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INTERNATIONAL CANNING CONTEST

A BALANCED MEAL IN GLASS



I imagine having a whole dinner ready in jars to be brought out whenever you need it. That is what many of our housewives can plan today. It takes all the worry out of serving unexpected guests. Then too, it lets the housewife prepare her meal on the day when she has more time so that when she is rushed she has only to take her meal from glass jars. Our meal may not include nuts but it does include soup. And there are so many delicious soups which may be prepared and stored safely in glass jars to be used when needed. Imagine the flavor of well prepared "Green Pea Soup." Then there are tomato or vegetable soups of all kinds. The meat soups may include any number of kinds. Any favorite soup may be canned. Chicken broth or gumbo or the more hearty fish chowder as well as beef bouillon may all find their way into glass jars. Soups are processed for 3 1/2 hours in boiling water, or for 50 minutes at an hour at 15 pounds pressure in a steam pressure cooker.

After soup comes the main part of the meal which may include any meat you may wish. If you have never tasted home canned meats you've no idea how good they are! Just every kind of meat may be canned: Beef stew, hamburger, roast or boiled steak. There may be chops, spare ribs or roast. Veal and lamb are great favorites. When the flock of chickens are culled they may all be canned at once. They may be prepared as stew, roast or fried. Accompanying the meat may be one of a dozen or more vegetables: tomatoes, okra, corn, peas, lima, or string beans, asparagus, beets, spinach, kraut, squash or sweet potatoes. One of these vegetables may be made into a crisp, delicious salad, serving with a favorite dressing. With this meal we may add some lovely pickles, there are so many to choose from, for the housewife likes to keep a variety on her cellar shelf.

The meal will include a jam or jelly. What a splendid variety there is to choose from: strawberry jam, plum butter, raspberry or black-

berry jam, orange marmalade or what have you.

For dessert there are the home canned fruits. She will choose the kind which is most suitable to follow the main part of her meal. These may be served either plain, with simple cookies or cake, or made into a pudding, cobbler or pie.

One little widowed mother, who teaches during the year, tells how she meets the demands on her time and money by raising a garden in the summer and then canning these vegetables and fruits for winter use. "I could never manage with three children, who are in school, if these foods were not all ready for us to use when we get home for our meals. I know, too, that they are good for the children." A balanced meal in glass is a great convenience.

TEXAS' OPPORTUNITY

Texas controls gas and oil enough to provide fuel for half the nation's industries, and has in reserve countless thousands of tons of combustible lignite; it has a virtual monopoly of the most important chemical known to the modern industrial world, producing more than eighty-five per cent of the world's, and almost one hundred per cent of the country's sulphur; completion of the intracoastal canal will connect its industrial centers with all of the important cities and populous areas of the Great Lakes and Mississippi Valley regions, and its splendid deep-water ports already have given it access to all world markets. To these add a mild and salubrious climate favorable to efficient year-round industrial operations and an abundant supply of surface and artesian waters. It is a picture of incomparable industrial opportunity.

No commonwealth of ancient or modern history ever had so valid a claim upon industrial and commercial pre-eminence, yet there is a rather general feeling that we are muffed the opportunity. Enough Texas gas is being wasted, experts inform us, to operate all of the industries of the great Chicago and Pittsburgh industrial districts; and instead of encouraging industry to come to Texas where this abundance of cheap fuel is available, our tactics are calculated to suggest that they locate elsewhere and pipe this precious fuel to the out-of-Texas location.

There was recently established in Corpus Christi a great chemical manufacturing industry whose initial investment will range between ten and twenty million dollars. It will afford employment for approximately fifteen hundred men. This giant industry came to Texas for three good reasons: it demanded a location central as to sulphur, salt and fuel, and nowhere else could that requirement be so well satisfied as in Texas.

If we would have more industries in Texas, like the one that established in Corpus Christi, we've got to build a reputation for industrial-mindedness. We've got to conduct ourselves, particularly in our legislative halls, so that a reputation for fair-

For in our car that means 160 miles of traveling. I don't know how anyone could have more fun for the money. Almost anything can happen in that distance.

And frequently does. This British dolt system reminds me of the story of the snake that started to swallow its own tail and pretty soon had completely devoured itself. Says we, if a thing is not a good thing if carried to its logical conclusion, then it's not a good thing to start. I'll draw a map of that.

