Ralph Mathews. The rock was quarried from the Santa Anna Mountain by Temple Perry and carved by Tom Petty, who sat in the street carving by hand. The buildings were put up by McHorse Brothers about 1900 to 1905.

The west buildings have more elaborate arches over the doors and windows, also the west side has a door and a window on the north with the heavy rock arches.

Reminiscing with Mr. Hays and Lee Hunter, Mr. McAnally had a livery stable north of the buildings with a well in the space between the buildings and present carports. Col. Robertson had a gas office in the west side; Roy McFarlin had a cafe at one time. Mr. Garrett had a second-hand furniture store in the middle building.

A. C. Hooper had a barber

shop with low prices — probably the first one on the east side. Oscar Whitlow had a barber shop in the east building and is said to have charged 10c for a hair cut and 15c for a haircut-and-shave.

W. L. Carroll had a plumbing shop on the east side. Hosch had a dry goods store at a later date in the corner building. Sam Collier had a feed store where the cars now park on the pavement back of the rock buildings, and many more are not recalled.

As progress marches on our old buildings with interesting history are being razed to make room for new structures.