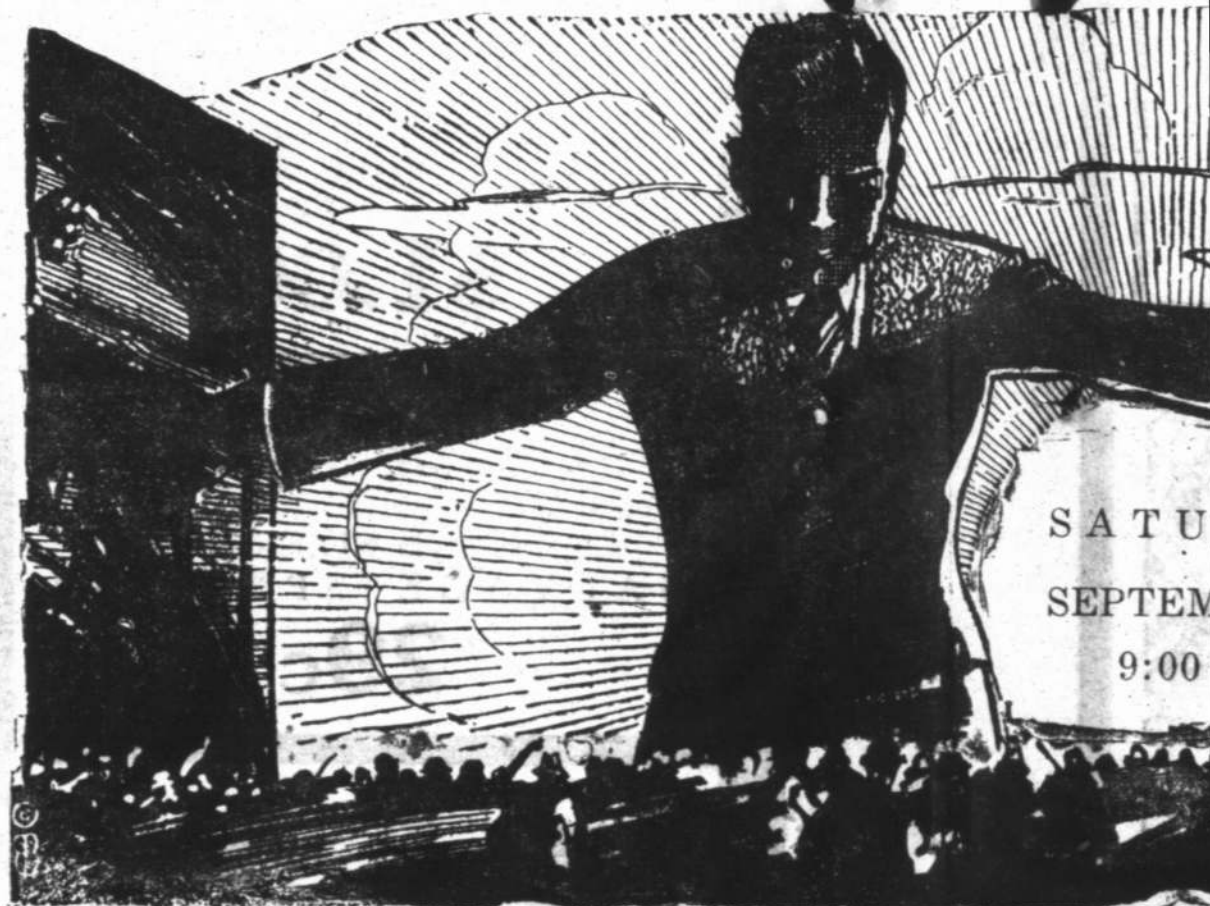

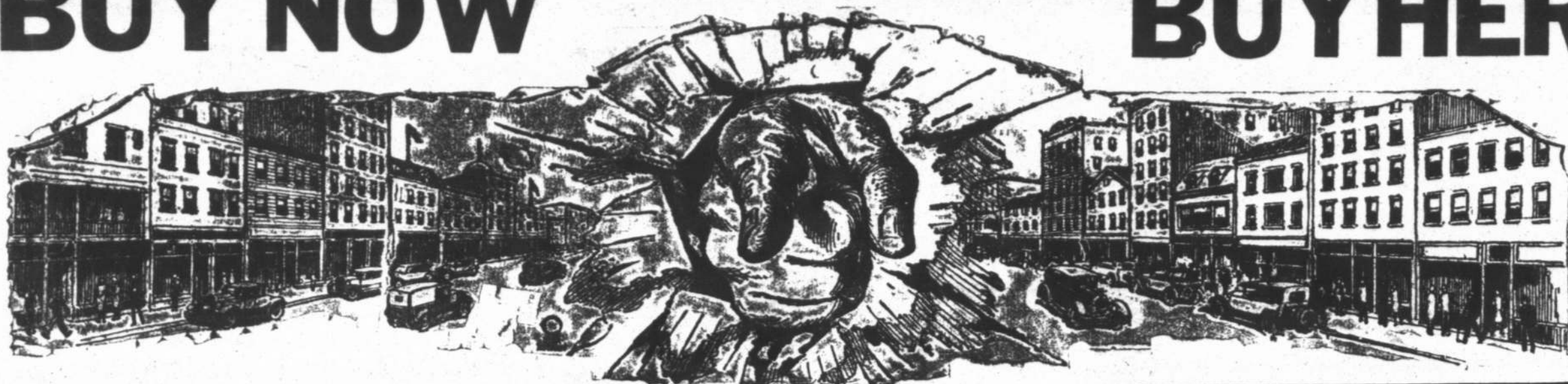

OLD PUDDING RECIPES ARE DRESSED IN NEW STYLES

Puddings are an old fashioned
dessert and in the history of cook
ery trace their lineage back to
the days when knights and ladies
and archery and tournaments dictated
the fashions in courtesy and
sports. Even this day in England
your dessert six days out of the
seven will be a pudding whether
it be a snack or a generous serving.
But the English puddings are
rather prosaic desserts for the
patriotic palates of Americans.
Fortunate are we who have had
handed down to us some of the
old pudding recipes of our New
England grandmothers or our
Southern mammas or Pennsylvania
aunts. Their pudding desserts
brought swains galloping across
four counties to the family table.
It has become the fashion today
among the young matrons to hunt
out the yellow leafed cook books
and try the pudding recipes. Some
receive the family approval. Others
must be dressed up to meet
the new fashions in fruits, sauces
and synthesized favors.

Cottage Pudding
One fourth cup butter.
Two thirds cup sugar.
One egg.
One fourth tsp. vanilla.
One fourth tsp. lemon.
extract
Two cups family flour.
One tsp. baking powder.
One half tsp. salt.
One half tsp. soda.
One half cup evaporated milk.
One half cup water.
One tsp. vinegar.
Cream butter, and sugar and
continue creaming until sugar
granules are dissolved. Add eggs
and beat well. Add extract. Sift
flour, then measure. Resift with
baking powder, salt and soda. Combine
evaporated milk, water and
vinegar. Add alternately with dry
ingredients to first mixture, begin
ning and ending with flour. Bake
in a layer cake pan a moderate
oven about thirty minutes. serve
with Vanilla Sauce.

Vanilla Sauce
One fourth lb. marshmallow (13)
One half cup water.
One cup evaporated milk.
One tsp. vanilla.
Scald milk over boiling water.
Chill thoroughly. Melt marshmallows
over boiling water. Add water
and continue cooking until
clear. Chill. Whip milk and fold
in marshmallow mixture. Add vanilla.
Serve cold. Yield: 6 servings.

Apple Dumpling
Pinch off small piece of pastry
and roll into pieces about 6 inches
in diameter. Lay a pared, cored
apple in center of each. Add one
and one half tsp. sugar, 1 tsp.
butter and a dash of nutmeg to
each apple. If apples are hard to
cook, cut into quarters, leaving
sections joined at bottom. Bring
corners of pastry up over top of
apple. Place dumplings in oiled
pan and bake in an oven (400
degrees F.) 10 minutes, then reduce
to moderate oven (375 degrees
F.) to finish baking. Serve
with Raisin Hard Sauce.

Plain Pastry
Four cups pastry flour.
Two tsp. salt.
One cup fat.
One third cup evaporated milk
and one third cup water mixed.
All ingredients should be sold.
Sift flour, then measure. Resift
with salt. Work fat into flour.
The pastry will be flakier if fat
and flour are not too thoroughly
blended. Add only sufficient diluted
milk to make dough soft enough
to roll out.

Raisin Hard Sauce
One tsp. butter.
Two cups evaporated milk.
Two cups confectioner's sugar.
One half cup raisins.
Cream butter, add sugar and
blend thoroughly. Add milk slowly
until mixture is light and fluffy.
Add raisins. Keep cold until ready
to serve. Yield: 6 servings.

Rice Custard Pudding
One one half cups boiled rice.
Two eggs.
One half cup sugar.
One half tsp. salt.
